## Freshmen . . .







taining to extra-curricular life at Dana. One of the Council's biggest projects this year was the inauguration of a student radio program over KFGT in Fremont.





narrow losses to Sterling, Kansas and Westmar cut the Viking morale badly.







Dana's number two unit in action: Dick Jensen tries a tip in.






Leaving his opponents on the floor, Bob Jensen goes high to score a couple points for the Vikings.







It was September, 1952. Rain soaked Dana-Midland football fans checked their programs. One name caught their eyes. Marion Hudson... freshman... back... 6'... 185 lbs. It sounded like the sort of name that should appear on sports pages... the sort of name that was easy to remember and pleasant to pronounce.






