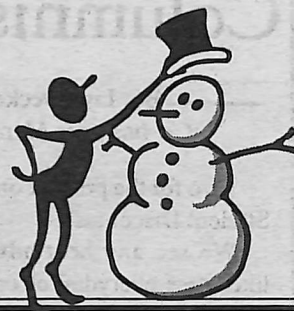

## Just a Few Statistics on Where Dana Students Come From

Demographics are important to marketers when determining who to target their products to, how to promote the products and how much money to put forth in promotions.

Just as demographics are important to marketers, they are also important to Dana. They are important when determining who and from where to recruit, what departments to allot more money to and, in the case of this article, for the entertainment and amusement of Hermes readers.

Enrollment and student turnover have been issues of concern facing Dana for the past few years. Currently Dana's full-time enrollment stands at 518 students, 148 of which are first year students. Forty-four students did not return to Dana this fall, which computes to be an 84.2% rate of retention.

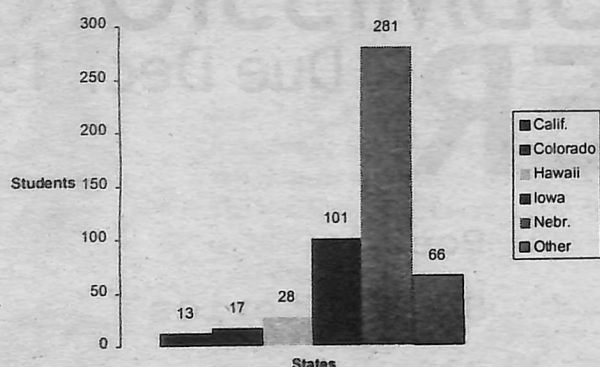
The 518 students at Dana represent 24 states and 11 countries and are split almost evenly between males and females. Students from Nebraska and Iowa make up 73.7% of Dana's population, which is 86.9% Caucasian. (See graphs 1, 2 & 3)

Business Administration is the most popular major at Dana with 83 students, 27 of which are female and 56 male. Elementary Education follows closely with 76 students, 59 being female and 17 male. The top ten majors are shown in graph 4. Numbers exclude any education emphases such as math or science for secondary education.

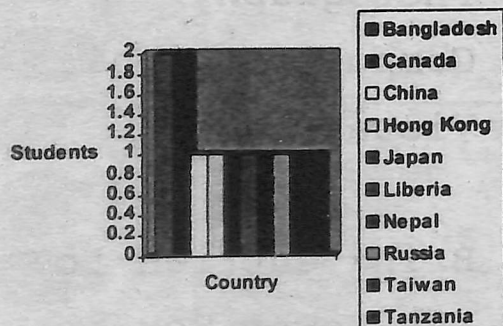
Athletics comprise the most students in extra-curricular activities with 280 students, over half of Dana's population. (Graph 5) The second closest program comprising 90 students is music and theater.

The data used for this article was provided by Janice Rasmussen. Some computations may be skewed due to double majors and dual activity students.

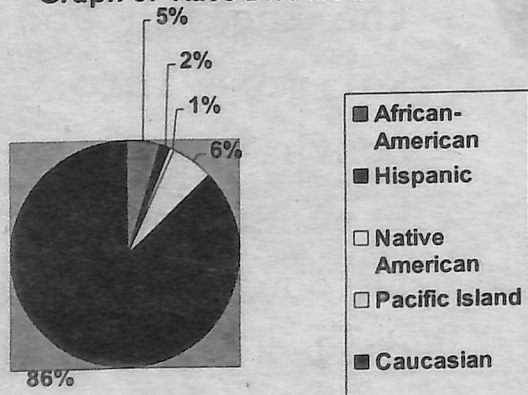
Graph 1: State Distribution



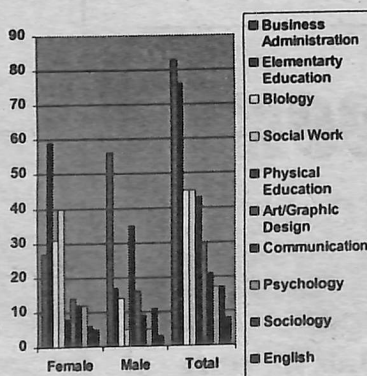
Graph 2: Country Distribution



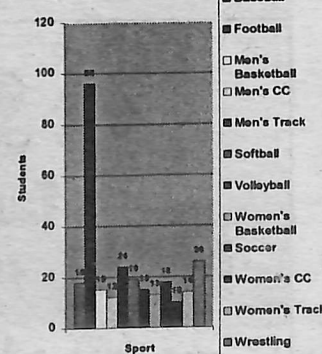
Graph 3: Race Distribution

## Planned Parenthood and Dana Columnist Explores Advertising Role in Dana Community

We see and hear advertisements like these everyday of our lives, and even though Dana may sometimes seem separated from the rest of the world, it is no exception. Advertisements targeting students are found campus wide from posters and circulars to the campus radio station and the Hermes.

