



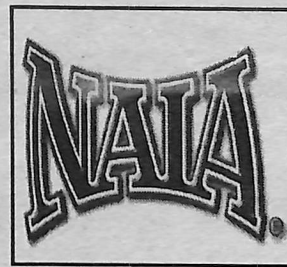

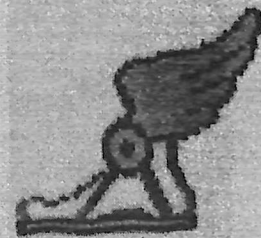

## Business Department looking at Honor Society to begin at Dana

Last Wednesday, the business department hosted an open house.

The relaxed atmosphere included chips, dip and punch; it provided a chance for students to socialize with professors. The open house wasn't just a time to chat with professors; the open house also provided a chance to inform students about Delta Mu Delta.

Delta Mu Delta is a national honor society in business administration. Professor Fran

Mallory said the business department has been wanting to start an honor society since June 1998, when the department was accredited. According to Mallory, the accreditation organization strongly encouraged participation in a chapter similar to that of Delta Mu Delta.

"The faculty is exploring student interest in having a national honor society" Mallory said.

The eligibility requirements for membership in Delta Mu Delta include: the student must be an undergraduate majoring in

business, have completed at least half the credits required for their bachelor's degree, have a grade point average of a "B" or better, be in the top 20 percent of their college class and be of good standing.

Mallory stated that there are some expenses involved in joining. There is a charter fee that would be paid by the business department and a \$35 membership fee that students would have to pay.

The \$35 would be a one-time-only national membership due, members of Dana's chapter

would decide upon local dues. Mallory said she hoped the cost would not discourage students from joining.

Dr. James Smith hopes by providing a program like Delta Mu Delta, that students will become more involved in the Business Club and community service, and not just see the program as an addition to their resume.

