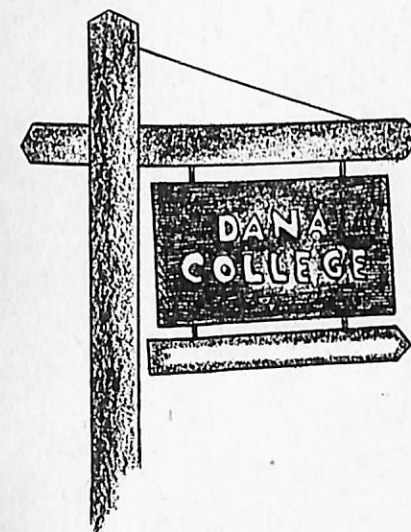

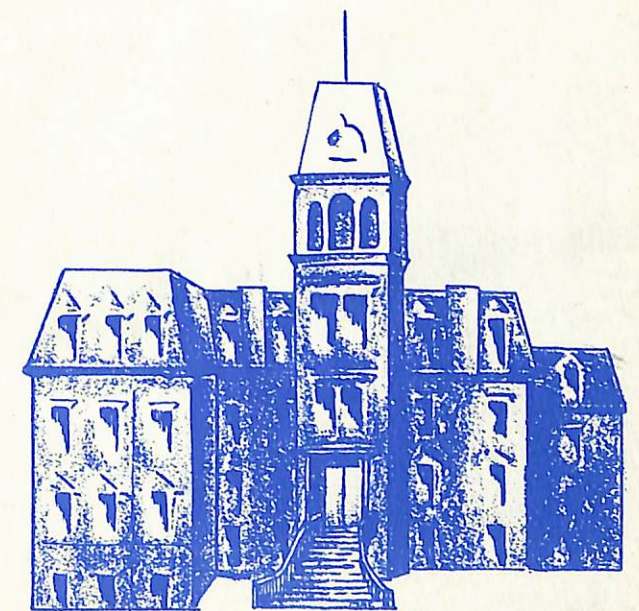

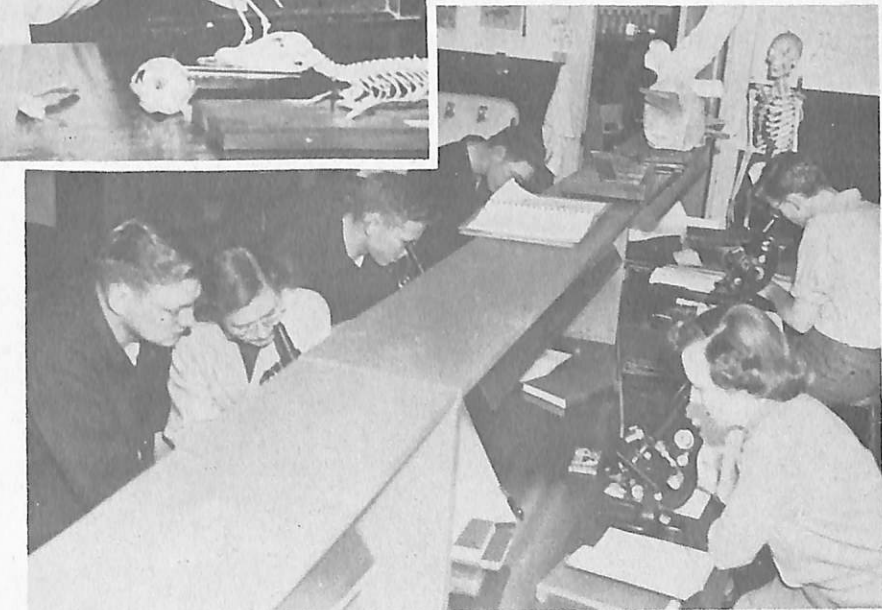
DEDICATION

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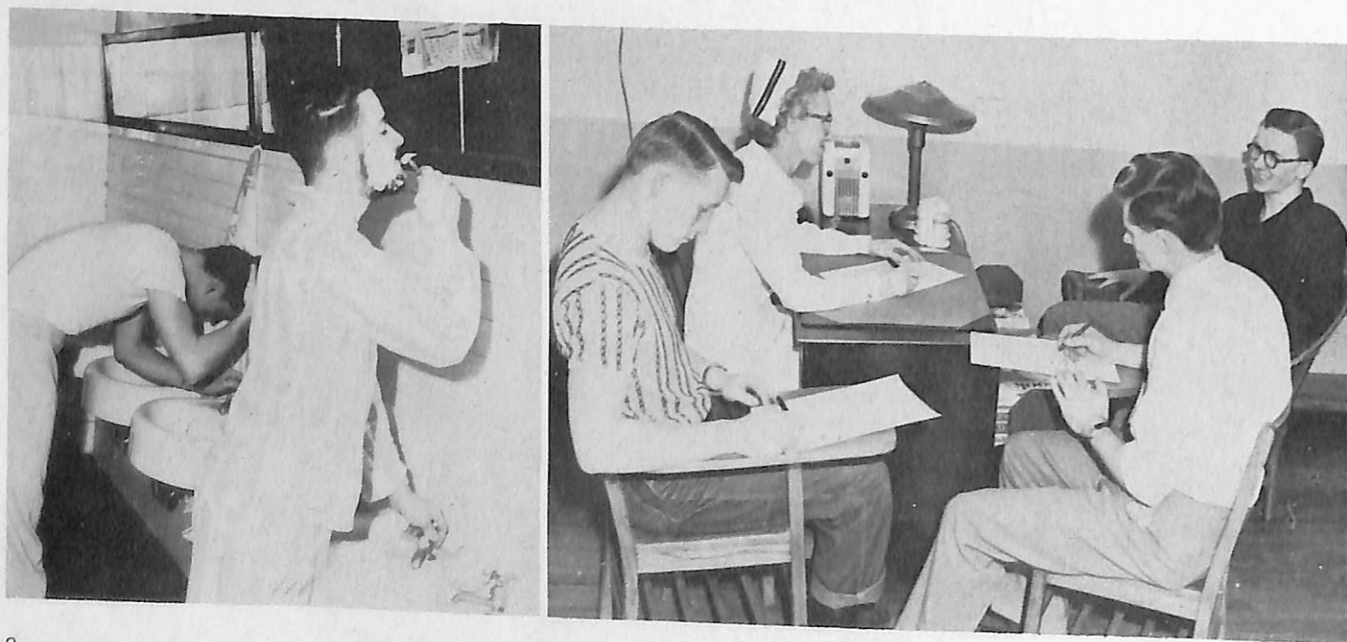

Some classes proved interesting and not so hard to prepare for while others seemed thoroughly useless to our practical minds, and we forced ourselves to take them in stride.

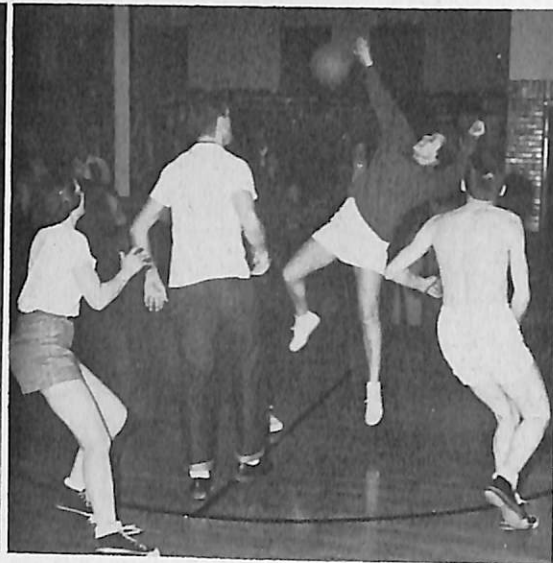
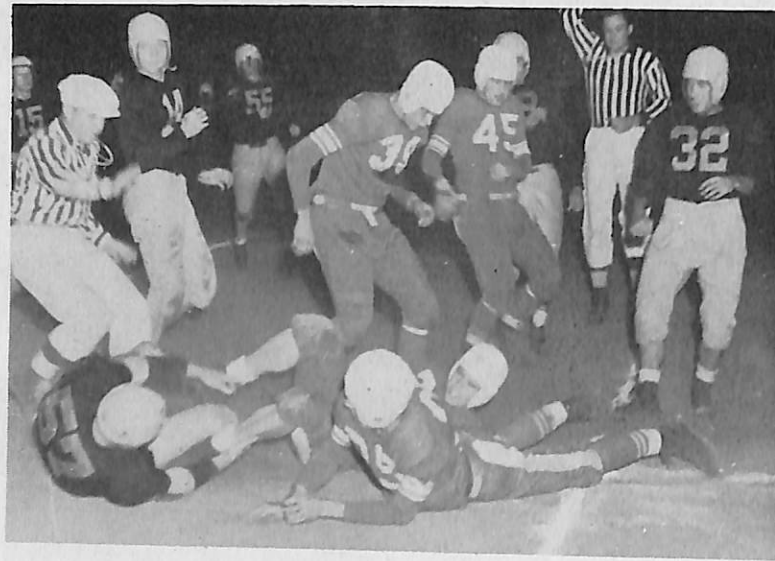

The girls formed teams for intercollegiate games and even challenged any boys' team on the Dana campus to match skills at girls' basketball.

Memorable days were experienced after the Dana Choir left on its eastern coast tour. For those on the trip, it meant an endless amount of makeup work, seeing new sights, meeting new people, reading the critics' reviews, hearing news from home, but most important, singing to the glory of God. Those who remained on the campus spent a peaceful three weeks continuing the work of a college education.

