TO THE CLASS OF 1939: Greetings!

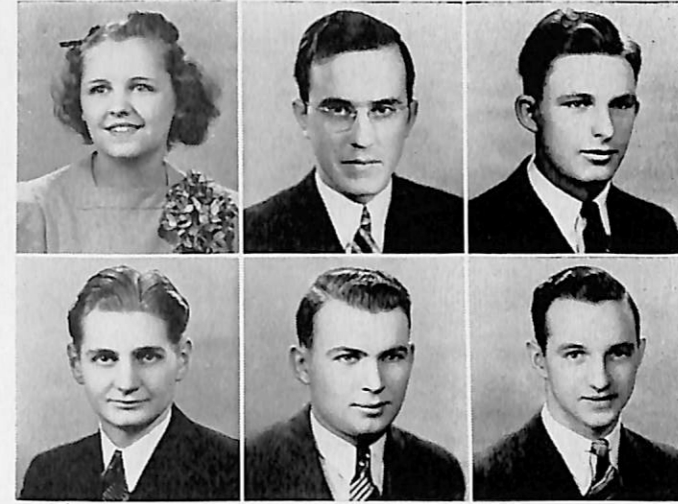

This year the Dana A Cappella Choir, with Professor Elwood Kraft as director and Edward Hansen as business manager, completed its twenty-fifth year of choral singing. Two events of minor historical importance should be placed in the annals of this year's choir. One was the sale of the old GMC bus—the ancient vehicle with the propensity to inopportune breakdowns. The other event was the acquisition of new surplices. This much-needed improvement in the appearance of the choir was made possible through the generosity of a number of Dana alumni and various members of our congregations in Falmouth and Westbrook, Maine.

On the spring tour concerts were given in the following places: Beresford, S. Dak., Geneva, Minn., Albert Lea, Farmington, Askov, Luck, Wis., Minneapolis, Northfield, Evan, Gilfillan, Hutchinson, and Tyler, Minn. The concerts were well attended and an enthusiastic response was shown. The singers traveled in a chartered 33-passenger Interstate bus and in Ed Hansen's trusty Ford, "Trofast."

In Minneapolis Mrs. Silas Andersen, first director of the Dana Choir, directed the choir in the singing of "Beautiful Savior." Following the concert, the choir members were entertained in the lovely home of Dr. and Mrs. Andersen. During the course of the evening, Dr. Andersen presented the choir with \$25.

The sign posts along Minnesota roads were interesting. One particular kind which often taxed the patience of the genial driver of our twelve-ton bus bore the legend, "This road closed to loads over four tons."

This year the Dana Choir celebrated its Silver Anniversary—twenty-five years of choral singing. The following are greetings to the Choir from those who have been its leaders during the past quarter century.