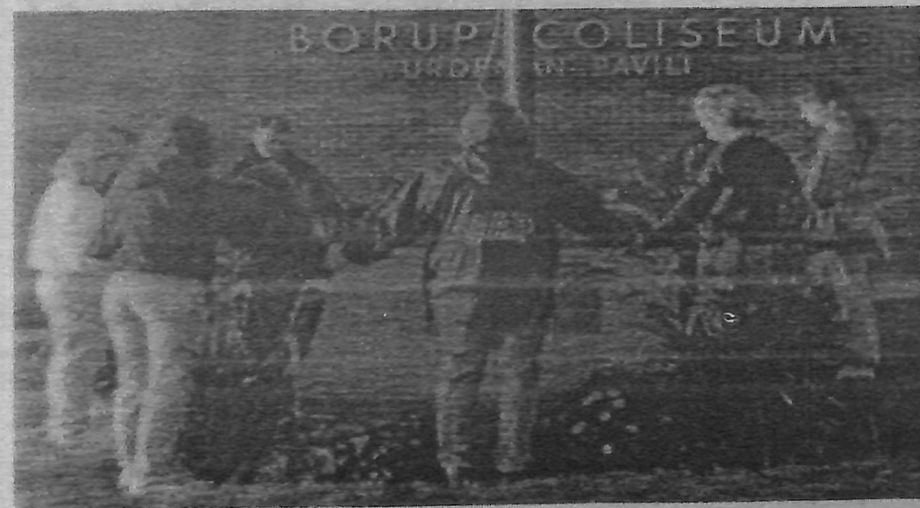

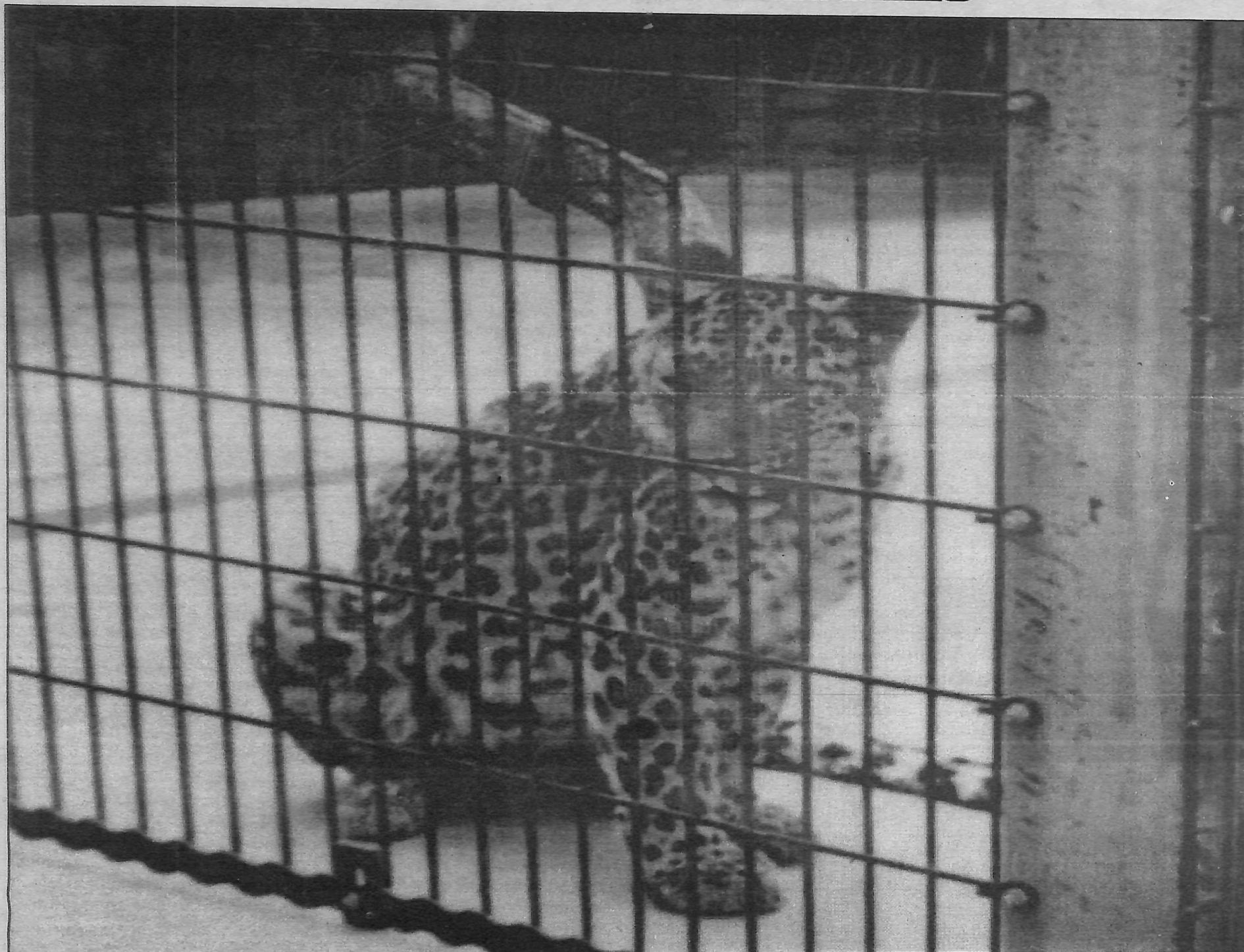

If you ask for some Omaha attractions, more likely than not the Henry Doorly Zoo will be listed in response.

Omaha's Henry Doorly Zoo, located at 3701 South 10<sup>th</sup> street, is one Omaha's most famous attractions. It is home to thousands of animals and provides hours of entertainment for anyone.

