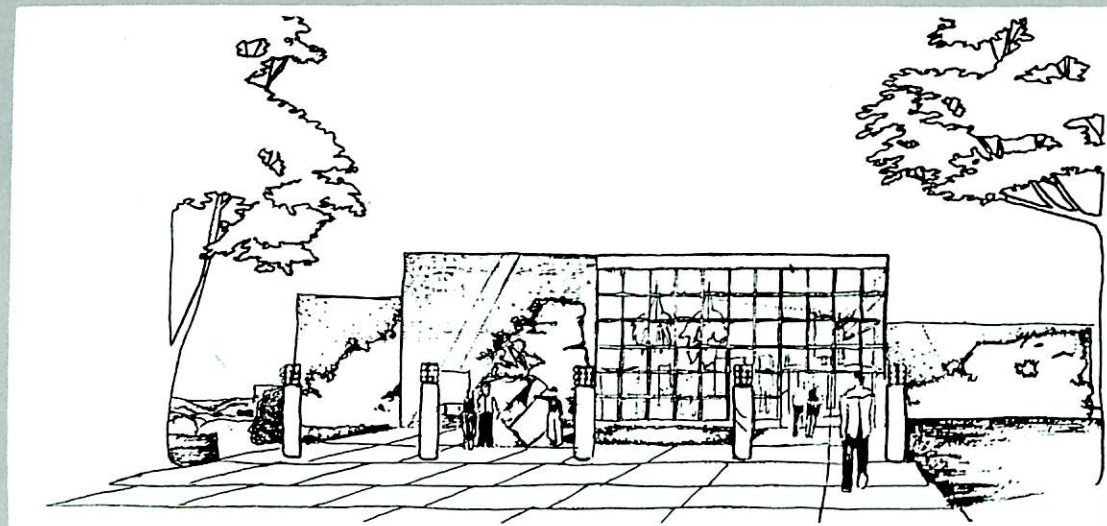

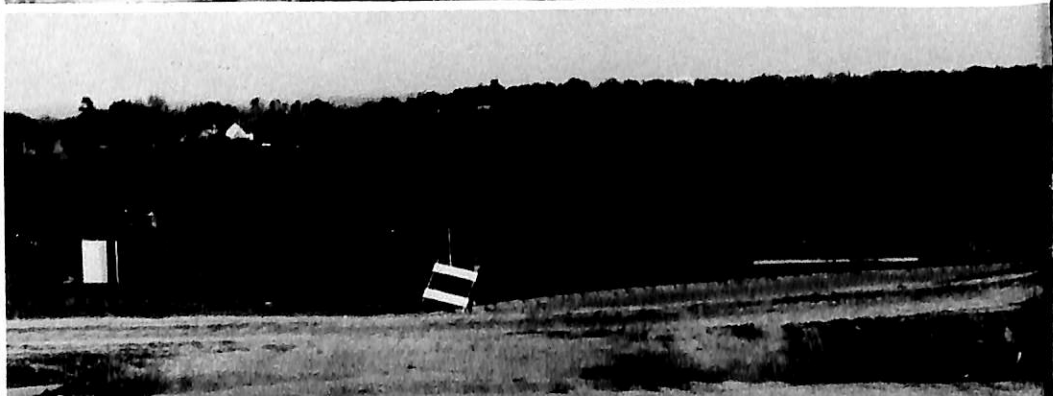
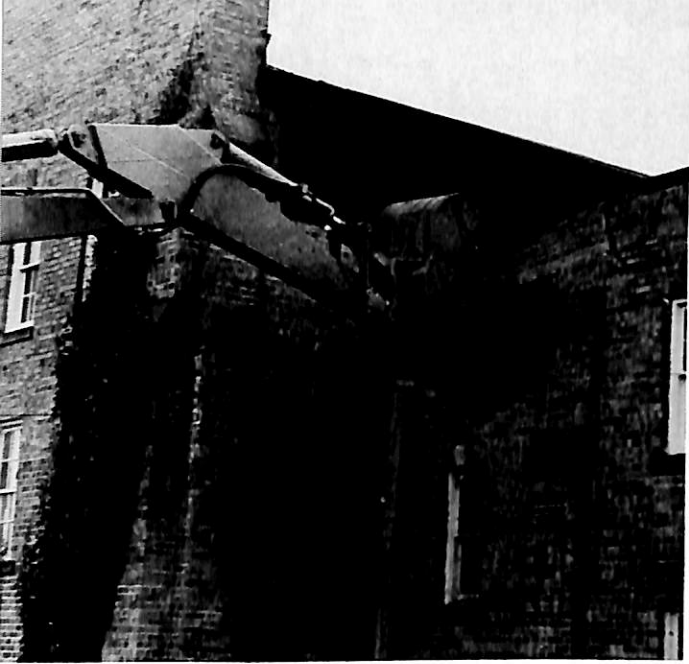

