Students favor 24-hour visitation

Should Dana College enact a 24-hour visitation period? Recently this issue has been addressed by students, along with concerns of personal freedom on campus.

Currently the guide for residence hall living states "students of one sex are permitted to be on the floor or in the room of a residence hall occupied by members of the opposite sex only during visitation hours. The current hours are 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. without an escort. With an escort they are 11 p.m. to 1 a.m. Sunday through Thursday and Friday and Saturday 11 p.m. to 3 a.m."

Open visitation is allowed in designated areas of residence hall lounges, lobbies and study rooms. When students were posed with the question of open visitation on campus, most responded in favor of it. Sophomore Shawn Isaacs said, "Yes I think we should have open visitation because the rules around here

are a joke. There are plenty of other colleges that have it."

Senior Jason Kemp stated, "Yes, I feel we are adults and should be treated as adults. We should have the opportunity to practice our free will."

Some students mentioned that rules are not enforced anyway. "Open visitation will be easier and we won't have to break any rules. People break the rules anyway," said first-year student Dave Anderson.

Roommate conflicts are another aspect of the question. "Yeah, I don't see a problem unless there is a conflict with your roommate," said sophomore Jeff Buman. Others feel differently towards 24-hour visitation; "No, I think it is disrespectful especially if you have a roommate," said sophomore Emily Kempcke.

The students opposed to the 24-hour visitation issue said they were old fashioned, didn't think 24-hour visitation was necessary and it would cause more problems in the dorms.

Minimum sanction for violating the visitation policy is a monetary fine of not less than \$25 per violation. Additional sanctions may include suspension and/or loss of visitation privileges.

Several students feel they are adults and are grown up enough to be responsible for their own actions. Although the majority of students favor open visitation hours, no action has been taken.

Senior Jennifer Hogie said, "Yes, we have been trying to do that (implementation of the policy) for years. Everyone is adult enough to decide for themselves."

Faculty members help in excavating an ancient city

The foundations of Jewish and Christian beliefs lay, in part, in the history of Israel. Dana College professors and students have played a part in bringing the history of the ancient city of Bethsaida to light.

Dana College professors Dr. John Mark Nielsen (English) and Dr. Delvin Hutton (religion) have participated in the Bethsaida excavations on several occasions since the project began in 1991. Professor Fran Mallory (business) made the trip in 1992.

The exact location of Bethsaida had been disputed. Nineteenth-century biblical scholars E. Robinson and G. Schumacher proposed three possible sites for the ancient city.

In 1987 Dr. Rami Arav, a leading Israeli archeologist, began probes to determine the actual location of Bethsaida. Investigations from 1989-1993 confirmed theories that the Sea of Galilee had changed in size and Bethsaida had been located on its coast. In 1989 the state of Israel recognized the site of Bethsaida on Israeli maps.

The Bethsaida Excavations Project, headed by the University of Nebraska-Omaha, was formed in 1991 with faculty members from institutions across the world. Dana faculty members became involved during the first year.

In May 1991, project director Dr. Richard A. Freund of UNO, was in search of a dig surveyor. He made a call to Hutton who called Nielsen to see if he knew of a possible candidate.

Nielsen had done some surveying work several years before. After he found out what the job

entailed, he decided to join the group. "Three weeks later, I was in Israel," he said.

Two Dana students have verbally committed to returning to Bethsaida with Nielsen this summer. Last year Judi Yeates of Fort Calhoun made the trip with Hutton. Both Nielsen and Hutton are on the project's board of directors.

The excavation is expected to be completed by 1997. A dig lasts about nine weeks each summer. Nielsen said it takes the remainder of the year to restore and study the amount of material excavated during that time.

Nielsen said Israel plans to make the site a national historical park. The Israeli Government Tourist Corporation is underwriting some of the funding for the project.

UNO plans to produce a multi-volume study of the city. The first volume is expected to be ready this summer.

Other excavations are planned for this summer and are open to individuals who wish to participate. Excavations for the summer of 1995 are scheduled for March 1-30, May 8-29, June 7-28 and July 2-23. Dr. Nielsen will be accompanying the excavation trip in June. As cities began to emerge in the

Middle East about 5,000 years ago, the area of Bethsaida became a transit spot in the commerce between the major civilizations of Mesopotamia and Egypt.

