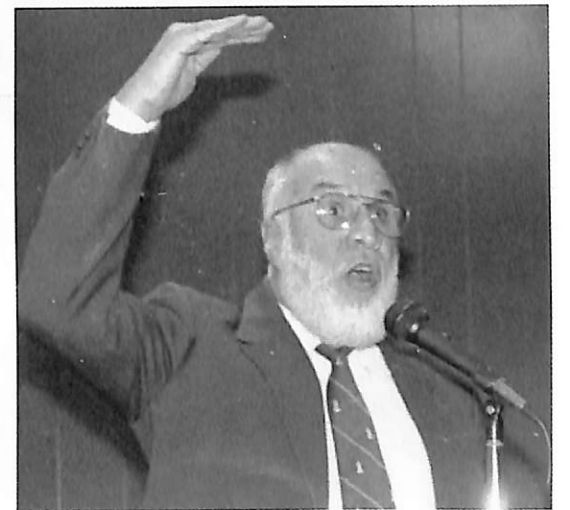
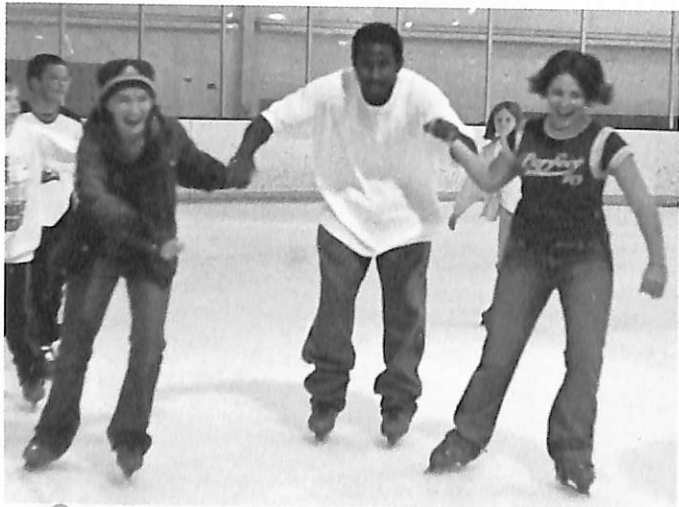
Life at Dana

