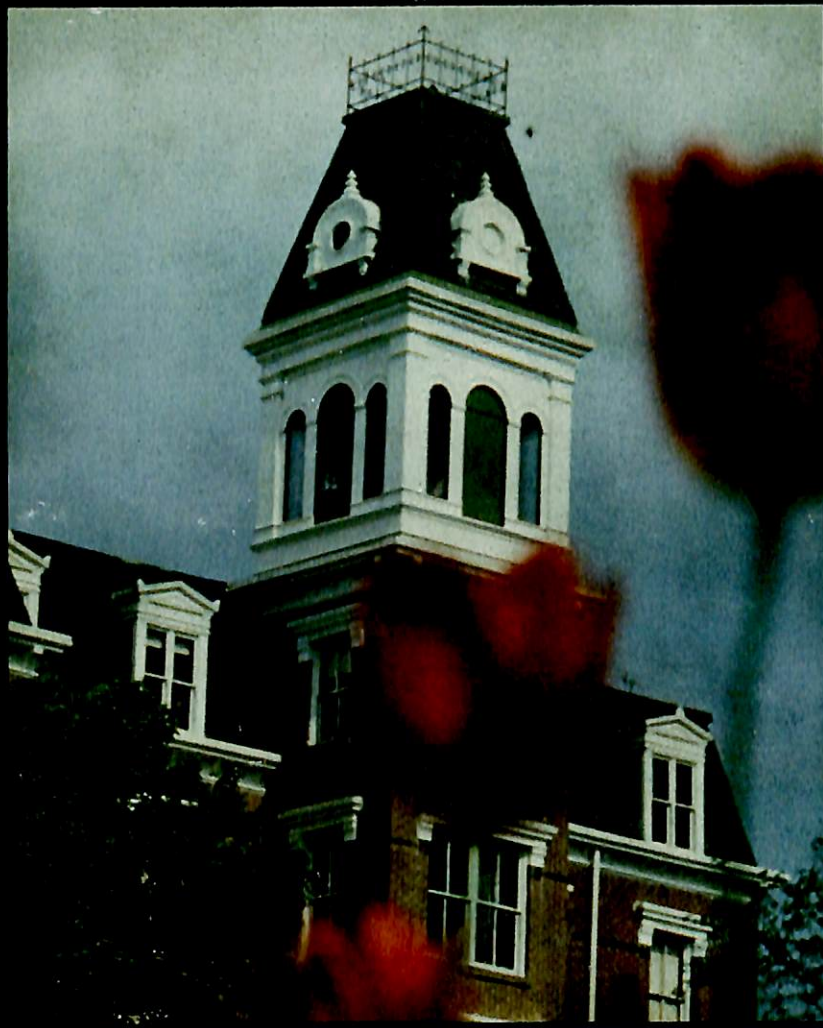

This volume of the Danian is dedicated to the memory of Old Main, constructed in 1886 and destroyed by fire on August 25, 1988. It was a building that brought beauty to our campus—a beauty that lives on through faculty, staff and students.

# Old Main

## "Not Forgotten"

102 years of dignity, beauty and strength. Old Main has a place in history not to be forgotten. She survived through many years of uncertainty as she sat quietly in her chair on Dana Hill. Her tower rose majestically through the trees acting as a guide, leading people to the Dana campus. The light from her tower at night shone as bright as a star from above.

She was a strong fortress. The central structure of Old Main was built in 1886. The architecture was of the French Second Empire Revival, a popular style in Europe and America in the 1800's. The land on which she was built was donated by Henry B. Dexter and J.C.W. Kline of Blair. The Blair Brickyards made the bricks, and horse drawn wagons hauled them to the site of construction on the hill. Winds in 1885 threatened to destroy the newly built walls, but she survived. October 21, 1886, was the official day of dedication of the building that was eventually to become what we call Old Main. At the time 12 young men were enrolled to study at this new institution called Trinity Seminary. The total cost of the new building was \$7,000. It included quarters for the president and his family, classrooms, dorm rooms, a dining room, and kitchen. At this time, plumbing and electricity were not in the building. There were coal burning cannonball stoves and kerosene lamps in each room for heat and light. Outhouses were to the south of Old Main, too close during the hot summer months and too far during the cold winter months.

As the number of students entering the Seminary rose, it was decided to build an addition to Old Main. A North Wing that included additional dorm rooms, classrooms, extra dining area, and more kitchen and pantry space was finished and dedicated on October 1, 1893. The cost of the addition was \$6,000. The number of students enrolled at this time was 55. In 1905, the South Wing was built at a cost of \$12,500. The new wing contained a chapel, offices, more classrooms and dormitory space. At the time the South Wing was finished, 72 students were enrolled. The total cost of the completed Old Main was \$25,500.

Old Main received city water and electricity in 1908 and central heating in 1916. Enrollment had risen to 141 students at this time. The building was threatened by fire



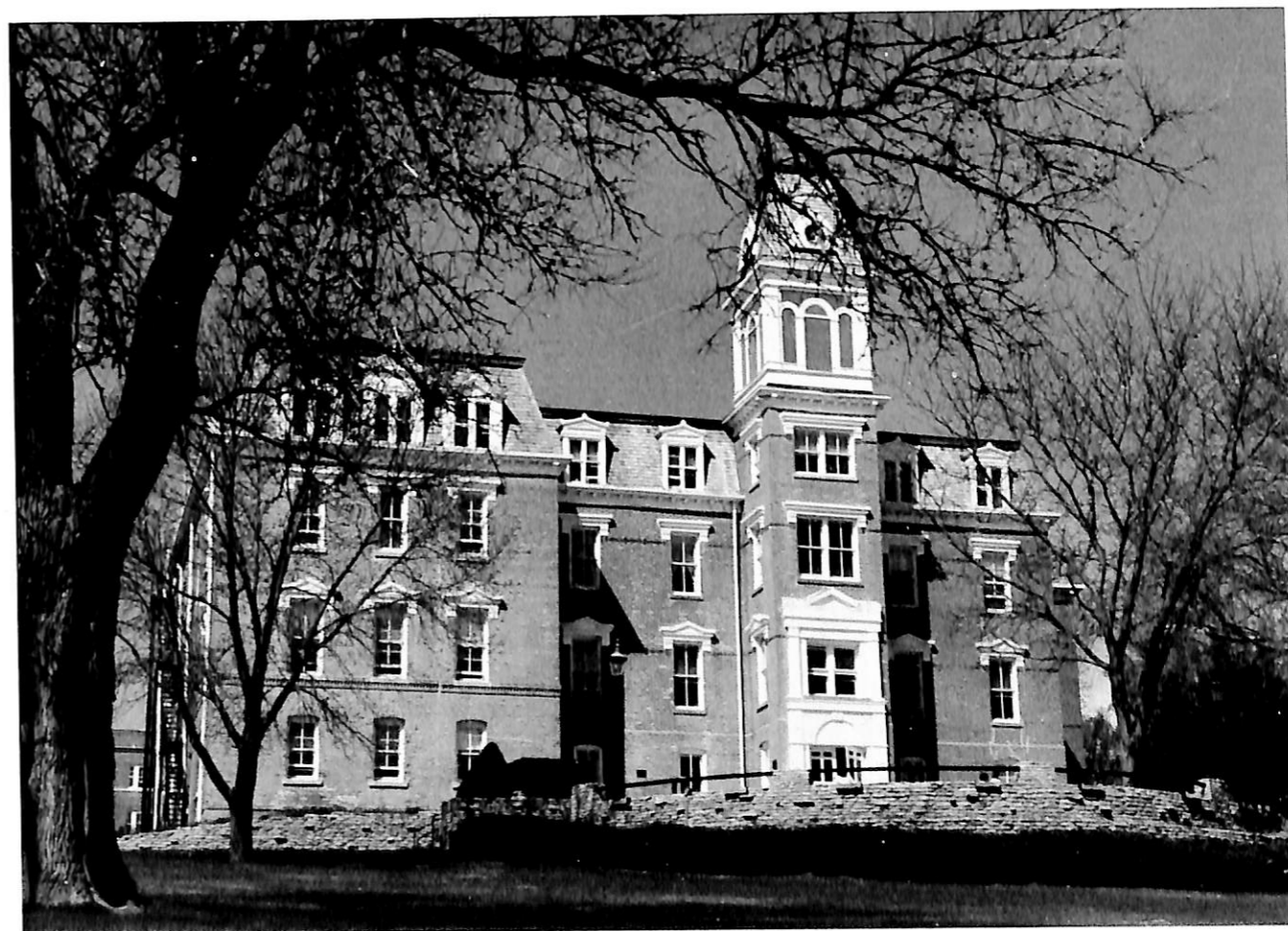
TRINITATIS SEMINARIUM.