The site of Bethsaida is of interest because of its possible link to the period of King David. It is believed to be the capital of the biblical city Geshur. A temple and palace with a large city wall have been discovered indicating it was a significant city of the period.

Bethsaida apparently was also prominent in the first century CE (Common Era). It is one of the most frequently mentioned towns in the New Testament.

It is reportedly the birthplace of the apostles Peter and Andrew and according to Theodosius (530 CE), the city was the home of the apostle Philip, the fisherman Zebedee and his sons James and John.

The gospels speak of Bethsaida as a place where Jesus healed the blind man and fed the multitudes. Near its shores, Jesus was seen walking on the waters.

A decisive battle fought in the early stages of the Jewish Revolt (66-73 CE) occurred at Bethsaida. According to writings of Josephus, commander of the revolt in Galilee, if he had not been injured, he would have won the battle against the pro-Roman soldiers.

The city was abandoned in 67 CE, after the defeat at the hands of the Romans. The people fled, leaving everything behind.

Students will compete for Presidential Scholarships

Approximately 100 students representing eight states will gather to take part in the annual Presidential Scholarship and Melchior Music Competitions at Dana College on Saturday, Feb. 11.

Students participating in the Presidential Scholarship Competition must have a minimum grade point average of 3.25 or an ACT score of 25 or combined SAT scores of 970. Students will be compet-

ing for scholarships ranging in amounts up to full tuition. Students will be evaluated and points awarded based on personal interviews with Dana faculty and staff, an essay on an assigned topic, college entrance exam scores and grade point average.

Students participating in the Lauritz Melchior Memorial Voice Competition will perform a prepared piece of music for a panel of judges who will award the scholarships. The competition is named in tribute to the great opera heldentenor Lauritz Melchoir who had a special fondness for Dana

College where he left an extensive collection of personal and professional memorabilia.

While on campus, participating students will have the opportunity to meet with faculty members from other departments and qualify for additional scholarships in the areas of music, forensics, art, graphic design and athletics.

The results of the Presidential Scholarship Competition will be announced approximately three weeks after the competition while winners of the Melchior Voice Competition will be selected that afternoon.

Art students recognized at Dana

In recognition of outstanding artistic achievement, 350 junior and senior high school students from throughout Nebraska will be honored at the 68th Scholastic Art Awards ceremony at Dana College on Saturday, Feb. 18.

The ceremony will take place in the Madsen Fine Arts Center. Junior high school students will be honored at 11 a.m. and senior high students will be honored at 1 p.m.

These students will be presented with gold keys, silver keys or honorable mention certificates of merit by the Scholastic Art Award Committee. Their entries, as well as

several hundred additional works by students of the state, will be on display in the regional exhibition at Dana on Feb. 13-24.

At the close of the exhibition, the gold key finalist pieces will go to the national headquarters at Scholastic Inc. in New York where they will compete with the finalists from other regions for national awards. The national judges will choose the winners of scholarships, gold medal awards and cash awards with prize-winning selections displayed at the annual national exhibition conducted by Scholastic Inc. of New York.

Financial aid office provides help

If you are interested in keeping current on scholarship opportunities, job openings on campus and other financial aid information, electronic mail may just be the way to go, according to Mark Anderson, Director of Financial Aid.

Last spring, the financial aid office began providing periodic updates to students using the cam-

pus electronic mail system. Past subjects have included: scholarship resources on campus, financial aid for study abroad, scholarship provided by private organizations, important application updates, a free computer-based scholarship search available to students and the application process for the 1995-96 school year.

Beginning this month, the financial aid office will be providing answers to commonly-asked questions. The first question ad-

ressed who is considered an "independent student." Future questions will include: reasons for changes in eligibility for financial aid; re-establishing eligibility after losing a scholarship; work-study; tuition increases.

In order to benefit from this information, students are reminded that they must have an active e-mail account, established in the computer lab or the computer services office. In addition, it is important to check this e-mail account regularly to insure that information is read in a timely manner.

