Science Hall Flood Still Not Solved

An estimated 250,000 gallons of water gushed through the Dana Hall of Science building on August 6 causing \$230,000 to \$250,000 worth of damage. Despite the devastation, Dana campus has pulled together to help "mop" up the mess.

"It was a tremendous task to turn the building around for use in three weeks," said Bob Schmoll, Vice President for Business Affairs. "It could not have been done without the volunteer help and support of the entire campus community."

Dr. Myrvin Christopherson,

President of Dana College said, "I think that it speaks of the character of Dana that the community responded as quickly and thoroughly during this crisis situation."

Information is still inconclusive as to how the flooding occurred.

"It's hard to say. Some feel it had to be vandalism while others think it could've been mechanical," Schmoll said.

Concrete evidence has still not been found, so the mystery still remains unsolved.

Student workers, maintenance, custodial crews, and office personnel all pitched in on an ironically rainy day in

August. After the initial bulk of the clean up was finished,

professional clean-up crews were

hired to take on the rest of the responsibilities.

Even though DHS cannot completely be up-graded, insurance does allow replacement of items. If additions beyond the money provided by insurance need to be made, the institution pays the difference.

Some things, however, will be improved upon for the mere fact that times have changed and so have materials. For example, chalkboards have been replaced with white marker boards, and a new fire alarm system has been installed.

Rooms have also been repainted, new ceiling tiles and

lighting installed, and damaged resource material replaced. However, certain things may take a little longer to restore. For example, blinds have been ordered for DHS, but it will take time before they are received.

"This problem helped us to realize that beyond making sure that the building would be usable when classes started, we were able to see how we can enhance our math and science programs," Christopherson said.

He said that Dana would be asking for help from alumni and friends so we could financially afford to substantially improve and expand the facility in the near future.