The Lied Jungle: the rainforest inside the zoo. It puts hundreds of animals in a realistic environment. It mimics their habitat with real jungle plants, correct climate settings and even indoor waterfalls. There are two levels to the rainforest, with several different sections such as Africa, Asia and Central America. The top floor takes you through the trees. It shows you birds, monkeys, a sloth and many other tree-dwelling animals. It also takes you through several caves. This is home to several bats, owls, a few members of the cat family and even some snakes. The lower level is a dirt path that shows you close-up what the jungle floor holds. Hippopotamuses, tapirs, alligators, dozens of varieties of fish and many other tropical creatures call this area home.

The aquarium is another highly acclaimed attraction to the zoo. It houses several varieties of penguins, providing ample room for viewing even when large crowds gather. It then takes you underwater as sharks swim right over your head. You walk through a long tunnel and watch rays, sharks, eels and other salt-water fish swim all around you. After the tunnel, stands a large jellyfish display. These poisonous creatures push themselves up and down in a large clear cylinder. Next to them is a large school of fish in a similar home. Several displays follow, including a beach, shark eggs, a flooded rainforest floor and a miniature coral reef.

Several more indoor complexes are scattered throughout the zoo.

The cat complex is always interesting. They have lions, leopards, jaguars, pumas, and tigers. Although many are simply in large glassed-in rooms, several also

have a mock habitat in which the cats take turns. The nursery is always entertaining. This is where the newest additions to the zoo can be found. Baby animals show off for their adoring fans with toys and bottles while coveting each compliment. The orangutan and guerilla houses hold the biggest comedians in Omaha. They make

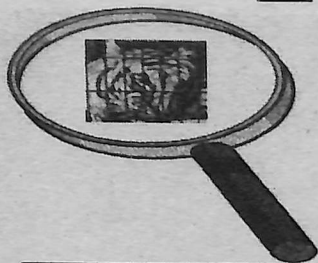

### Cross Country

Doane's cross country season began at the William Jewell Invitational Saturday, Sept. 11.

The men's team was led by sophomore Joel Phipps who individually won the race with a time of 26:49 for 8,000 meters. The men's team placed fourth overall.

The women were led by junior Mary Livengood. Livengood cruised to a 20:28 finish in the 5k race and came in second. The women's team won the meet.

The men had a problem with depth, as one of their runners suffered a concussion during the race.

### Football

Doane football began their home season with a 30-10 victory against Mount Senario.

The Tigers balanced their superb running game with an uncharacteristic air attack.

Junior running back Raymonn Adams dominated the running attack again for the Tigers. Adams finished with 144 yards and two touchdowns.

Adams leads the conference in rushing. He averages 191 yards per

game with the second rusher in the conference at 106 per game. Adams is also tied in the conference for total points with 12.

The Tigers found their throwing game producing more than usual as senior quarterback Chris Snyder threw for 180 yards, completing nearly 60 percent of his passes.

Doane took a week off and will open the conference season at Nebraska Wesleyan Sept. 25.

### Volleyball

Doane's volleyball team has compiled a record of 10-4 and stands second in the conference.

The Lady Tigers took the first set against the third ranked team in the NAIA, College of St. Mary, 15-12.

The next three sets belonged to the College of St. Mary, as they went

on to defeat Doane, 12-15, 15-7, 15-4 and 15-5.

The volleyball team played for the conference championship last year, and they make this year's goal no different.

Doane began conference play last Tuesday against Hastings and faced Concordia at Seward last night.

### Women's Soccer

A 1-3 start for the Doane women's soccer team left the team stunned.

However, the Tigers have fought back with four straight victories. Doane is tied for second in the conference with a 2-0 start. The Tigers rank second in goals per game (3.43), however, Doane is second to last in goals allowed (3.00).

The Tigers are led by captains Dayle Ebisch, Paula Coleman and Jenn Ury.

The Tigers expect recruits Nicole Loya, Amy Navarrette and Karyn Schmidt to play major roles.

Sophomore Jen Swanson is second in the conference in goals per game (1.29) and scoring (20 points).

Doane's next challenge comes in the form of Friends University tomorrow.

The Tigers next conference match-up is against Northwestern on Oct. 2.

