### OUR SEMINARY

The primary purpose of our school is to fit the young men and women of our church to fulfill their calling as children of God in the various professions, as teachers, doctors, lawyers, or whatever other field becomes the individual's specific field of activity. Thus, to provide Christian leadership is the basal aim of our school, and the Seminary, which is intimately tied up with our school, serves in a very special sense to provide trained workers for our church. The Seminary faculty has ever sought to impress upon the students, both by word and example, the necessity of true, Christ-grounded spirituality for all who are to be privileged to fulfill the high calling of the Christian ministry. In this respect the course in theology as offered in our Seminary comprises more than an advanced course in Bible study and the memorizing by rote of certain doctrinal and denominational teachings. It speaks, "not the wisdom of this world, nor of the princes of this world," but it speaks the wisdom of God as it is set forth in His Divine Word; it realizes the limitations of reason and knows that the reason of man must be guided, enlightened and sanctified by the Spirit of God. Thus, there is no academic wrangling for it seeks to penetrate to the heart; for after all, Christianity is of the heart, and its leaders must have that spiritual life which depends upon the one thing needful, namely Jesus Christ and Him crucified.

### ACADEMY

The academic department was established at the beginning of this institution. The academic course was added when the first building was dedicated in the year 1886. This course offered pre-seminary preparation for prospective theological students and also gave other young people an opportunity to receive their high school education at a Christian institution. With only a very small enrollment at first the academy grew to a considerable size and added the normal course, business course, and music course.

During the later years the enrollment in the academy has been diminishing, due largely to better opportunities for receiving high school education nearer the homes of the students than it was formerly, and owing to this fact it has been decided to discontinue the academy course at Dana College after this year. The academy course has proven very successful during the years it has been conducted here and has been an asset to the institution. In the present school year eleven have been enrolled in the academy and six are graduating from the course. For many years the academy has been fully accredited by the University of Nebraska and other institutions of learning.

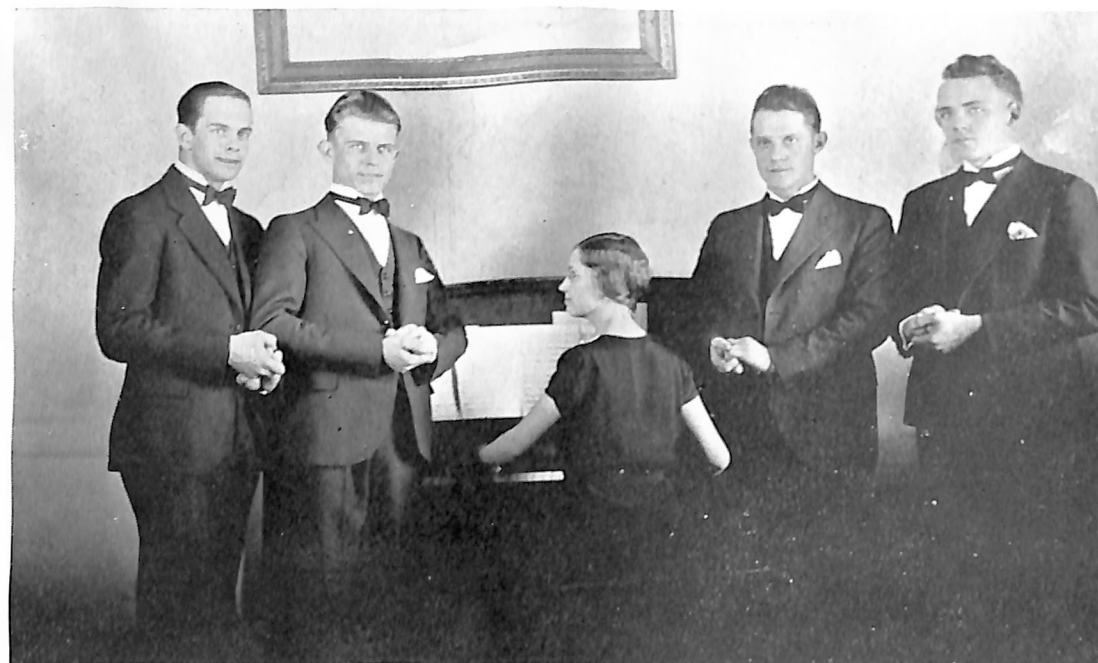


### THE DANA A CAPPELLA CHOIR

The main purpose of the choir, we venture to say, is educational. This purpose is to exert upon its members a certain type of influence. The choir tours with their public appearances are "by-products."

