FACULTY OF TRINITY SEMINARY


REV. P. S. VIG, D.D. (center picture), Dean of Trinity Seminary, attended the Askov High School, and the Missionary Institute of Copenhagen. He has been a member of our faculty from 1896-99; 1902-05; and since 1909, teaching Old Testament Exegesis, Dogmatics, Apologetics, Bible Study, and History of Danish Literature. His sincerity of heart and his kindly humor have endeared him to those who have had the pleasure of association with him.

REV. N. P. LANG (left picture), has studied at Dana Collge, Trinity Seminary, and the Chicago Lutheran Seminary. He began his work as instructor in Trinity Seminary in 1909 and is now teaching New Testament Exegesis, Ethics, Liturgics, Homiletics, Catechetics, and Pastoral Theology. Rev. Lang is a consistent student of the Greek New Testament and is thus well qualified to teach this subject also.

Since 1923 he has been Treasurer of the College.

REV. THEO. M. HANSEN, A.B. (right picture), attended Dana College, University of Nebraska, and St. Olaf College; took up post-graduate work for one year at the University of Minnesota, and spent one year at University of Copenhagen and Tubingen. He is now enrolled in the University of Chicago, during the summer sessions, where he hopes to complete his graduate work. 
In 1923 he was appointed Dean of Men at Dana, in which capacity he is still serving.







The day shall come when for your faithful strife, for ev'ry deed, for each endeavor





DANA ORGANIZATIONS

HE SECOND YEAR of the Student Organization is nearing its close. No matters of special importance were determined by it this year but it has continued sponsoring "Hermes" and gave its Annual Banquet shortly before the close of the Winter Term. It endeavors to keep in mind at all times the best interests of the students and the welfare of the school. We feel that it will be a real vital organization when it incorporates in its constitution a student council and governing body.

The monthly publication of our school, Hermes, under the direct supervision of the Student Organization, is one of the chief student activities. It gives ample opportunity for developing literary style, and hopes to bring to its readers a characteristic message from Dana.

The Students' Christian Association aims to be of assistance in enhancing the spirit of true Christian fellowship among the students. Mid-week meetings, in both languages, are held throughout the school year, prayer meetings are conducted, and special programs given, during the Winter Term, on Sunday afternoons. We believe the organization could also be of assistance to the local church especially at Sunday evening services.

The Foreign Mission Society, as its name implies, endeavors to keep alive the interest in foreign missions by having various individuals present biographies of missionaries, and sketches of mission work, followed by general discussion. Christ's last command to His disciples is the central theme of this organization.

The English part of the literary and forensic activities is promoted by the Hesperian Literary Society. It strives to entertain as well as to educate. The programs this year have been varied and interesting. We believe it would be very helpful to all if parliamentary practice became part of several programs.

Danish literature and speech is upheld by the Dannebrog Literary Society which has been particularly active this year. The society in conjunction with the "Hesperian" arranged for the declamatory contests which were held May 14th and 25th. Our suggestion to the "Dannebrog" would be that even though the programs are exceptionally good, they should not be too long.

Dannevirke, although the youngest and perhaps the most exclusive of all Dana societies, is without doubt the most active. Its purpose is to unite the Winter Term students about that which they have in common. Ordinarily, half of each meeting was devoted to discussion of current topics. The remainder of the program was varied. Prof. Nyholm has been the active agent in promoting the affairs of this organization.

The Nordisk Læsekreds, a Danish reading circle organized in 1923, affords a most excellent opportunity for obtaining an acquaintance with Scandinavian literature. It is under the leadership of Prof. Nyholm.



The Athletic Club is an organization whose membership is almost 100 per cent of the student body. While its endeavor is the promotion of athletics in its various forms it is most active in basket-ball, assisting the team to obtain equipment and aiding in arrangements for games.

The most popular of Dana's outdoor sports is tennis. This year through the efforts of the Tennis Club members, the "lower" courts were improved, making four good clay courts available for this fascinating game. The annual tournament this year was marked with keen interest and a spirit of sportsmanlike competition.

