
# Discover the Magic


Saturday's activities started with the first annual golf cart parade. Campus organizations had the chance to decorate golf carts and then drive their parade "floats" around the oval






Gaedlig Jul! Merry Christmas!








# **Student Activities**









# **Hermes**






# **Student Senate**



















# makin'points sports