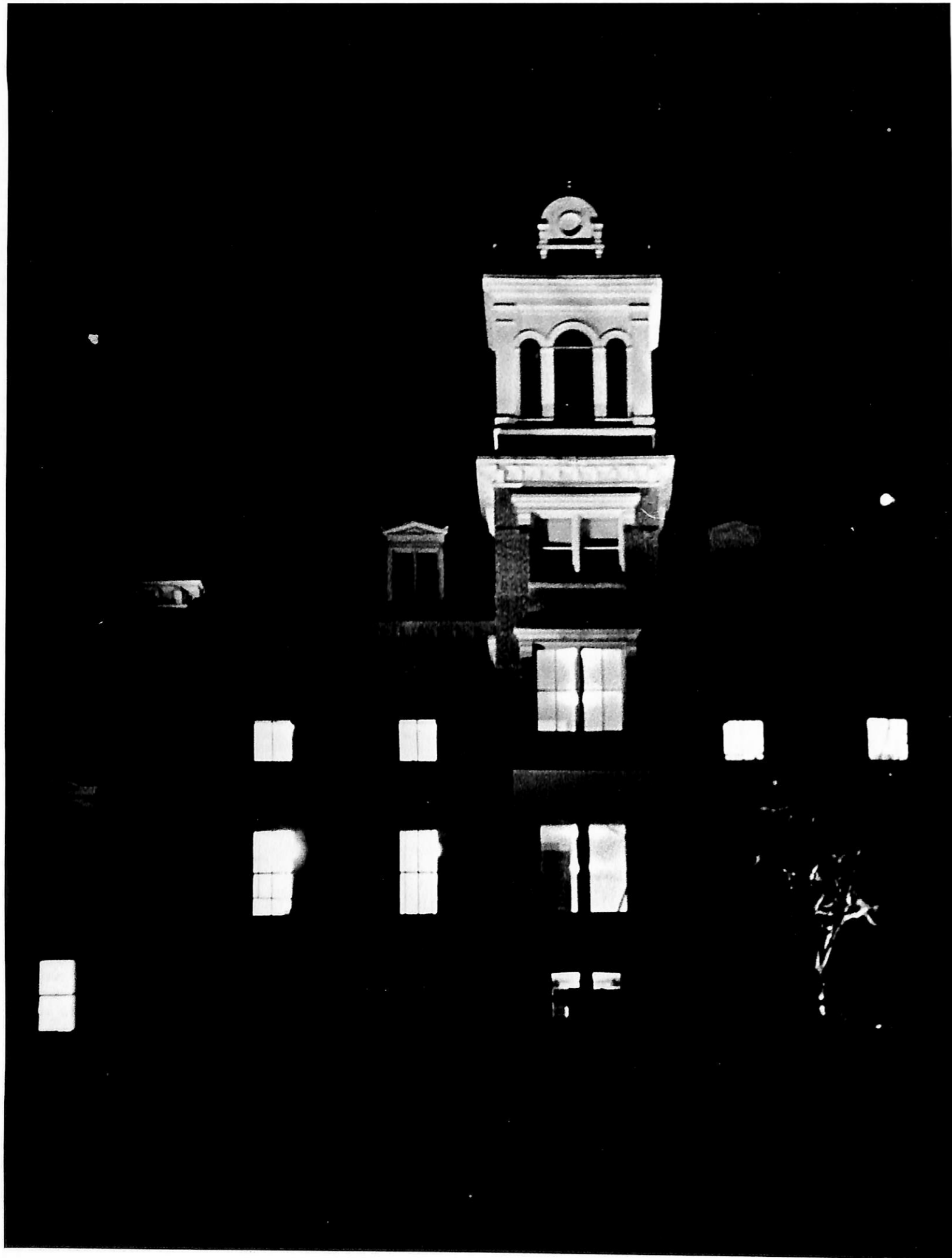
several times throughout her history. The first time was in 1933; the fire caused no damage. In 1947, a fire that started at the southeast entrance of the building was discovered by president R.E. Morton when he arrived at 5:30 a.m. on Easter Sunday morning. The fire destroyed some woodwork, several feet of floor and part of a desk. Again in 1944, fire threatened twice. The first fire was caused by an explosion in the chemistry lab but was quickly extinguished. The second was caused by fireworks set off by students.

Many other changes besides the addition of the North and South Wings of Old Main took place during her lifetime. In 1956, she received a new

roof and replacement of the two old chimneys that had been a part of her since the original structure was built. Also in 1956, the removal of two stairways in the South Wing made room for a student canteen. In 1957-58, the front steps of the structure were removed and replaced by a ground level entrance. In 1960 a patio was added to the front entrance.

In 1980, Old Main was named to the National Registry of Historic Places. In 1984, the first of three phases of renovation began. The first phase ended in 1985 at a cost of \$274,095. Phase II of renovation was completed in 1986 at a cost of \$288,902.





In October, 1986, the 100th anniversary of Old Main was observed. Thursday morning, August 25, 1988, would be Old Main's last fight with fire. Fire departments from several surrounding Blair communities helped to fight the fire that was steadily consuming our beautiful Old Main. The cause of the fire was found to be old electrical wiring in the North wing, the part of Old Main that was to be renovated in 1989. Old Main was declared a complete loss by engineers on August 29, 1988. On August 30, at 10:00 a.m., the tower of this historic landmark was demolished and preparations to tear down the rest of the structure began.



The loss of Old Main was estimated at \$1.5 million. But this estimate did not take into account the vast amounts of teaching equipment, books and classroom materials that were lost. Nor did it take into account the personal loss of individual faculty members. The building contained facilities for art, business, education, psychology, a Career Services Office, a computer laboratory and a new classroom/laboratory for color and black/white photography. Apparently fifteen faculty offices were also destroyed—a great personal loss for those faculty members who had developed a home for themselves in Old Main. Teacher credential files of Dana graduates and most of the equipment in the photography lab and other items were found in the salvage.

Dana President Dr. Myrvyn Christopherson characterized it as "a time for prayer, for reflecting and for thanks for the blessing Old Main has been to us." And as the weeks passed by many letters from past alumni and people who had known Dana, also, expressed their sadness of such a loss, but gave thanks for what Old Main had given to Dana and to the many people who had passed through her halls.

Merle Brockhoff '81 of Beatrice, Nebraska: "Fire is not such a bad ending for a building built of Viking forebears, for more than one Viking king chose to meet his end in the burning pyre of a longboat."