According to "Contemporary Advertising", 7<sup>th</sup> edition by William F. Arens, advertising benefits society in four main ways. First, by encouraging development and acceptance of new products and technology. Second, it gives consumers a wider variety of choices. Third, it stimulates healthy competition. Finally, advertising promotes a higher standard of living.

"Contemporary Advertising" also states that "truthful commercial speech is entitled to significant if not full protection under the First Amendment." But just because an ad

is protected by the First Amendment, does not mean that publications have to run the ad if it conflicts with their own interests.

So what advertisements should be allowed to reach Dana students, or should ads be censored at all?

This was a question that the *Hermes* and the media advisory board was recently faced with regarding advertisements submitted by Planned Parenthood. Planned Parenthood is a non-profit organization that provides health care, primarily dealing with reproductive health, at an affordable price.

The controversy arose due to comments from sources outside of the Dana community regarding the moral implications of some of the services provided by Planned Parenthood. The major one being the Emergency Contraception Pill, formerly known as "the morning after pill". Stated in the Planned Parenthood ad, "Emergency Contraception is a higher dose of birth

control pills, that if taken within 72 hours of unprotected sex, can prevent pregnancy."

So would the *Hermes* be going against Dana's mission of providing a "higher education in harmony with the Christian faith" if it ran advertisements for an organization that promotes products that deal with sex? Or would the *Hermes* be fulfilling the duties outlined in the job description of the business manager?

Two of these duties that the business manager is responsible for are to sell advertising to all local merchants whose goods and services may be of interest and use to *Hermes* readers, and to provide *Hermes* readers with information about local merchants.

Using these responsibilities and information printed in Planned Parenthood advertisements, the Media Advisory Board made its initial decision regarding the types of ads that are acceptable to run in the *Hermes*.

After much discussion, the board determined that "Dana students need access to women's health information and services such as provided by Planned Parenthood, and that such ads [informative ads similar to the ad in the survival guide] were appropriate." In an effort to provide information about local merchants, other health facilities such as Lutheran Family Services will be solicited.

It is not the intention of the *Hermes* staff to offend any readers due to the content of the advertisements. It is our intention to provide students access to paid advertisements that will aid them in making purchasing decisions, whether the product is pizza or birth control.

As always, any comments, questions or concerns regarding this topic or any other topics the *Hermes* deals with are welcome.

## Basketball Team Starts Off Season in Good Form

The Dana Viking basketball team has had a successful week surrounding the holiday, picking up two victories over quality opponents. The Vikings have yet to start play in the NIAC, but they are off to a very good start to the season.

On Tuesday, November 23, Dana traveled to Bellevue to take on the Bruins. The Vikings brought a record of 4-2 into the contest, coming off a second place finish in the Peru State Tournament. This game was truly a

tale of two halves, as each team completely dominated one of the two 20 minute periods.

Bellevue got off to a very good start, and took a big lead in the first half. On the strength of good shooting and rebounding, the Bruins took a 17-point halftime lead of 62-45.

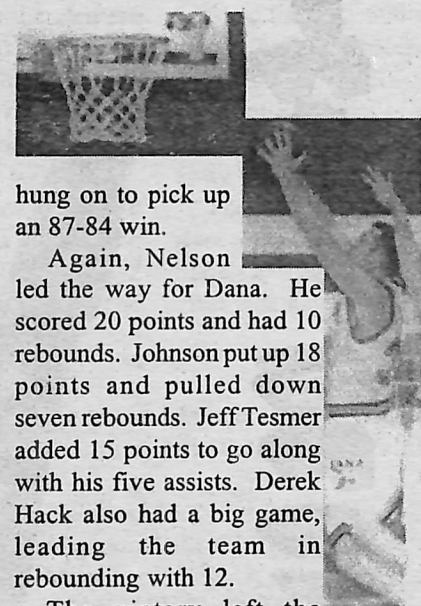
However, the Vikings would come back in the second half. As they cut away at the lead, Dana got the Bruins into foul trouble and that would help make the difference down the stretch. In the

end, the Vikings outscored Bellevue 47-25 in the second half of play to pick up a 92-87 victory.