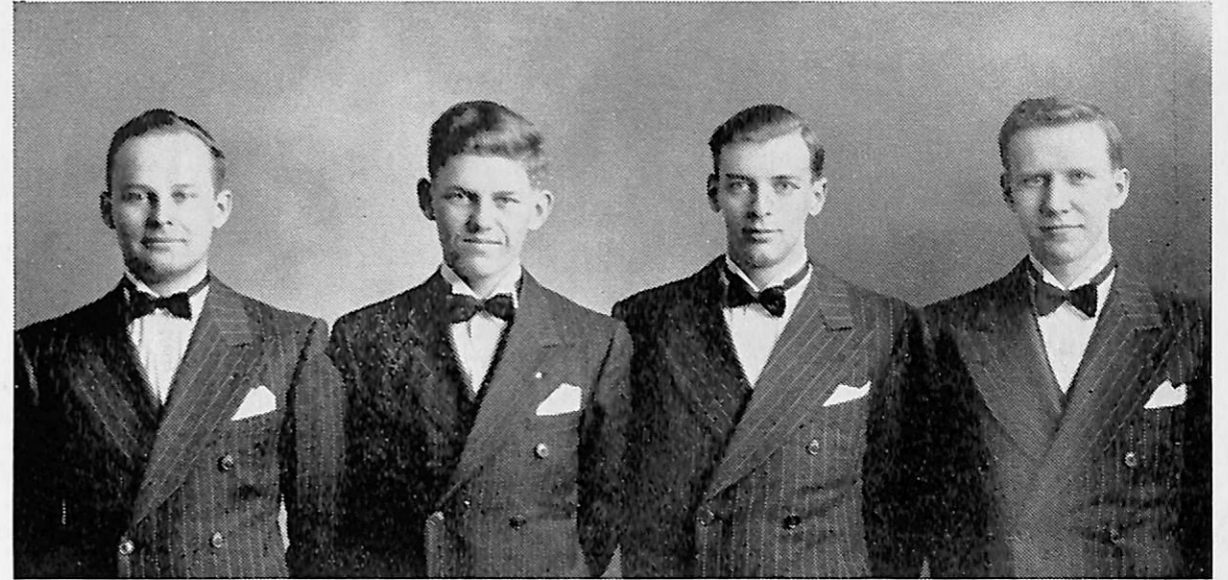


Dana Violin Ensemble

An organization which made many appearances during the current school year was the Violin Ensemble. This group was composed of the three old members, who appeared last year as the Violin Trio, and three new members, all of whom were freshmen at Dana College. The Ensemble was organized and led remarkably well by Arthur Tingley, first violinist of the group. Under his capable leadership the group made outstanding progress during the year. While most of their performances were given at school, a number were made away from the college in conjunction with the College Male Quartet. These included appearances at Ruskin, Nebraska; Omaha, Nebraska; Jacksonville, Iowa; and Council Bluffs, Iowa. The Ensemble and Male Quartet also presented a radio program on February 26 over Station WOW in Omaha, Nebraska. The group played classical numbers as well as sacred numbers in their programs.

Organizations



Luther League

The Luther League, a student organization having a faculty adviser, furnishes opportunity for furtherance of religious activities carried on in the home leagues and acquaints the students with the work of the L.S.A.A. This year a new constitution which provides for affiliation with the L.S.A.A. was adopted.

Special activities sponsored by the league include entertaining several hundred young people from surrounding congregations on Rally Day, May 7, and sending a large delegation to the regional L.S.A. Conference at Lincoln. At this meeting our league adviser, Professor Paul C. Nyholm, was elected regional L.S.A. adviser, and our representatives invited the L.S.A.'ers of the region to convene at our own campus next fall for the annual regional conference.

At the weekly meetings varied programs were rendered. Students, faculty members, and visiting pastors had opportunity for self-expression on religious subjects. Four league members gave a debate; Ashram films were shown; there was a special Christmas program; and the league sponsored an Easter Sunrise Service. Special music, both vocal and instrumental, added its effect to the reverence of the services.

Every office excepting that of the treasurer is filled three times a year. Enoch Rasmussen, Arthur Tingley, and Thorvald Hansen have been presidents; Fern Oleson, Ethel H. Jensen, Alvin Rueter, and Paul Neve, vice-presidents; Thelma Andresen, Shirley Bondo, Ruth Nielsen, and Luella Nielsen, secretaries; Clifford Hanson served as treasurer. Wednesday evening was the regular time of meeting; the chapel was the usual meeting place.