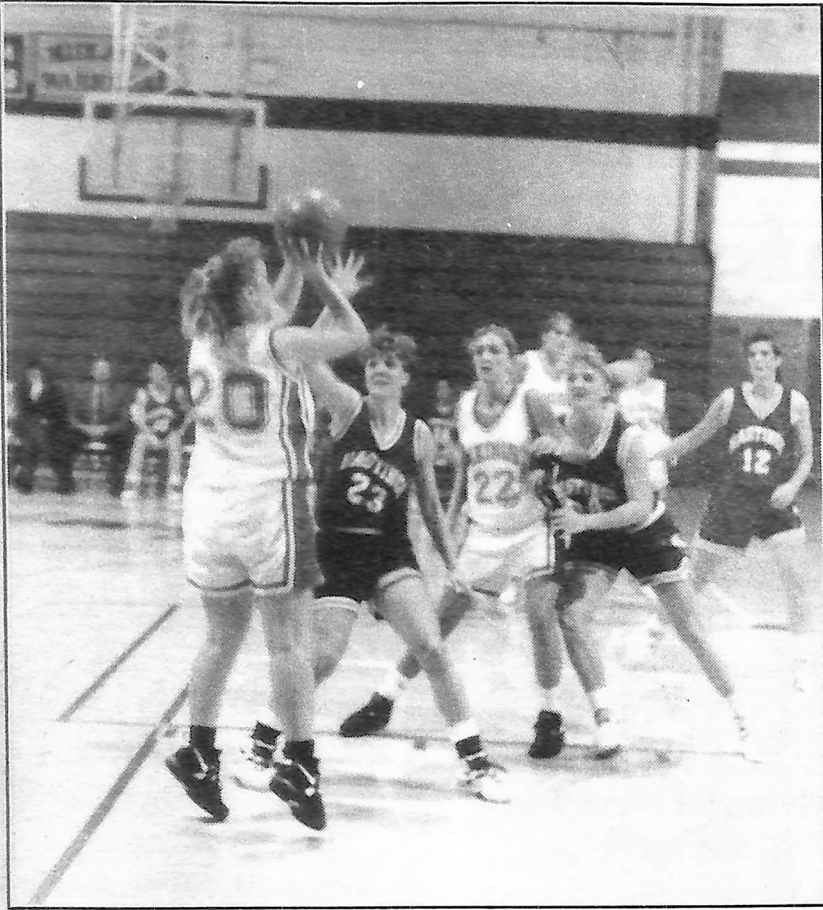

Grappendorf tops 1,000 points

The Dana women's basketball team started its 1995 season with a 7-3 record, including a 54-53 victory against the Plainswomen of Nebraska Wesleyan. The Vikings came back from a 12 point deficit in the second half to win in the final minute of the game. Senior Heidi Grappendorf led the team with 25 points.

On Jan. 10, the Vikings hosted Midland Lutheran College. Dana led 42-41 at the half but Midland was able to pull out from behind in the second half and win 87-78.

The Vikings then headed to Northwestern College in Orange City, Iowa to take on the Red Raiders. The Vikings were down at intermission 46-34 but they waged a comeback near the end of the second half to tie the game at 73-73. The contest was sent into overtime where the Red Raiders

outscored the Vikings 13-9 for an 86-82 win.

On Jan. 16, the Dana women rebounded from their two game losing streak when they defeated York College in Borup Coliseum. The Lady Panthers tied the game at 49-49 with 11:26 left to play. A couple baskets by sophomore Nichol Buenning gave the Vikings the lead and their eventual 85-71 win. The next day, Dana defeated Mount Marty, S.D. 72-67 in their rematch in Borup.

Heidi Grappendorf was named player-of-the-week by the NIAC (Nebraska Iowa Athletic Conference) for her work against Midland and Northwestern. Grappendorf hit 8-of-9 three-point field goals at Northwestern, setting a new school record for three-point efficiency (.889, minimum five attempts) and tied the single-game record for made three-pointers (8) established by Katie Corbitt

against Graceland, Iowa in the 1990/1991 season. She also joined Corbitt as the only Dana players to make over 100 career treys (Grappendorf had 110). The senior guard scored 28 points at Northwestern after hitting for 22 against Midland.

The Vikings travelled to Seward to take on the Concordia Bulldogs on Jan. 20. The game was tied at the half 27-27, but Concordia outscored Dana 29-28 in the second half to give them a 56-55 victory.

On Jan. 22 the Vikings lost another home game when they went against Hastings College. The Vikings stayed close the entire game, leading 39-38 at half time. Hastings defeated Dana 77-75 in the end. Grappendorf went over 1,000 points during the first half.

The Vikings played Avila College, Mo. last night. Results were not available at press time. The Vikings are at Midland Lutheran

Men's basketball 12-12 after defeating Hastings

The Dana College men's basketball team used balanced scoring to win their third Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) game of the year by routing Northwestern 92-75 Wednesday night at Borup.

