


Danish National Gymnastics Team Exhibition






ONWARDMARCH. As part of their Dana performanace the Danish Gymnasts diplayed some of their addictive energy. This was one of the stops on their international tour.

OUT FOR THE KILL. Several of the Dana Vikings bulldozed a Midland Warrior. Dana gave it their all, but still ended up losing the game.



Athletic Banquet

The Dana College fall sports athletic banquet was hed in the campus center to recongnize excellence in the arena and the classroom for Vikings athletes.

Special team awards were presented for football, volleyball and cross country as the gathering of around 200 people brought an official close to the 1994 fall sports season. In addition, 20 Dana students-athletes were recognized for outstanding academic performances in their studies. Anna Hovde and Ben Sandy were named most valuable womens and men's runners for the Dana cross country team. Shannon LaFave received the leadership award for the Viking runner.

Mike Haddock was selected as the most valuable player (MVP) for the Viking football team. Chris Hollibaugh was named the special teams MVP. Brett Williams was selected as the most inspiritional player.

Stephenie Wilson was named the MVP for the volleyball team and also received the team's spirit award.

The Vikings Scholar Award is the highest academic honor a Dana student-athlete can receive. Student-athletes must be at least a sophomore academically but may be in their first year of athletic participation. Individuals in their third or fourth year of academic eleigibility who earn a Viking Scholor Award also qualify for consideration as a National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Scholor-Athlete at the national level.

The Viking Honor Roll Award is presented to Dana student-athletes with a cumulative grade-point average between 3.0 and 3.49. These individuals must be at least a sophomore academiclly to qualify for this award. Recipients of this award include: (for cross country) LeFave, Josephat Mwatotele, (for football) Joe Stretch, Travis Davidson, Ryan Lieb, Ken Swanson, (for volleyball) Angie Heise, Melanie Hild, Stacy Haas, Kristi Niemier and Dawn Bernzen.

Dana Presented Plaque for Buiding World's Largest Sub-sandwich

Sid Wertheim, president and founder of Little King, Inc., presented Dana College with a plaque Monday for achieving the record for producing the world's largest submarine sandwich.

The sandwich, 252 feet long, was buit last semeter on April 27, which beat out Little King's record of 240 feet. The sandwich too four and one-half hours to make. It also took approximately 960 lbs. of meet, 722lb. of cheese, 100lb. of lettuce, 80 lbs. of tomatoes and about 60 people. The sandwich was eaten by Dana students that night and the leftovers were donated to the Open Door Mission in Omaha.

Wertheim had an inscription of a message to Dana on the plaque. It reads: "To the students of Dana College, from the King of sub-sandwiches. In honoring Dana College for achieving the World Record for producing the Largest Submarine Sandwich." Dana's record had already been broken by another school but Dana was the first Nebraska school to break the record. 


The Dana Theatre Department was busy during the spring semester as well. Students were able to participate in The Gingerbread Lady and The Tempest.





A few of the dancers wore dresses with jingles on them for the Jingle Dress Dance. These are made into cones from chewing tobacco cans and then painted to go with the outfit.

The Dana studnets made a great turnout at the performance and many hope SAO can bring them back again.







Grappendorf tops 1,000 points

The Dana women's basketball team started its 1995 season with a 7-3 record, including a 54-53 victory against the Plainswomen of Nebraska Wesleyan. The Vikings came back from a 12 point deficit in the second half to win in the final minute of the game. Senior Heidi Grappendorf led the team with 25 points.

On Jan. 10, the Vikings hosted Midland Lutheran College. Dana led 42-41 at the half but Midland was able to pull out from behind in the second half and win 87-78.

The Vikings then headed to Northwestern College in Orange City, Iowa to take on the Red Raiders. The Vikings were down at intermission 46-34 but they waged a comeback near the end of the second half to tie the game at 73-73. The contest was sent into overtime where the Red Raiders outscored the Vikings 13-9 for an 86-82 win.


On Jan. 16, the Dana women rebounded from their two game losing streak when they defeated York College in Borup Coliseum. The Lady Panthers tied the game at 49-49 with 11:26 left to play. A couple baskets by sophomore Nichol Buenning gave the Vikings the lead and their eventual 85-71 win. The next day, Dana defeated Mount Marty, S.D. 72-67 in their rematch in Borup.

Heidi Grappendorf was named player-of-the-week by the NIAC (Nebraska Iowa Athletic Conference) for her work against Midland and Northwestern. Grappendorf hit 8-of-9 three-point field goals at Northwestern, setting a new school record for three-point efficiency (.889, minimum five attempts) and tied the single-game record for made three-pointers (8) established by Katie Corbitt against Graceland, Iowa in the 1990/1991 season. She also joined Corbitt as the only Dana players to make over 100 career treys (Grappendorf had 110). The senior guard scored 28 points at Northwestern after hitting for 22 against Midland.

