## Dana's Schneider hopes to publish novel

Dr. Paul Schneider, professor of English, chair of the English department and head of the theatre department at Dana College has been teaching others to write and study literature for 19 years and he has recently finished a novel of his own which he hopes to get published.

Schneider graduated from the University of Wisconsin in Milwaukee with an English major and a French minor in 1966. From there he went to the University of Virginia, where he received a master's degree in 1967. After this Schneider went on to get his PhD from the University of Wisconsin at Madison in 1973.

In the fall of 1979 he began teaching at Syracuse University in New York. At Syracuse he had a chance to teach creative writing and run a writing workshop. At that time he began to write quite a bit on his own.

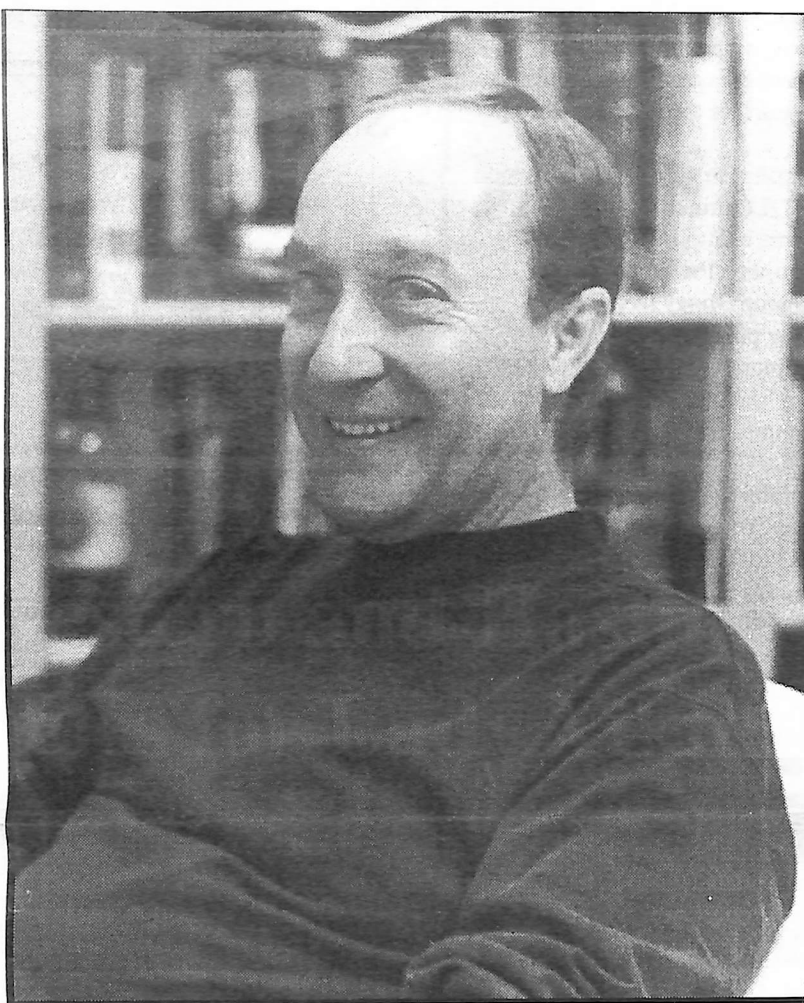
In 1982, he left the teaching profession to become a stockbroker. During that time, he put his own writing aside and began to read a lot of popular fiction and became fascinated with that genre.

In the fall of 1991, he returned to his first love, teaching, when he joined the English department at Dana College. The second summer after he began teaching at Dana, he started writing fiction, driven by the desire to do something creative and to leave a legacy behind. Unable to

stop, he wrote 10 hours a day, six days a week, all summer until he had finished 350 pages of a novel. The next summer he picked up where he left off and wrote until he finished the first draft of his book.