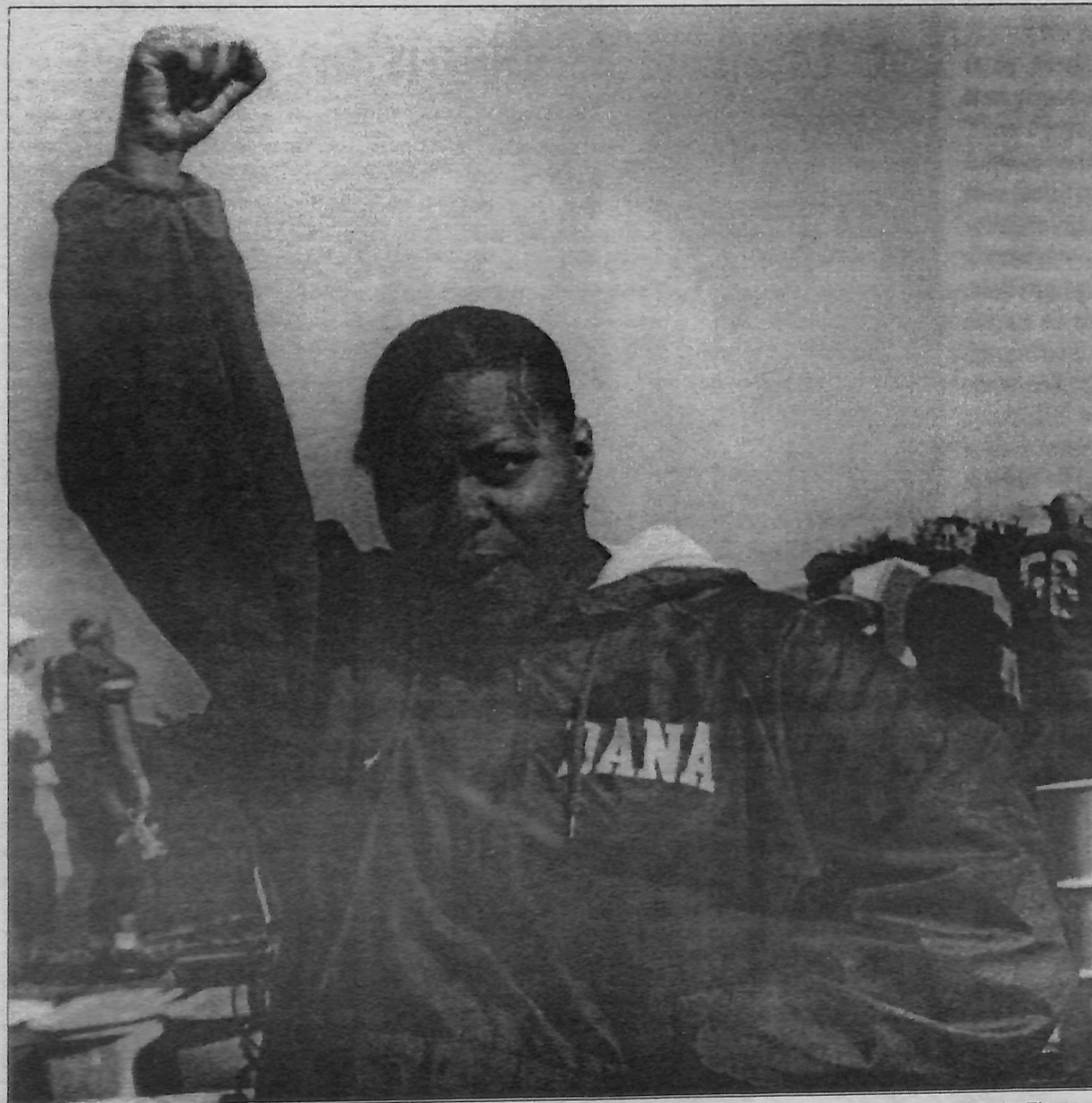

Smoking Causing Multiple Problems on Campus

Students aren't aware that their privilege of smoking can cause health problems, but that they are also affecting students around them in a negative way

While walking across campus, it's not hard to notice all of the cigarette butts lying on the ground like dead grass. In some areas, such as underneath Holding's staircase, it looks like it has already been snowing. There is even an ashtray at the entrance of the building, which nobody seems to use. Outside the side doors of the DCC building, there are many old cigarette butts lying around. There isn't even an ashtray for students to put the remains in. Maybe if we were to invest in one, the landscaping of our school would look more clean and presentable. Alumni were overheard talking about the mess from cigarettes outside of each building. It was rather embarrassing to think that people looked upon us as irresponsible adults. If we are responsible

enough to smoke, than we should be responsible to disregard of it properly. Not only does the habit create a mess, it also keeps people up at night. On a cool fall night when one wants to sleep with the window open, that person is forced to close it because the smoke goes directly into the window. The Joslyn Art Museum, located at 3701 S. 10th St., is Nebraska's only fine arts museum. They have a very large permanent display specializing in 19th and 20th century art from Europe and Asia.

The museum is open Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sunday from noon to 4 p.m. Joslyn is closed Mondays and on all major holidays.

Each room of the Joslyn is adorned with wonderful pieces of original artwork. The rooms themselves are separated into time periods and styles. This separates the museum itself into several smaller galleries within one large exhibition.

Several traveling displays make their way through Omaha. Right now and continuing through October 31, Sandy Skoglund is featured with her exhibit "Reality Under Siege." Included in this display are photographs, paintings and

prints. She mixes reality and dreams for an amazing twist on life. Also featured is "Picturing Nebraska." This is part of a series of educational exhibits visually comparing the way artists have seen Nebraska for nearly two centuries. A few exhibits on their way include "The Great

Mertin and Christina Patoski. Also coming up is "Soul of Africa," featuring nearly 200 African Art pieces.

Joslyn is undergoing renovations and two former galleries will soon be reopened. In late October they will be revealed. The style, color and floors were

reworked. A digital information touch-screen computer will be available to further explain these works.

The first Sunday of Each month, Joslyn offers Bagels & Bach. This is a classical music series featuring both local and national musicians. Brunch is offered prior to each performance and is located inside Joslyn in their Fountain Court. All concerts begin at 11:15 a.m. The doors open one hour early.

Classical music is not the only music that is available at Joslyn. The first Friday of each month is the "First Friday JAM." This runs from October through May. It begins at 5:30 p.m. and goes until 8 p.m. Food and beverages can be purchased during the concert as well.

Art isn't the only feature of the Joslyn Art Museum, Café Durham serves lunch Tuesday through Saturday 11 a.m.- 2 p.m. a light menu is offered until 4 p.m. Drinks can be purchased Sunday noon - 4 p.m.

