Varsity Football

While football is a major sport at Dana, its success in wins and losses is somewhat hampered by the large proportion of freshman material each year. Of the twenty-two men who were active for the entire season only five were lettermen.

The six losses and one victory tell the story in popular terms, but the season was by no means discouraging. The Spartan ideal—the right goal in all athletics—was to a large extent achieved along the lines of physical development and in the fine spirit and character of the squad as displayed on the field and in the locker rooms. Neither could the season be altogether disappointing to those who were thrilled by the powerful, spirited drives and the tenacious last-ditch stands in some of the games.

A seven-game schedule was played this year. Trinity and Doane of last year's opponents were replaced by Luther and South Dakota Southern Normal. The scores of the 1936 season follow:

The Viking 1936-37 basketball season established its reputation as one of the most exciting and interesting in the past several years. Ten victories out of eighteen games was the final record, but spectators will testify that some of the last-half rallies and the superior type of basketball displayed in many of the games would do much more credit to the Viking cagers than the final tally would indicate.

Probably the most outstanding games were the two with Midland, the one game with Hebron, and possibly the game with Nebraska "B" played at Lincoln. The two Midland games were well-fought and even from start to finish, but in the Hebron conflict, the Vikings came from the losing end of the score to eek out a victory by two points.

Prospects were bright and hope ran high at the beginning of the season. And there was no disappointment, for the four veterans and the capable new recruits were soon worked into a winning team. As the season progressed there were handicaps of sickness and injury, but the reserve was capable enough to make good account of itself in filling in the vacancies.

The annual banquet was held on March 18 in the college dining hall. The following were awarded letters: Monroe Bixler, Earl Fries, Robert Jensen, Edward Mann, Thomas Ninegar, Lewis Patrick, Paul Petersen, Harold Qualsett, and Adolph Vammen. Numerals were awarded to Russell Lund, Delwyn Olson, and Clarence Petersen. Ben Miller received the manager's award.



The past year has been a very successful one for the Women's Athletic Association. Since this organization started there has been a steady growth, but its activities have been broadened more in the past year than in any other. The members have shown a whole-hearted, enthusiastic interest in all the types of athletics which were undertaken. Competition of a very good quality was seen in volleyball, tennis, basketball and kittenball.

The purpose of the W.A.A. is to promote physical efficiency, good sportsmanship, fellowship, and to provide recreation through participation in athletic activities. A letter "D" is awarded to members who completed successfully the work planned for the year by earning the required number of points in athletic events. Points are earned throughout the year by participation in tennis, hiking and kittenball in the fall and spring, and basketball, volleyball, tumbling and calisthenics during the winter months. Track is a new activity which was added this spring. All work is carried on outside of the regular physical education period.


Intra-Mural Athletics

Because of the limited number of men who could participate in Varsity basketball, intra-mural basketball engaged in keen competition seven teams from among the many sport enthusiasts. Although all of the players were not expert in ball-handling and floor work, a high degree of interest, pep, and brawn made up for the deficiency.

This year a new plan for the organization of the teams was introduced. Groups of men were permitted to form their own teams and choose captains. The following teams reported: the Bachelors, Oliver Plows, Ramblers, Town Team, Gophers, Bow and Arrows, and Bow-Wows. The effectiveness of the plan was evident in that no team was able to complete the one-round tournament undefeated. Although victory at times was decided by wide margins, many of the games ended in a close score, and no league standings could be predicted until the final game was played. The Bachelors under the leadership of Kloth, and the Plows guided by Lyndrup finally emerged with the honors. High point men were "Doug" Christensen, Earl Nelson, Verner Carlsen, and Howard Mickelsen.

With the coming of spring, intra-mural interest shifted to kittenball, tennis, and track. Each year a number of teams have participated in interesting contests on the diamond. Also, an elimination tournament has been held to determine the singles and doubles tennis championship of the college. Considerable interest having been shown, plans have been developed for an inter-class track meet. Students welcome the revival of track which has been latent for a number of years.