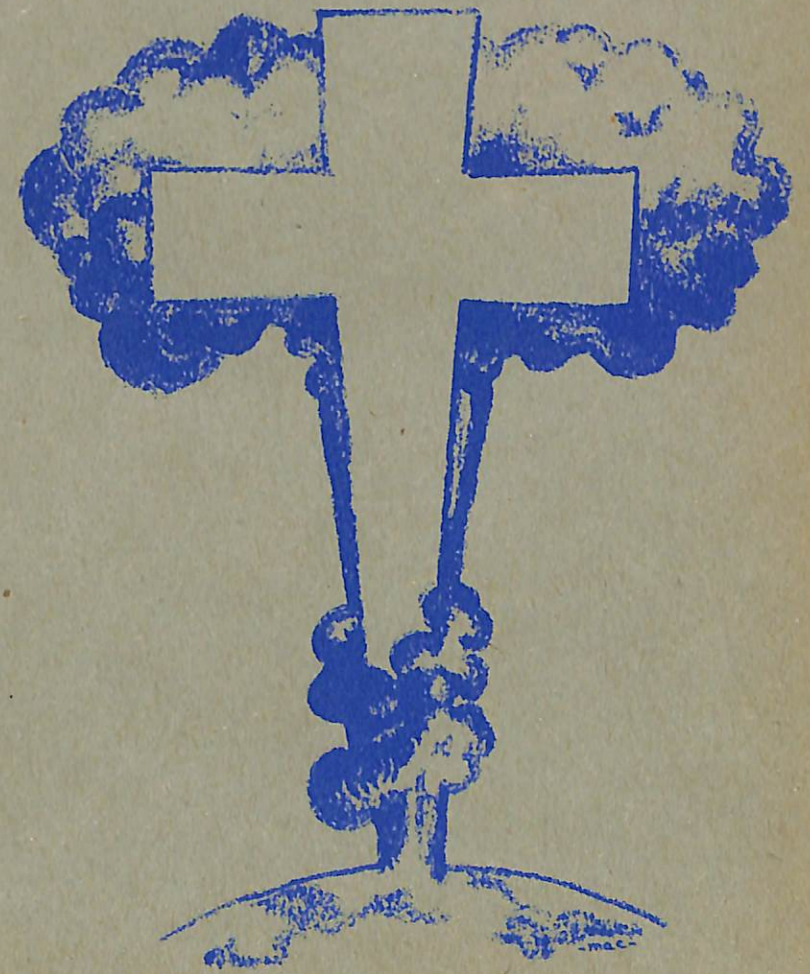

President Morton was inaugurated as president of Dana in 1944 and elected president of Trinity in 1946 after serving as a member of the Board of Trustees of Dana and Trinity. President Morton was instrumental in influencing the Defense Department in Washington, D. C. to change Army selective service and enlistment policies to benefit college students. 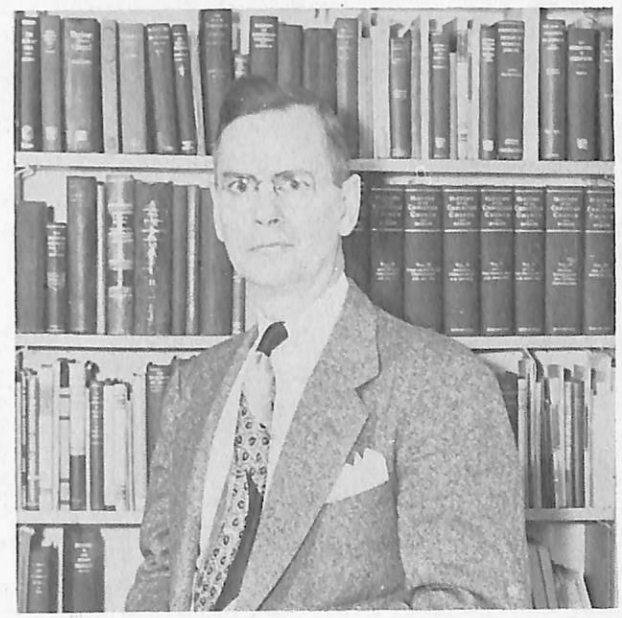

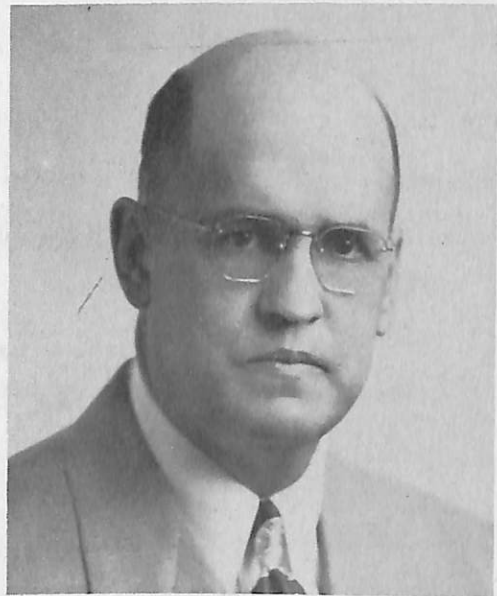


ELMER M. RASMUSSEN, B.A., M.A.

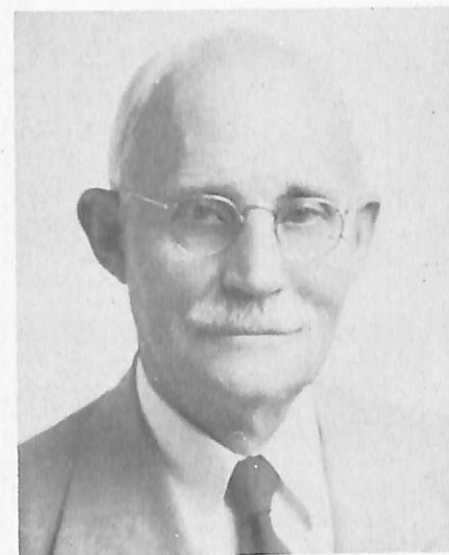

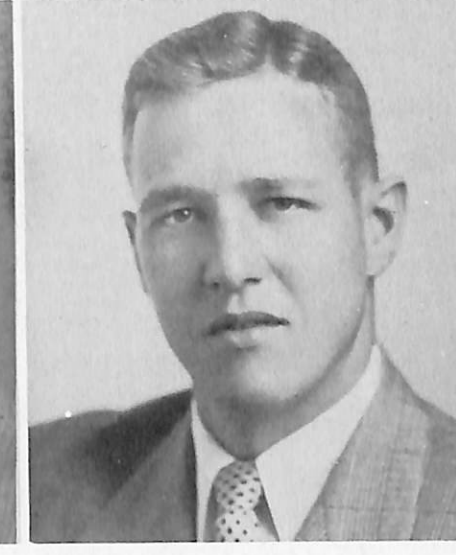


ARTHUR C. RANHEIM, B.A., M.A.

