It was a year of good and bad, victory and failure, tradition and change.

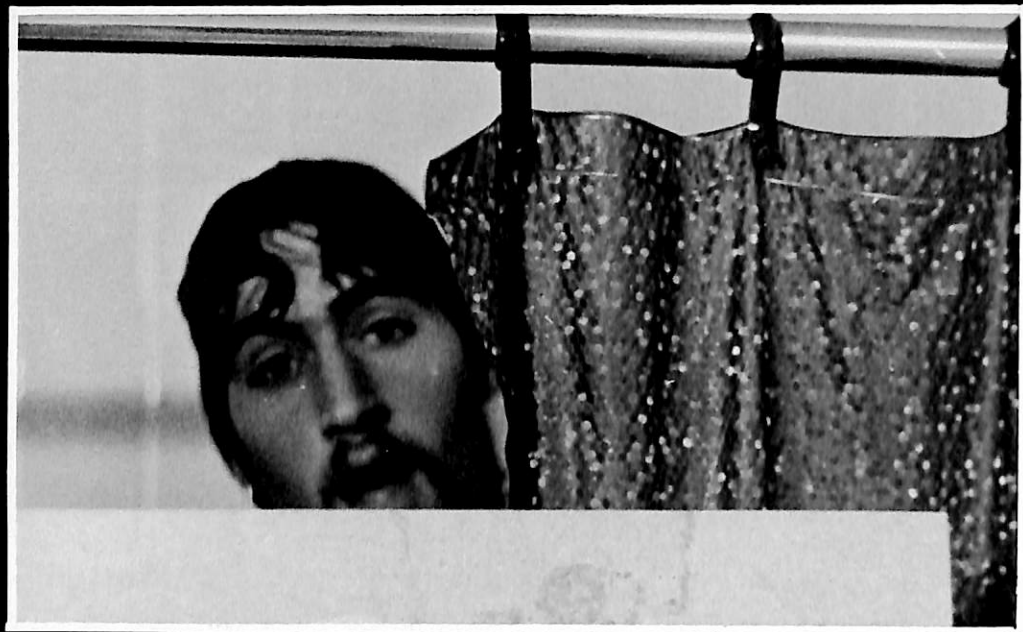
A good year.