Dwight Nelson led Dana in scoring with 21 points. He also collected eight rebounds to lead the team. Michael Johnson added 18 points, and Luke Connell contributed 13 to the winning effort.

After taking the weekend off for Thanksgiving, Dana was back in action at Borup Coliseum on Tuesday, November 30. This time, the opponent was York College. The Panthers brought a 5-3 record into the game.

This contest was tightly contested throughout. After shooting 50 percent in the first half, Dana took a 43-39 lead at halftime. York would connect on several 3-point field goals in the second half to keep the game close, but Dana would not allow the Panthers to escape with a victory. The Vikings

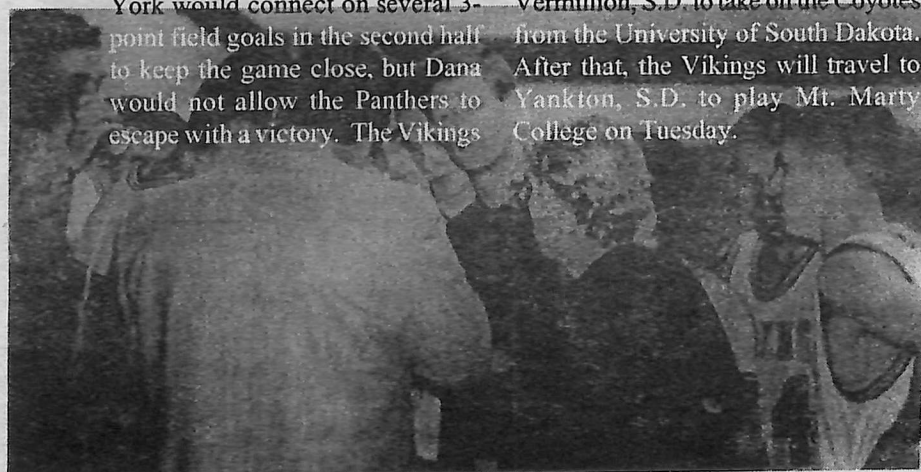


hung on to pick up an 87-84 win.

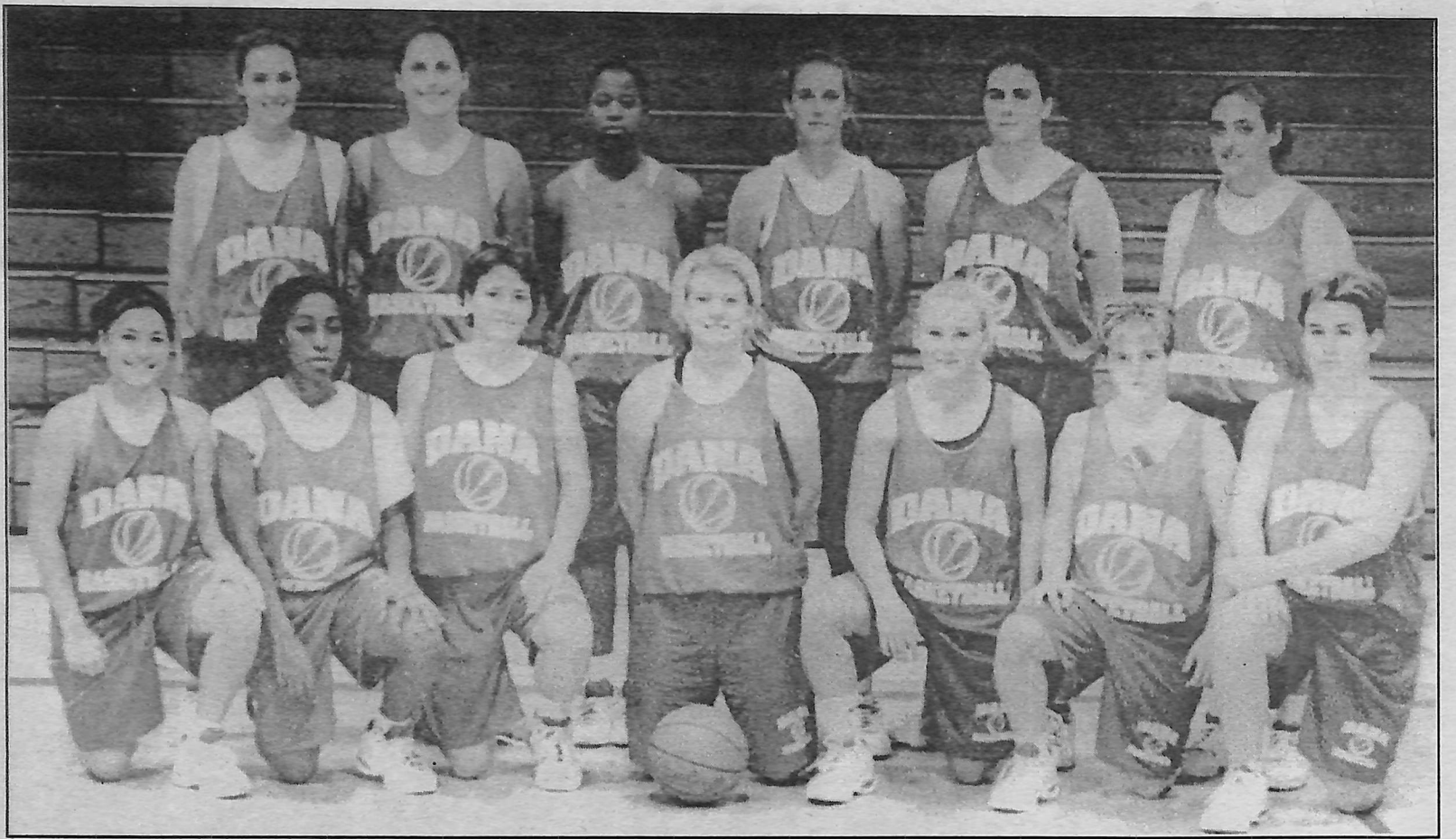
Again, Nelson led the way for Dana. He scored 20 points and had 10 rebounds. Johnson put up 18 points and pulled down seven rebounds. Jeff Tesmer added 15 points to go along with his five assists. Derek Hack also had a big game, leading the team in rebounding with 12.