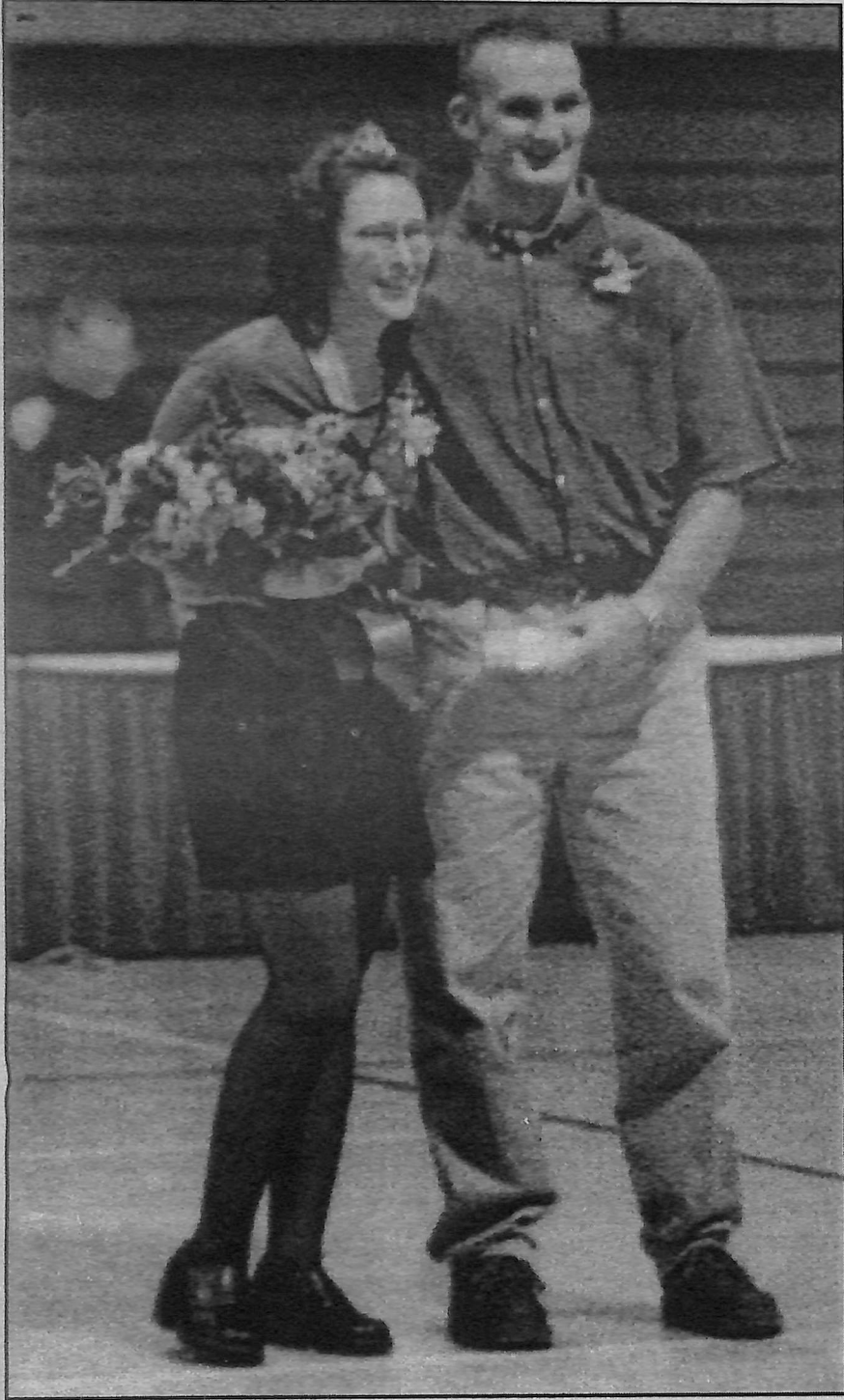

Ruhde is majoring in English and Theater. She is from Shenandoah, Iowa and plans on teaching high school English.