In the first place, choral singing does play an ever increasing part in our churches and communities, and to be able to take an active part in such activities, as member or director, is surely an asset. Our choir members should be in a position to render real service along these lines as they leave our ranks. But that is not the main thing. The ability to concentrate every faculty on a given task is of great value in any field of activity, and the choir demands absolute concentration. Furthermore, the continued association with beauty, especially when that beauty is the exalted expression of Christian faith, must surely leave its marks. Fine choral music appeals to the loftiest idealism of youth. If the choir does not help to develop beauty of Christian character in its members, then it has failed in its main purpose.

The choir tours as well as all public appearances of the choir are for the purpose of bringing these educational and spiritual benefits to others. Advertising of the school is a "by-product." The Dana Choir is largely an outgrowth of the religious life of the school, and it is therefore natural that "singing the Gospel to the hearts of men" has been a leading motive from the beginning. A worthy purpose, indeed! here can be no doubt as to the fact that the average listener, with no musical training, does sense the spiritual appeal of fine choral singing. What a responsibility indeed, and what a privilege, to be ambassadors of Christ, in our singing!

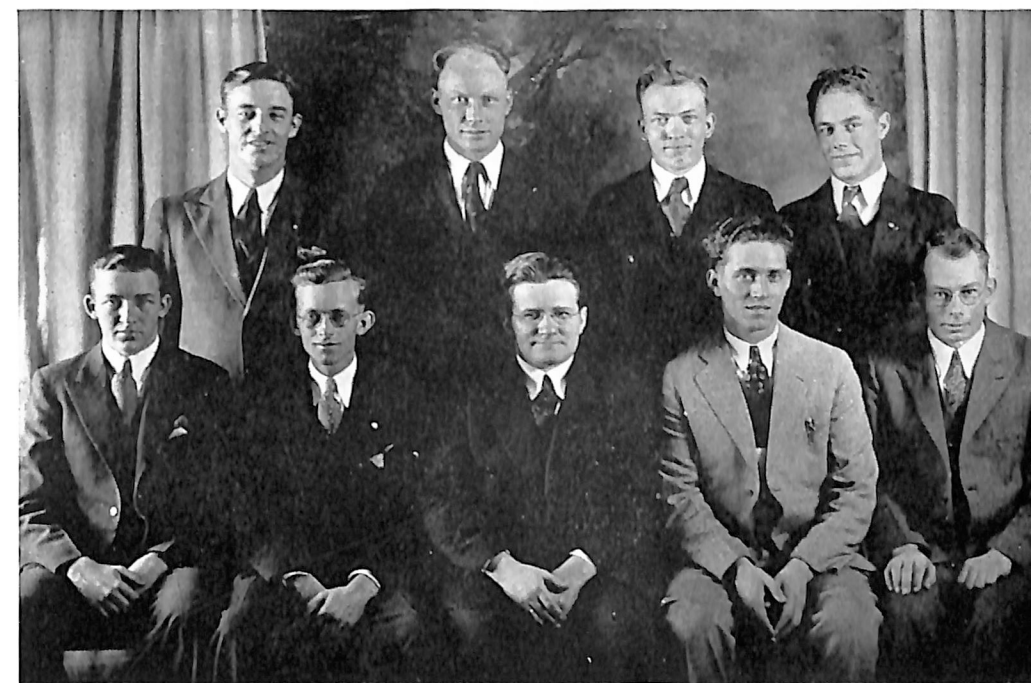

### DEBATE

Debating has become one of the major curricula activities at Dana. This year the squad, under Dr. Popeke's coaching, won five and lost three debates. Long hours were spent in preparing for the question which was: Resolved, That congress should enact legislation providing for the centralized control of industry.