BASKET-BALL

ASKET-BALL, the chief sport at Dana, has always been followed with great interest by the students. This was also the case in the season of 1924—25. Though this year was not exceptionally successful in the number of games won, it was unusual in the interest shown by the entire student-body, for without their support it would be impossible to have athletics at Dana. This is due to the fact that our college is without an athletic fund; so in order to foster this game the students have given of their limited means. Indications would seem to point to a bright future for Dana on the hardwood court, as we hope to have a modern gymnasium before long. If this wish materializes, Dana will be able to put forth a good basket-ball team each year. Then it might be possible to gain membership in the basket-ball conference of Nebraska and aid materially in making our school prominent and of more service.

Prof. Nielsen is very desirous of promoting a greater interest in choral singing, especially in the Danish church.



College Amateurs was the name chosen by the group of aspiring basket-ballers shown above. They were a rather energetic organization whose highest ambition was to beat the College team some day.


The most humorous, yet boldest of the "free lance" basket-ball teams called themselves "The Laydees Ade". We regret we have no picture of this most popular quintet.

EXTRACTS FROM A SENIOR'S LETTERS*

Dana College, Blair, Nebr. Sept. 26, 1924.

Dear Twinnie.

I have been wanting to write you for several days but there have been so many things to do that I haven't had time. But since I promised to let you know everything that takes place here I must begin soon or I will forget some things.

But, say, Twinnie, you know what I'm going to do? I'm going to keep a diary and just tear the pages out every once in a while and send them to you. That will save me lots of work,—going to classes and studying takes up more time than I bargained for. Here's the first page:

Sept. 22. Today we registered. They say if I take Danish I can better understand my ancestors. Maybe it'll help me to understand my brother "Twinnie" too! How many queer looking students there are and some are so old they look like teachers, while some teachers look so young you'd think they were students. I feel kind-a lonesome today. The school buildings are nicer than I thought they were, but it's not like home. I met a nice fellow, John the Janitor.

Sept. 30. The "Dannebrog" society held a meeting. Officers were chosen. I joined the society but didn't get a job. I hope I will next time, 'cause I need some



Nov. 7. This afternoon and evening we celebrated Dr. Vig's 70th anniversary. One of the speakers said he expected him to die on the battlefield with his boots on. Dr. Vig replied, "My shoes hurt too much!" The Music Director, the Danish Prof, and a Danish boy named "Pete" each wrote some poetry about Dr. Vig. He received many gifts.

Nov. 8. Miss Olesen, a missionary, told us of her work in India. It must be hard to be a foreign missionary but they feel they are doing their duty and that's the main thing.

It made me feel kind-a homesick too the 19th of December, when the Dana Choir gave a musical program in the Chapel. They sang like nightingales and made me wish I was back home. Tomorrow night they're going to have a Banquet for us all who are left after the Christmas program in the Chapel.

I'll write all kinds of letters during Xmas week. Write me lots of them too 'cause I'll be so lonesome. Merry Christmas to you and the folks.

I sure thought I'd write lots of letters last week but they sure kept me busy. Every day we went some place. I hardly even had time to get lonesome. I did en-

joy all the presents you sent me as I wrote in my letter to Ma a few days ago. Can you tell me what "bowling" is? They say they had midnight bowling matches with an indoor baseball on the fourth floor of the south wing of the boys' dormitory all last week. I guess Asaph was the champion.

Dec. 31. Invited to New Year's Party in Danish Church.

Jan. 1. The boys acted just terrible last night. They washed their floors with the fire hose and turned each other's beds upside down. I think the Dean of Men ought to live in the boys' dormitory, too.

Jan. 2. Invited to Dr. C. X. Hansen's home in the evening. Treated by Jim Mose (a nice fat and jolly man who has an ice cream parlor. I think he's Jewish. but I heard him speak Dane). Tomorrow lessons begin again. I can't remember

Jan. 7. Something awful has happened here. I think all the boys are getting crazy or something. A big bunch of them made a club not to shave their upper lips and they are beginning to look terrible. I think it's a disgrace. But that is not all. There are seven boys here with all their hair clipped off-just as if they were in prison. We girls won't talk to them any more, just to show them how we feel about it. Edna's room-mate threw water on one of them. Even Carl Johnson was going to have it done but his sister wouldn't let him. 
