Marriott gives Dana cafeteria new food, atmosphere

A change of taste for Dana students. This is what happened over spring break when Dana's food service changed companies.

The Marriott Corporation, based in Bethesda, Md., has replaced Service Master, headed by food service director Scott Sullivan. Changes in Dana's cafeteria were not only in staff, but food preparation, presentation and variety.

Bob Luedtke, regional director of Marriott's project office based in Milwaukee, Wis., said he hopes students will find value in their new meal plans. "We'd like to incorporate different self-serve bars, exhibition cooking and more batch cooking," said Luedtke.

Some changes which highlight the menu include a larger variety of food options, soft serve frozen yogurt and a stir fry bar. The lines have also changed to self-serve and napkins are now placed on the tables.

Students reactions have been favorable to the changes according to Luedtke. Juniors Rachel Brotherton and Jennifer Willers agree that Dana's

food service has made large improvements. "I think the food is a lot the same (as the previous food service), but the atmosphere is quite a bit different. It's nice to have fresh fruit and a good salad bar, that part is 10 times better," said Brotherton.

Sophomore Ben Reyes said he feels the food's appearance is good, "I think it's neat the way they cook the food right in front of you."

Willers said she also likes the fact that the lines have been moved to self-serve. "It makes you feel like you are an adult now."

Steve Santo and Perry King, interim directors for Marriott, say they have had a good response so far and the students are pretty receptive. Santo said personal service was one of their priorities for next year. "Things are highly impersonal here and we'd like to change that," he said.

Luedtke said it's too early to tell if more major changes in the cafeteria should be made. "We would like to consider renovation which would allow more personal service and shortened cooking time such as an oven for personal pan pizzas."

He added that they want to work off of a food preference survey which they would distribute to the entire stu-

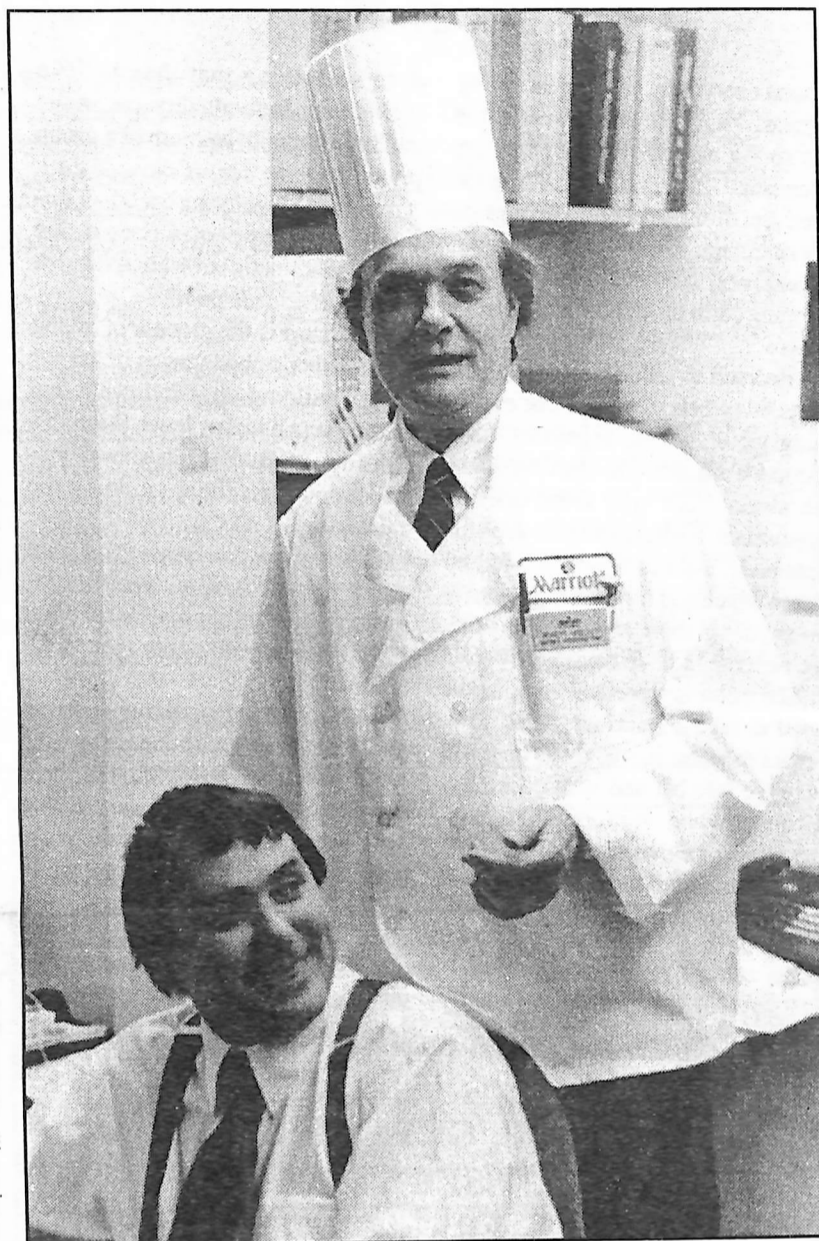
dent body. "We want to create a wish list, but not until we know student preferences. We want students to feel this is their meal program, reflecting their changes and desires within budget."