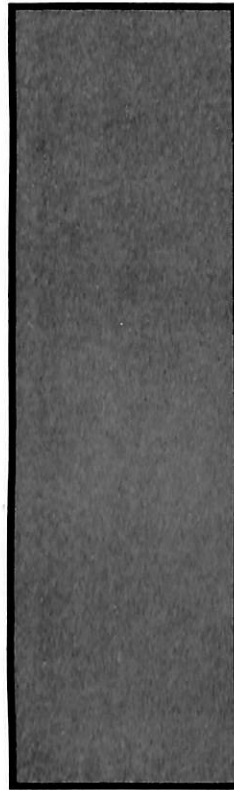

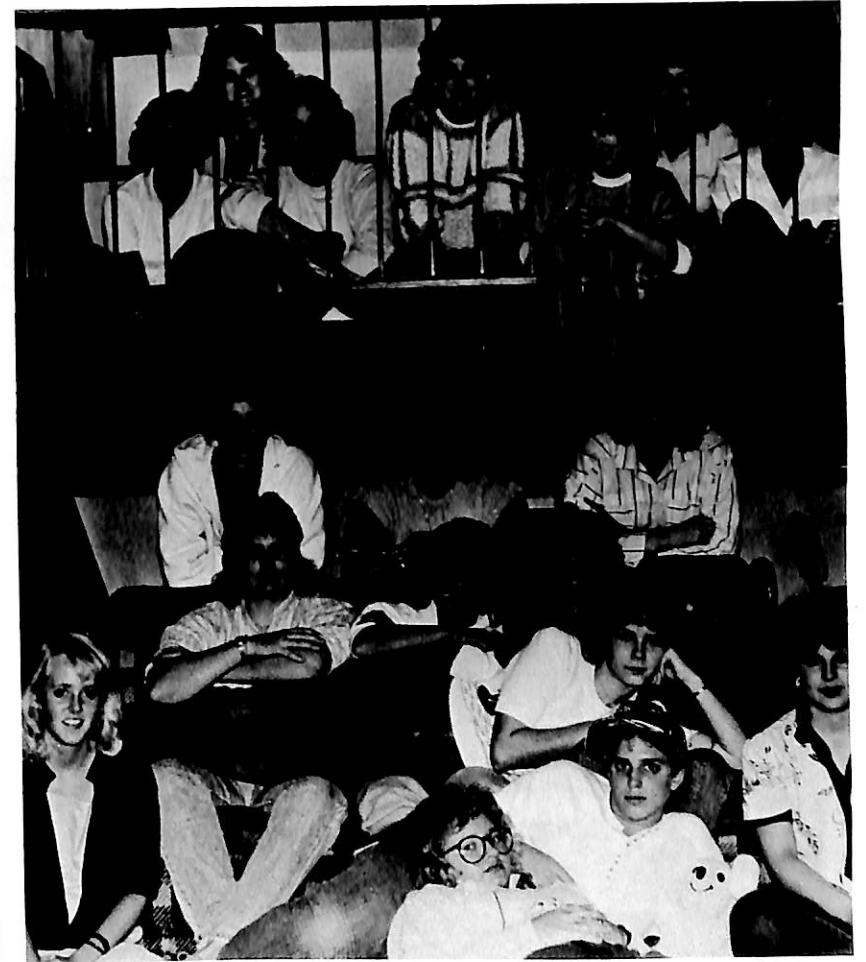

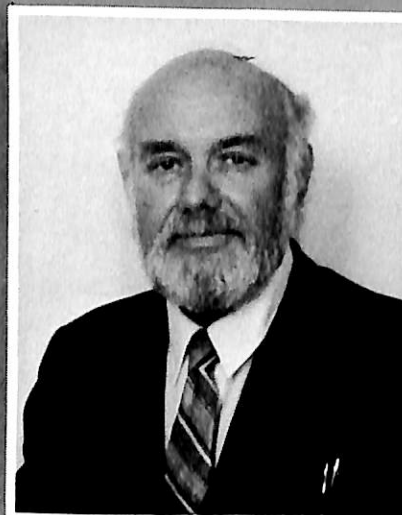
We remember how his joy of life was contagious. He took particular pleasure in giving as when he entertained, whether groups of students or his wide circle of friends. We witnessed his enthusiasm for a good book, the theater and thoughtful discourse. From his more robust days we recall his splendid appetite, especially for rich food, and plenty of it.

We admired him for the way he could defuse a tense situation with a witty

remark and the way he could turn the comedy on himself as when, in his heavier years, he could truthfully refer to himself as "the great bulk of the faculty."

More importantly, Ray was a superb teacher. His reputation for excellence in the classroom is a matter of record, but for many of us the greatest lessons he taught us were outside the classroom. Both by his words and his deeds he taught us what is most important about being human. Like the great teachers of the ages, he had a way of presenting profound truths in simple language that any of us could understand.

For so many generations of students and for so many colleagues Ray epitomized the very ideals of Dana College. The highest tribute we can pay him would be to preserve his example in our own actions.