1982-1983 will be remembered as the dawn of Dana College's revivification!





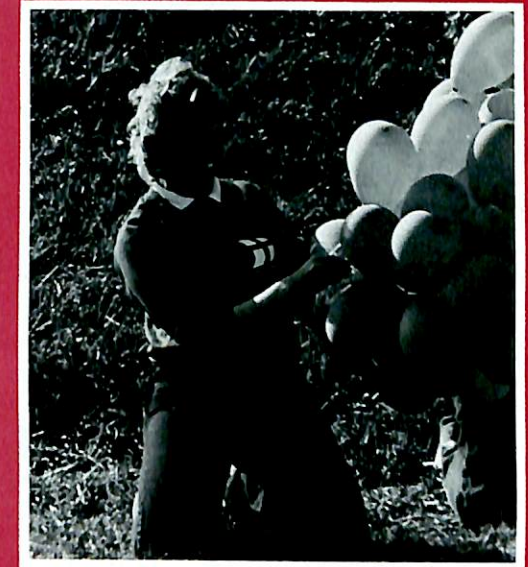
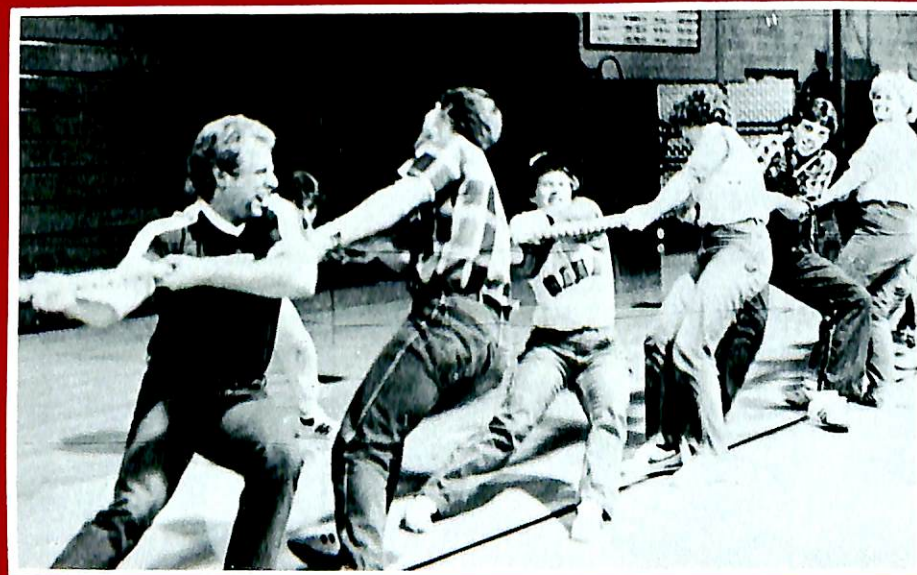
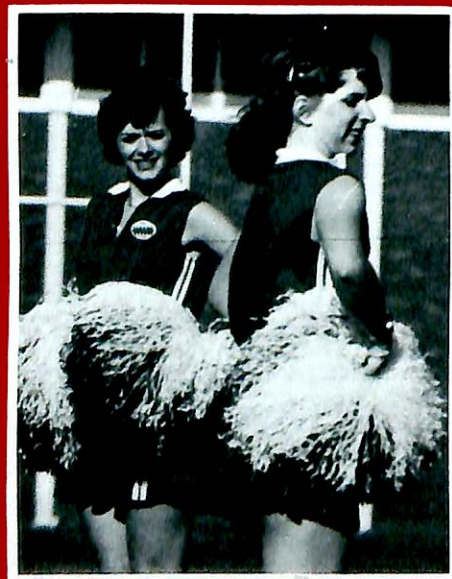