Biology

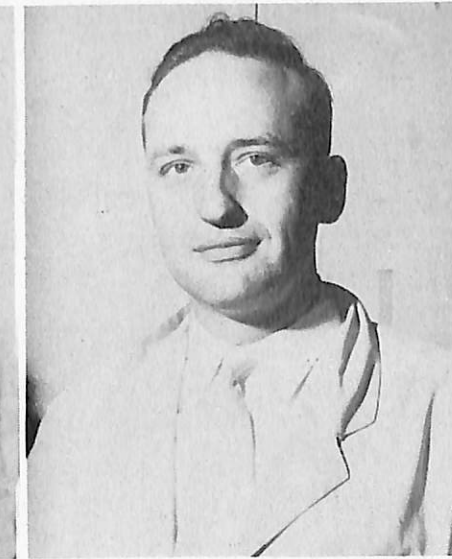

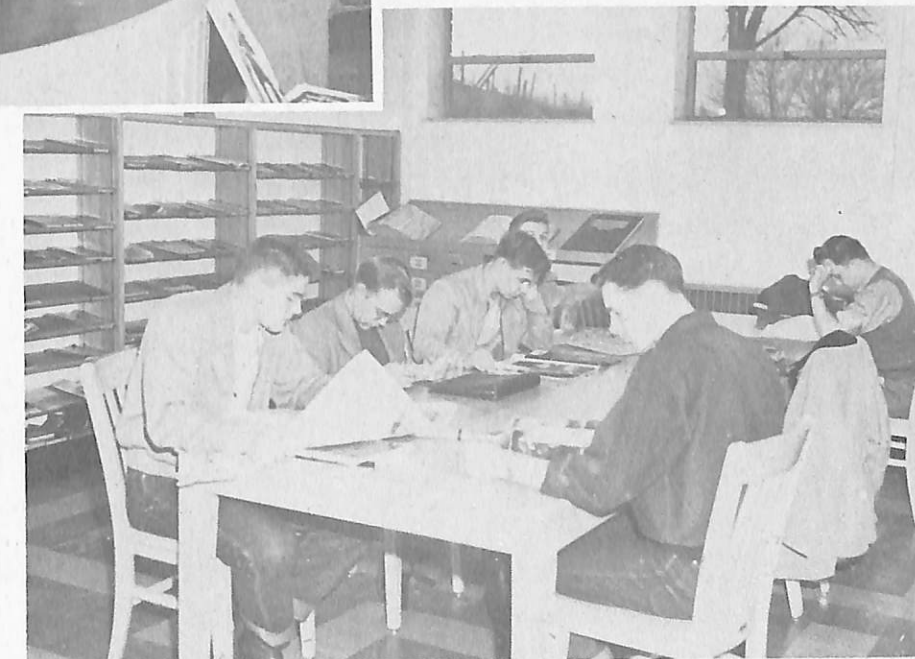

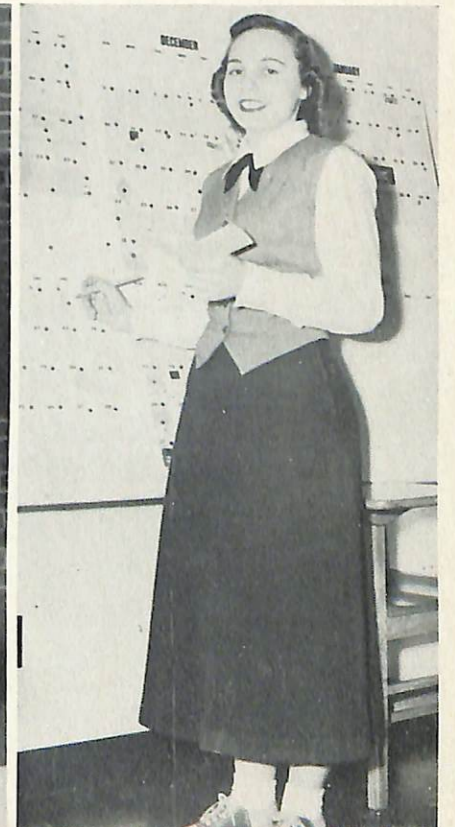

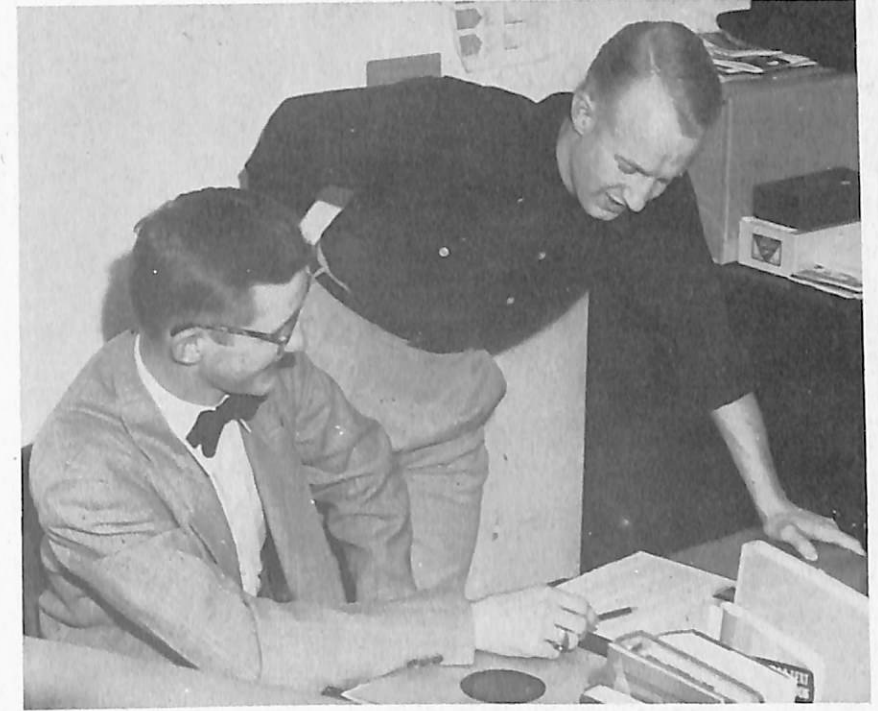
**PAUL E. NEVE
CONDUCTOR**

This year's tour took the Dana Choir through 4500 miles of 12 Eastern Coast states and Canada in three weeks. Seventeen complete concerts were sung besides numerous appearances in which the choir sang only part of its program. Professor Paul E. Neve conducted the choir for his eighth season.

Impressive comments and praises from music critics, civic music conductors, and appreciative audiences again emphasize the fact that the Dana Choir is one of the nation's first rank choirs.

Mr. Otis C. Williams, Jr., eminent music critic of the Portland, Maine, **Press-Herald**, summarized the expressions of many music lovers who heard the Dana Choir when he wrote, "The Dana Choir is an excellent one, as good or better than any chorus to appear here in recent years. There was not a single unmusical moment during the program. The choir sings with a fresh liquid tone which is a credit to both their voices and their director. It is a strongly-balanced organization with good soloists, and everything that it did vocally was clearly executed. Neve directs with precision and feeling, and his choir is exceptionally well disciplined for one which sings with such freedom of expression and apparent lack of effort."

"Of 42 mixed voices it was meticulous in its response to Mr. Neve's direction. Choral tone was rich and alive; there was clarity of vocalization as they wove their ways through intricate counterpoint, and obvious sincerity and understanding gave devotional warmth to their program."

Conductor Paul E. Neve stated, "From the musical standpoint, this Dana Choir is the best musical representation Dana has ever had in my time. The choir displayed the best singing throughout the tour of any Dana Choir I have directed."

A series of spring weekend concerts in midwest states completes the concert season. Because of the high degree of success attained on this first autumn tour, the Dana Choir will again take its annual tour in the fall of the year, rather than in the spring as has been the custom in the past.