The book, "The Whole Truth" is mystery-suspense novel that deals with sociological and psychological problems, often in a comical way. The hero of the story is Volz, a 49-year-old man who works in repossessions for the police department. According to Schneider, Volz can be described as a man shaped in the 50's trying to live in the 90's. He has been divorced once and was widowed by his second wife. Two years later he is dating again and attempting to figure out women. He is the father of six kids and he is dragged reluctantly into an investigation by his adorable and precocious 11-year-old daughter who forces him to address a problem by making it a moral issue. He and his partner Jane, follow up on this intrigue and find that it has awful implications as they try to untangle a mess that revolves around illicit organ transplants and illegal aliens. His daughter gets kidnapped and the last half of the book is Volz's attempt to rescue her and solve the mystery.

The most exciting thing about this project, according to Schneider, was finishing the revisions. He is looking forward to getting an agent and after that getting it published. If his book gets published, Schneider's goal is to write 19 more centering

around the same hero. Although his novel is not available for public viewing, he did promise that if it gets published he will sign copies for free.

His advice for aspiring authors was, "Start writing now and write everyday, even when you don't have

anything to say. In your attempt to get published, find a way to reach the large audience. Don't be afraid when people don't like what you write, just listen to them. Writing is a process that can be advanced by criticism. Most of all, just don't stop, and don't give up."

## Learning Center can help with midterm grades

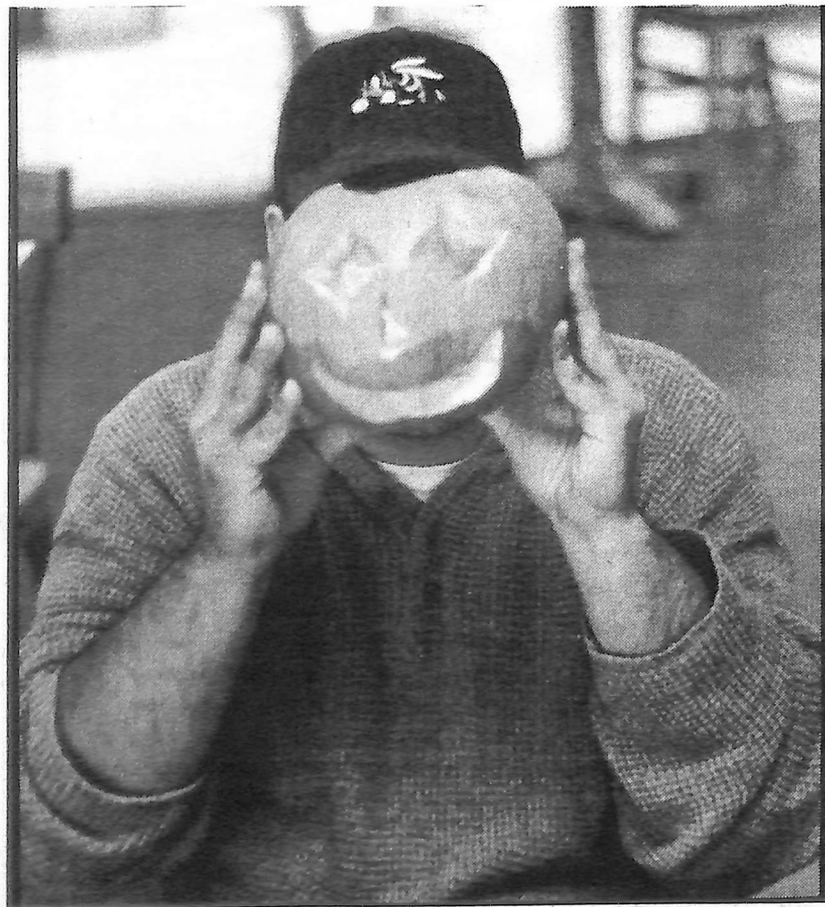
When you pick up your midterm grades, remember the resources available in the Learning Center that might help you maintain or improve those grades:

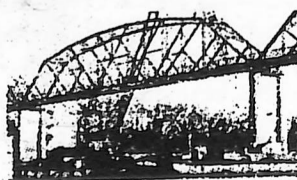

### Dana in History

The following was published in past issues of the *Hermes*.