The victory left the Vikings at 6-2 for the season. On Thursday, Dana traveled to Vermillion, S.D. to take on the Coyotes from the University of South Dakota. After that, the Vikings will travel to Yankton, S.D. to play Mt. Marty College on Tuesday.

## Dana Women Off to Hot Start Under New Leadership

The Dana women's basketball team is on fire. And in this situation don't call the fire department because it looks like this one won't be put out.

The Vikings opened the season with a loss to nationally ranked Mount Marty, 80-66. After winning the Godfather's Invitational at home, coach Doug Fessler and the Vikings took on Mid-America Nazarene in Borup Coliseum.

The Vikings were led by senior Elizabeth Snedigar who compiled 27 points for the second

time of the season. She also grabbed 15 rebounds to bring her double-doubles to three on the year. Junior Tori Talbitzer added 12 points and 17 rebounds, and senior Kim Wilken joined Talbitzer with 12 points and seven rebounds.

For her efforts Snedigar was named the NIAC player of the week.

The Vikings took care of Nazarene, 71-65, by shooting 42% from the field, and 75% from the free throw line.

The Vikings traveled to

Huron for a two-game series. The first

game found Dana down one at half to Huron. The Vikings pulled through in the second half to beat Huron 91-84.

Junior Mandy Axmann led Dana with 21 points, with Wilken, Snedigar, freshman Kori Montez and Talbitzer also scoring in double figures.

The next day had Dana being routed early on by Valley City State. The Vikings were down 15-1 from the tipoff. However, the Vikings came back to tie the game at half. However, it wasn't meant to be as the Vikings fell 79-67.

Axmann led the Vikings again with 16 points. Wilken scored 14 points, senior Jorgia Morin added 13 points and Snedigar had 10 points. The loss brought Dana's record to 4-2.

The Vikings traveled to York Nov. 23 on a mission to improve on last year's record. If the Vikings beat York they would match their season total for victories last year of five.

After being tied at half, the Vikings ran away with the victory, outscoring York 48-30 in the second half. Dana beat York 74-56 and tied their victory count from last season.

Wilken scored 20 points in the game to lead the Vikings. Morin scored 13 points and grabbed 10 rebounds, senior Tricia Nicholson added 11 points and 11 rebounds, and Snedigar again scored 10 points.

The Vikings hosted York Nov. 30, and with a win would eclipse last season's record in only eight games.