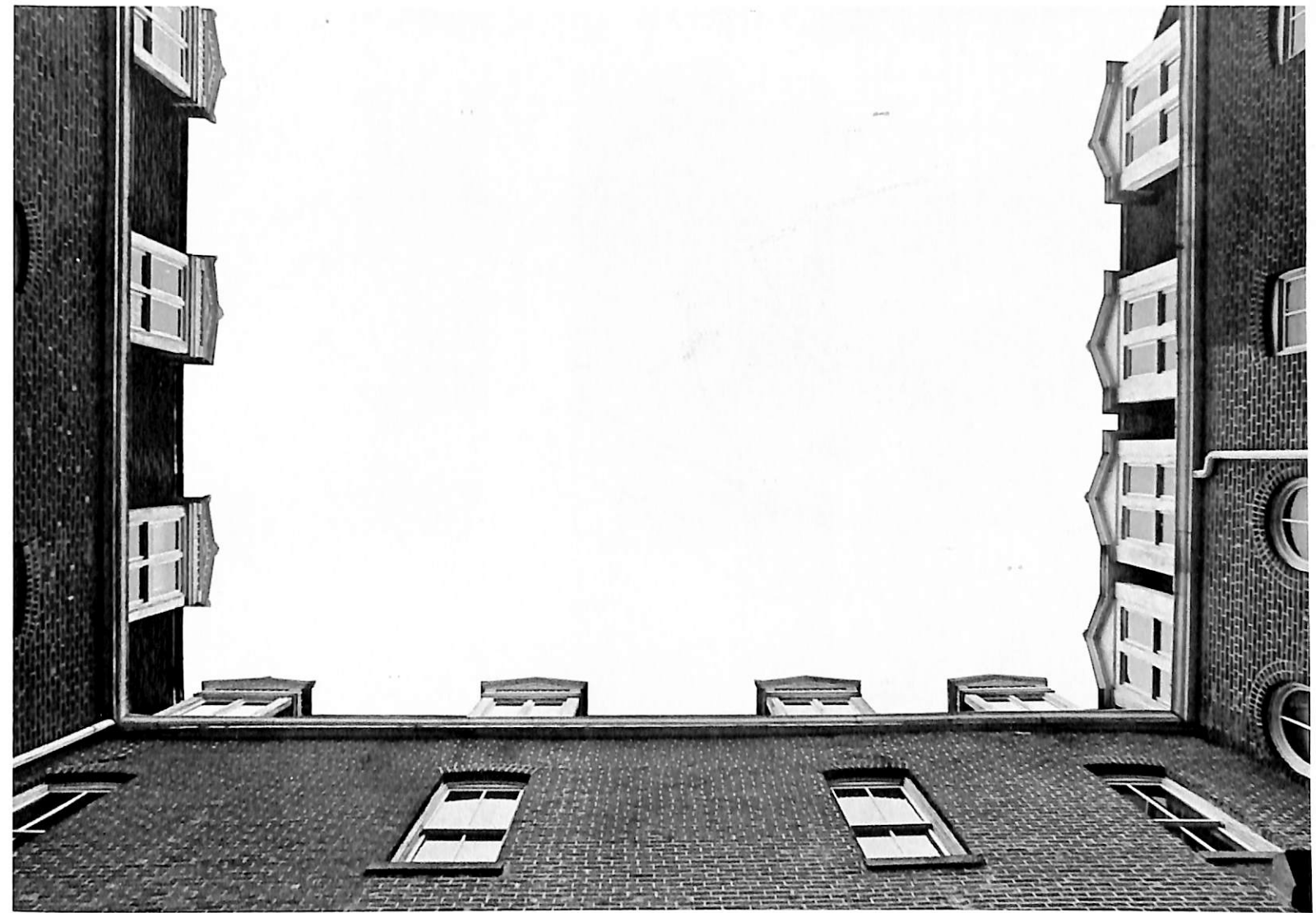

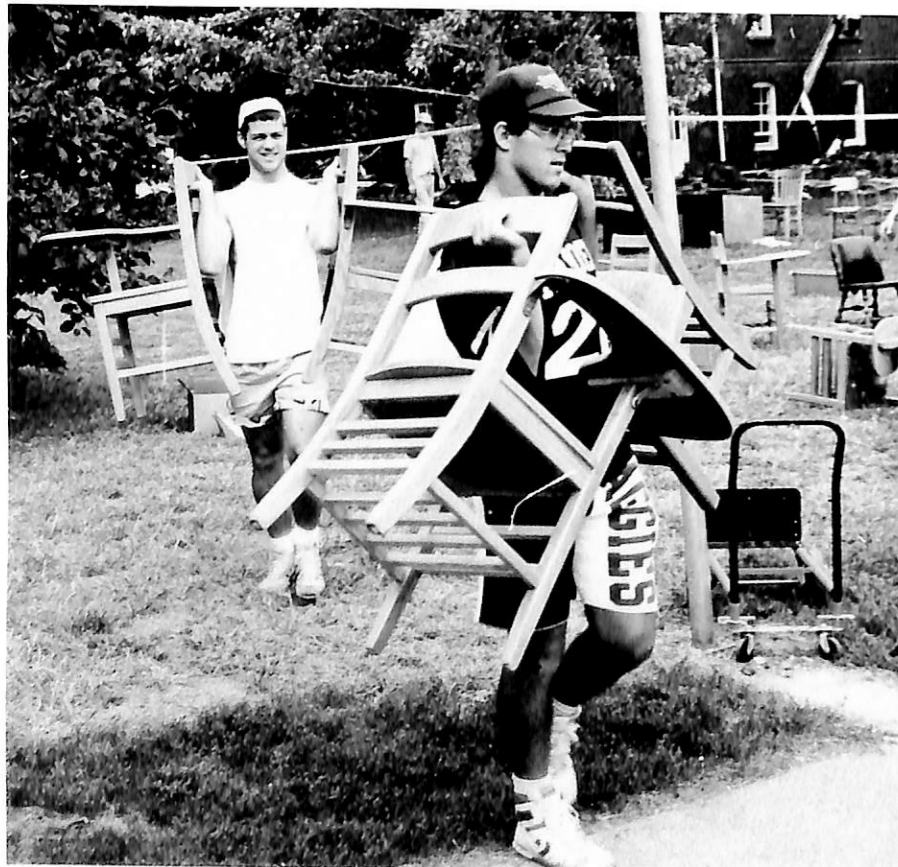

Lilly (Jorgensen '35) Sorensen, Nebraska City, Nebraska: "Many thoughts and memories flood my consciousness. I remember my first visit to Old Main in 1920 when I was seven years old. My uncle, Anders Jorgensen, was to graduate from Trinity Seminary in the spring. My family was visiting Pastor A.T. Schultz in Blair, my mother's brother. I remember the trip up the many stairs to Uncle Ander's room. It was Old Main that I was first introduced to Severin Sorensen, who later became my husband. Homecoming will give a moment of sadness, but we see great things for Dana over the horizon."

Joerg Nehter, Mayor, Bad Segeberg, West Germany: "My thoughts are with you in this moment. I hope it will be possible to rebuild Old Main as a symbol of Dana's mission to form and shape young lives through education."





John Beck '50, Director of Church Relations and Planned Giving: "Old Main was burning. The worst fears of generations of Danians were coming true. The shadows of the first students who used to carry coal to their fourth floor rooms and then worry about the threat of fire seemed to be dancing in the flames. Old Main was truly burning this time. I stood below on the hillside where I used to sleigh ride as a boy, wiped away a tear, and watched the hungry flames eating away at the mansard roof and licking at the edges of the Tower. I thought of my father, Marcus Beck, now 88, whose life has been so entwined with this building. Somewhere I have a picture of him as a five-year-old, standing on the emerging foundation of Old Main's south wing. The picture was taken with his grandfather, old Marcus Beck, in 1905. Dad attended Dana (class of '22), was on the commercial faculty for a year, was a co-chairman of the 1920's fund drive of the old gym (AMA), served two terms on the college Board of Trustees, and has always loved Dana deeply. He met the woman he was married to for nearly 60 years at Dana.

There were times in Dana's history when Old Main was the only warm place on the campus where a young couple could go on a cold winter's night and share some time alone. Many very strong marriages have come out of relationships with their roots in and around Old Main. I met my wife, Ginny, at Dana, as my brother, Marc, met his wife, Peggy, and my father met mother and our sons John and Eric came to know their wives.

Danians have had love affairs with truth, with knowledge, with the Christian faith and with other students over the years.