#### 50 years ago

Dana's enrollment stood at 117 increasing 38 percent from the previous year. The divisions among the classes were as follows:

	Total	Male	Female
Seniors	1	1	0
Juniors	4	1	3
Sophomores	26	7	19
Freshman	67	22	45
Adult	3	0	3

Additionally there were 16 music and part-time students.

A new administration and library building was to be built on Dana's campus to supplement, not replace Old Main. Revised plans were to be ready for approval at the annual convention of the United Lutheran Evangelical Church in June. The cost was estimated at \$150,000. Further details on location and composition were yet to be announced.

#### 25 years ago

Dana Professor Norman C. Bansen associate professor of English and Danish at Dana was named Knight of the Order of Dannebrog by King Fredrick IX of Denmark. Bansen, son of Danish immigrants had been associated with Dana for 23 years. Bansen was a student, public relations director and faculty member. He taught courses in Danish, Scandinavian Literature and Scandinavian Drama.

The National Secretary of Young Americans for Freedom, Ronald F. Docksai announced a program to show majority support on campus for firm action against "radical extremist who seek to destroy education. 'The Blue Button Campaign' was a symbol of opposition to the violence and terrorism of the radical left-wing militants who believe in no one's rights but their own," said Docksai.

#### 10 years ago

The city of Blair finally gained adequate funding to repair the Cauble Creek-Hansen Drive bridge. In April 1984, the bridge collapsed with sinkage of the hill due to "sugar clay" which dissolved in time causing the hill to sink. Excavation was being completed and construction work had begun

The Dana Campus congregation and church council held Hunger Week Oct. 21-27. Chapel speakers focused attention on the topic, a 'Fast Day' where students signed up not to eat with money saved going to "Bread for the World" efforts. A 10-mile Crop Walk or 10-lap swim where pledges were given was also held.

## Dana students react to abortion rights poll

Fourteen out of 16 Dana College students interviewed Tuesday said a married woman should not be allowed to obtain an abortion without her husband's knowledge or consent.

Abortion and family values are key issues in the United States today. One-hundred percent of the women interviewed and 75 percent of the men interviewed believe a married woman must have her husband's consent before obtaining an abortion.

Marnie Jensen, a sophomore, commented: "When people are married they are supposed to share things. Keeping secrets of any kind is detrimental to marriage, especially a secret this big."

Benjamin Olson, a junior from Cambridge, Iowa, felt that it was the woman's choice and that he would not interfere or be offended with her decision.

Many students felt that abortion in any situation was simply wrong. Reinhardt Ochs, a freshmen business and communications major, said: "You can't take somebody else's life just to better yours. It's not right to kill innocent children and it's definitely not right to kill a child and not tell your husband. The child is just as much a part of the man as it is the woman."

The students participating in the non-scientific poll were questioned in the Dana Library and in Blair Hall. Half the students (8) were male and half (8) were female and they represent a variety of cultural backgrounds, ages and majors on the Dana College campus.

## Hastings beats Dana; clinches NIAC crown

The sun was out Oct. 28 when the Dana football team traveled to Hastings to take on No. 14 nationally-ranked Broncos. It did not shine on the Vikings, however, as Hastings captured the Nebraska-Iowa Athletics Conference football crown with a 27-7 drubbing of the Vikings.

Dana was ranked No. 25 nationally going into the game but fell from the rankings this week. The setback drops the Vikings' conference record to 3-2 and their overall record to 6-3.

Hastings opened the scoring on their first offensive drive, marching 80 yards on 12 plays to take a 7-0 lead in the first quarter. A Dana turnover led to the Broncos' second touchdown with 10:21 left in the second quarter.

A fumble recovery by the Broncos early in the third quarter gave them possession at the Dana 16-yard line. It took them four plays to score and increase the lead to 21-0.