Dana's initial plunge into intercollegiate debate took place with Omaha University. Honors were divided with this school. The affirmative team, consisting of Clarence Jensen, Robert Larsen, and Alvin Carlsen (Captain), won two out of its four debates. This team under Carlsen's leadership was very able in presenting its plan.

The negative team, consisting of Ingward Olsen, Alfred R. Jensen, and Wm. Larsen (Captain), won three out of five debates. The power of the negative on this question lay in its practicability. The season closed in winning from Central College in a dual debate.



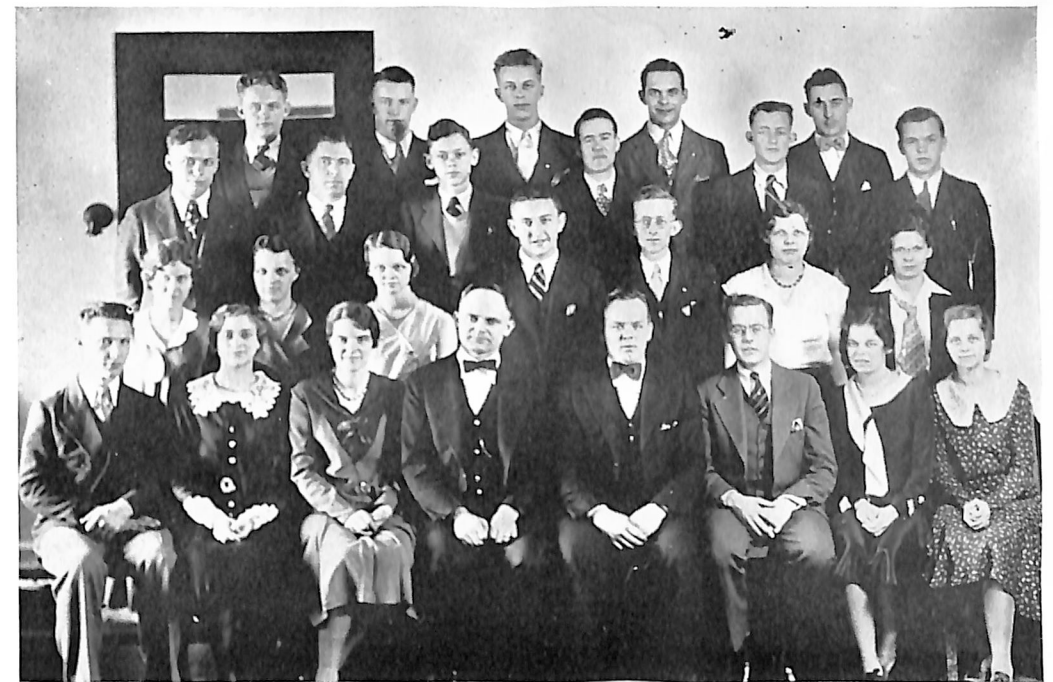

**THE FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY**

The Foreign Mission Society of Dana College and Trinity Seminary aims at making the students better acquainted with the work carried on in the mission fields, and in that way to arouse a keener interest in mission work. The Mission Society does not sponsor the work in any particular field, nor does it send out missionaries. The funds collected from annual membership dues are generally divided and sent to two or more mission fields as decided upon at the annual meeting, which is held during the spring of the year.

The Society aims at having regular monthly meetings at which time the work of a certain field or the biography of a missionary is presented. The Society has been greatly favored, from time to time, by lectures of missionaries who are back on furlough. The living experiences, as they are related by returned missionaries, naturally, create a greater interest in missions.

The ultimate aim of the Society is to help some student accept the challenge to service in the mission field.

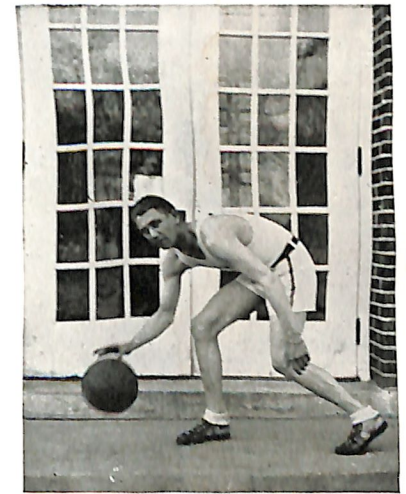

Miriam Rosenblatt, having spent several years as swimming instructor at the Honey Creek Municipal pool, is at present living at Toronto, Canada.