Perry said as for the Dragon's Head, the Marriott staff wants to incorporate more individualized items such as signature salads. "We're also going to keep it (the Head) open from 8 a.m.-10 p.m. until the end of the school year to see what type of response we get," said Perry.

Cathy Bennet, manager of the Head, said she couldn't determine just yet the changes Marriott will make for the Head. "We're on hold right now until they come up with some definite plans for us, which are still coming."

Tinna Asp, who works in the Head, says that Marriott is great so far. "They care. They're not slow when you need things, they'll try to get it right away," said Asp.

Luedtke, King and Santo all commented on Dana having a beautiful campus and a great student body. "We are happy to be here and are enjoying the reception from students," said King. "We want the students to let us know what they think and feel."

Satisfaction Inventory reveals student opinions

The Student Satisfaction Inventory (SSI) survey has been completed, collected and compiled. The survey includes the responses of 108 randomly selected students representing 18.3 percent of the total Dana College population. The questionnaires were administered to 143 students Nov. 27 - Dec. 14, 1995, by Student Senate volunteers. Of these, 108 surveys were returned.

The SSI is a standardized survey managed by the Dana administration and tabulated by the Noel-Levitz company. Noel-Levitz conducts such surveys at four-year colleges across the country. Dana's students' answers to the 73 questions are compared to the answers of over 40,000 college students nationwide. These results are then published in a report to the academy.

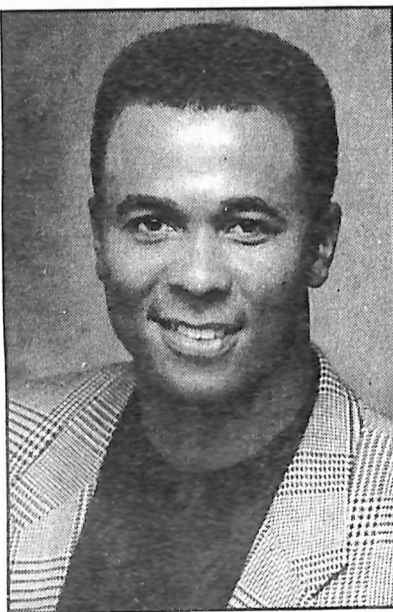
The results are broken down into 11 categories: instructional effectiveness, academic advising,

safety and security, student centeredness, campus climate, recruitment and financial aid, concern for the individual, registration effectiveness, campus support services, service excellence, and campus life.

This year's shows a high level of satisfaction in the areas of academic advising, instructional effectiveness and campus support services. Dana students gave these three areas a score of 5 points or higher on a scale of one to seven. The remaining eight areas scored no lower than 4.71 points, where campus life got that mark. This is still above average, although lower than last year's average.

Dana administrators use this survey, among other methods, to make improvements on campus. Most notably, Dana created the position of Student Activities Director as a result of last year's survey.