Homecoming Spirit

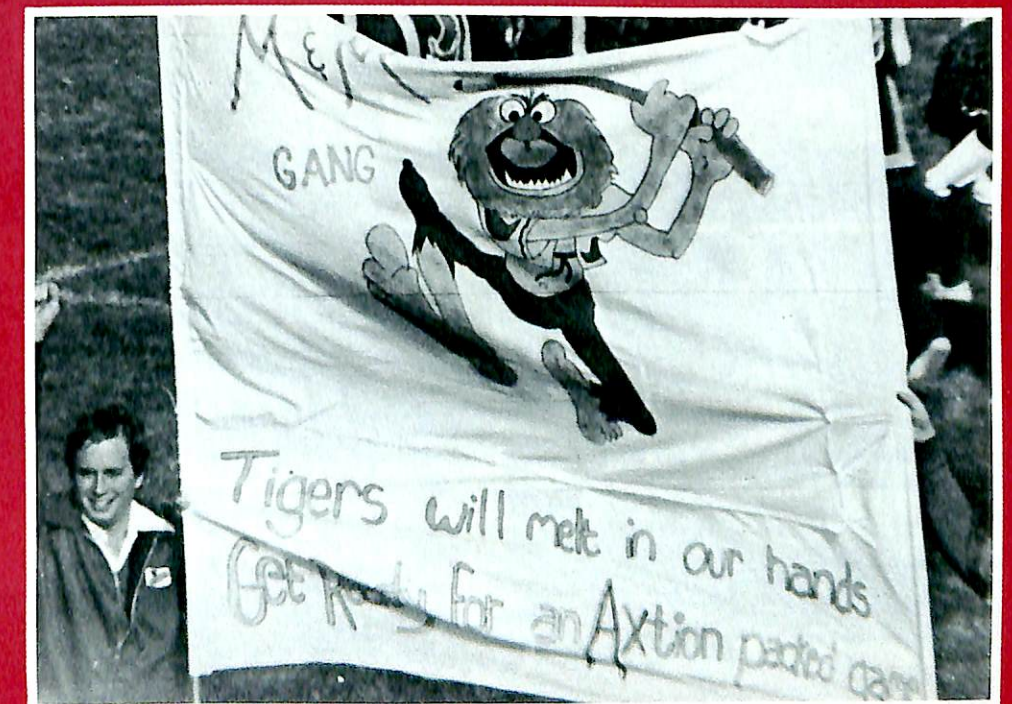
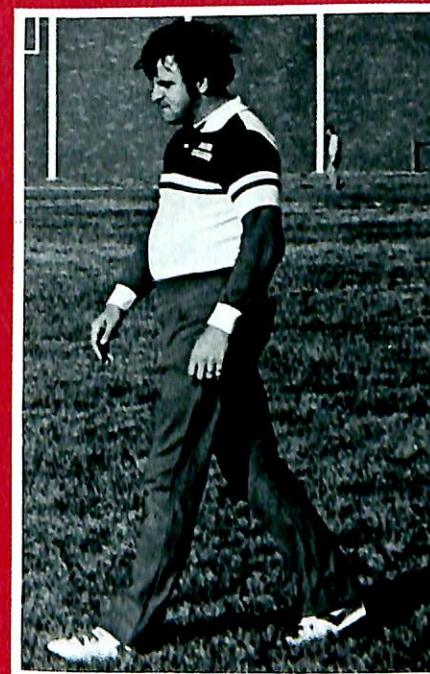