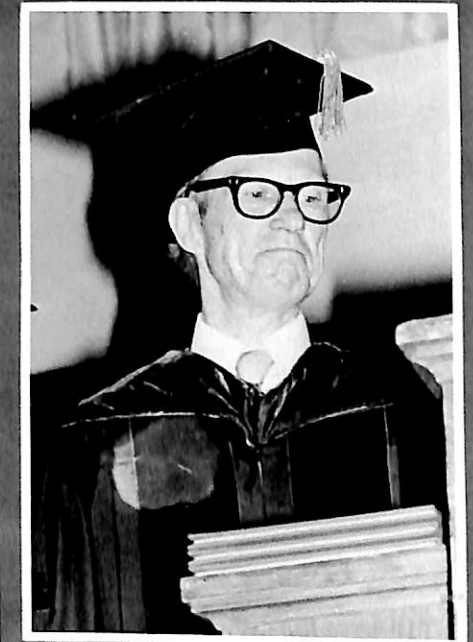
**New president gets the ball moving**

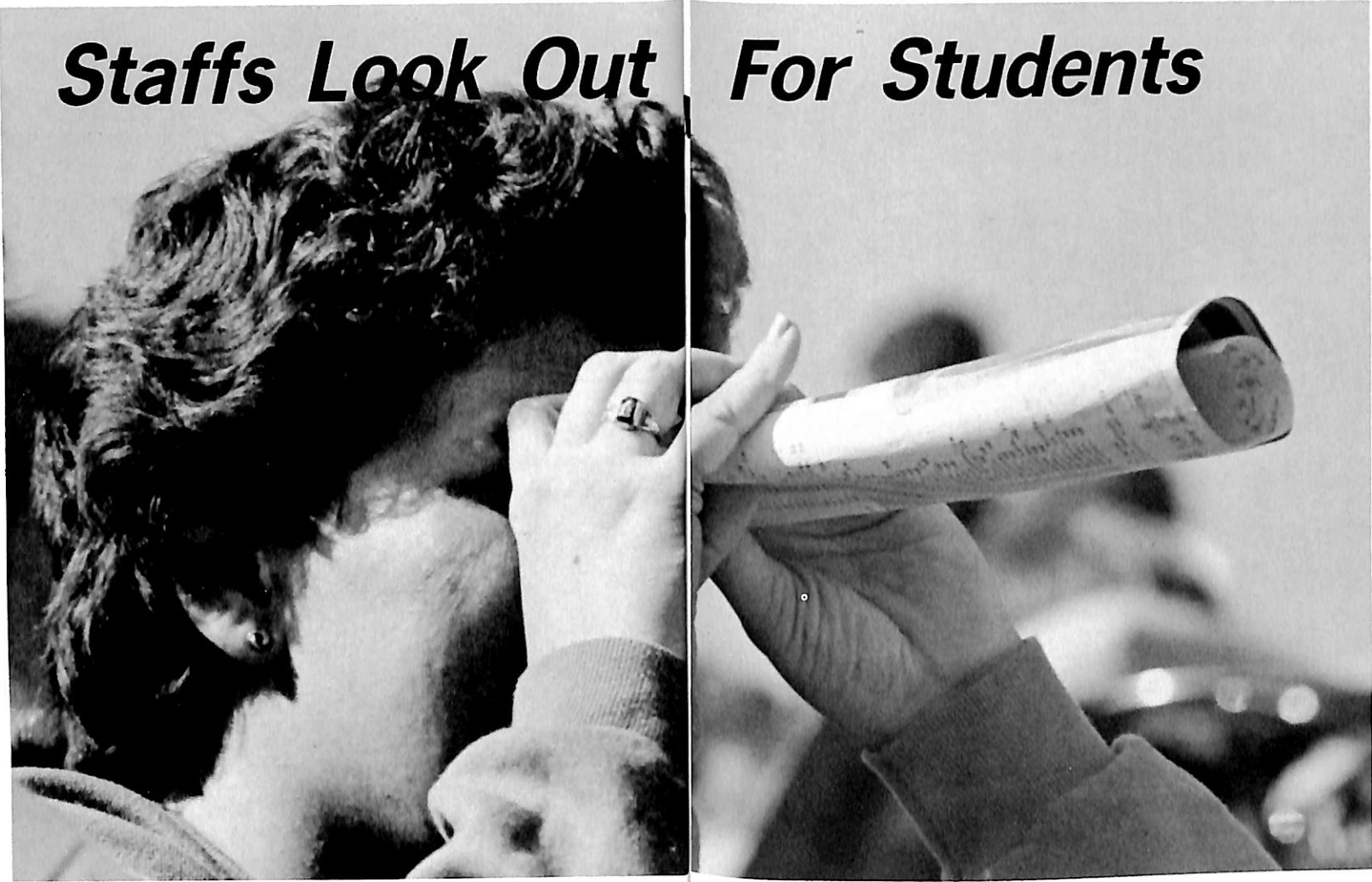

