




















# Graduation "Class of 1999"










# Diplomats




During the Presidential Scholarship Competition, diplomat Marc Bierbaum leads a group of prospective students and their families through the classroom center.









### Runners Surprise Country, Take Fifth at Nationals

The men's cross country team experienced a rewarding end to their successful season. The Vikings place fifth at the Nationals meet held November 21 in Kenosha, Wis., and had one All-American, Scott Stanley. Stanley, who finished with a time of 24:55 and placed 11th, seta new Dana record on any course. According to coach Jay Birmingham, the team ran well.

"We were ranked ninth going into the race, and we placed fifth," said Birmingham. "I think we surprised a lot of



people by doing so well. No other team moved four places higher than their ranking."

Dana's Nationals squad consisted of Stanley and six others, Matt Poulter, Bob Spangler, Justin Christensen, Derek Fey, Evan Bees, and Aaron Schlote. Schlote, who ran the final 1.5 miles with only one shoe, having lost the other after another runner stepped on his heel, still managed to finish ahead of many of the 325 total runners.

"The Nationals course is not an easy one," said Birmingham. "Most of our runners ran their personal best times."

Also participating at the Nationals meet was Tiffani Nielsen, who ran her best race of the season. Only the third Dana woman to compete at Nationals, Nielsen came in just 38 seconds after the last All-American.

### Two Arrests Rock Campus and Community

An investigation led Blair police officers to suspect that two senior chemistry majors, Nathan Olsen and Kevin Brennan, had been manufacturing a controlled substance, GHB (Gamma-Hydroxybutyrate), in a laboratory in their dorm rooms and were distributing it on campus and to local high school students. The two were arrested at the college and charged with Manufacture of a Controlled Substance and Distribution of a Controlled Substance. Prior to the arrests, police officers had contacted Brennan and Olsen at the college, and they gave evidence and statements that indicated that they had indeed manufactured and distributed the drug.

On the morning of December 8, 1998, the Blair Police department assisted by Agents of the III Corps Drug and Violent Crime Task Force investigated the GHB overdose of a Blair High School student. This student had been given the drug at school by another student and became ill, prompting school officials to call an ambulance. He was taken to the Memorial Community Hospital in Blair, where he was admitted into the Intensive Care Unit. This overdose sparked the investigation. A search warrant was served, and component chemicals, completed GHB, drug paraphernalia, papers relating to the purchase of chemicals, and recipes for several illegal drugs, including LSD, were seized from Olsen's room.

Brennan and Olsen were ordered to stand trial for felony charges. The two could face up to 20 years in prison and/or a \$25,000 fine if convicted. At press time, the trial date was unknown.

Although the Miss Nebraska title carried many responsibilities, Lemmerman was able to keep Dana as her "home base" and remain an active member of Chorale and theater.

### Dana Loses Active, Dedicated Student

A familiar face was missing on campus this year. While waiting for a bone marrow transplant, James Peterson died on May 30, 1998.

A Dana College sophomore hailing from Viborg, S.D., James was majoring in broadcast media with minors in history and political science. He was a very active member of the Dana community, participating in the *Hermes*, DVTV, KDCV radio, and Fellowship of Christian Athletes. At the awards banquet last spring, James received two Golden Leaf Awards for excellence in sports media broadcasting.

A scholarship was established in memory of James, and the 1998-99 Student Senate donated \$500.





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

Thirteen players were named to the NIAC all-conference teams, including Joel Carter, Biff Schofield and Chad Hansen who earned first team honors.


















# Wrestling Wing




Grappling with his opponent, Nick Tostenson makes a move to avoid the pin during a home wrestling meet in Borup Coliseum.



The Dana track and field teams shattered 22 records and collected numerous medals in six indoor and six outdoor meets this season according to Coach Jay Birmingham. Overall 28 athletes competed; 23 individuals broke a total of 98 personal records.

Sophomore Justin Christensen set a new school record in the 3,000-meter steeplechase with a time of 9:29.08. Junior Scott Stanley broke his own school record in the 1,500, turning a 3:55.6 performance. Sophomore Tiffani Nielsen repeatedly topped previous Dana bests in the 3,000 and 5,000-meter runs, setting the new standards at 10:40.67 and 18:22, respectively. Nielsen also helped junior Sarah Klein, freshman Renee Boman and freshman Natalie Flynn break the women's 4x400 relay school record. Boman set her own record in the 400 as well. Junior Amber Weber established a new record in the heptathalon during a meet at Nebraska Wesleyan.

Seven Vikings qualified for the NAIA national championships held in late May in Palm Beach Gardens, Fla.: Christensen, Nielsen, Stanley, Aaron Schlote, Bob Spangler, Allen Wagner and Derek Fey.