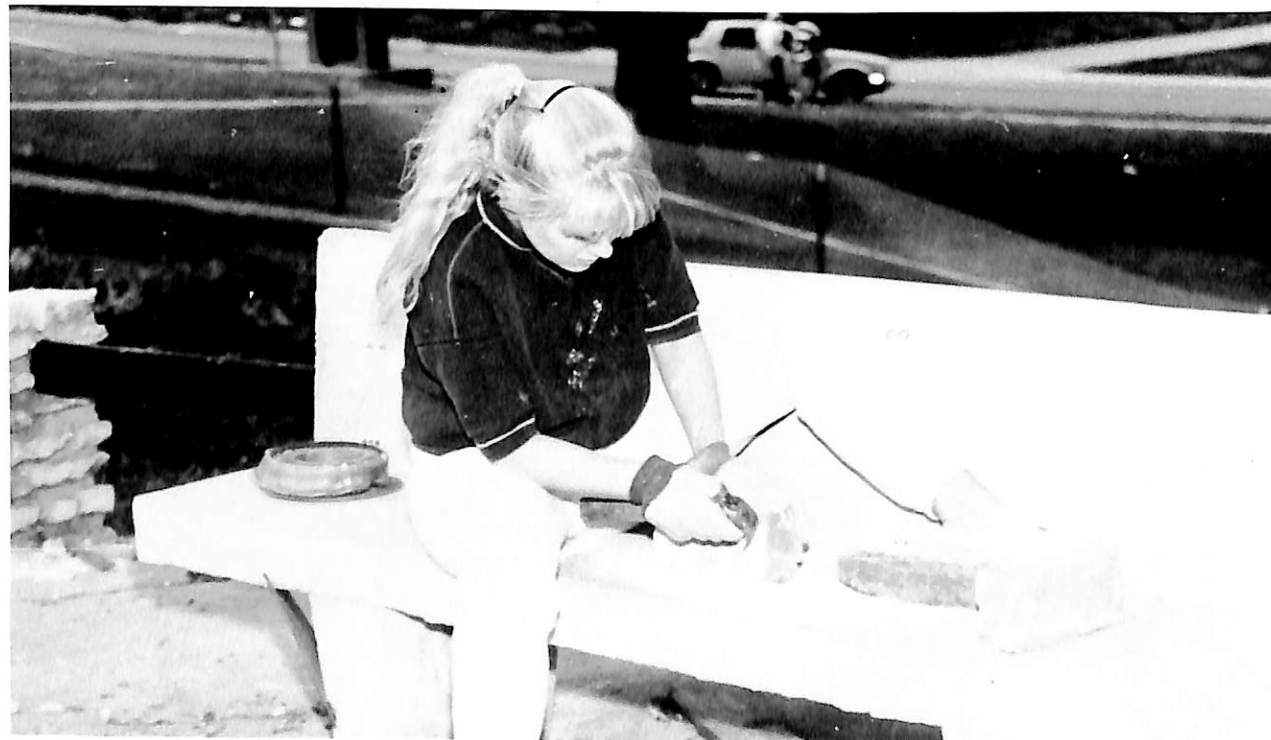
I stood below on the hill and watched those hungry flames . . . And then I noticed the man who stood next to me. And I was glad to see him, for he is a friend and I knew it was fitting that we should be standing here together. His name was John Wolsmann, his grandfather, also named John Wolsmann, was just getting started as a young immigrant and was working for my great grandfather, Marcus Beck. In the 1959 college history, "Saga of the Tower," Dr. William Christensen records information from an interview with John Wolsmann. He told of driving the team and wagon provided by Grandfather to haul bricks from the brickyard to the building site on the Hill. Is it pressing truth to think that Marcus Beck and John Wolsmann once stood on the hill, side by side, and gladly watched the Tower rise? I know that their two grandsons stood on the hill, side by side, and sadly watched the Tower burn.

"There's a rainbow!" someone shouted from the hillside. And truly, a rainbow's arc could be seen amidst the spray of the firehoses focused on the Tower. I am completely ready to affirm that Dana is not a building. I know that the numbing pain so many of us feel comes from the fact that Old Main and the Tower was such a powerful symbol of Dana College. It was a symbol, I believe of the dauntless spirit, of the deep Christian faith, of the firm moral courage, of the love of learning, of the desire for an educated clergy and laity, of the firmly held belief that faith and knowledge ought to be partners, and that the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom.

I thought of the five generations of our family that has been blessed by Dana College as I said goodbye to Old Main and the Tower. And I was thankful to God for Dana. Thankful that my children studied science from teachers who teach the sciences in a building that has a plaque in the entry way which reads:

And let those learn  
Who here shall meet  
True wisdom is with reverence  
crowned  
And science walks with  
humble feet,  
To seek the God which faith  
has found.

And I am certain that the pioneers who built Old Main and her Tower would be thankful for that too. It just may be that time is the "Dana difference."



Besides the many letters expressing people's thoughts about Old Main, donations from several people, institutions and companies from around the world were pouring into Dana. Many donations were given towards the building of a new structure for a greater Dana. Two major donations of \$250,000 each were given by HunTel Systems of Blair and Great Plains Communications also of Blair. Besides donations, the faculty, staff, students and many surrounding volunteers set to work salvaging and cleaning as many bricks as possible from the ruins of Old Main. These bricks were cleaned and a small plaque was placed on each brick. The bricks were then given away to people in hopes of a donation of \$25. The Dana Community pulled together during this time of pain and with strength from each other looked toward a future of a Greater Dana. A Dana that we always have been and always will be very proud of.

# Viking Football 1988

The Vikings football team has had winning seasons the past three years and have not lost a home game since 1985. The 1988 Vikings won six games and lost four close games, and were nationally ranked in the top twenty during most of the season.

The nationally ranked team played exciting football throughout the season. Four consecutive last-minute wins in the middle of the schedule kept crowds on the edges of their seat. At one of those games, homecoming crowds saw junior running back Bryan Muschall, 1987 All-American, carry the ball 95 yards for a fourth quarter touchdown that edged out Doane 31-26. The other fourth quarter victories were over: Tarkio (10-9) where James Anderson passed to junior Dean Norris who caught a tipped football for a touchdown, Hastings (9-7) Anderson passed to freshman Sean Dalton for touchdown in the last play of the game, and Dana beat Concordia (30-21) in the fourth quarter when Anderson threw a pass to Muschall for a touchdown and Scott Wagner ran for game clincher touchdown.

The Vikings finished second in Conference for the third year in a row. The 1988 Vikings were in every game and knew how to win. Those Vikings voted to the All-NIAC first team in football were: Terry Vieregger and Bryan Muschall on offense and Jeff Nelson, Mark Havermann, and Pat Chism on defense. After leading the nation in rushing last year, 191 pound junior Bryan Muschall was among the nation's top ten rushers all this season. Despite playing with nagging injuries all season, Muschall remained one of the top running backs in the nation. Muschall ended the season with 1053 yards on 225 carries, for an average of 4.7 yards per carry.

Mark Havermann was the dominant middle line-backer in the conference all season long. Junior Jeff Nelson earned all-conference honors for his play on the defensive line. Nelson, a 235 pounder, had 68 tackles and 47 assisted tackles. The Viking defensive backs were represented on the all-conference first team by sophomore Pat Chism. The five Vikings making the second-team all-NIAC football squad were: senior tight-end Terry Barber, senior wide receiver Paul Sanders, junior running back Marvin Peterson, junior defensive lineman Robert Bara and senior defensive back Tom Bolton.

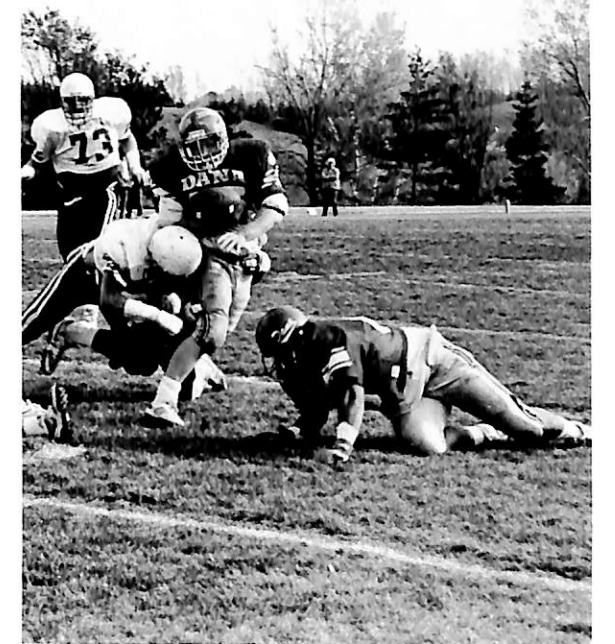
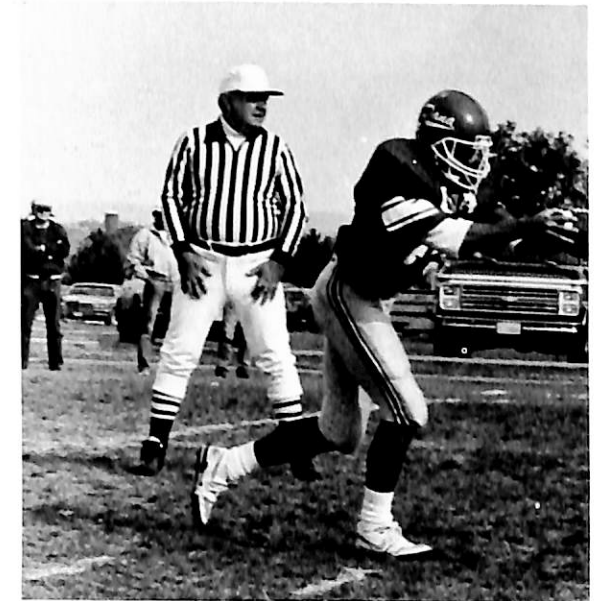

The Lady Viking Volleyball team, led by an outstanding freshmen class, finished the season with a record of 19-22. After last year's record smashing performance, which included a conference championship and a playoff spot for the first time ever, that may sound disappointing. But Coach Foley is quite pleased and anxious for the next few seasons to come.