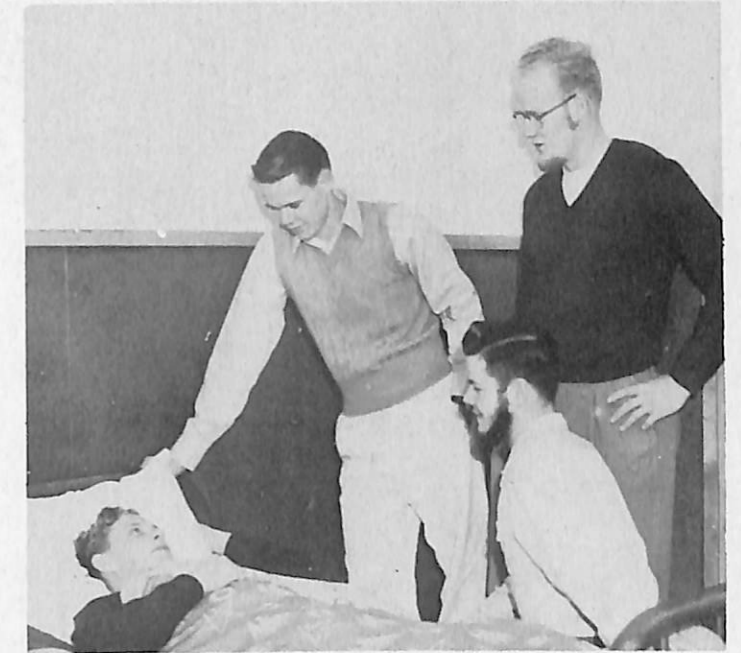

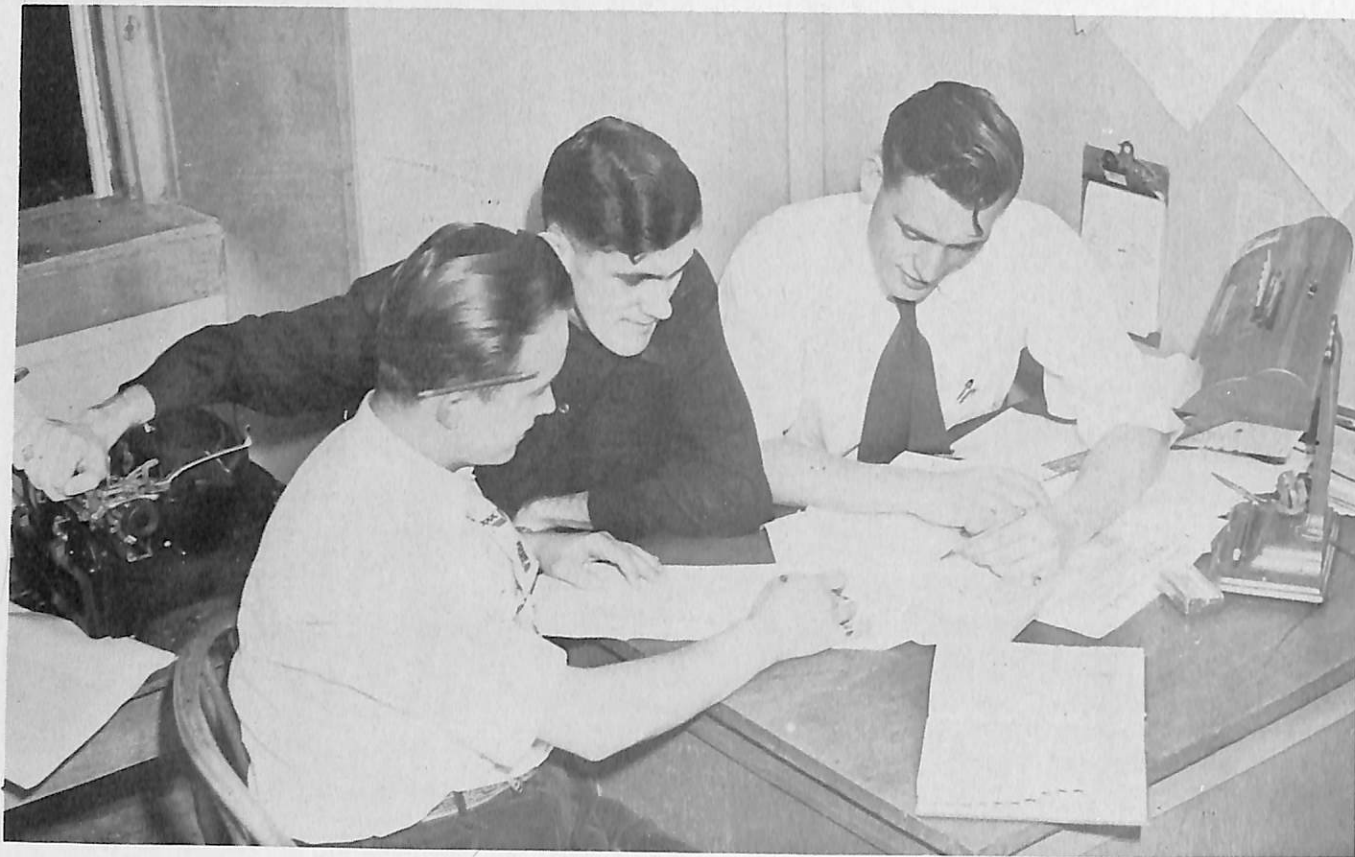

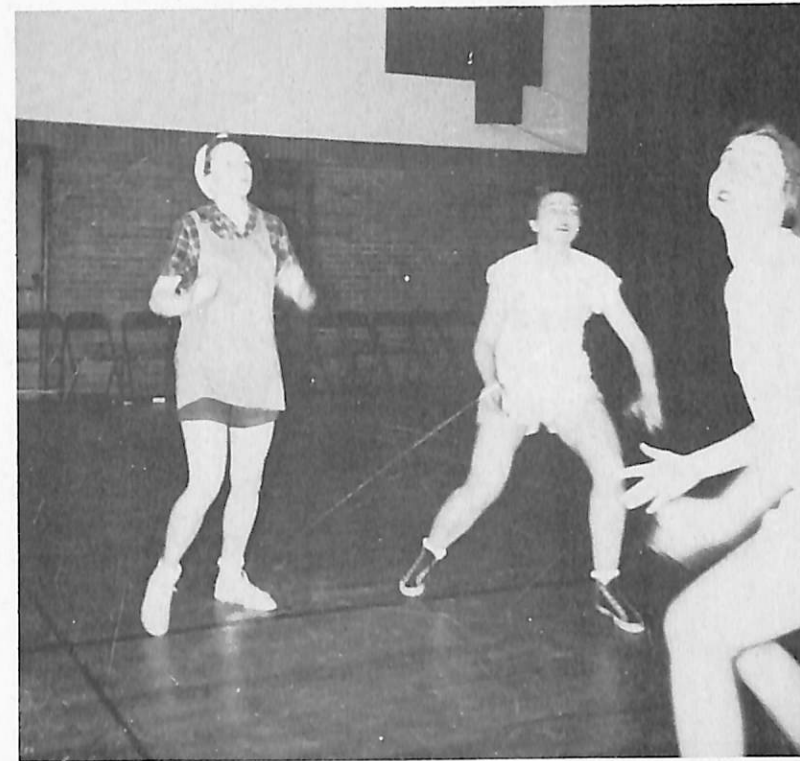

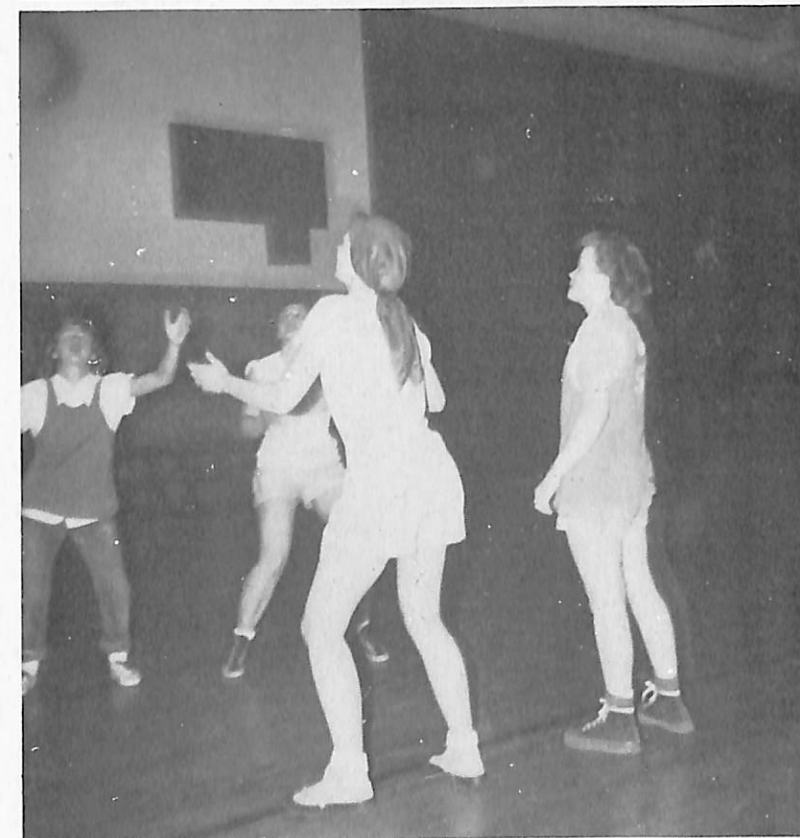

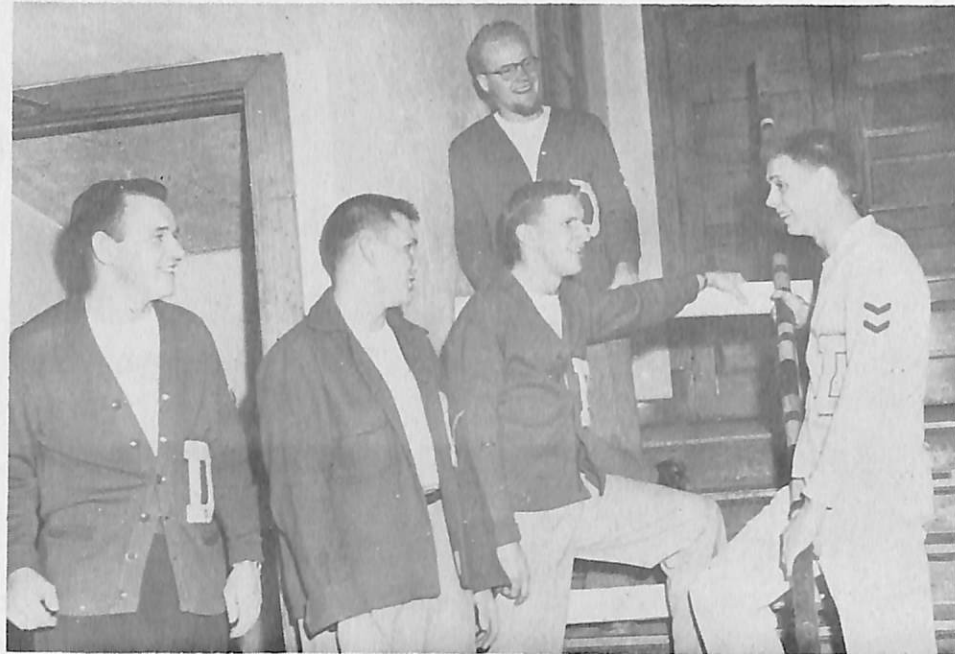

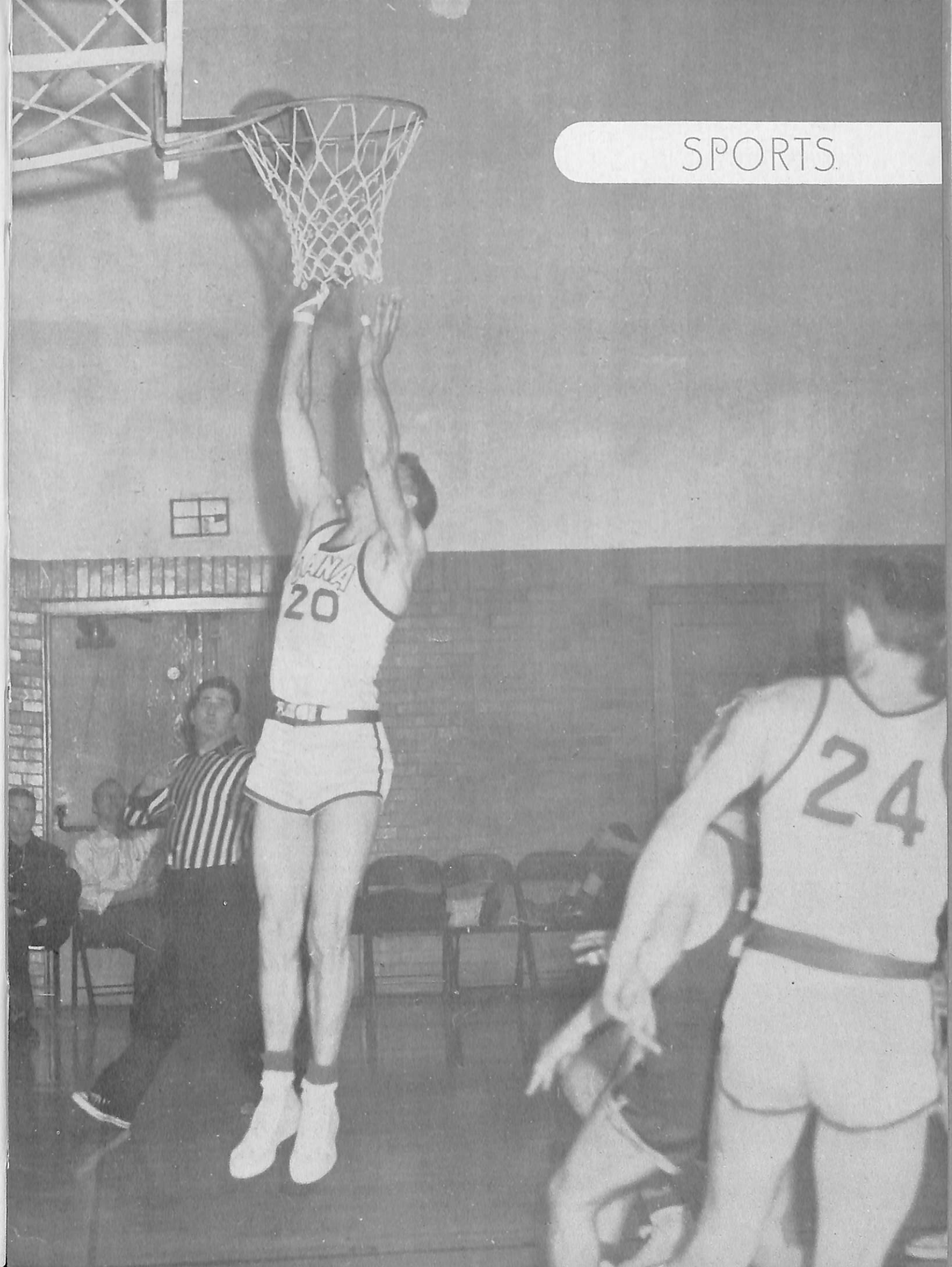