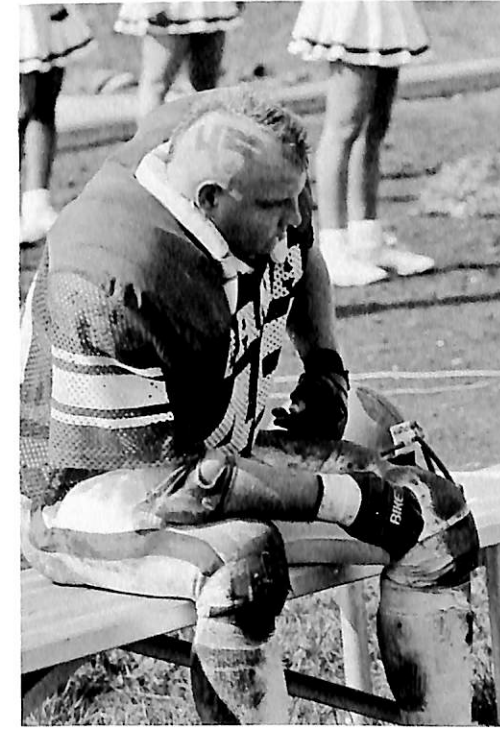


## Football

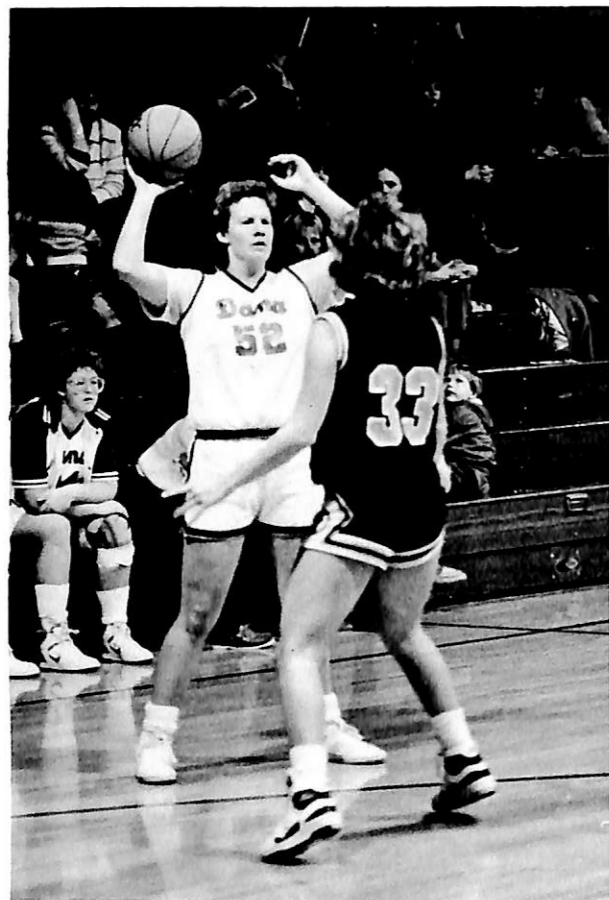