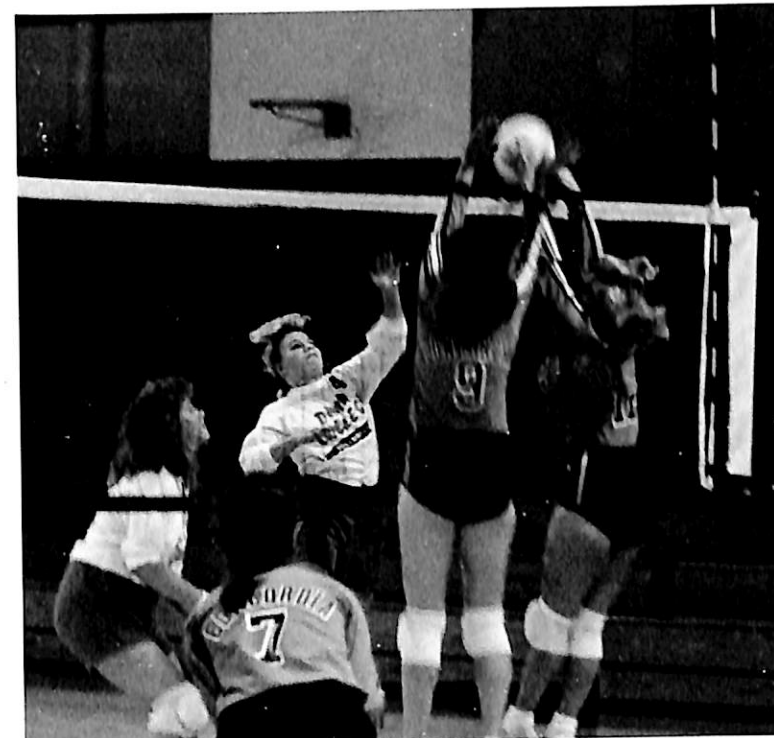
The reason for her optimism is the play of the Lady Viking underclassmen. Five of the six statistical categories were led by freshmen and sophomores. Freshman Elizabeth Felker led the team in kills per game with 3.48; Christy Wawrzyniak led in assists per game with 7.65. Freshman Kris Skelton and sophomore Deb Keller led the team in serving percentage with 90%. Deb Keller also led in passing with 92%. Sophomore Deb Rife led in blocks per game with 0.49. Lone senior Shari Bohling had 3.77 digs per game to lead in that category.

The Lady Vikings also had several team members in the district statistics. Elizabeth Felker and Sarah Masker were 5th and 6th respectively in kills per game. Christy Wawrzyniak was 7th in assists per game. Deb Keller was 10th in passing % and Shari Bohling was 6th in digs per game.

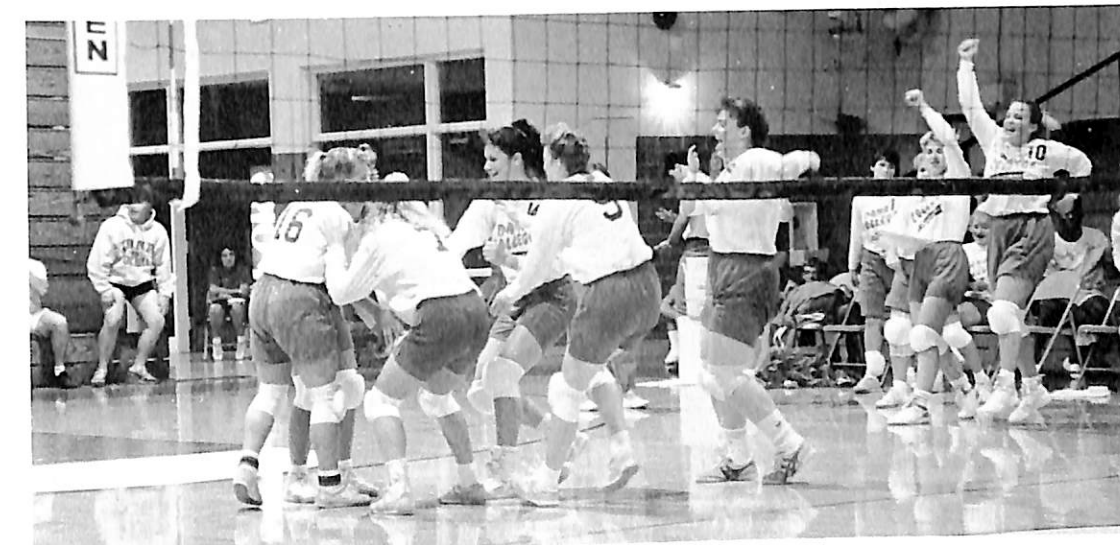
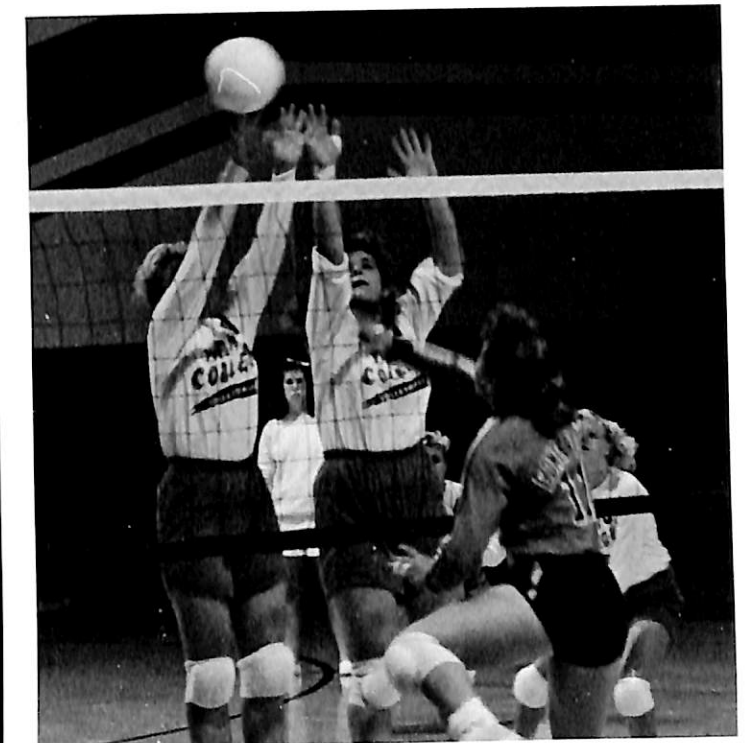
The team finished in the following positions in District team statistics: 8th in kills per game; 7th in assists per game; 1st in ace serves per game; 10th in serving percentage; 7th in passing percentage; 3rd in digs per game; 11th in blocks per game.

The team finished 3-7 in the conference and made the playoffs for the second year in a row. The only starter Dana loses is senior Shari Bohling, who Coach Foley says will be missed. "Shari did a great job for us on and off the floor, I wish she had another year. She's a good competitor and contributed a lot to the team."