After leading 39-26 at half, the Vikings switched it up a notch and held York to 24% in the second half. The Vikings were relentless in the second half, finishing off York 85-52.

Axmann led Dana with 15 points, while four others finished in double figures. Talbitzer added to her list of double-doubles of the season with four.

With the victory, the Vikings improved to 6-2, their best start in decades. The Vikings travel to Mt. Pleasant, IA tonight and tomorrow.

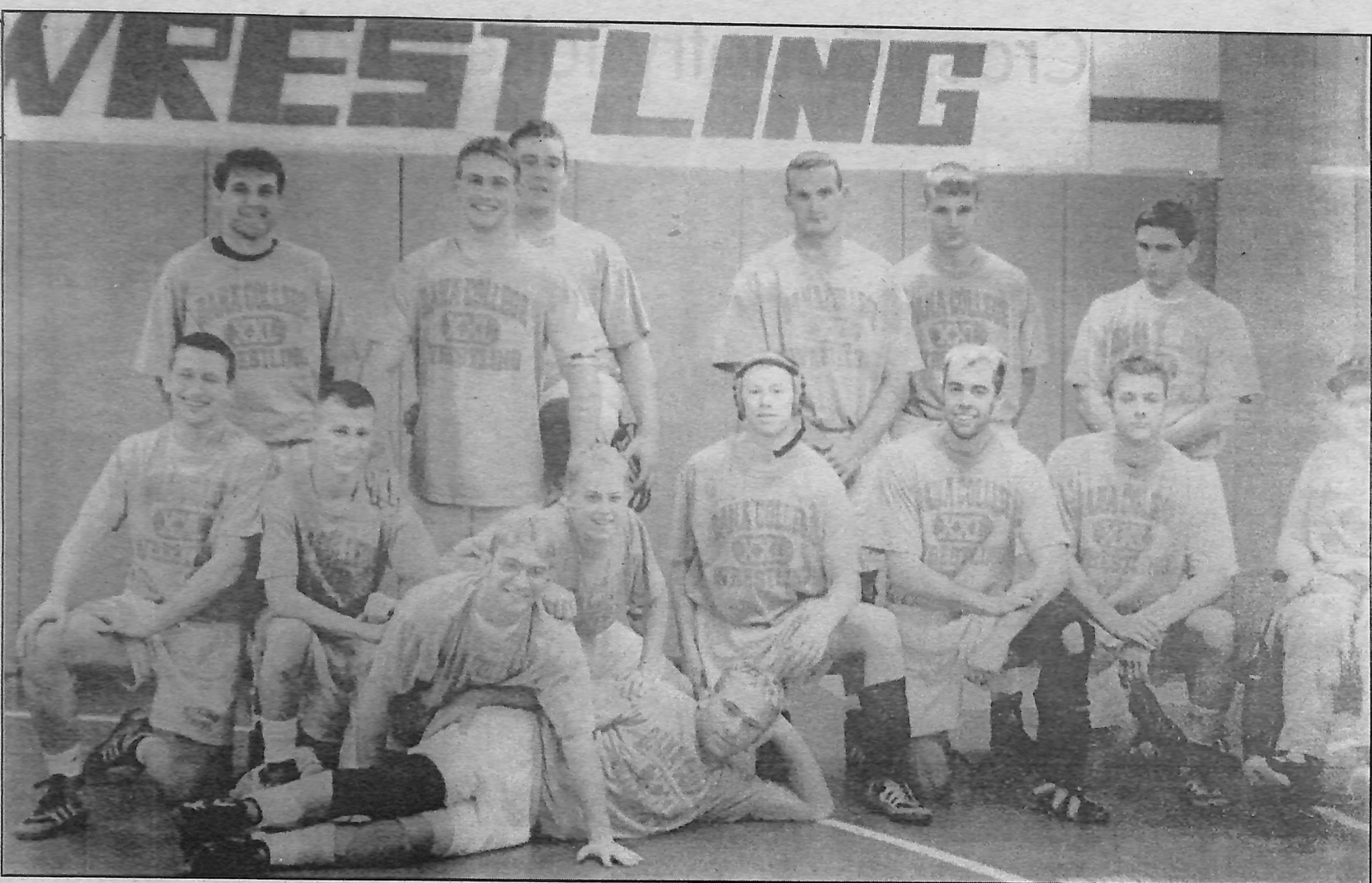

This year's wrestling team has a slogan: "Never Quit." The team has it imprinted on their sweatshirts just in case they forget why they are wrestling at Dana.