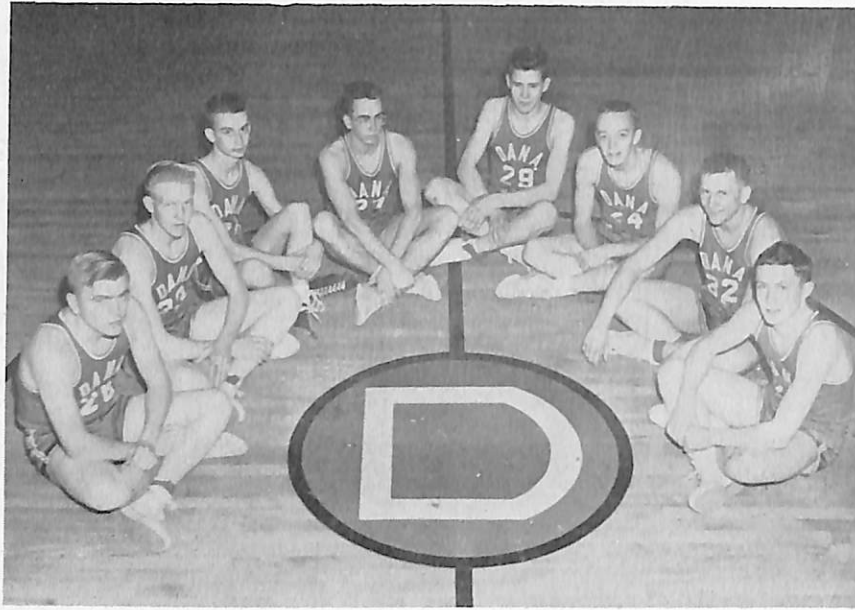

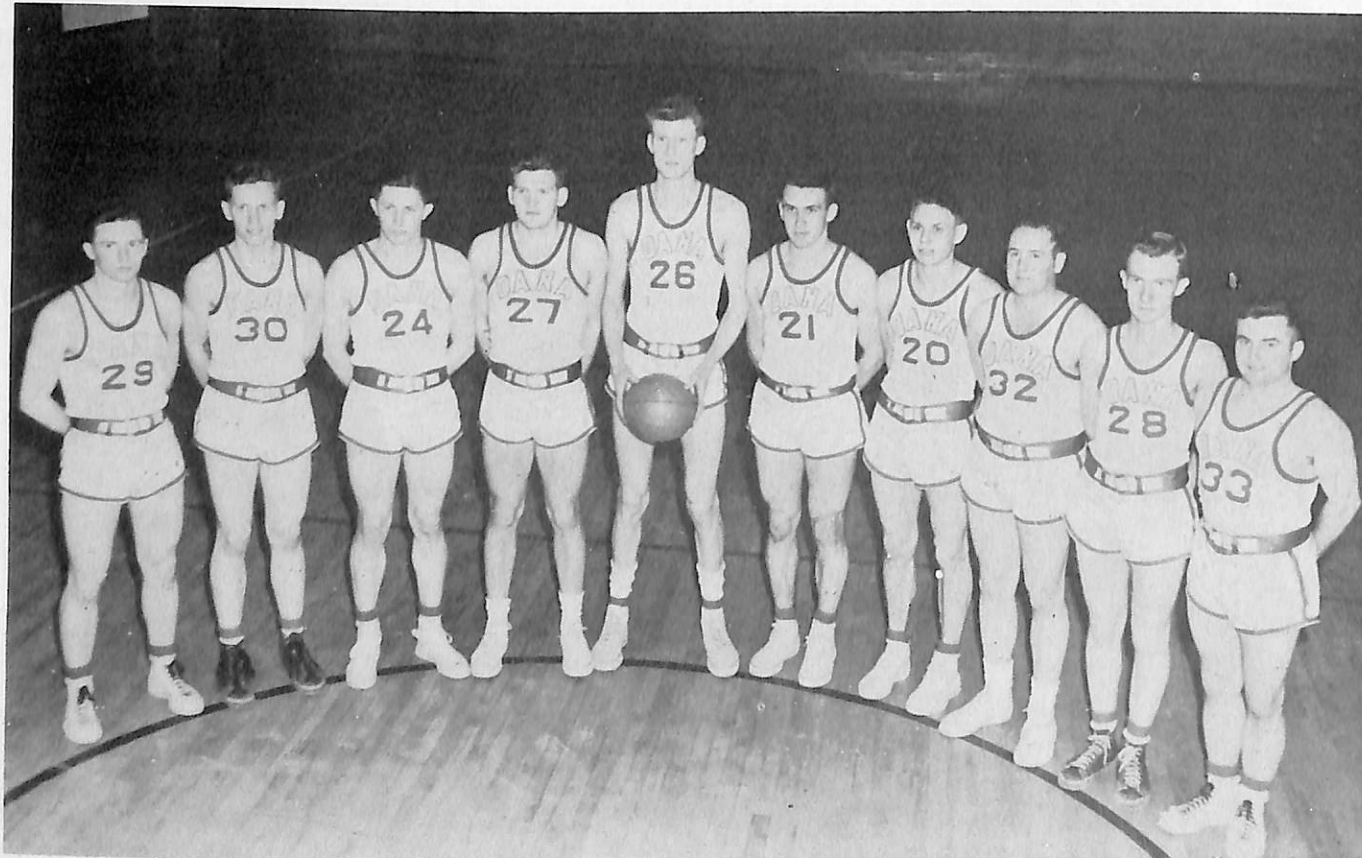

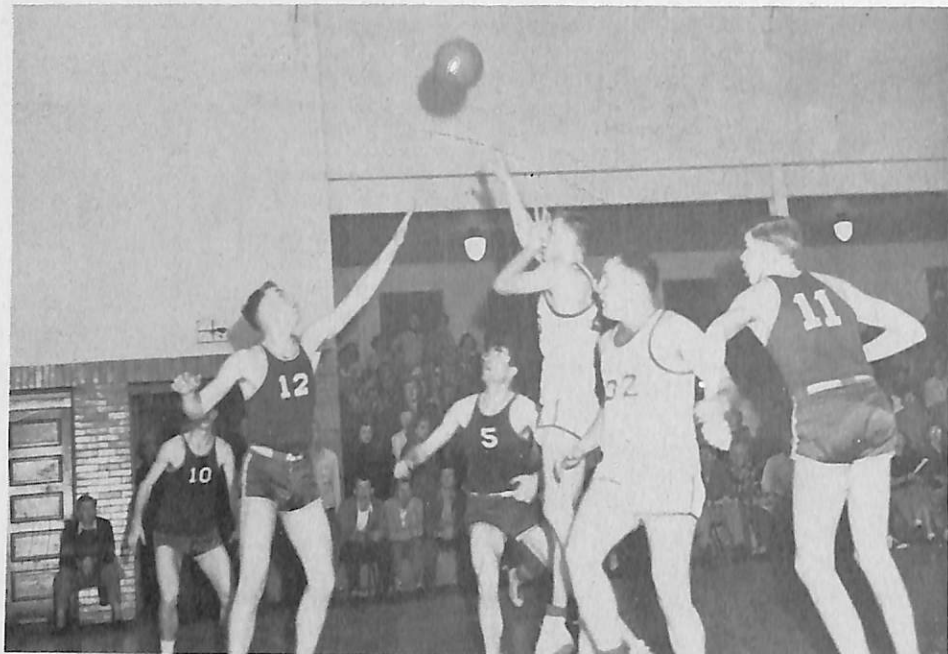

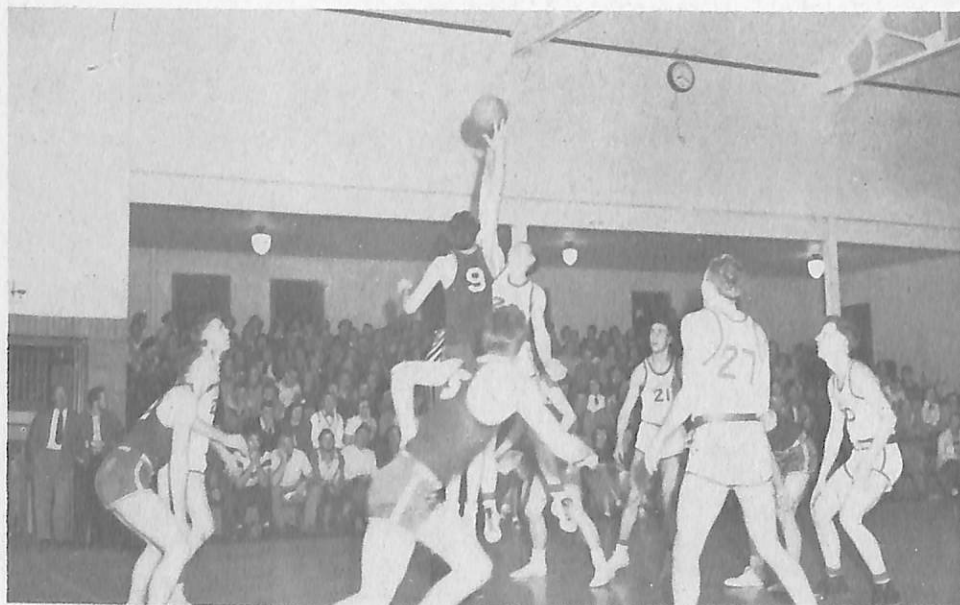


PAUL LAURSEN DEFIES his Luther (Wahoo) guard and scores two more points for the Vikings.