The Vikings travelled to Seward to take on the Concordia Bulldogs on Jan. 20. The game was tied at the half 27-27, but Concordia outscored Dana 29-28 in the second half to give them a 56-55 victory.

On Jan. 22 the Vikings lost another home game when they went against Hastings College. The Vikings stayed close the entire game, leading 39-38 at half time. Hastings defeated Dana 77-75 in the end. Grappendorf went over 1,000 points during the first half.




Scene from the play "The Gingerbread Lady".





A New Look for Parnassus

A new classroom in Pioneer Memorial was opened this spring. The room is also known as Parnassus, which many students call "the old Forum." The name Parnassus was first introduced by Dr. John W. Nielsen, who was the director of the humanities program at Dana College from 1973 to 1985. Parnassus derives its name from Mt. Parnassus in Greece. It is known as the "home of Muses" and inspires people who have strong interests and talents in the field of humanities.

According to Professor James Olsen, who served as the director of humanites program from 1986 to 1993, Parnassus used to be the center of various humanities activities on the Dana campus.

"The humanities program included fields in art, history, literature, music, philosophy and religion," said Olsen. "It was to encourage students to embrace and accumulate their knowledge in all academic disciplines."

To enhance the program, Dana faculty also formed an integrated teaching team to organize activites such as exhibitions, presentations, lectures, discussions and recitals. "Parnassus was a great hub for all the activities," said Olsen.

Most of the activites held in Parnassus now take place in The Forum after the opening of the new building in 1993. Parnassus was remodeled and used as a classroom with approximataly seventy seats. According to the registrar's office, the new classroom is now used for interpersonal communication classes and LARP.

Students who have classes in Parnassus described it as a nice, clean and open place. "It is big enough for a class of forty," said senior Nicole Alfredson. "But also easy to find a small corner for group discussions."


A stirring comeback win over a nationally-ranked team and a national ranking for Dana high-lighted the 1994 Viking football season as Coach Jim Krueger and the Dana gridders finished with a 3-7 overall record and a 1-5 mark in Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) play. The Vikings were dramatically more competitive this fall as Krueger's rebuilding efforts continueDana whipped Dakota Wesleyan 42-19 of opening day and then rallied to stop NAIA Division II #25 Benedicitine (Ks.), 28-27. Both of those teams had beaten Dana soundly in'93and the two wins to open the season put Dana at #25 in the national NAIA Division II rakings for one week.

Peru State handed Dana its first loss in the Applejack Bowl at Nebraska City and the Vikings did not taste victory again until 41-35 NIAC win over Concordia five weeks later. Among the losses were narrow setbacks at Doane and at home against Nebraska Wesleyan, Hastings and NIAC champ Northwestern (Ia.) topped Dana on the final two Saturdays of the season, although Dana put an obstacle into the Red Raiders' championship drive before falling,50-35.

Offensive lineman Brett Williams and fullback Mike Haddock were named first-team all conference for a second straight year and linbacker Jeff Buck and defensive end Jeff Jones also earned first-team recongition. Jones was the only sophomore on the all-conference elite team-Running back Jessie Walker and cornerback Chris Hollibaugh were named second team while honorable mention went to seven Dana players² Neal Anthony (DE), Wade Daggett (WR), Lee Heimes (WR), Terrance Hill (NT), Bruce Kearney (CB), Matt Ganders (G), and Joe Stretch (DT)-Haddock scored 14 touchdowns on the year, a new school record, and his 88 points ranks second all-time for a single seson behind Mark⁴ Thomsen's 92 points in 1950. Haddock rushed for 1,107yards to move past Marion Hudson into second place on the Dana career rushing chart-


An All-American performance helped Dana to its best-ever finish at the NAIA national Wrestling Championship, March 10-11, in Jamestown, North Dakota.

Sophomore Andy Hensley became Dana's fourth All-American wrestler by placing third at 167 pounds at the nation meet. His only loss in six matches at nationals came to the eventual champion and he recorded four pins in his five victories. Hensley was also an NAIA area champion and won 18 of his final matches to finish the year at 22-9. He joins Scott Stickler (1994), Trent Gutschenritter (1987) and Virgil Watson (1979) as a wrestling All-American from Dana. Hensley's third place finish was the best in school history for a Viking wrestler at nationals.

Another national qualifier for Dana, junior Brent Johnson received NAIA Scholar Athlete honors by going to the national meet as a junior or senior with a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or above. Johnson went 0-2 at 142 pounds at nationals.