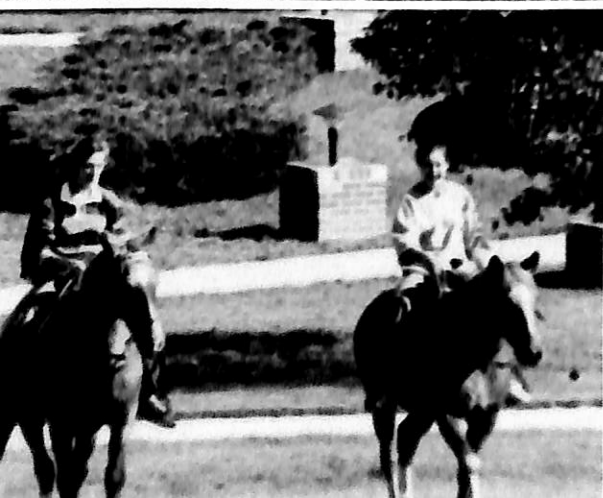
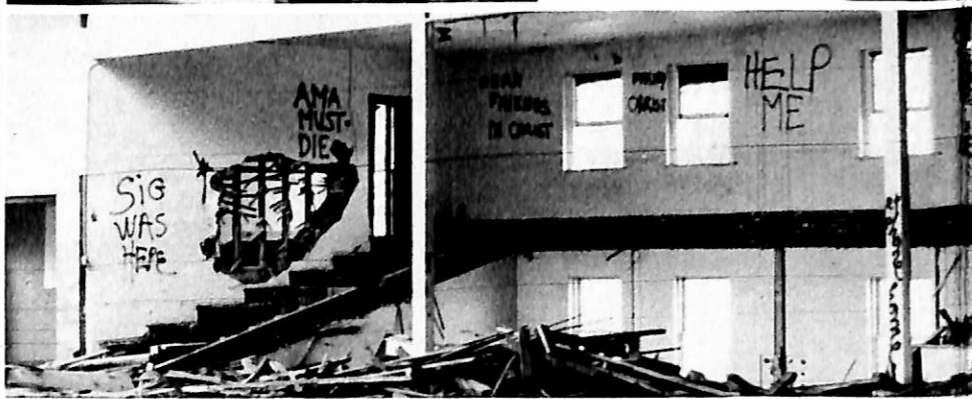


Almost Anything Goes

A schedule of events was provided and suggested visiting only one of the following major events each hour. Each event began promptly at a quarter to the hour. Music from the campus carillon signalled the end of each event; when the music stopped, the next event began.

"The Business of Good Government," a contemporary drama for the Christmas season, was staged by the Dana Players in DHA. In PM's Parnassus, "Storytime" amused many with selections of Christmas prose and poetry for

Mickelsen Hall provided a German Christmas celebration, "Christkindlmarkt," with music, food, samples, and decorations of the season. 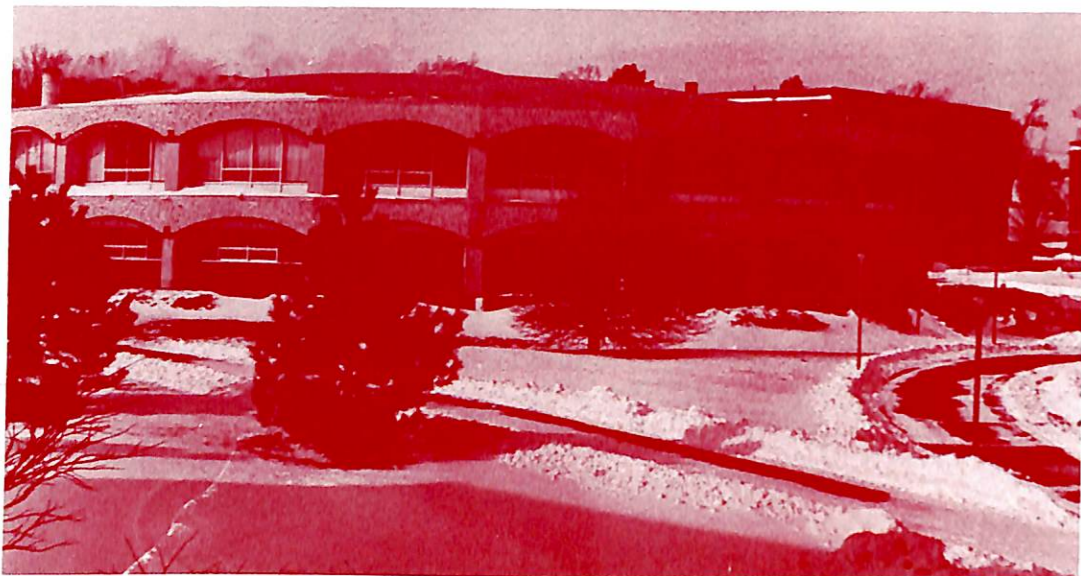