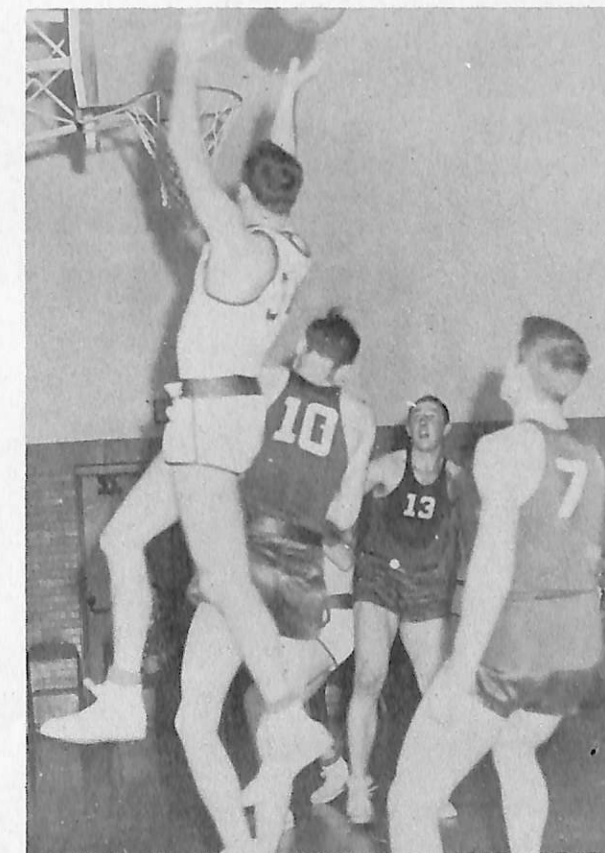

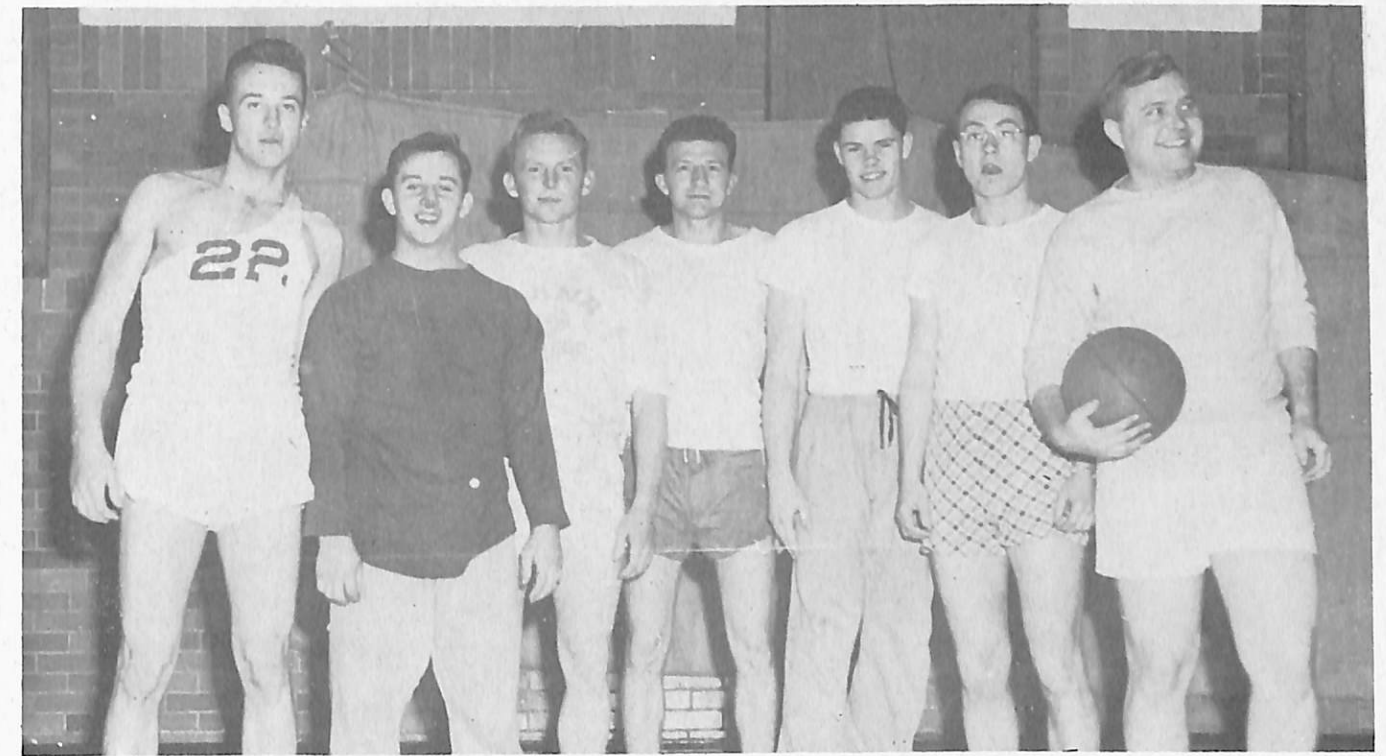

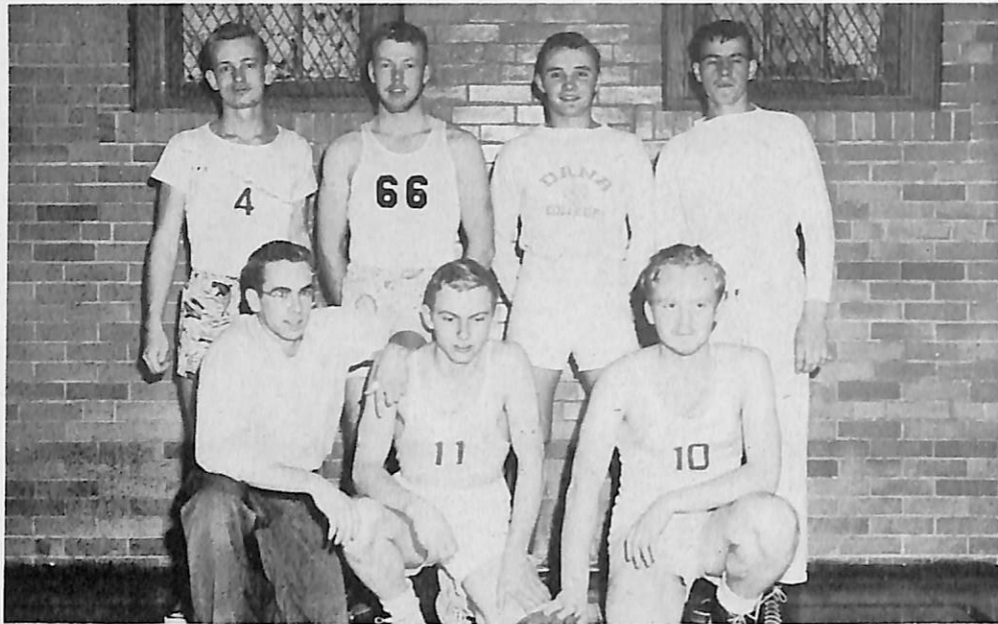

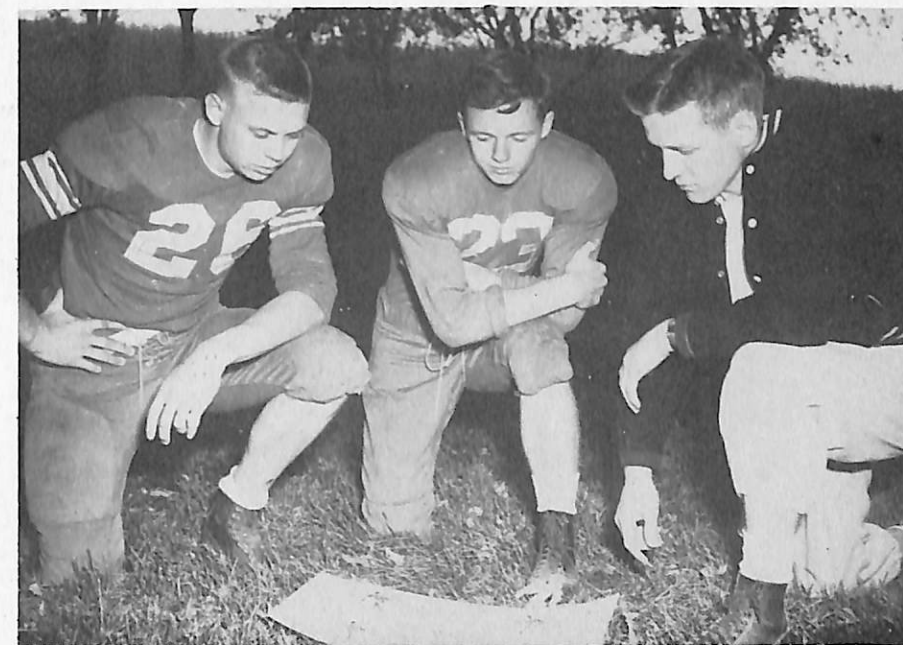