The purpose of the choir is three-fold: to bring a spiritual message to its audiences through the medium of song, to familiarize the members of the choir with the best in church music, and to acquaint the congregations of our Synod with the work of our school.

To this end the choir makes annually several concert trips: the extended spring tour and a number of week-end trips into the region surrounding Blair. This spring the choir has sung in the States of Nebraska, Iowa, and Minnesota, and a concert tour into northern Minnesota, South Dakota, and Wisconsin is planned for the summer. Last summer the choir made an extended tour into the Pacific Coast States.

The Alpha chapter of the Alpha Sigma Phi at Dana has had a year of unusual activity. The aim of the society is to stimulate interest in debating and in other forensic activities.

Four members of the argumentation class were admitted as associate members to the organization. Since the course in argumentation was not offered the first semester of this year, the Dana debaters did not participate in inter-collegiate debates.

The Alpha Sigma Phi sponsored a declamatory contest in which thirty-six students signified their intention of competing. In a preliminary contest the number was reduced to fifteen. On April 5, these winners competed for further honors and prizes of five, three and one dollars in each of the three divisions. Winners in the oratorical division were George Petersen, Ethan Svendsen and James Olsen; in the dramatic division winners were Edward Hansen, Leona Johansen and Vita Kildebeck; and in the humorous division Robert Jensen, Alice Traum and Clarence Petersen won the awards. This event was considered one of the outstanding programs of the school year. The Alpha Sigma Phi plans that such a contest be an annual feature.

A formal garden party was held on the Dana campus, May 1. Varied musical numbers and readings made up an interesting program.

In the latter part of May the members of the society journeyed to the beautiful Hummel park in Omaha and enjoyed their annual steak fry.


The society, which sponsors an annual lecture by a contemporary American historian, was honored this spring by the presence of Dr. O. W. Qualley of Luther College, Decorah, Iowa. Dr. Qualley has spent one year with the University of Michigan archaeological expedition at Fayum, Egypt.



The Dana Pep Club, organized in the fall of 1936, has taken the place of the Viking Club of former years and finds its members among the girls of the campus who are interested in maintaining the Dana spirit.

During the year the girls of the organization have sponsored a number of candy sales, the proceeds of which have been used for purchasing new equipment for the cheer leaders. Trophies were also bought and awarded to members of the basketball squad.

The "D" Club, which has one of the largest memberships of any organization on the campus, is a men's athletic club. Because of the great interest and support given to the athletic department by Dr. C. X. Religious Activities

A number of organizations and informal groups meet regularly on the Dana campus to foster the religious life of the students. Most of these religious activities are conducted under the supervision of Prof. Paul C. Nyholm.

Perhaps the most outstanding is the Luther League which conducts weekly meetings in the chapel with programs consisting mostly of local talent. On several occasions the League has invited visiting speakers. Presidents of the League during the past year have been: Elmer Rasmussen, Edward Hansen, Clarence Petersen, and Marvin Nygaard. Once a month the Missionary Society, whose president this year has been Andrew Staby, shares a Wednesday evening with the Luther League and presents a program in the interest of home and foreign missions. Early in the spring of each year the college invites a pastor to present a series of mission meeting addresses at our chapel services and at evening meetings. This year God blessed us richly while Rev. Mr. Ethan Mengers, pastor at Denver, Colorado, was with us.

Chapel services are conducted five mornings of the week under the direction of members of the seminary faculty and Dr. C. X. Hansen, and on Sunday mornings Dr. J. P. Nielsen teaches a Bible class on the campus during the hour before the services in the First Lutheran Church in Blair. Dr. Nielsen is also advisor to the Pre-Seminary Students' Club which was organized in the spring of 1936 to acquaint the pre-seminary students with some of the problems which lie before them. On Sunday mornings throughout the year, seminary students and some of the college students conduct church and Sunday school services in communities of the surrounding country-side.

In each of the dormitories an evening half-hour or so every week is given to a devotional period. The women meet regularly as one large group in their reception room. The men also meet in their reception room once a month and on the other weeks they gather in smaller groups, each meeting on its floor. Here the students join each other in a short song service and a few moments of prayer.