Dan Travaille, Vice-President for Academic Affairs, said, "While the Student Satisfaction Inventory is but one indication of how stu-

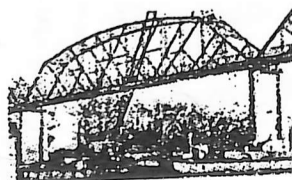
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Residence Life Staff named for 1996-97

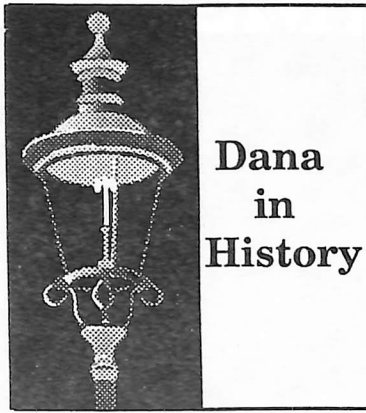

75 years ago

Basketball and Dana was coming back to its own. Under the direction of Professor P. F. Falck as coach, seven boys' teams were organized.

The girls had a basketball team this year. The players wore black suits with a flashy D.C. in red and white on their blouses. Their first game was against the girls of Blair High School winning 30-7.

50 years ago

Rev. Scriver Kloth and Chaplain William Larsen were the main speakers at Dana as it hosted the Youth Conference held in connection with Spiritual Emphasis Week, Feb. 7-10. Presidents of the various district leagues conducted the panel discussions and services.

Thirty-five new students registered at Dana for the second semester making a total of 125 students enrolled. Twenty-three were men, most being ex-servicemen who had attended Dana before entering the service.

25 years ago

"The Mooners", a group of students from Rasmussen Hall who previously held the Dana kite-flying record had their record shattered. Holling Hall set a new Dana kite flying record of 7,200 feet. The students stood near the cross on the hill and unravelled six spools of string as the kite flew more than a mile and a quarter in a southerly direction.

Enrollment at Dana was down 66

students, 7.8 percent for the second semester compared with the first semester's enrollment of 777. The largest factors contributing to the semester decrease were a failure to make grades and graduation. Thirty students failed to make the required g.p.a. and 22 graduated.

10 years ago

The Floyd Shaffer Clown Ministry Workshop came to Dana. This workshop was designed to teach people how to be instrumental in reaching out to the Christian community through their own special kind of ministry called, "Creativity and the Clown".

On the second and fourth Monday of every month a group of students, faculty and members of the First Lutheran Church met in the Melchoir Room of the library over lunch hour. The purpose was to gather for study prayer and mutual support as they struggled with the problems of world hunger.

Summer youth camp in Africa will give Hildreth taste of Tanzania

From Tekamah to Tanzania, Dana College junior Sara Hildreth is preparing for the trip of her lifetime.

Hildreth, a member of Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Tekamah, has begun her training to be part of a youth work camp in the African nation of Tanzania this summer as part of an outreach effort by the Nebraska Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The ELCA's "Rafiki" team leaves for Tanzania in June. Rafiki is the Swahili word for "friends".

While in Tanzania, located on the southeastern coast of Africa, Hildreth and other members of the team will work on building a dam and irrigation ditch for fish farmers and will also help with the construction of a school building. However, the projects, Hildreth says, are not the primary mission of the trip.

"I am becoming more and more interested in global issues, so that is what first attracted me to this trip," said Hildreth, a social work major from Red Oak, Iowa. "What is especially interesting about this trip is that the focus is on the people. We are building things, yes—but even the work projects are secondary to meeting people and building relationships."

Hildreth was chosen for the 10-member team in December.

Since then, she's been training for the trip and learning about the nation and the people she'll be visiting. Already, she has learned some basics of Swahili, the official language of Tanzania, and Hildreth knows she is in for a culture shock when she departs on June 17 for a four-week stay in Africa.

"We are all trying to prepare ourselves for the change in lifestyle," said Hildreth. "And we know we'll be eating different kinds of food and that there will be a lot less running water for us to use. They have a staple of their diet which they call a "cooking banana" - it is in a lot of what they eat. It's not sweet like our bananas, so I am anxious to try that."

The Nebraska ELCA contingent will start their work trip near the Tanzanian city of Moshi at the foot of Mount Kilimanjaro. That is where they will work on the dam

and irrigation project. From there, they will be paired up with high school and college students from Tanzania as they work on the school project near Karatu, a city about 150 miles west of Moshi. Both are in the extreme northeast region of Tanzania.

The American students will camp in a dryland area for the first part of their visit, and will then live in the homes of their Tanzanian student partners.

The cost of the trip will be about \$3,000 for each participant and the individual is expected to provide about one-third of that. Hildreth said some fund-raising activities are in the planning stages through her church in Tekamah. She is not sure if she will ask for contributions from faculty and staff at Dana.