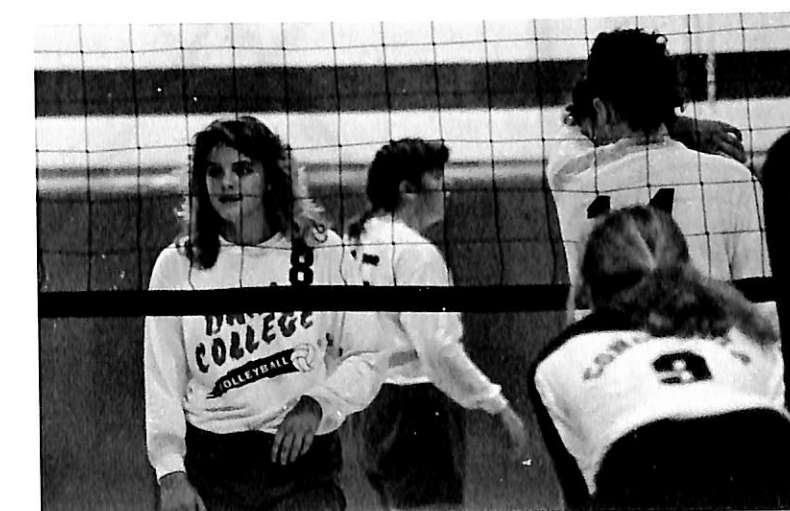
Kim Gosch attacks against Concordia, while Nikki Nizzi waits to block.

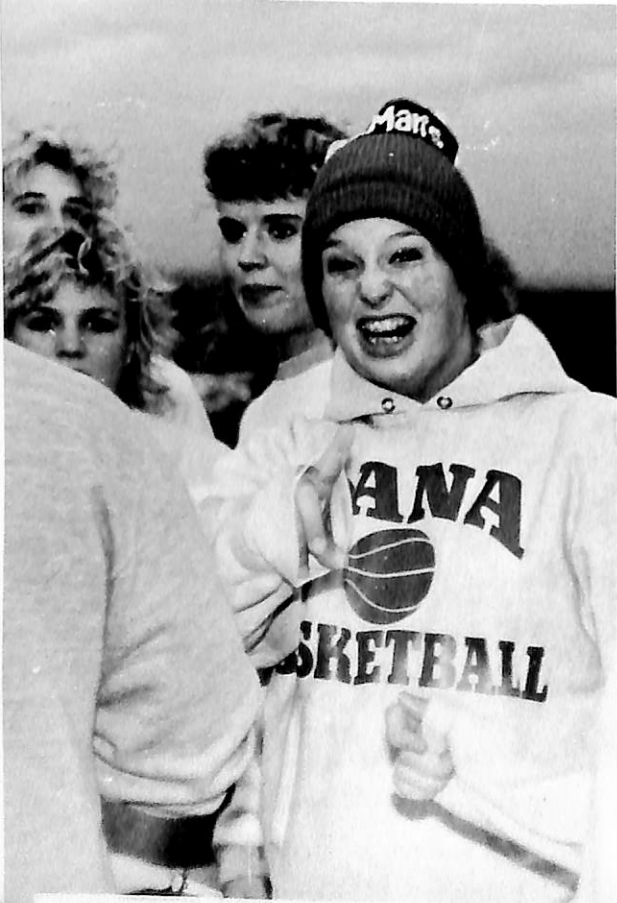
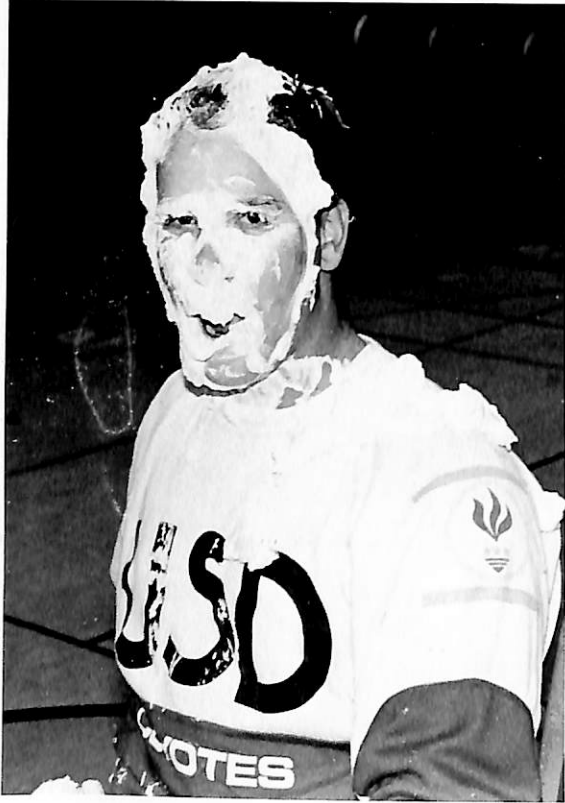