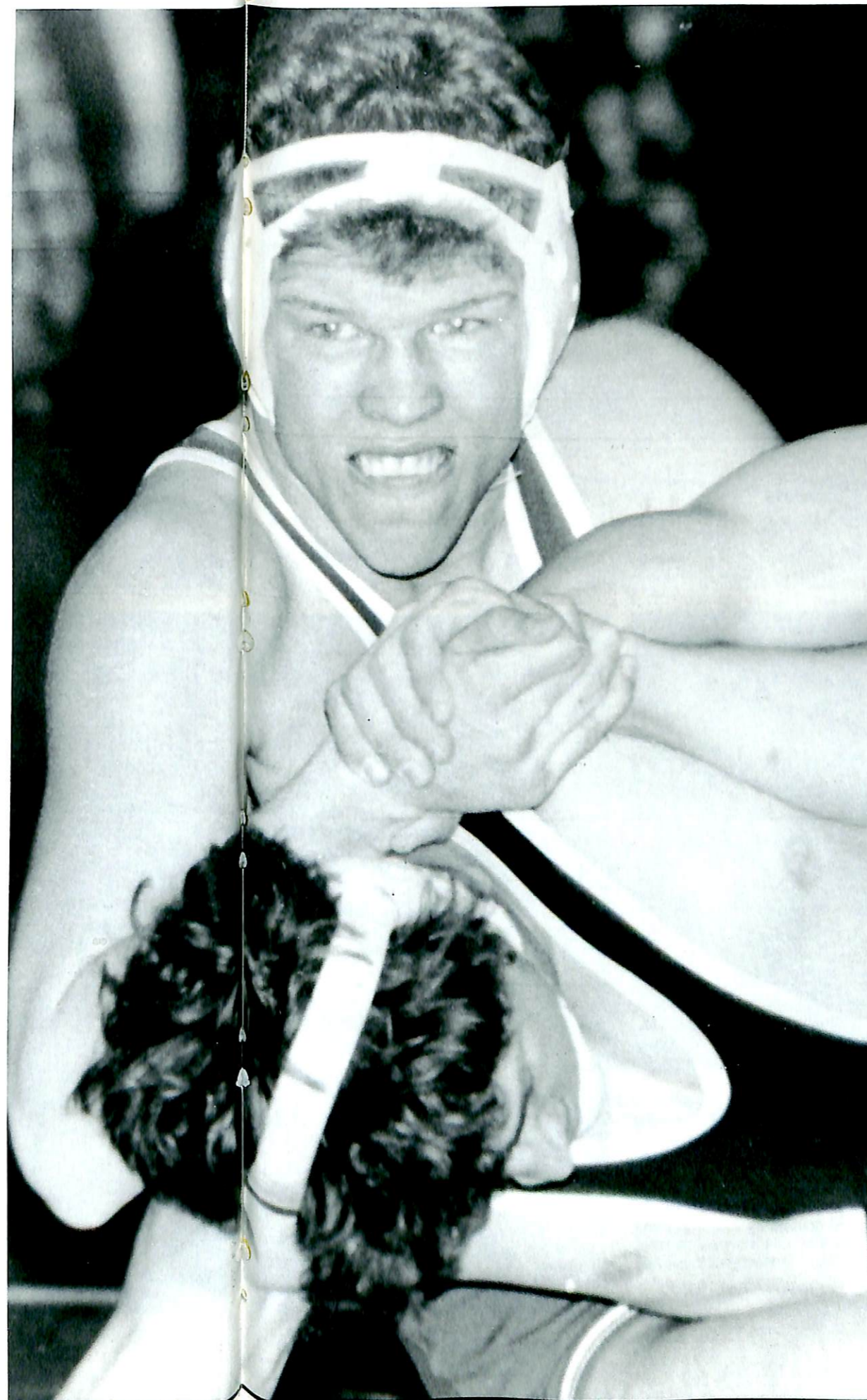


# Wrestling

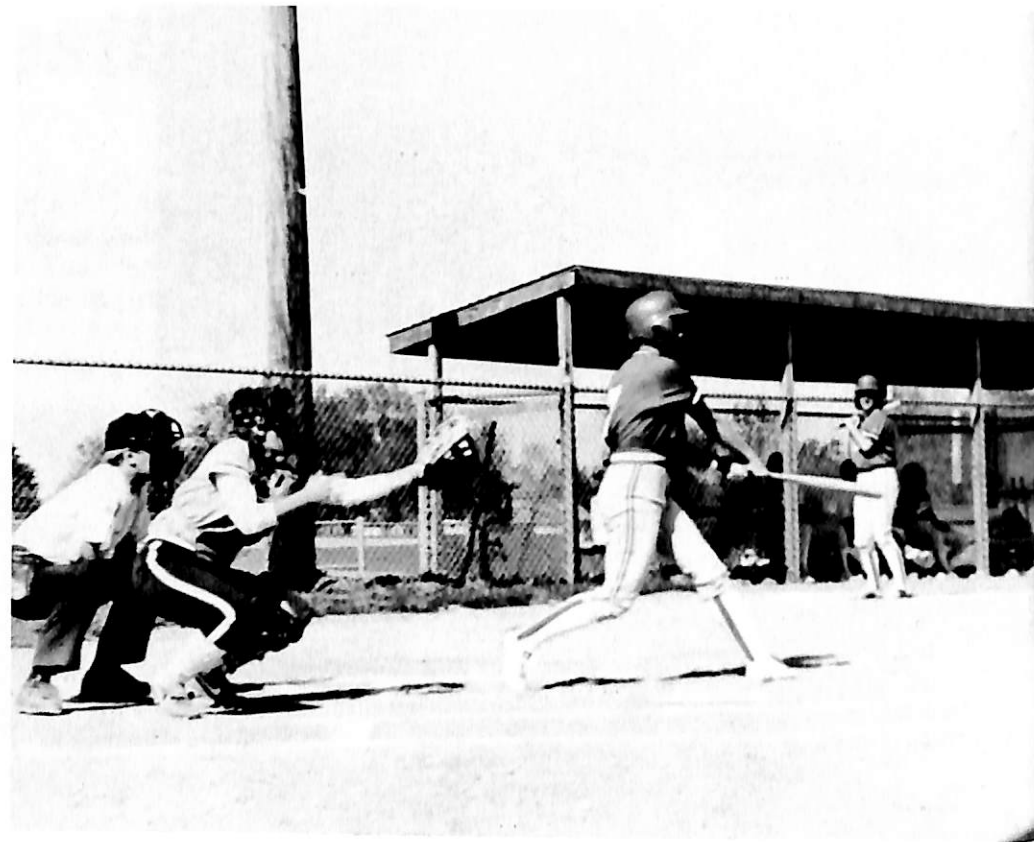

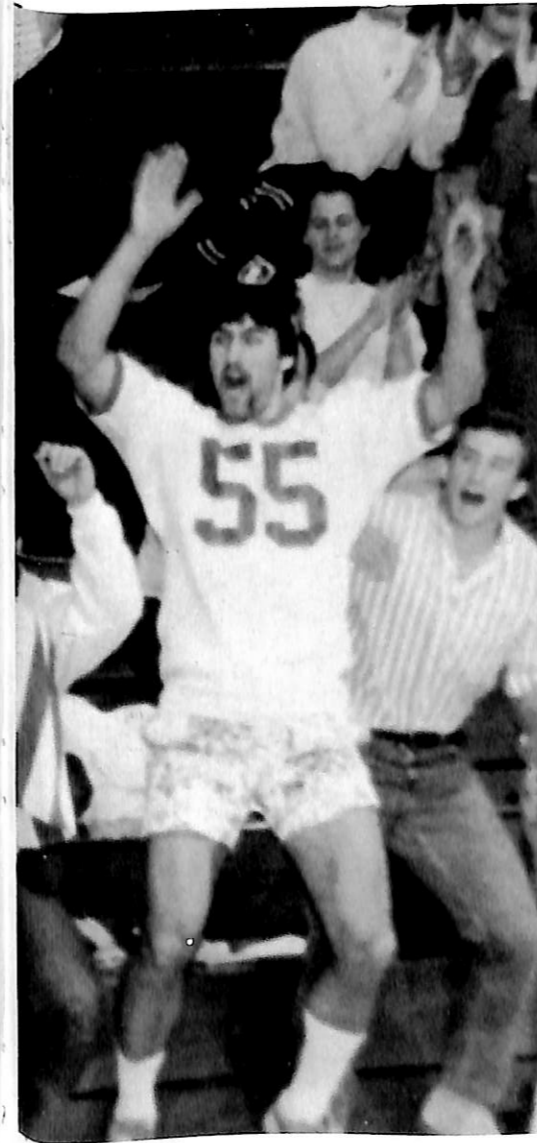