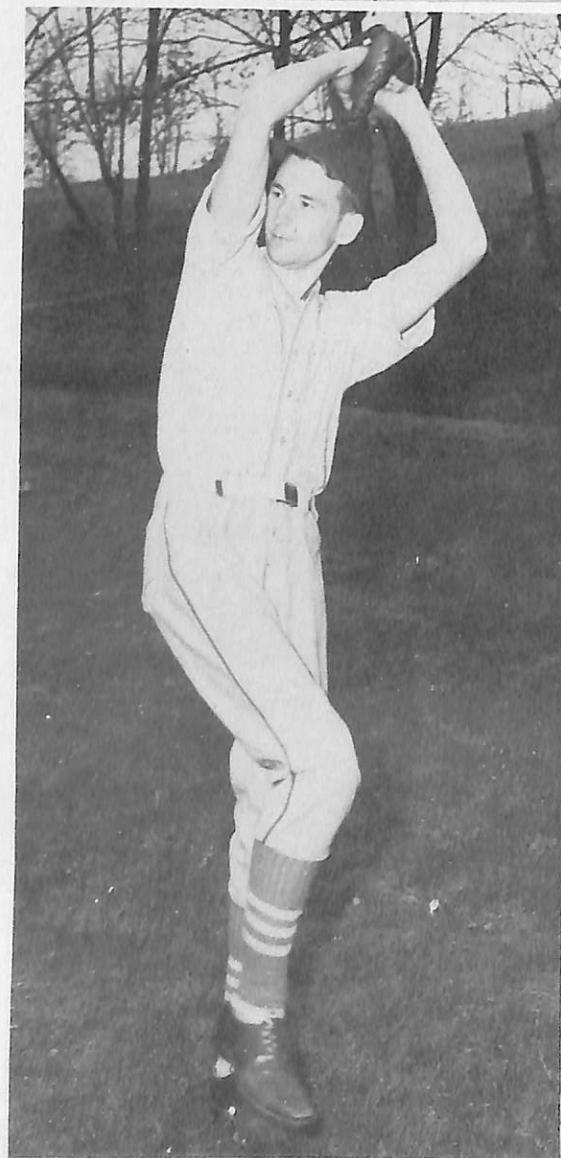

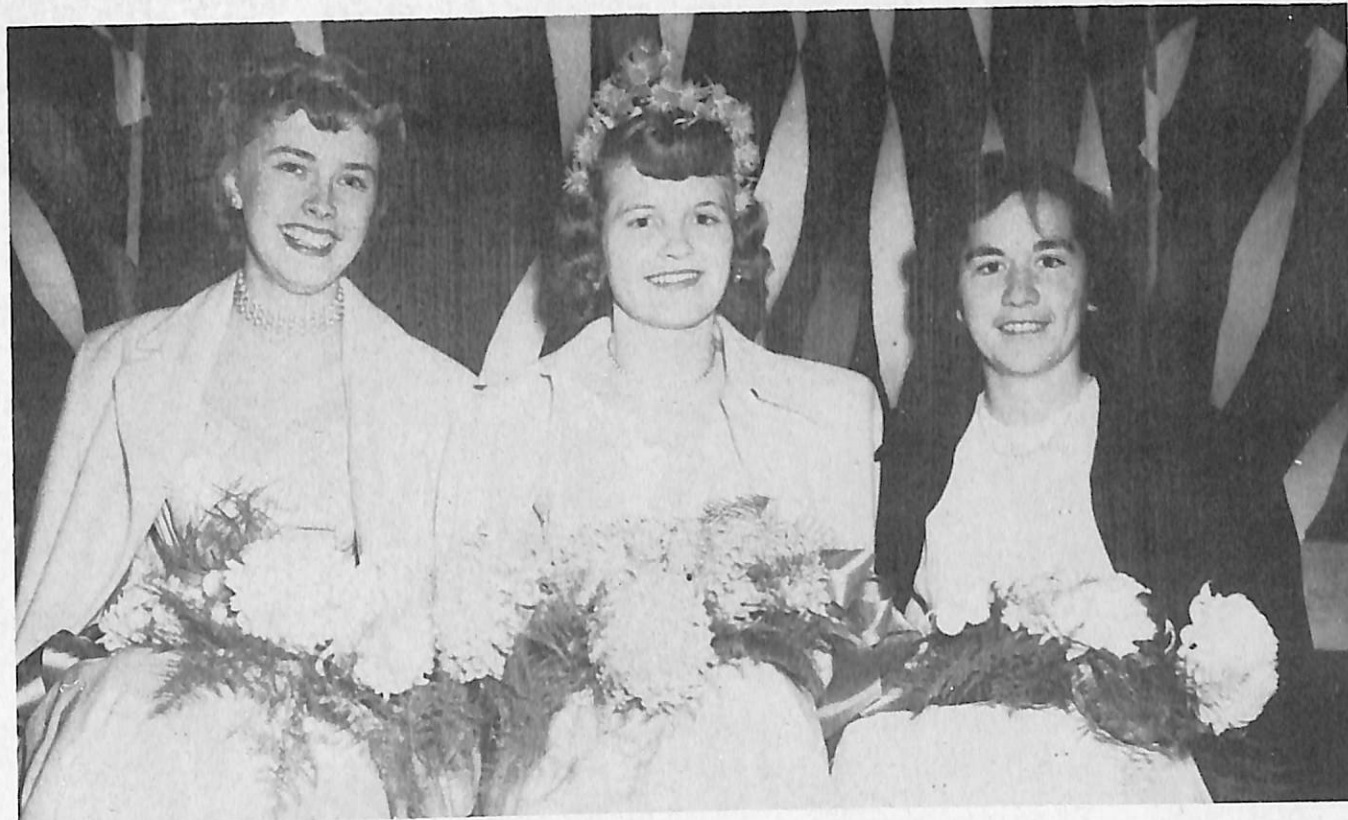

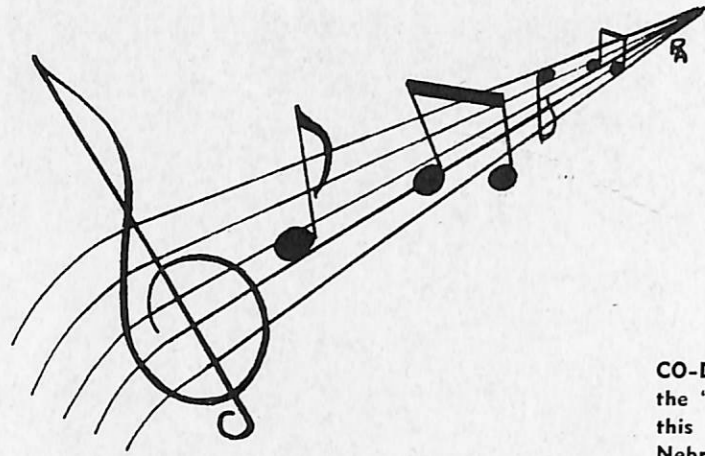