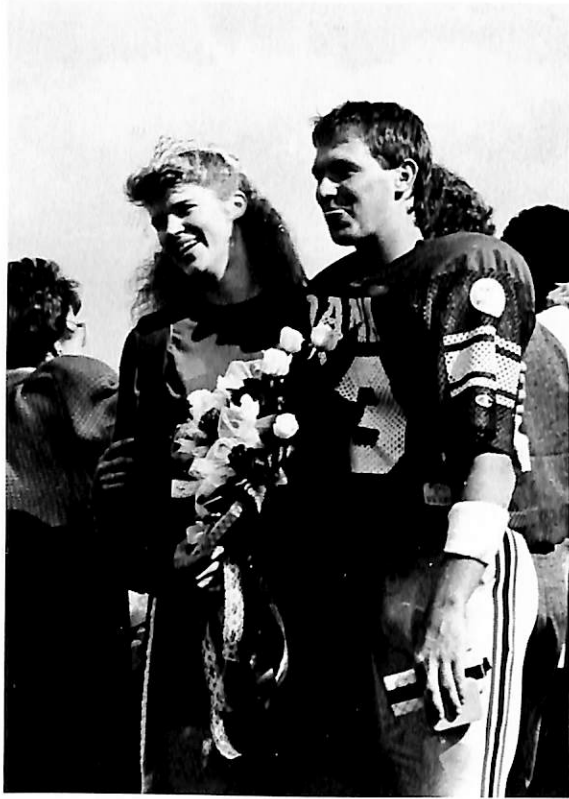

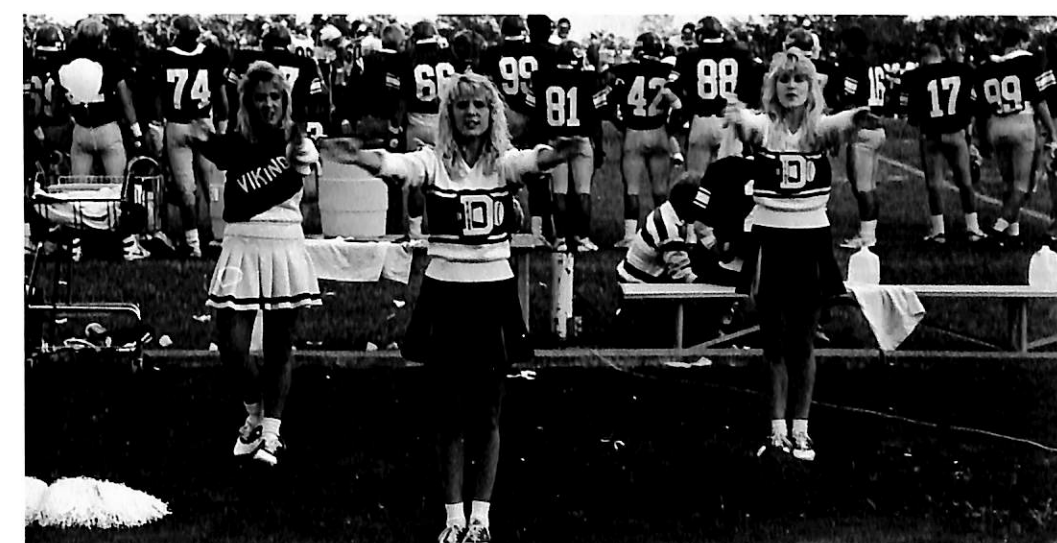

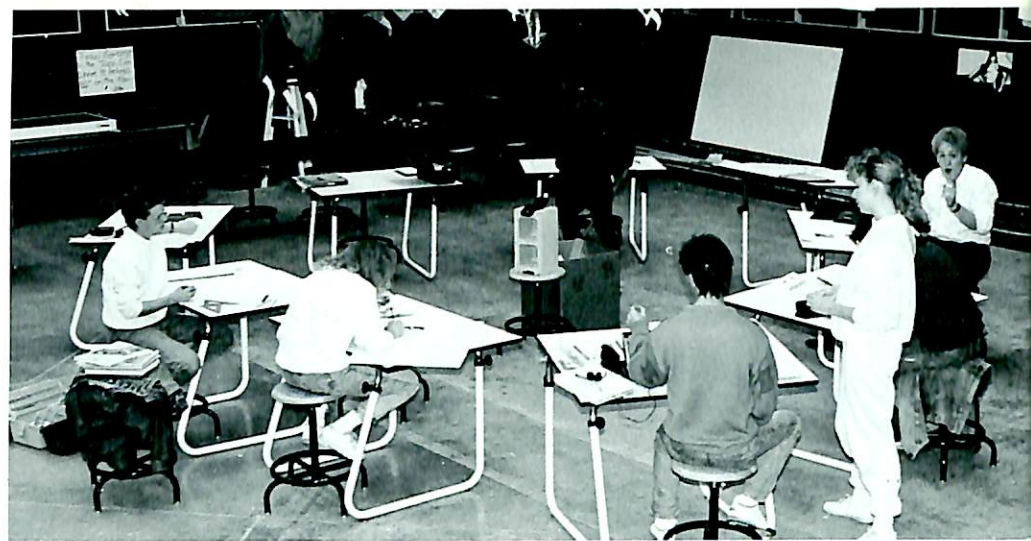

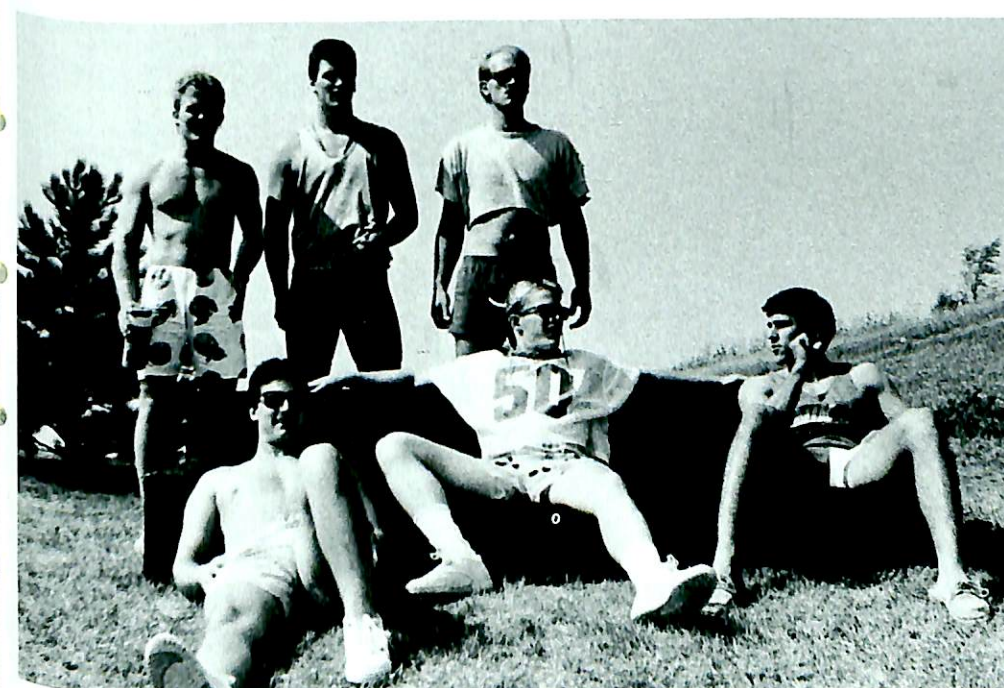