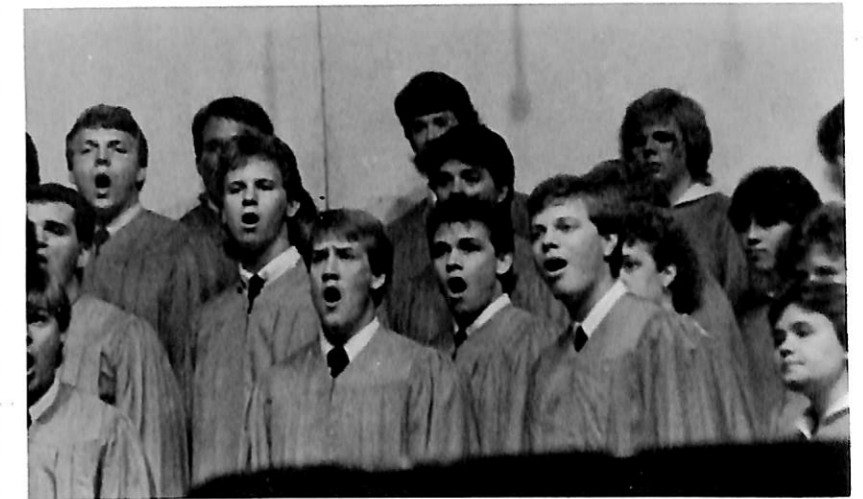
by EK, but they came to a realization that a problem existed.