The Vikings avenged an earlier loss to Northwestern at the Teikyo Westmar Holiday Tournament in November where the Red Raiders posted a 89-75 win.

The Vikings jumped out to a hot start by leading 13-2 just over three minutes into the game. Northwestern battled back but Dana exploded on a 17-5 run to end the first half to post a 47-30 lead.

Dana led by as much as 27 points in the second half and coasted to the 92-75 win.

Guard Rob Coursey led the Vikings in scoring with 17 points. He also pulled down five boards and dished out six assists. Forwards Shawn Fasbender and Nathan Babbitt each scored 16 points while Oliver Wallace chipped in 13 points and 12 rebounds. Center Mark Andrews scored 10 points and grabbed six rebounds.

The Vikings are now 12-12 over-

all and 3-5 in the NIAC. They will travel to Hastings on Saturday and host Briar Cliff on Wednesday.

Hastings is third in the NIAC with a 4-3 record and has a 18-4 overall record. The Vikings will seek revenge because the Broncos blew past Dana 100-86 back on Jan. 11 at Borup.

Hastings has the second, seventh and eighth leading scorers in the conference in Eric Rasgorshek, Chad Spady and Brian Kobs. Rasgorshek averages 21 points a game and shoots 67 percent from the field.

Spady averages 17.3 points a game while pulling down 6.3 rebounds a game. Kobs puts in 17.1 points a night and hits 43 percent of his three point shots.

Hastings also has the leading rebounder in the conference in Peter Ferguson who averages 9.4 boards a game. Also, Bronco guard Adrian Duncombe is second in the conference in assists with 7.9 a game.

The Vikings leading scorer is Babbitt. He is fourth in the conference with a 19 point average. Fasbender averages seven rebounds, a game which is eighth in the conference, and guard Jason Jackson is eighth in the NIAC averaging four assists a night.

Wrestlers 2-5 in duals heading to Buena Vista Saturday

The Dana wrestling squad competed in Borup Coliseum Jan. 13 and 14. On Friday night the Vikings took on Northwestern College of Orange City, Iowa and Dakota Wesleyan University of Mitchell, S.D. Dana defeated Northwestern 28-27 for its first dual win of the season. Dana held off the Red Raiders with wins by Justin Garcia, Danny Mattern, Brent Johnson, Andy Hensley, and Chase Roller.

On Saturday Dana held an invitational where Dana, University of Nebraska at Kearney, Missouri Valley College, Teikyo Westmar University, Iowa, Northwestern College, Iowa, and University of Nebraska at Omaha competed. Justin Garcia (118 pounds) and

Danny Mattern took fourth place. D.J. Walton (126) and T.C. Aguilar (150) took second. Corey Cross (158) and Soren Schmidt (177) took fourth. Chase Roller (275) got second place and Andy Hensley (167) won first place.

Dana took on Teikyo Westmar on Jan. 17 in Oakland, Iowa. T.C. Aguilar and Andy Hensley both brought home victories.

On Friday, Jan. 20, the wrestlers travelled to William Penn College in Oskaloosa, Iowa. Dana won the dual 48-3 with wins by Danny Mattern, Chad Caskey, Brent Johnson, Shawn Isaacs, Nate Cone, Andy Hensley, Ollie Glass, Justin Smith, and Mike Bisig to give the Vikings a 2-4 dual record.

On Saturday, Jan. 21, the team competed in the Simpson Invitational at Cowles Fieldhouse in Indianola, Iowa. There the team

wrestled against Fort Hays State College, KS, Cornell College, Iowa, Simpson College, Iowa, Northwestern College, Iowa, Teikyo Westmar University, Iowa, and William Penn College, Iowa. Vikings that placed at the invitational were Danny Mattern (3rd place), D.J. Walton (1st), Andy Hensley (2nd), and Chase Roller (2nd).

On Jan. 25, the Vikings headed back to Iowa to take on Teikyo Westmar again. The final score of the dual was Teikyo Westmar 44, Dana 4. Andy Hensley won his match 18-2.

The wrestlers head to the Buena Vista Duals Saturday, where they will compete with Buena Vista College, Dubuque University, Iowa, Upper Iowa College, Dakota Wesleyan University, and Wisconsin-LaCrosse College.