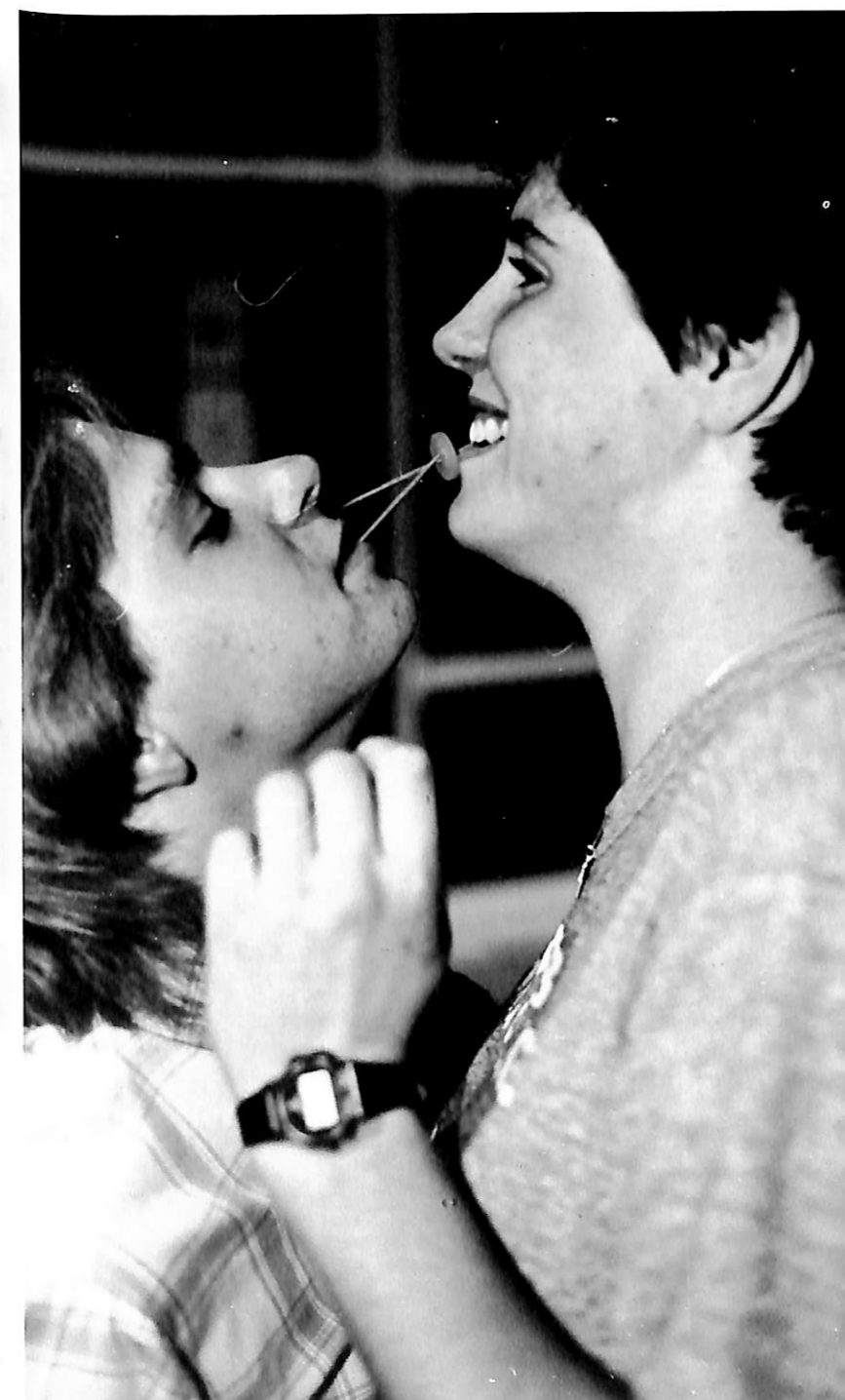

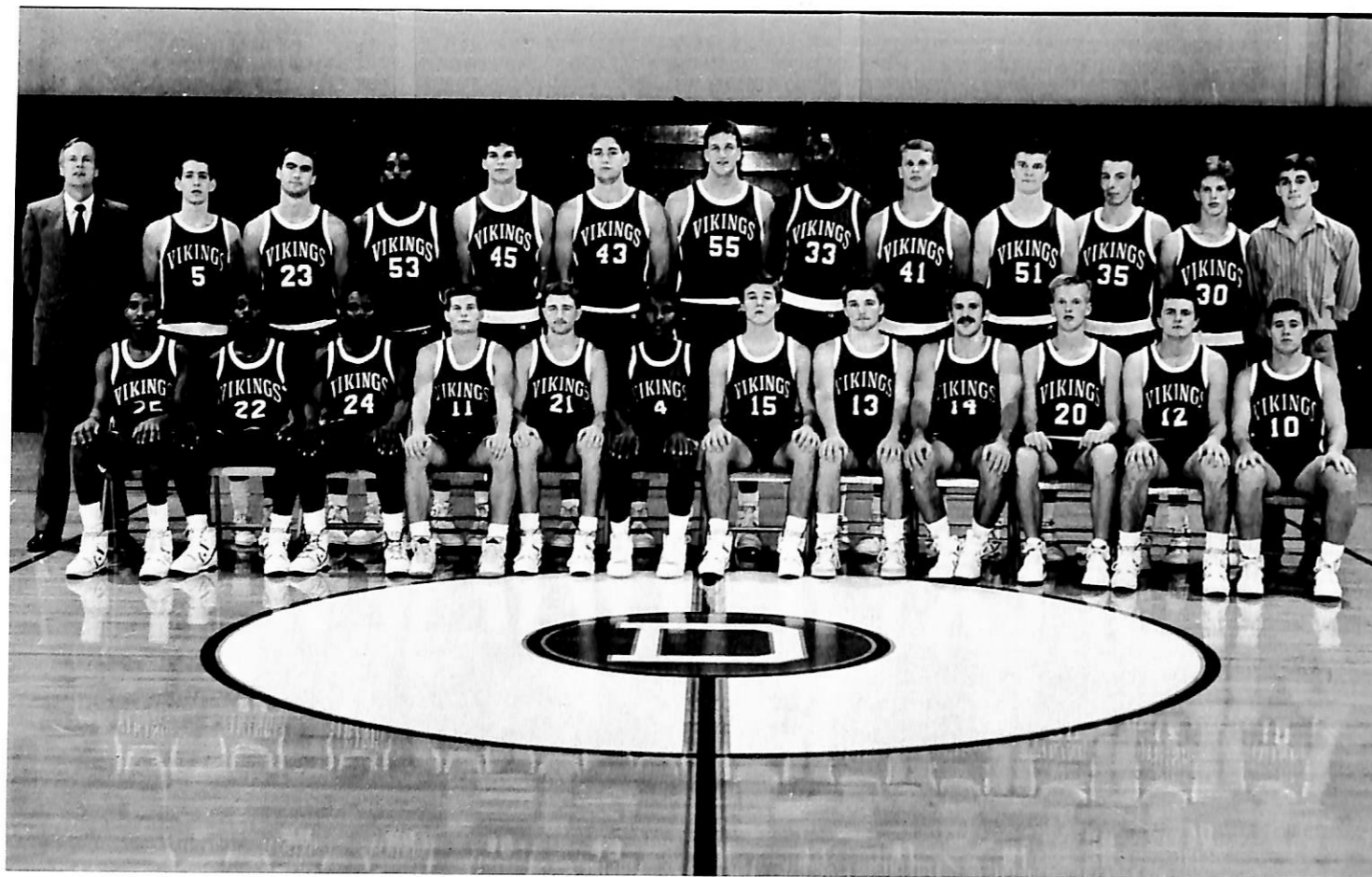

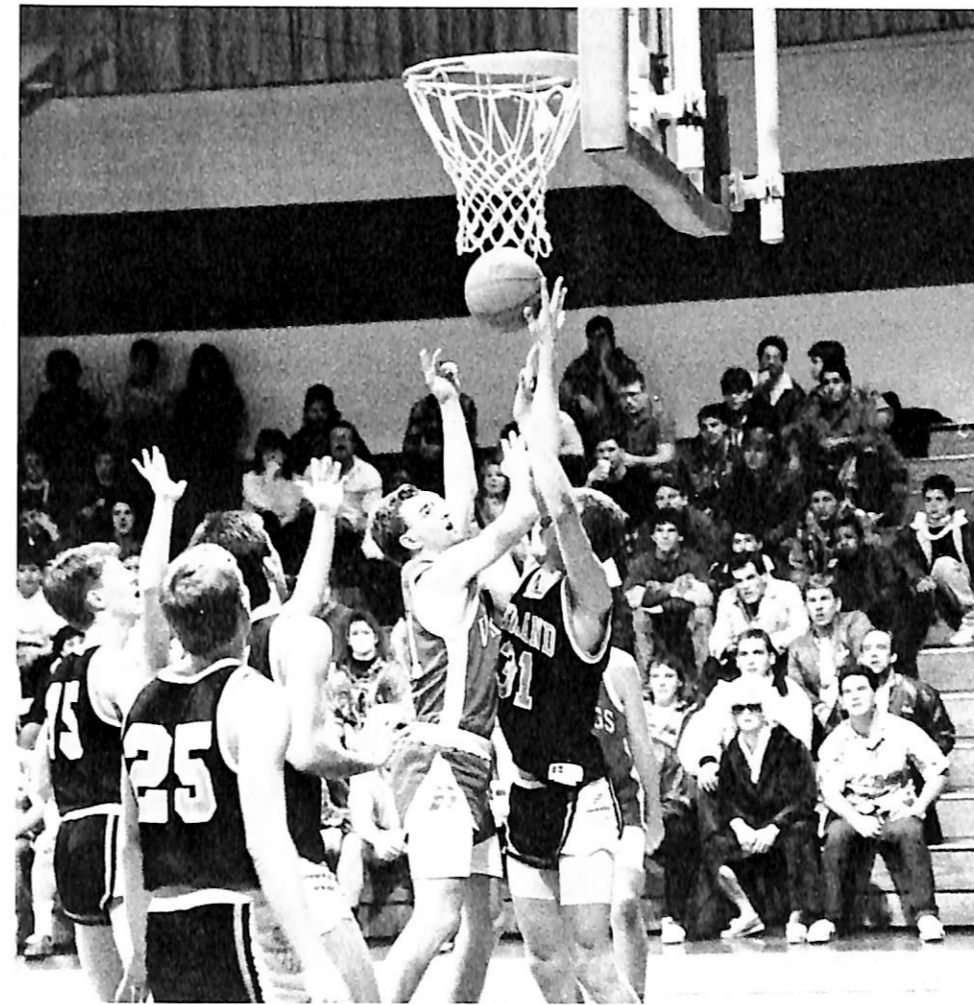

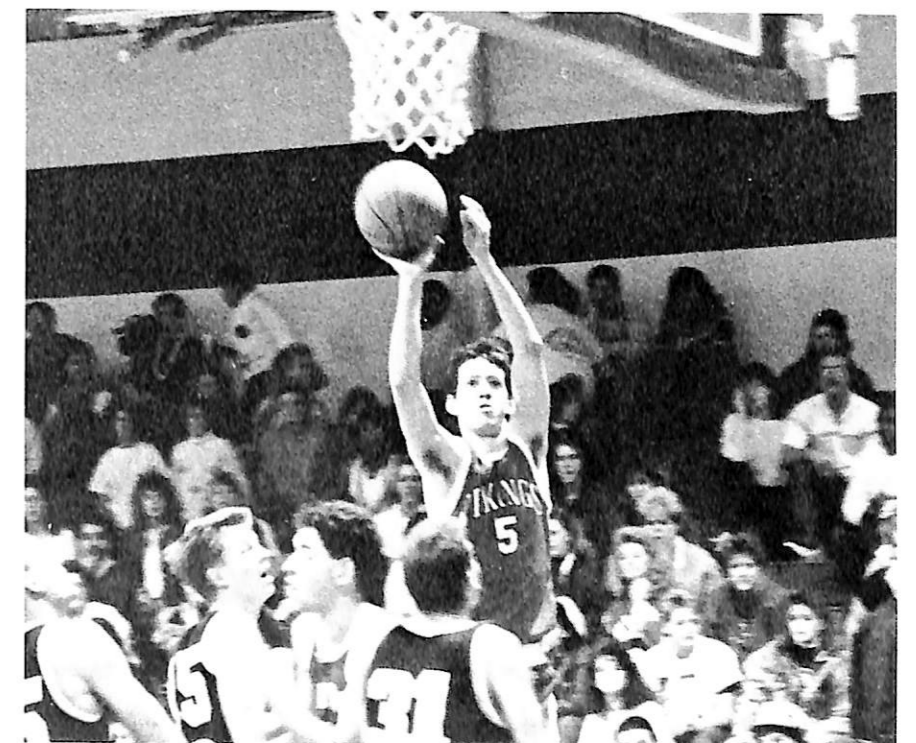
