Instructor of art and architectural drawing and design, Rev. F. William Thomsen, himself an artist of note, has developed the latent talent in a number of his students.





Public Relations



TRINITY SEMINARY

NUCLEUS OF

Trinity Theological Seminary, a function of the United Evangelical Lutheran Church, is now in its sixty-second year of service to the Lord. Under the able direction of the Rev. Theodore I. Jensen, Dean of the Seminary, Trinity has benefited greatly in scholastic and spiritual endeavors. Trinity is a school for those who desire thorough training in Christian theology, primarily those who seek to enter the Christian ministry in the Lutheran church, as either pastors or missionaries. During its entire period since inception, Trinity has produced many able ministers and missionaries who, in this country and in distant fields, have advance the Kingdom of Christ. The intensive three year curriculum and the production of a thesis leads to the degree of Bachelor of Divinity. A Diploma of Graduation is granted to those who do not meet the requirements for the Bachelor of Divinity degree. As the training center of its future ministers, Trinity may well be called the neucleus of the synod. There are five main departments in which courses of instruction are offered under able and gifted faculty. These five departments are: Old Testament, New Testament, Systematic Theology, Historical Theology and Practical Theology.

THE SYNOD

Professor of New Testament, Dr. C. B. Larsen, has this year, completed twelve years of reverent labor to Trinity. Before coming to Dana he gave of his service in both the foreign and native ministry.

Rev. Paul Nyholm, professor of Church History, is the only faculty member who received his theological training in Denmark. At present he is working for his doctorate. Practical examples and suggestions are interspersed in Rev. Nyholm's well organized lectures.

Another new faculty member is Rev. C. C. Madsen, who served as a chaplain in the United States Navy during the recent war. His service experience has been of much value for his courses in Practical Theology.

Dr. J. P. Nielsen, Professor Emeritus, retired in 1946 after nineteen years of faithful service as Professor of Old Testament and Dogmatics at Trinity. A former missionary to Japan, Dr. Nielsen sought to bring out the main tenants of his lectures with patience and thoroughness.


One of the newest professors on the faculty this year is Dr. Ethan Mengers, who is professor of Old Testament.




HOLGER C. CHRISTENSEN Tilley, Alberta, Canada


SOPHOMORE

When the choir left Dana on the afternoon of Sunday, April 4, on its annual concert tour, the day was warm and sunny. All augured well for a routine trip ahead to the concerts scheduled in the states of Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana and the Canadian

province of Alberta. The first day passed smoothly with an all-tour record attendance at the Spencer, Iowa, concert. From then on came a series of disappointing blows. Extremely heavy snows in the north and restricted highways, caused numerous concert cancellations. No concerts were performed in Alberta and Minnesota. Hastily arranged concerts were held at points of delay. Not until April 14 did clear weather and roads permit a resumption of the original plans. 





Fighting Vikings









In spite of difficulties in obtaining practice space and a shortage of equipment, the confidence reposed in the team by the school has been justified.









The lighting of the Christmas tree and carols on a crisp, clear evening was the beginning of the Christmas festivities.






The dining hall, decorated in blue and white, was transformed into a banquet hall befitting the Christmas spirit.

Ad Building




Students provided many hours of labor on the new Ad. building. Virgil Hansen and Paul Laursen collect cement forms.




