


Advancement

1982-1983 will be remembered as the dawn of Dana College's revivifica-





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


Homecoming Spirit



A Snowy Interim



their spiritual life. The goal of F.C.A. is to








Though defense was the Lady Viking's


Coach Foley notes that this is the best record for any varsity women's team at Dana to date, in spite of the disappointing showing in the district tournament.