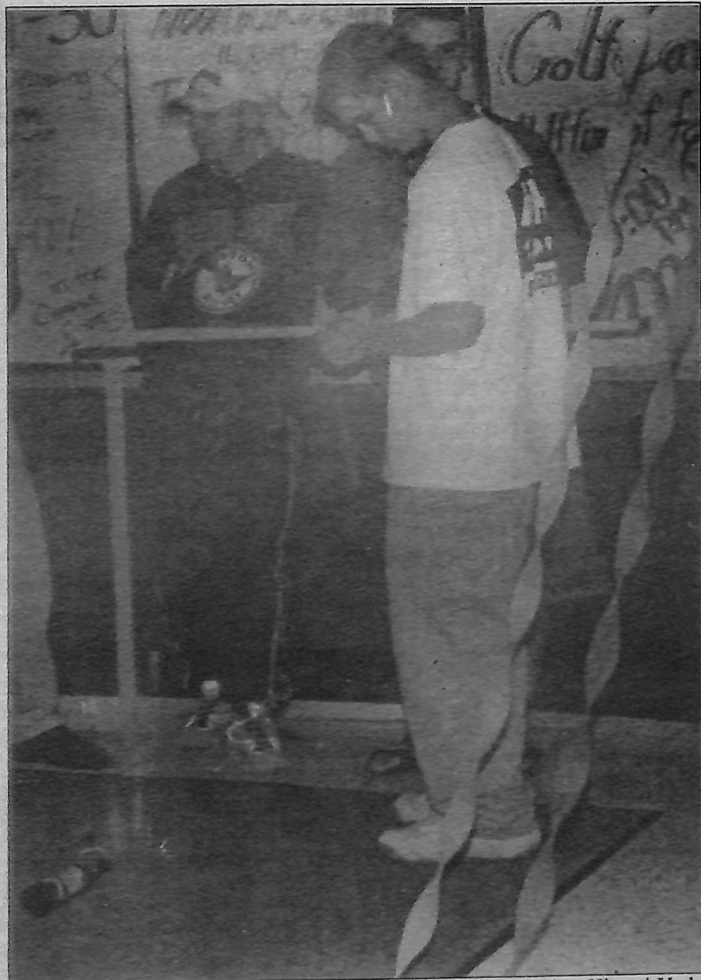

The Dreaded Resume: *Some Info to Get You Started*

Before you can get the job of your dreams, you first have to get an interview with the job of your dreams. Landing that crucial interview has just become easier with the help of career services, the Nebraska Interview Consortium and the Internet.

The Nebraska Interview Consortium, or NIC, is an organization that provides a list of nationwide job openings each fall and spring to colleges in Nebraska. The NIC has positions listed for every major. Some companies that have posted job openings with the NIC include Norwest Financial, Alegent Health and Sherwin Williams.

In the past the providing of company and job information, sending of resumes and setting up of interviews had to be done by mail or phone. The major improvement the NIC has made this year is to provide these services over the Internet.

In order to submit your resume with the NIC, you must first approve your resume with career services. This is to help

improve your resume and to correct any errors. The next step is to complete a registration form. Registration consists of contact information such as your name and phone number, major and job interests. The purpose is to place qualified candidates with jobs that fit their interests.

Once registration is complete, you can upload your resume in its exact format, and submit it to companies whose job postings you are interested in. The company will then contact you for an interview that will be held in Lincoln or Omaha. Interview times can be scheduled by phone or over the Internet.

The whole registration and submittal process only takes about 20 minutes. It is important to not wait because October 14 is the last day for fall resume submittal, and many company deadlines are approaching.

If you are uncertain about how to start your resume, or just need to touch it up, career services can help. They have many sample resumes and tips for help. A resume workshop was held at noon in the Dragon's Head yesterday.

The Dana College Vikings looked to rebound against the Red Raiders of Northwestern College on Saturday, after having been defeated by #2 Hastings in the NIAC opener.

The Vikings hoped the homecoming atmosphere, along with a sense of urgency, would propel them to a victory in their first conference home game of 1999. Northwestern brought a 2-1 record and a ranking of #21 in the NAIA to Viking Field.

Dana got off to a quick start, as freshman Chevas Lamoya scored during the first drive of the game on a 70-yard run. This put the Vikings up 7-0.

Northwestern would answer right back on the ensuing drive as they scored on a 61-yard scoring pass to tie the game. Still in the first quarter, Lamoya broke away

for another long run that set up a 15-yard touchdown pass from Bryan Soukup to fellow senior Jason Mitchell. This put the Vikings up 14-7 after the first period, and it looked as if a possible upset was in the making.

Unfortunately for Dana, the Raiders would go on to score the next 21 points and the Vikings were not able to recover.

In the third quarter, Robert Milliken connected on a 30-yard field goal, bringing Dana to within a score of 28-17, but they would get no closer.

Northwestern scored on two more touchdown runs in the fourth quarter and would go on to win 42-17, spoiling Dana's homecoming festivities. The loss drops Dana to 1-4 (0-2 NIAC) on the season.

The Vikings will take a break from NIAC play this week, as they travel to play the Dakota State Trojans in Madison, S.D.

DSU brings a record of 3-2 into this contest, coming off a victory over Black