Student Worship

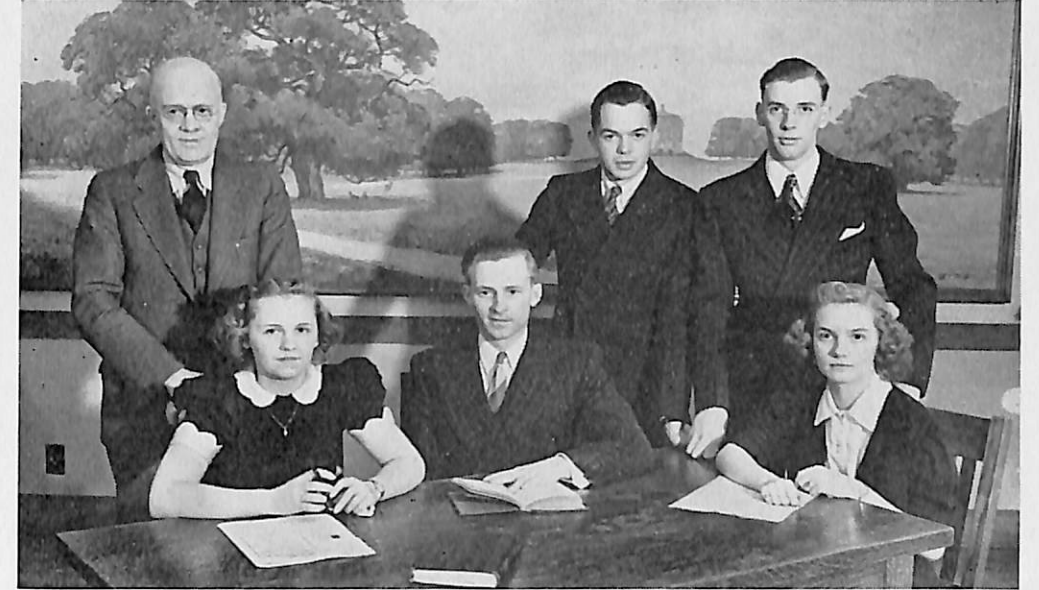
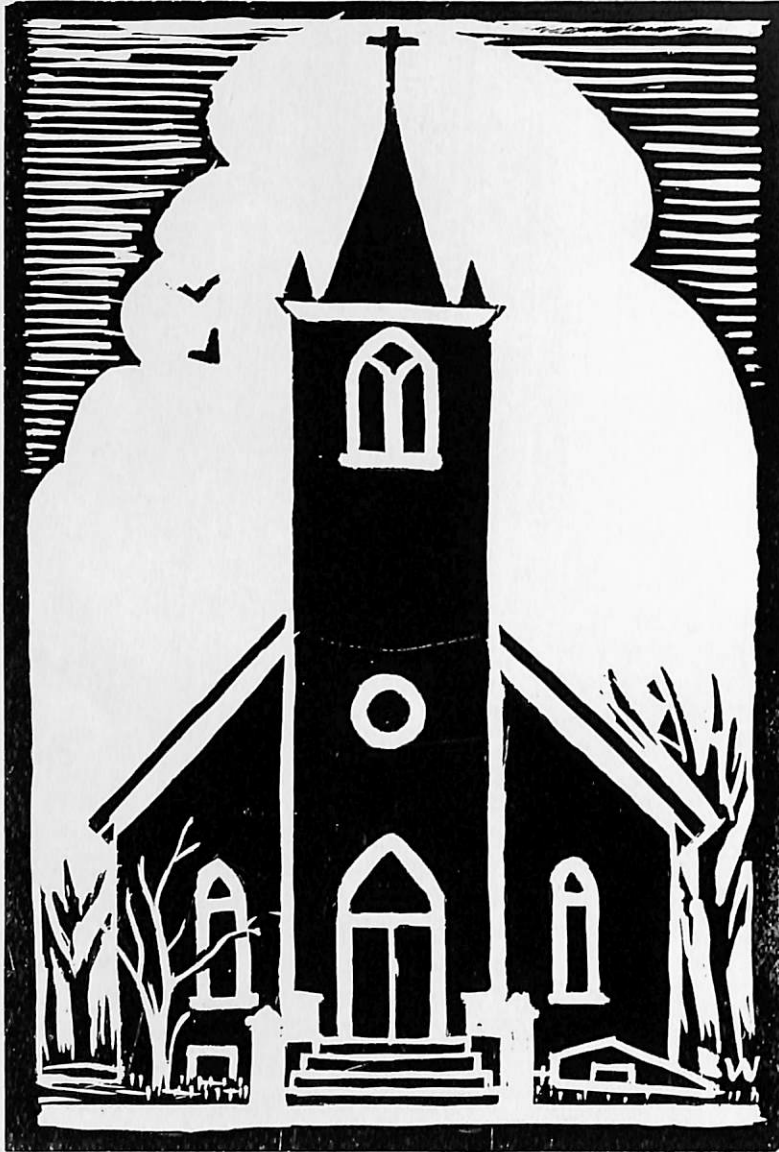
Once a day in every Dana student's program there comes a period that is set aside for chapel service. "Chapel" as it is popularly called is not a mere exercise nor an attempt of someone to foist an unwanted and outdated practice upon students. It is rather an endeavor to develop the spiritual life of the student and to give him a well-rounded curriculum. It is also an opportunity to renew daily the covenant with a living and personal God. That has been the general theme of the daily meetings.

The chapel service is a paragon of simplicity. A hymn followed by a ten minute talk and a closing hymn usually completes the program. This year a matin service has been used a few times to vary the usual procedure.

On Sunday morning and other times the door of the First Lutheran Church has stood open to Dana students. It has been good to shake off the student atmosphere and worship on a common ground with people from all walks.

Because there is at present no local pastor, Dr. J. P. Nielsen is in charge of the services.

The seminary faculty and visiting pastors have supplied the pulpit and will continue until the arrival of Rev. Harold C. Jorgensen, pastor-elect.

History Club

Under the leadership of Dr. H. F. Swansen the Dana College History Club was founded in the fall of 1932. The club aims to cultivate interest in the study of history and to encourage the collection and preservation of records and documents.

The first meeting of the present year was held October 24. The Rev. Bach of Kumamoto, Japan, spoke to the group on "State Religion of Japan in Relation to Missions."

The annual musical and literary program was given just prior to the Christmas vacation. The Vocal Trio and Violin Ensemble rendered several numbers. Harriett Cornell and Homer Nielsen also presented musical numbers. The feature number was the dramatic presentation of Dickens' "A Christmas Carol," Edward Hansen assuming the role of Scrooge. Other members of the cast were: Paul Neve, Leo Andersen, Austin Bach, Leonard Andersen, Kenneth Lang, Alvin Rueter, Phillip Larsen, Ione Christensen, Charlotte Richter, John Beck, Marilyn Siersbeck, Adolph Kloth, and Sheridan Svendsen.

Dr. J. L. Sellers, professor of United States History at the University of Nebraska, spoke to the club and friends on "The Ramparts of Democracy" on April 14.