Hastings continued to show no mercy. A 12-play, 71-yard march ended with another touchdown. The point-after attempt failed but the lead had widened to 27-0 with 3:14 remaining in the third quarter.

The Vikings avoided a shutout when they put together their only scoring run of the day. Quarterback Bryan Soukup carried the ball five yards for a touchdown on fourth-and-goal to make the score 27-7. Dana stopped a Hastings touchdown bid from the Dana nine-yard line to end the game.

The Hastings defense was stingy, allowing 208 offensive yards for the Vikings. The Dana offense made its first play in Hastings territory in the final minute of the third quarter.

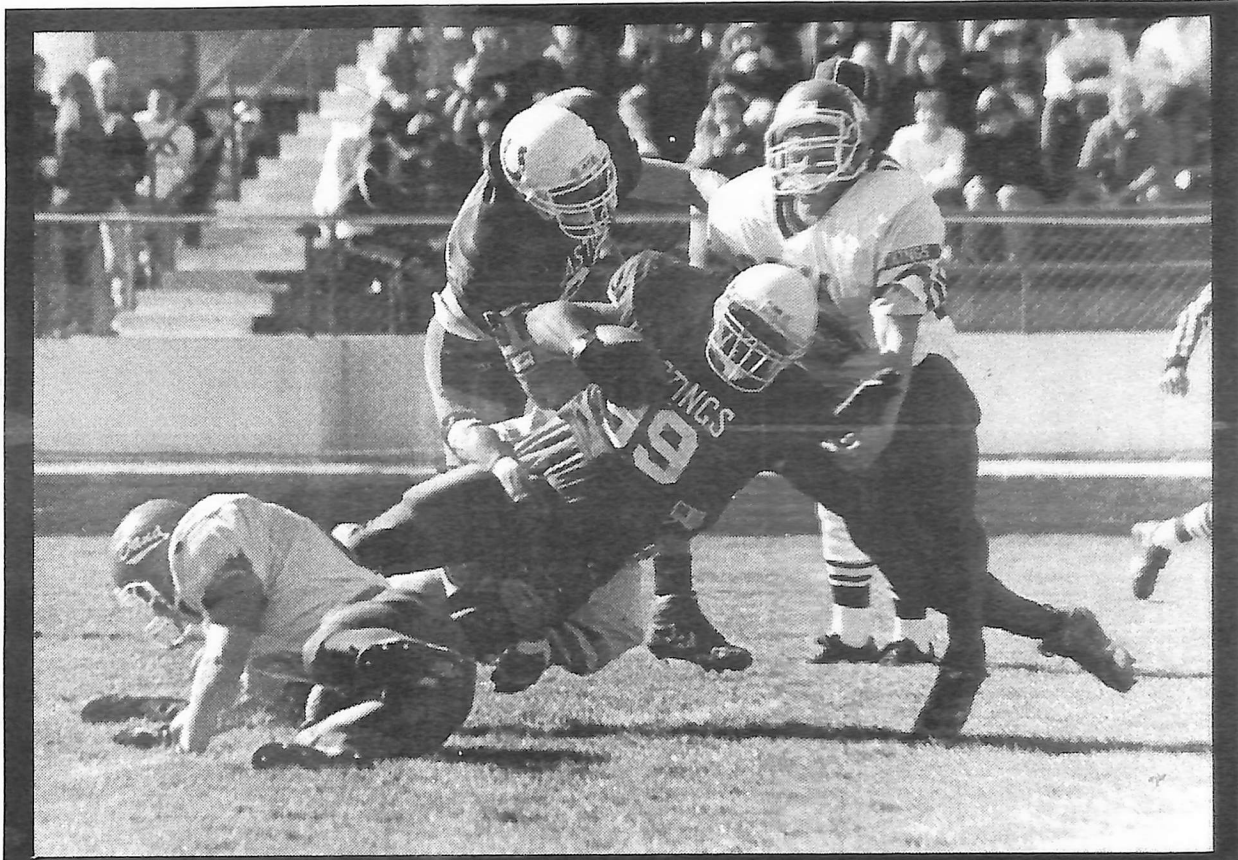
William Collins led the defense with 16 total tackles, including a stop that prevented a Hastings touchdown from the Dana one-yard line in the fourth quarter. Pat Morris and Mike Tupa each recovered a Hastings fumble and John Olsen and Bret Erixon recorded quarterback sacks.