Hildreth, the daughter of Nick and Diane Hildreth of Red Oak, is social ministry chairperson at Dana through the school's Campus Ministry organization. She is involved with Dana VOICES and is president of the Social Awareness Organization (SAO) on campus. She plans to attend seminary after graduation and would like to become an ELCA pastor.

She was baptized at First United Methodist Church in Red Oak and works as ministry assistant involved in youth worship at Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Tekamah.

Vikings go 4-6 on spring break baseball trip

The Dana baseball team is now 8-9 overall after going 4-6 on its spring break trip. Over break the Vikings played six games in Kansas and four in Oklahoma.

The trip started out with two losses against Benedictine, Kan., by scores of 5-0 and 9-3 on Saturday, March 16. In game one Mike Haddock had two hits and Clint Williams was the losing pitcher. In the nightcap, Mike Gerson delivered a solo home run in the first inning. Starter Dustin Wolfe was the losing pitcher.

Sunday, March 17, the Vikings captured two wins against Bethany, Kan., 12-6 and 6-5. In the second inning of game one the Vikings scored seven runs to build an early 10-0 lead. Mike Tupa was the winning pitcher, throwing two innings of middle relief and allowing one unearned run on two hits.

The night cap against Bethany was tied 5-5 in the ninth, Scott Shannon led off the inning for Dana with a double, moved to third on a Matt Rega sacrifice and scored on a passed ball. Rega was the winning pitcher in relief, throwing three hitless innings.

March 18, the Vikings traveled to

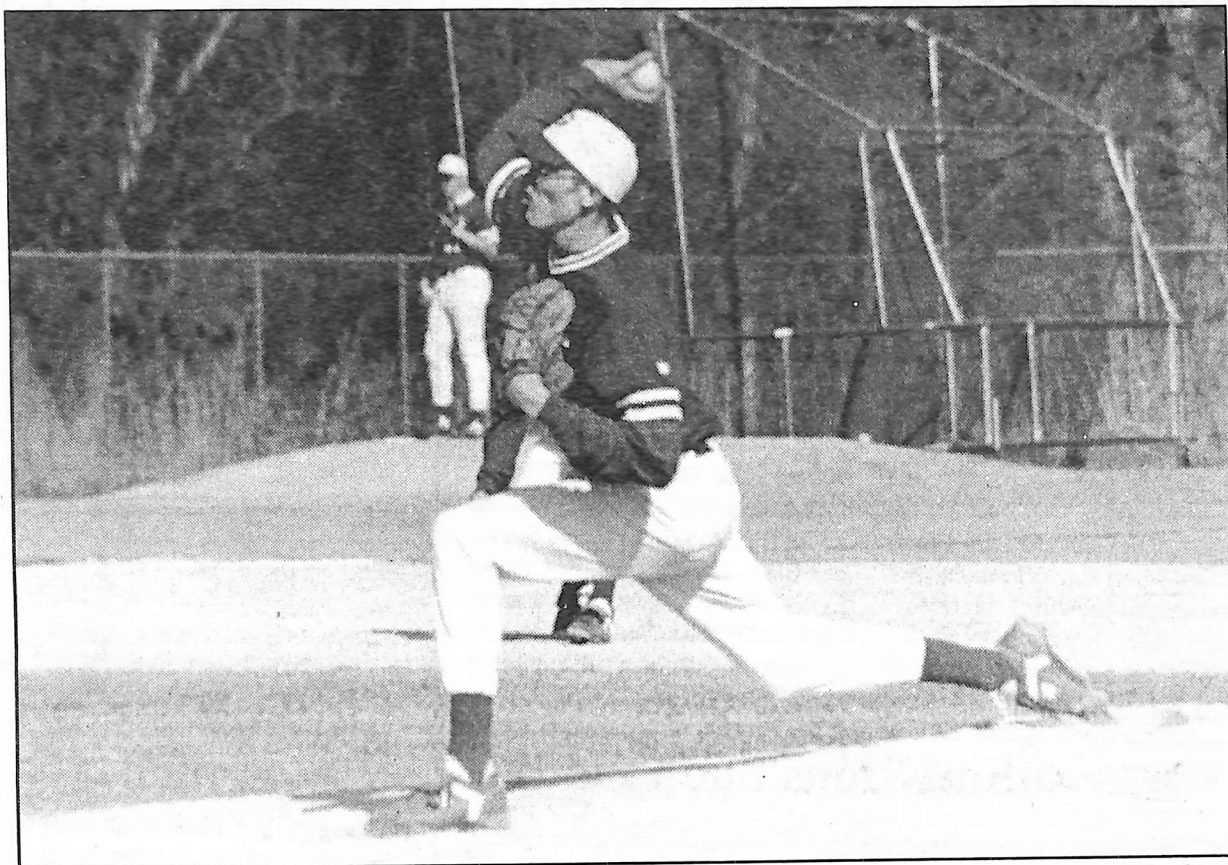
Oklahoma where they battled and lost to Oklahoma City, ranked 13th in National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics baseball, 13-11. The Vikings actually suffered a double loss, losing the game and Shawn Fasbender, pitcher and first baseman. Fasbender was hit in the face by a line drive and will not return for the season. The junior from Omaha was scheduled to undergo surgery this week to set broken bones in his cheek under his right eye.