The History Club is interested in securing new books for the college library. As a result of this interest the following books were recently purchased and presented to the library. "The History of Rome" by Theodor Mommsen, "Herodotus" translated by George Rawlinson, and "A Guide to Historical Literature" edited by George M. Dutcher and others.





Our Farm

We, as Dana students, are all interested in and enjoy visiting the laboratory where much of the food for the kitchen is produced.

Our farm furnishes all the milk and cream used daily in our college kitchen. It is produced by a herd of twenty-four purebred Holstein-Fresian cattle. This herd is one of the outstanding herds in the state having a production record during the past year of 430.6 lbs. butterfat per producing cow. This growing herd affords an excellent opportunity for the agricultural students to view the development of a superior dairy herd.

A flock of Leghorn and Black Australorp hens produce eggs for the dining hall. This flock is of high quality and scientific methods are employed in its management. Furthermore our farm produces hatching eggs for the production of hybrid or cross-bred Austro-White chicks. Our farm also has a herd of purebred Hampshire swine which includes twelve brood sows.

Improvements, such as the remodeling and the modernizing of the buildings, are being made.

Contour farming and crop rotation are scientific practices applied on the farm. The production of hybrid seed corn and the maintenance of hybrid corn and sorghum test plots are practices employed for experimental purposes, in connection with the University Extension Department and the local county farm bureau.

The Oliver Farm Equipment Company has contributed to the farm, modern machinery, including a six-cylinder Oliver row-crop tractor.

The college farm is a laboratory for the scientific study of farming, and furnishes work for needy students. It is under the management of our qualified instructor Professor C. W. Harvey.

Basket Ball

Dana's fortunes in her two major sports, football and basket ball, were badly shaken this year due largely to a severe dearth of veteran material. For the second consecutive year the football team, battling against this handicap as well as that of an all-round light squad, failed to gain a win with which to brighten the record book. The basket ball team fared somewhat better, completing its twelve-game schedule with five wins and seven defeats.

But neither the ill fortune which thus cloaked the inter-collegiate program this year nor the frequent subjection to the role of the under-dog could crush the fight of the Vikings. To this the football games against two of the most powerful college teams in this region, Western Union and York, will testify.

And in our civilization we should no longer judge the worth of athletic activities by superficial signs as a gladiatorial contest of ancient Rome; but rather it should be judged according to the wholesome satisfaction gained from playing a spirited, healthy game with our fellows. Such is the pleasure which should be and is gained through the games and practices of the Viking football and basket ball squads.



W. A. A.

The W.A.A. was organized in 1932 and has been an active organization since that time. The purpose of the W.A.A. is to promote physical efficiency, good sportsmanship, fellowship, and recreation through participation in athletic activities. Any woman attending Dana College may be a member of this organization when she has completed her first two hikes.

In order to receive an award, a member must have fulfilled certain minimum requirements through participation in basketball, volley ball, tennis, badminton, ping pong, archery, shuffle board and darts. These activities are in the form of tournaments. Scholarship is also considered in the awarding of letters.

The organization is under the direction of Coach Olson with Miss Wind, the dean of women, as adviser.

The officers are: Ferrol Adams, president; Fern Olesen, vice president; Thelma Andresen, secretary; and Gladys Dobernecker, recording secretary.



The Dana Alumni

The Dana College Alumni Association has this year continued to work along the same lines of endeavor that have been followed in the past. Its program consists of arousing friends and former students of Dana to a more spirited and wholehearted support of their school. In order that its purpose in this respect may be accomplished more effectively, it was decided at the last annual convention to classify as alumni all those who have attended Dana one year or more. One direct result of this has been a greater number of contributions toward the sum which is required for the initial step in meeting North Central standards. But the sum required for this purpose has not yet been raised. This fact seems to indicate that there is still much room for improvement in the way our alumni support Dana.

Other features, however, indicate that our alumni can be relied upon for fairly substantial support. This is evident from the number of voluntary contributions that are received from individuals from time to time. Not only are individuals active in this respect, but Dana booster organizations as well, as for instance the Chicago Club of fifty members, most of whom are Dana alumni. This organization recently donated \$30.00 to the library. Another indication of the dependability of our alumni in supporting their alma mater is found in the willingness with which many of them respond to direct pleas for funds. A large portion, for instance, sent small gifts to the school when Paul V. Hansen recently mailed requests for choir and library funds to 200 of our younger alumni (those who have been graduated since 1934). The contribution of the alumni, however, remains essentially a nucleus for more adequate support by other friends of the institution.

The present officers of the Association are: Rev. C. Clifford Madsen, president; Rev. Johan Petersen, vice president; Rev Ingward Olson, secretary; and Aleine Miller, treasurer.