"If we would have beat them," says head coach Jim Krueger, "we would be first in the conference and playing for a conference championship. In a sense, it was our first taste of pressure like that. I don't think we handled it very well but that goes back to our inexperience in those situations."

Krueger says defensive lineman Joe Stretch will probably not play in Dana's next game because of stingers (feelings of numbness) in his shoulders and back. Stretch was taken off the field on a stretcher after being injured against Hastings.

Dana plays its final game of the regular season at Viking Field tomorrow against Northwestern College. The Red Raiders have a 3-2 conference record and are ranked 16th in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Division 11 polls.

"No doubt it will be another pressure situation so we get another chance at it," says Krueger. "Whoever wins this game will have second place in the conference. With the weather conditions the way they are we'll have to adjust our game plan somewhat but we can't approach the game any different. We have to show up and play good football."

## Northwestern and Hastings strong foes for Lady Vikings

The Dana volleyball team was defeated this week both at home and on the road. The Vikings lost at home Friday to the Northwestern Red Raiders and lost again at Hastings Tuesday against the Broncos.

The Vikings' intense effort was not strong enough for their last home game of the season Friday against Northwestern. Northwestern prevailed over the Vikings 15-9, 15-1

and 15-5.

Offensively, Jodi Hook led the attackers with 10 kills and Diane Crawford put up 25 assists.

Leading the defense was senior Stephenie Wilson in the last home match of her collegiate career. Wilson recorded a team high 10 digs and was 14-for-14 passing. Wilson was also 11-for-11 on serves.

The Vikings lost to the Hastings Broncos Tuesday night in three games 15-4, 15-13, and 15-10.

Leading the offense was Wilson recording 10 kills. Chestnut Pearl and Susan Weddingfeld had six kills

each. Setting for the Vikings was Tara Tiefertal who put up 17 assists. Taffy Forsen led the serving charts as she was 9-for-9 with two aces.

Wilson and Pearl led the defensive end. Wilson scrapped for 16 digs and Pearl was 18-for-19 on service receptions.

The Vikings end their regular season play Thursday night at Concordia. Dana begins the Nebraska Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) post-season tournament play on the road Saturday. Dana will most likely play the Hastings Broncos or the Midland Warriors.

## Soccer teams show integrity in seasons

Next action for the men will be in the spring. This Sunday the women close their season with a road trip to Vermillion to play the University of South Dakota.

## Dana football team one of five considered for Wheat Bowl

The Dana Vikings football team is being considered to play in the first annual Wheat Bowl in Great Bend, Kan.

Head coach Jim Krueger says Dana is one of five teams being considered to participate. He says the Vikings have a very good chance of being selected if they beat Northwestern College Saturday.

"A lot of times teams with an 8-2

or 7-3 record don't make the playoffs because only 16 teams make it to nationals," says Krueger. "(The Wheat Bowl selections) come down to teams that have winning seasons and are ranked or have been ranked in the (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Division 11) Top 25."

Two teams from a six-state region will compete. Other states with teams in the running are Texas, Oklahoma, Iowa, Kansas and Missouri.

Krueger says the event will be more than a football game. Other activities include a parade, a banquet for

the players and an open practice session that allows the area's children to get autographs.

"It's nice to be in a situation where we have a chance to play for something," says Krueger, now that Dana is out of contention for the Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference championship. "The players have held together and done an excellent job keeping focused. They're very unselfish and they're great to coach because they give it all they've got."

"I hope we can play a great game Saturday and make a run for it."