The squad has a new leader this year, as coach Ron Beaman retired from the team after coaching at Dana for 19 years. Taking over for Beaman is coach Jess Randall.

The team traveled to Warrensburg, MO for the Central Missouri State Open November 14. The team came back to Blair with three wrestlers that placed at the meet.

Senior Darold Foster won his 157-pound weight class. Foster

didn't only take first place, but he dominated the field with a 4-0 record on the day. With that performance Foster has already earned a spot at nationals.

The Vikings bring nine freshmen to the mat this year. The freshmen faced a tough challenge, but they didn't disappoint in their first collegiate meet of their careers.

Freshman Rob Pilcher placed 4<sup>th</sup> in the 149-pound division. His overall record stands at 5-2 with four pins. Pilcher comes to Dana from Millard South.

Another freshman performed well for the Vikings. Keith Simmons excited the crowd as he came away with a 6<sup>th</sup> place finish in the 125-pound weight class. Simmons, from Sidney, IA, not

only was awarded 6<sup>th</sup> place, but also came home with the most pins in the least amount of time award. Simmons record stands at 3-3.

Freshman Jake Herre injured his elbow in a 0-2 defeat in the tournament. Freshman Nick Steinhoff, wrestling at 133-pounds, fought hard, but couldn't pull out a victory.

Sophomore Chad Rybar came away with a pin, and ended the day with a 1-2 record, wrestling at the 157-pound division. Senior All-American Perry Mostek finished the tournament with a 1-2 record.

Sophomore Tom Wissman came away with a pin in the tournament, and left with a 1-2 record. Wrestling in the

heavyweight division, one of Wissman's losses came to the second best wrestler in Division 1. Wissman fought hard against Iowa University's Wes Hand, but in the end Hand was victorious.

It wasn't meant to be for freshmen Cody Carret and Wynn Fangmeier, as both came home with a 0-2 record in their first collegian match.

Sophomore Ben Wilcox finished the day .500 with a 2-2 record, and also recorded a pin. Wrestling with Wilcox in the 149-pound division was freshman Ryan Stolz. Stolz went away with a 1-2 record.

The Vikings travel to Hays, Kan. to compete in the Fort Hays State Open. Dana's first home meet is January 14.

# Cross Country Takes 19th at Nationals

Dana's Scott Stanley finished his cross country career with another stellar performance at the NAIA National Cross Country Meet Nov. 20.

Stanley ran a season best 25:03 race, which placed him 16<sup>th</sup> out of 236 runners. Stanley was the sixth American to finish. Life University's Silah Misoi, a Kenyan, ran 24:05 to help his team win their second straight title.

This was Dana's fifth trip to the national meet in five years.

The Vikings finished 19<sup>th</sup> out of 28 teams, but Dana bettered its pre-meet ranking of 24 by five spots.

"We were hoping to place a bit higher," coach Jay Birmingham said. "But they ran tough, earning one All-American award and five personal bests. Placing in the top 20 is a nice accomplishment for these young men."

Junior Justin Christensen was the Vikings second runner,

coming in 72<sup>nd</sup> place overall with a time of 26:10.

His roommate junior Aaron Schlote finished 111<sup>th</sup> with a time of 26:41. Sophomore John Tripp showed up for the Vikings in a big way, improving his personal

best to 27:48, which placed him 175<sup>th</sup>. Junior Marc Bierbaum finished the Dana scoring, coming in 194<sup>th</sup> place with a personal best 28:15.

Junior Jason Brindle came in 203<sup>rd</sup> in 28:42 and freshman Ryan Milner shattered his personal best with a time of 28:59, which placed him 207<sup>th</sup> overall.

Dana's academics were also recognized by the NAIA. The Vikings held a team GPA which exceeded 3.0, which placed them in the top seven in the nation. That was the third time Dana has been recognized nationally for academics.

### DOES IT REALLY MATTER?

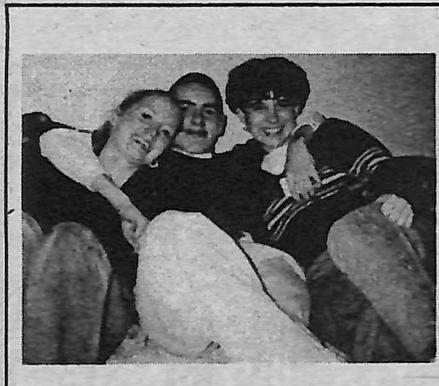