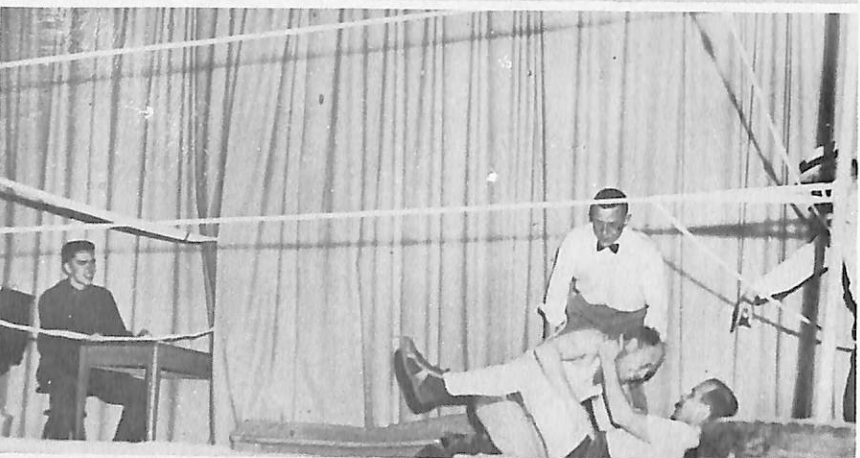

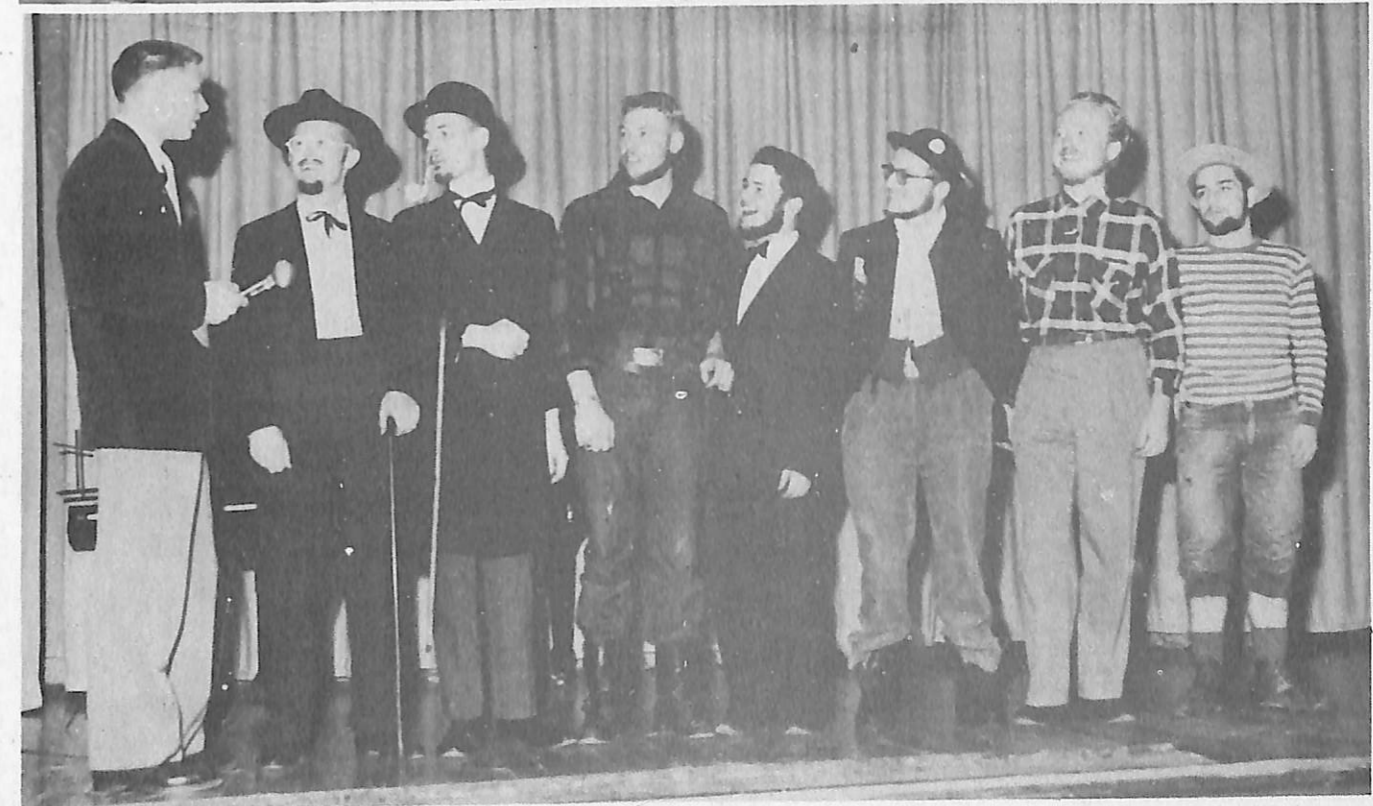

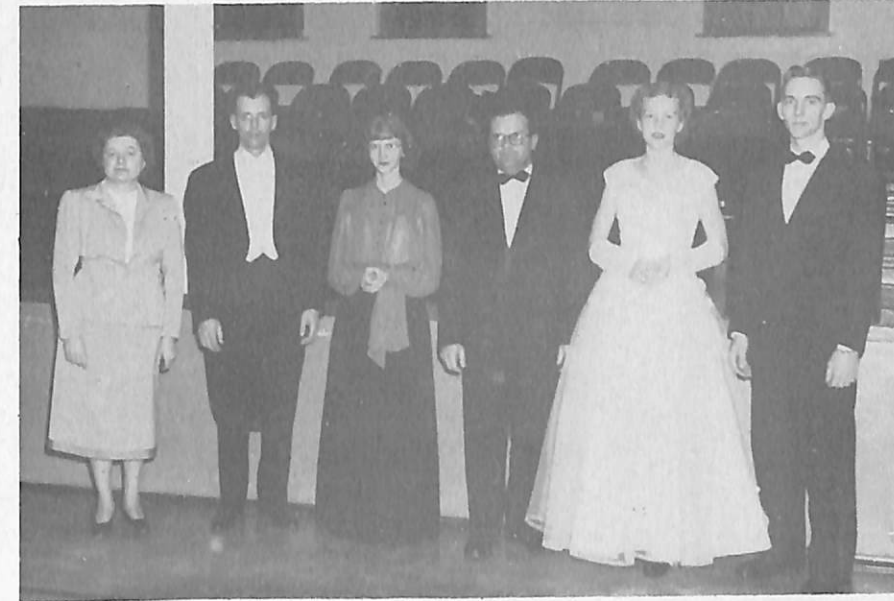

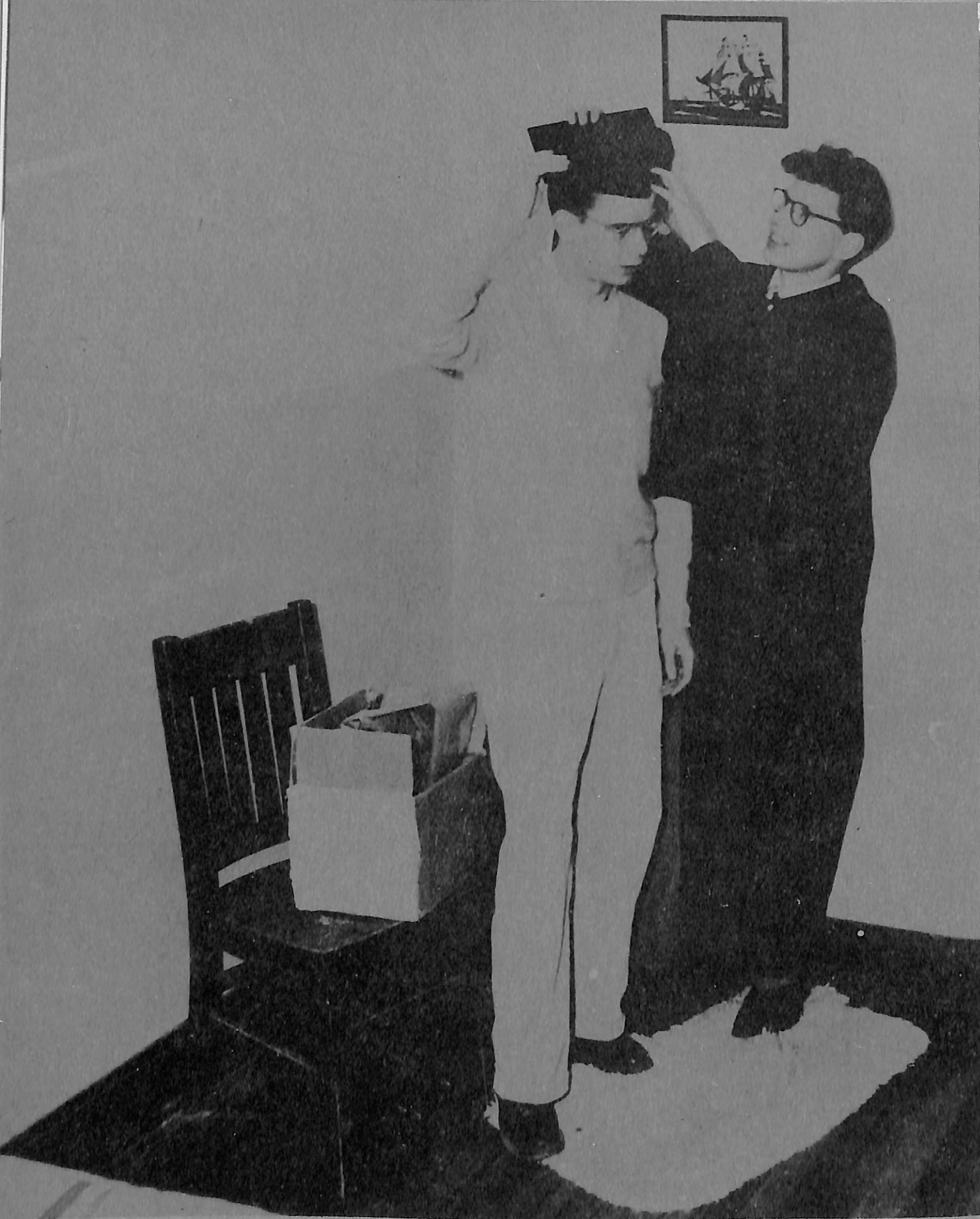