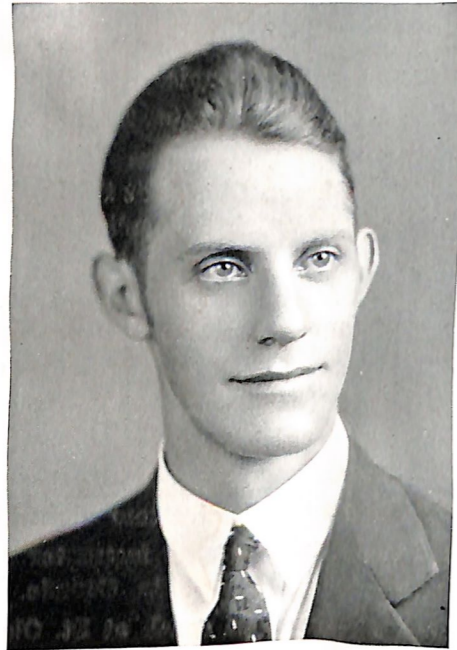
Peter A. Sorensen not long ago accepted a position as coach at St. Olaf College.

Dagmar Thomsen is private secretary of Mr. Mullins, scientific explorer in Africa.

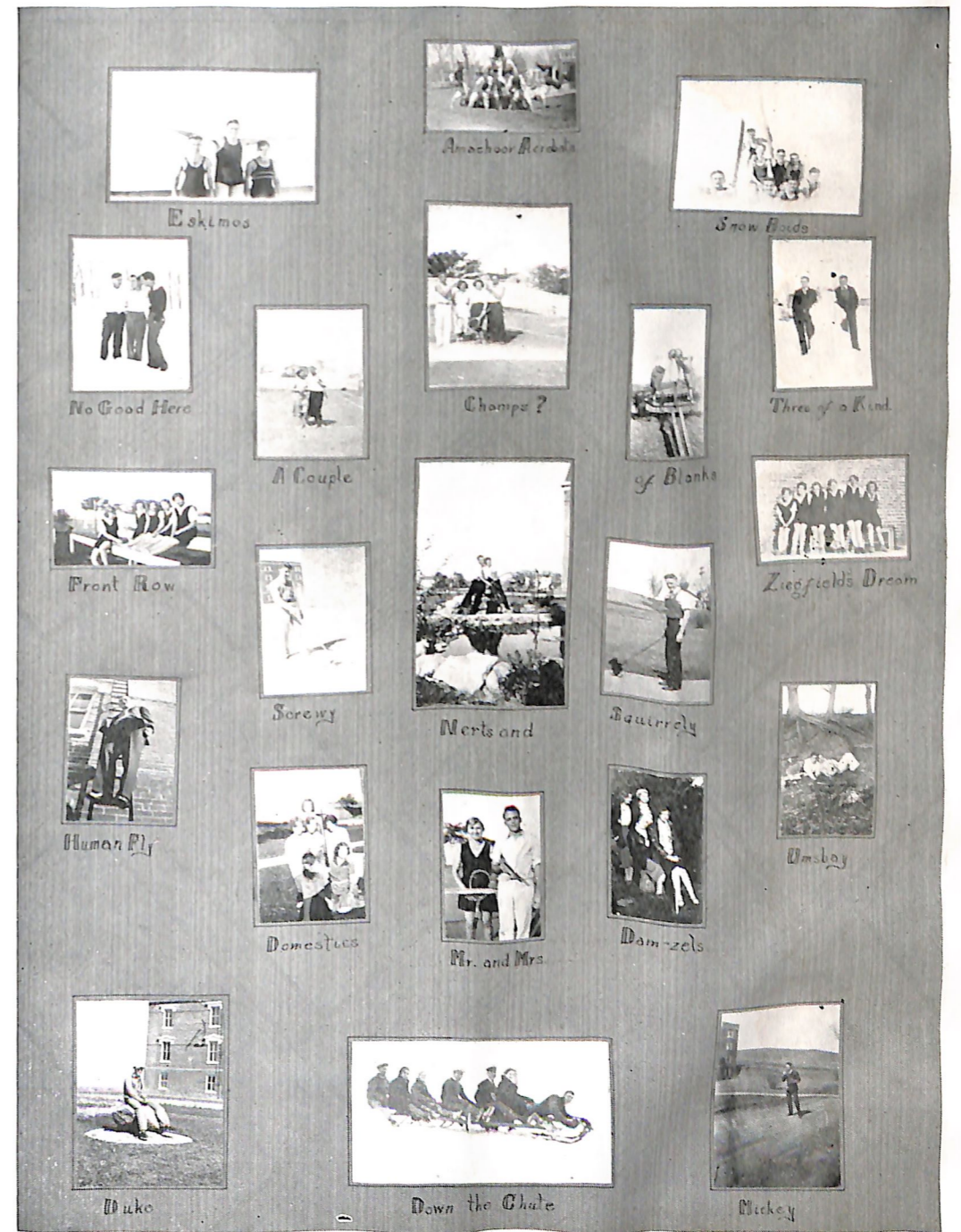

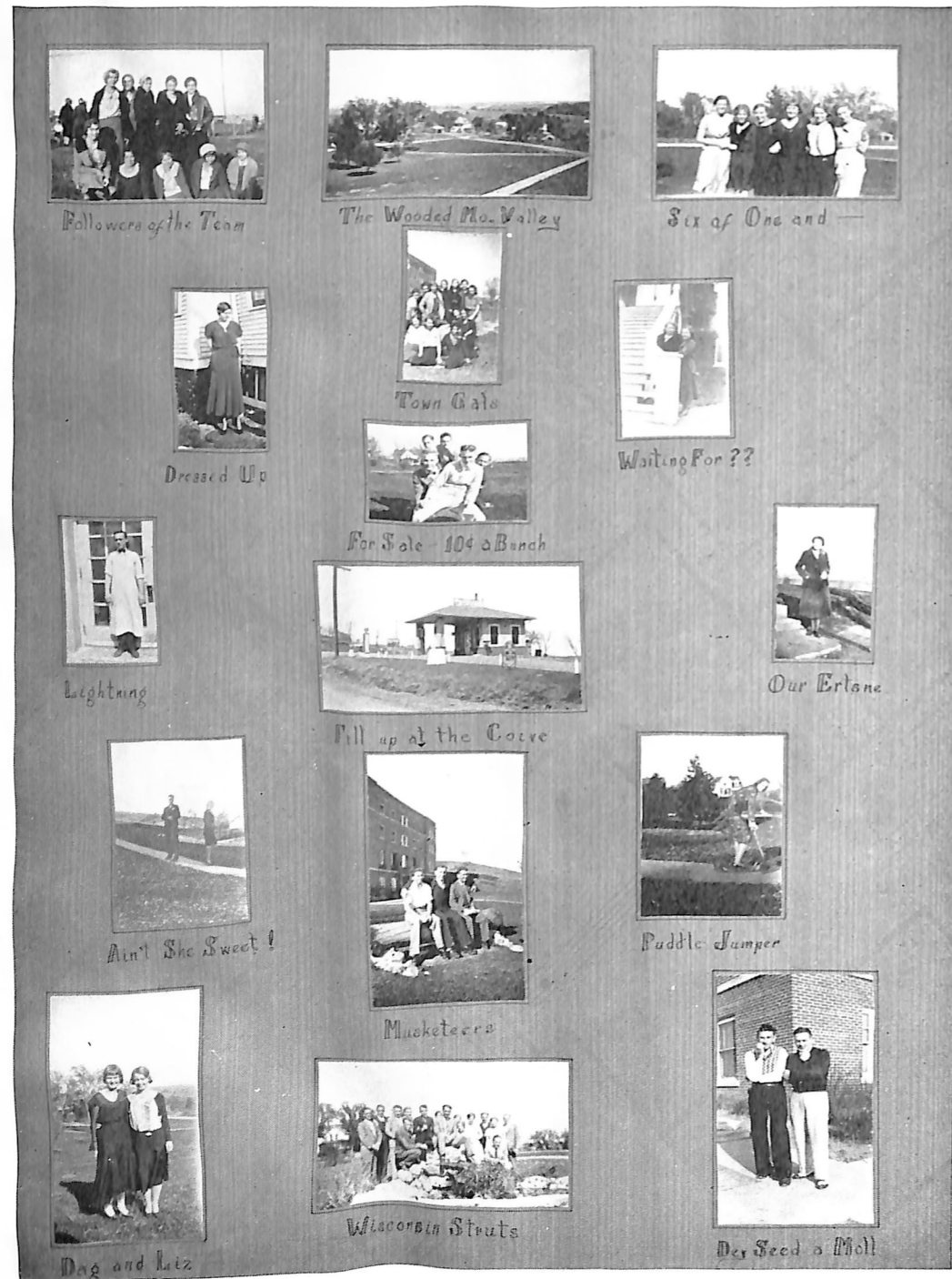

 To love and serve forever!

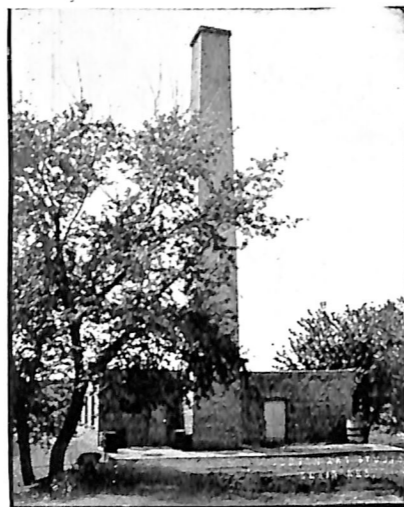

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