Cold weather canceled the Vikings game against Oklahoma Christian on March 19.

March 20 the Vikings picked up another victory as they defeated Oklahoma Sciences and Arts, 13-12 in 12 innings. The score was tied at 12 going into the top of the 12th. Gerson launched a solo home run to lead off the inning and that proved to be the game-winning run as Rega shut the Drovers down in relief and picked up the win.

March 21 Dana faced Oklahoma City again and suffered another defeat, 18-4. The rematch with OCU was very one-sided as OCU scored 18 runs on 17 hits. Wolfe was 2-for-3 with and RBI leading the attack.

Friday the Vikings lost to Oklahoma Christian, 7-4. Gerson hit another home run, driving in two runs in the top of the sixth inning. Starter

Williams worked six innings and took the loss.

The Vikings traveled back to Kansas Saturday and split a twin bill at Kansas Wesleyan, losing 17-7 and winning 12-11. The second game was highlighted by Adam Hurt's two

home runs, one of them was estimated at 475 by Coach Paul Davis. This slammer drove in three runs.

Back at home the Vikings were scheduled to host defending NAIA national champion Bellevue on Wednesday, but the game was post-

poned by snow. Dana opens its Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference season this weekend with a four-game set against Nebraska Wesleyan. The teams play two games in Lincoln Saturday and come to Blair for two games on Sunday, starting at noon.

Melinda Martinez and Melinda Almand were both 2-for-3 and Karri Roberts had three RBIs. Mundt was the winning pitcher in game two. Mundt pitched a complete game in which she only gave up two runs, one earned, on seven hits.

Individual highlights came from Roberts against East Central when

she was 2-for-4 with a double and triple. Amy Croughwell also had a big game against East Central going 3-for-3.

Dana's Buenning honorable mention All-American

Dana junior Nichol Buenning has been given honorable mention to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Division II All-American women's basketball team.

Buenning, a 5-10 forward from Parkston, South Dakota, was chosen first-team all-conference in the Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) after ranking among the league leaders in scoring, rebounding and field goal percentage

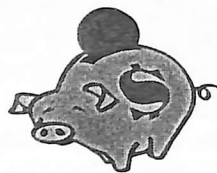
throughout the season. She finished third in the conference in scoring, third in rebounding and sixth in field goal percentage. Buenning had been named honorable mention all-conference in each of her first two seasons.

Buenning is the all-time career blocked shot leader at Dana with 113 rejections in her first three collegiate seasons, including a school record 43 blocks in 1994/95 and 41 last year. She became the eighth Dana player to go over the 1,000-career point

mark during the 1995/96 campaign and currently ranks sixth in career scoring. Buenning, who scored 411 points this past season, has 1,033 career points and is 487 shy of Katie Corbitt's school standard of 1,520.

Buenning joins Cathy Shaw (honorable mention 92/93) and Heidi Grappendorf (third team 94/95) as Dana women's basketball players who have received All-American recognition.

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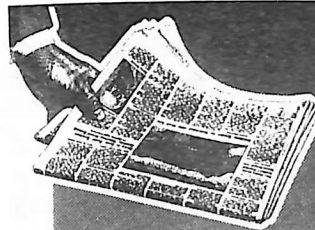
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