One experienced the hustle and bustle of the Christmas season by attending all the above activities during the day.

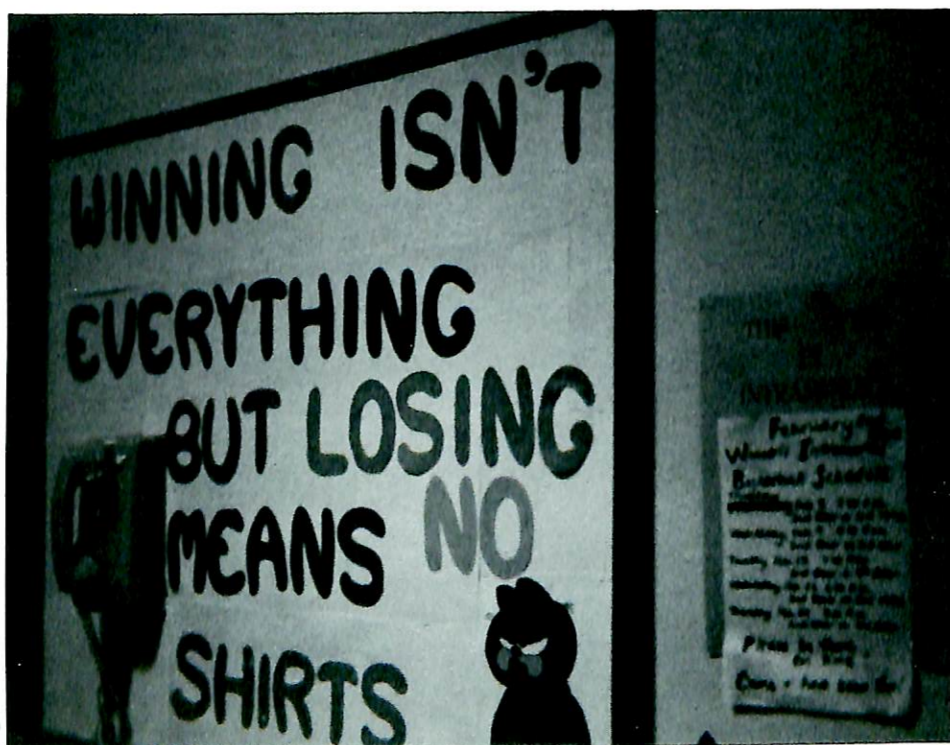