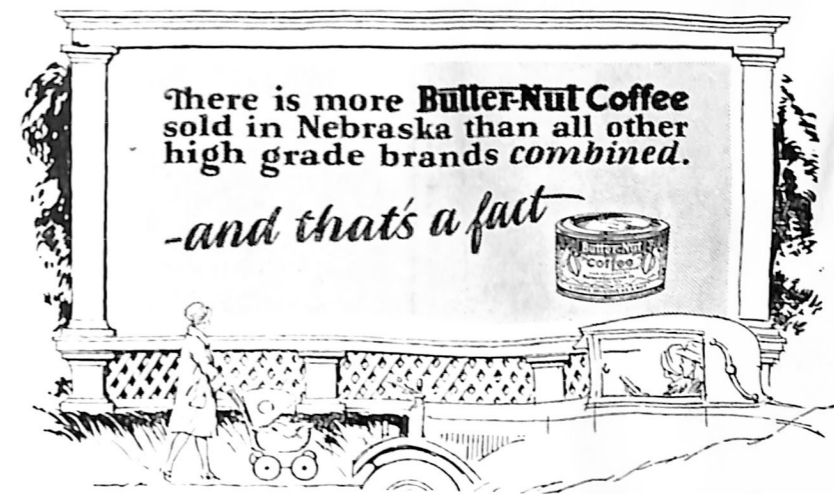
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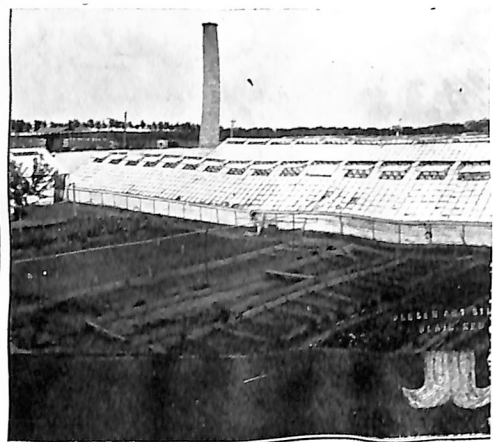
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