## Final Applejack Bowl Belongs to Peru State

The Dana Viking football team took to the road last Saturday in a game with the Peru State Bobcats.

Dana was looking to rebound from a big loss the week before to Huron University, which left them 1-1 on the season. After playing two tough games against teams ranked in the top 10 nationally, Peru State came into Saturday's contest winless.

Unlike the previous week against Huron, Dana was the first to score in this game. On the Viking's first possession, senior Jason Mitchell scored on a 10-yard touchdown run, and Dana led 7-0 after the first quarter of play.

After Peru St. scored on a short touchdown run, freshman Chevas Lamoya scampered for a 48-yard run, which set up Jason Mitchell who put the Vikings in front again with a 4-yard run to the endzone.

Unfortunately for the Vikings, the Bobcats rattled off the next 22 points unanswered. In the fourth quarter,

Bryan Soukup connected with fellow senior Joel Carter on yet another long touchdown pass, this one spanning 63 yards. The two have combined for at least one long touchdown pass in each of the first three games.

Yet, this was a hole that Dana could not dig themselves out of, and they would go on to lose by a final score of 36-20.

For the Vikings, Lamoya led the team in rushing again with 111 yards on 20 carries. Soukup passed for 118 yards, including one touchdown and one interception. Mitchell pulled down five catches for 63 yards, and Carter had three catches covering 86 yards.

The schedule does not get any easier for the Vikings over the next few weeks. Up next, Dana has a road game against Hastings College. The Broncos are currently ranked #2 in the nation in the NAIA football poll, having compiling a record of 3-0.

This will be the first game of the season in the NIAC conference for both schools. The game is scheduled to start at 7 p.m. in Hastings.

## Cross Country Team Fairs Well at Nebraska Invitational

The Dana men's cross country team saw several individual successes, but are yet to reach the team standard that has been built in the past five years.

Senior Scott Stanley showed poise as he finished the 8,000 meter course at Lincoln's Pioneers Park in 25:53, a career best on the course.

Stanley finished 9<sup>th</sup> in the 200+ field, with only one conference individual beating him. The men's team finished 6<sup>th</sup> out of 20 teams.

Junior Aaron Schlote ran his best race with a 35<sup>th</sup> finish in 26:57. Juniors Justin Christensen and Jason Brindle, along with sophomore John Tripp completed the scoring for the Vikings.

The women saw sophomore Natalie Flynn break her

personal record for the 5,000 meter race in 20:47. Freshman standout Stephanie Collins was close behind at 20:55.

Freshman Alicia Widtfeldt came in third for the Vikings at 21:50. It was Widtfeldt's first ever college meet after missing the Dana Open to fulfill Army obligations. Junior Jessica Chambers was fourth at 21:58 and freshman Heather Legler completed the women's scoring with a 22:06.

The women had a five women pack time of 1:19 (school record), and finished 15<sup>th</sup> out of 20.

The Vikings will travel to the University of Minnesota for the Roy Griak Invitational tomorrow. Over 30 teams are expected to compete in the college division.

### NIAC Conference to Expand in 2000

The Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) that Dana has been a part of has always been known for being highly competitive. Soon Dana will be facing more competition as the conference we are a part of expands.

Beginning in the fall of 2000, four new schools will join our conference, which will no longer be referred to as the NIAC.

The four schools that are joining the NIAC are Dakota Wesleyan University, Dordt College, Mount Marty College and the University of Sioux Falls. All four schools formerly were members of the South Dakota-Iowa Intercollegiate Conference (SDIC).

Jim Krause, the Athletic Director and Physical Education Chair at Dana College, said with 11 schools, the new conference would be the largest in the nation.

"Some scheduling plans were finalized at the summit in June, and others should be ratified at the fall conference meeting in October," said Paul Clark, the NIAC Commissioner.

A name must be decided upon for the new conference that will now include South Dakota schools as well as schools from Nebraska and Iowa.