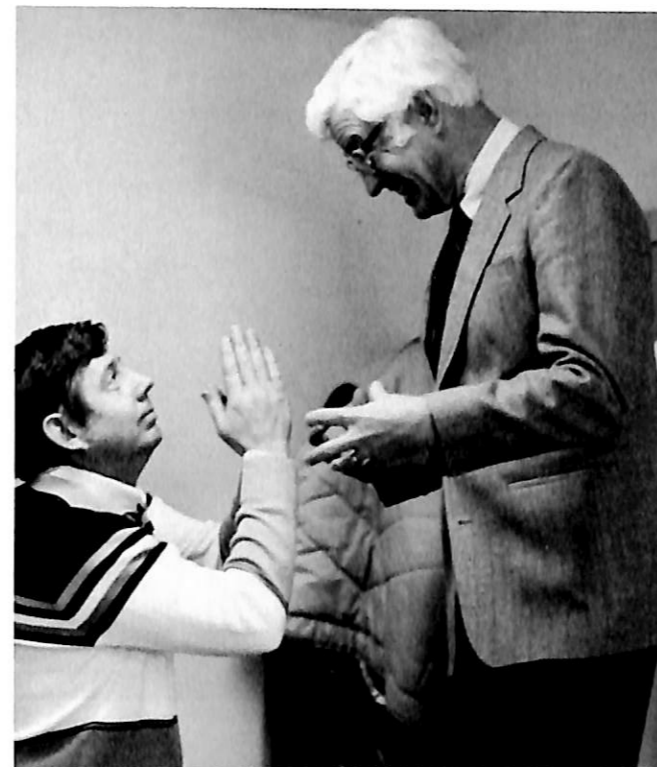

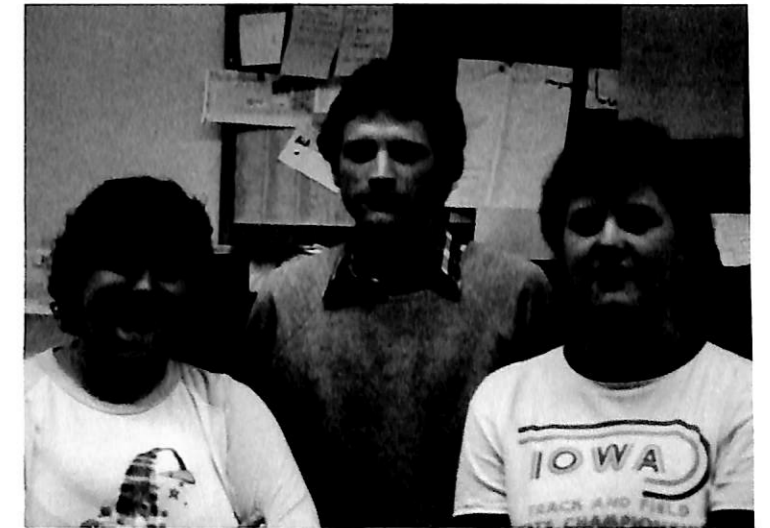

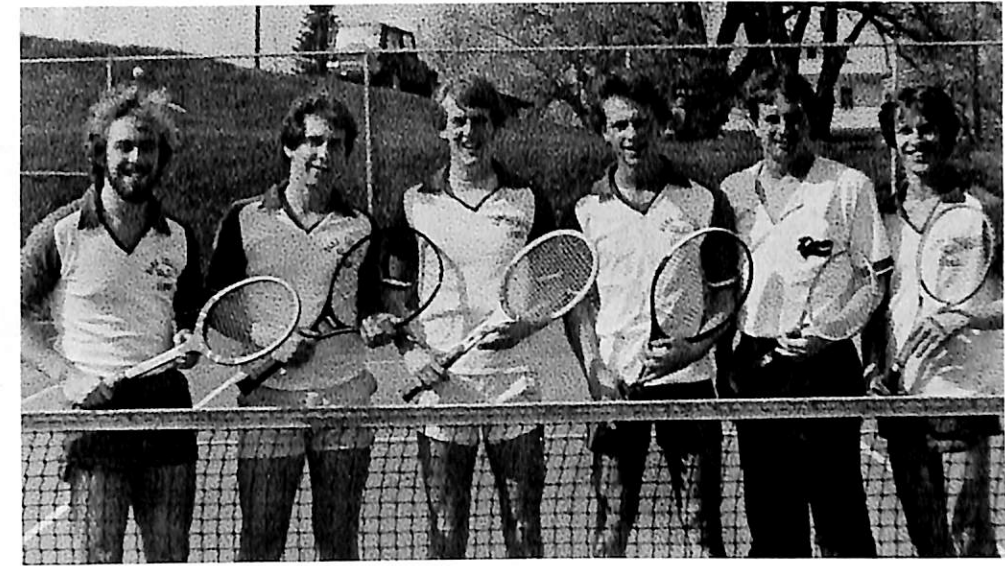
Though defense was the Lady Viking's