Also qualifying for Dana were Chad Caskey, junior, 126 pounds 2-2 at nationals; D.J. Walton, 126 pounds, sophomore, Cresent, Iowa,0-4 at nationals; T.C. Aguilar, 150 pounds, sophomore, Grand Island, 1-2 at nationals; Chase Roller, 275 pounds, sophomore 0-2 at nationals. Wild-card entrants Shawn Bluml and Justin Smith were winless in two matches at nationals for Dana.

The Vikings, who had a 3-9-1 dual record on the season, placed 17th at the NAIA meet for the highest nationals finish in the history of Dana's wrestling program. The Vikings tied for second with Northwestern IA at the Tri-State (conference) Meet and finished at an NAIA Area Tourament held at Borup Coliseum on February 18. Dana defeated Northwestern, William Penn, IA and St. Thomas, MN for its three dual victories on the season.






Although the strides forward taken by the Dana men's basketball team were smaller than hoped for, the 1994/95 Vikings contunued to move the Dan program loser to the upper echelon of the Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC).

Dana finished the year 15-16 overall and 5-7 in the NIAC, good for a fourth-place tie with Doan in conference. It was the best league finish for the Vikings since 1986/87 and, for a second straight year, dana finished with a game of the .500 mark for the season. The 31 wins in the last two years equals the most ever racked up in back-to-back seasons by a Dana team, first accomplished by the 1985/86 and 1986/87 squads. The Vikings closed out the season with a 99-85 loss at Concordia, racked#2 nationally in NAIA Divison II, in the semi-finals of the NIAC postseason tournament. Dana had defeated Northwestern in a first round game at Borup Coliseum, 99-93, for its third win of the season over the Rec Raiders. The scarlet-and-white also swept two games from Mildland Lutheran to run its winning streak against the Warriors to five. Dana Defeated Doane, 83-81, in a NIAC thriller at Borup n February 11.

The Vikingswent 10-4 at home this year, the best borup record since the 86/87 team went 11-2 at the coliseum. The Vikings were 10-9 in nonconference games and placed second in apair of holoday tournaments. Among the losses for Dana this year were three to Concordia, two to Hastings (ranked #9 in thefinal NAIA Division II pool) and one at Northern State, the #1 NAIA Division II team heading into the national tournament Dana also suffered five-point road losses at NCAA Division II schools Wayne State (in overtime) and Nebraska-Omaha.

Sophomore Nathan babbitt earned All-NIAC first-team honors this year while three other players, jason Jackson, m Rob Coursey and Shaw¹¹ Fasbender, were honorable nention all-conference. Babbitt led Dana in scoring this season (18.7 points per game) while Fasbender wa the top rebounder (7.5 per gam) for the Vikiongs. Jackson dishedout a team-high 129 assists while Coursey was second on the team in scoring and assist and was the only player to start all 31 games this season.

Three seniors, Coursey, Jackson and Tony Collins, finished their careers this swason, Coursey ended up as the #7 all-trime scorer at Dana with 1,322 points. Jackson finished his two-year career at dana with 245 assists, fifth all-time, and Collisns completed his career at the holiday break with 1,721 points, the thrid highest total ever at Dana.

Women's Basketball

Coming off a 10-point loss at home to Northwestern Feb. 7, Dana's women's basketball team travelled to Missouri to challenge Avila College, hoping to duplicate a blowout that occurred earlier this month in Borup Coliseum. The Vikings took with them an 11-11 record, and hoped to break .500 with a repeat performance against Avile.

Dana struggled in the first half of the game, shooting just 27% from the field before warming into a respectable 46% second half production. The team was led in scoring by Heidi Grappendorf, who had 19 points, just under her conference-leading season averaging of 19.5. Jennifer Dierks added 10 points while Susan Weddingfeld and Nicole Buenning had eight and seven points respectively.



Cross Country and Track

The sport of cross country returned to Dana in the fall of '94 for the first time in over a decade as new coach Birmingham and a small squad with big ambitions competed in seven meets on the year.

First-year runner Ben Sandy led the Viking Harriers this season, winning the Highland (Ks.) Invitational and placing in the top six individually at two other meets. Sandy contended for a national meet qualifying spot at the Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference (NIAC) championships in November, but faded late in the race due to amdonimal pains after running fourth place for five qualifying spots for much of the race. Josephat Mwatotele, Austin Brown, Shannon LeFave and Matt Cox completed Dana men's squad.

Anne Hovde was Dana's top female runner, leading the vikings in all the meets she entered, including a fourth-place finish at the Highland (Ks.) Invitational. Two other first-year runners, Angie Sparacino and Valerie Bensen, competed for the Viking women this fall.




Graduation '95





This was also the big day for al the seniors who would be taking that final walk out of this chapter in their lives. Emotions were high as family and friends watched the graduates cross the stage.