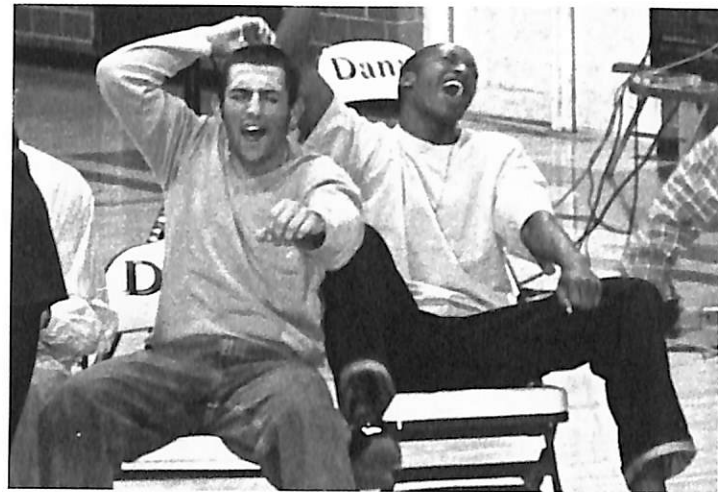

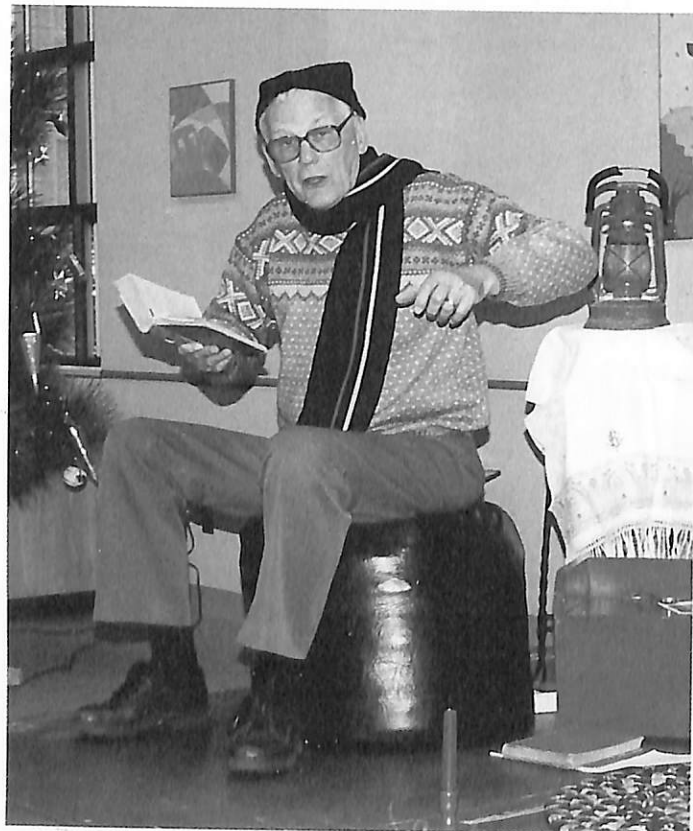

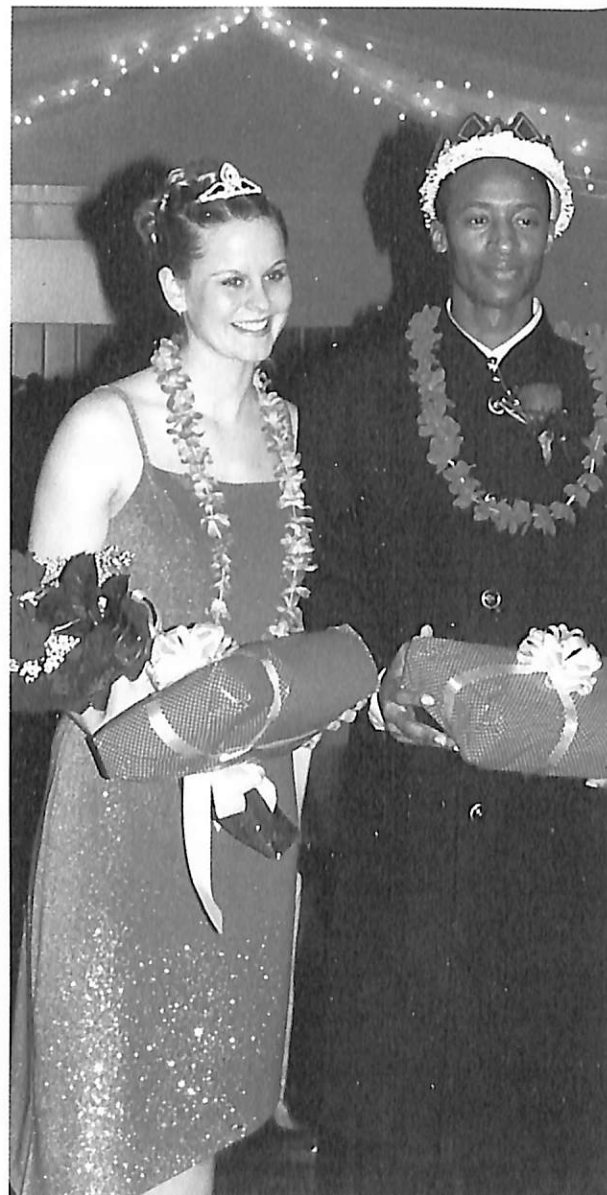
Winterfest: A Tropical Paradise

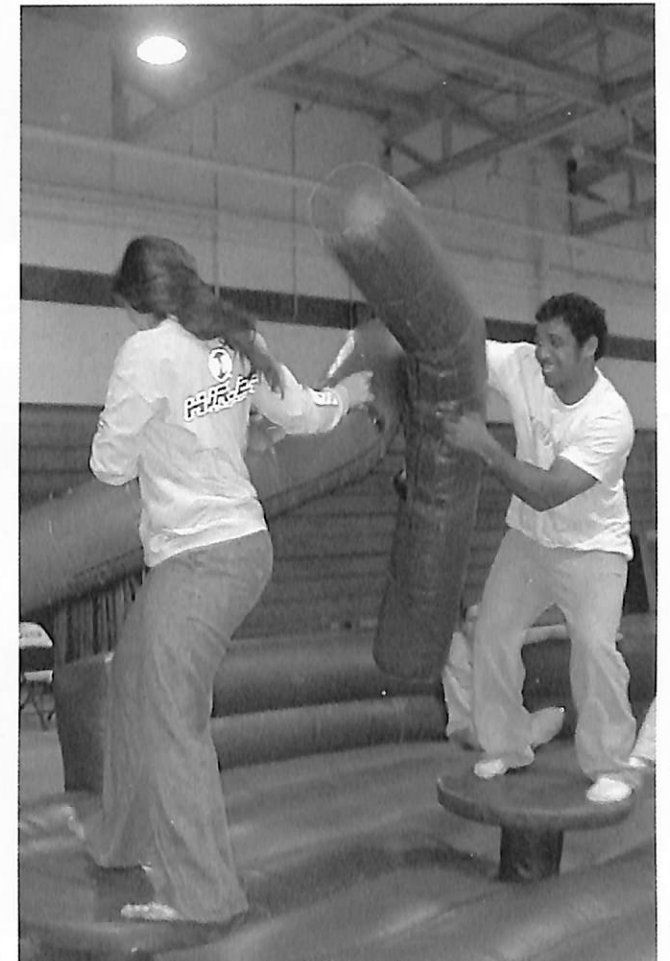
Spring Fling

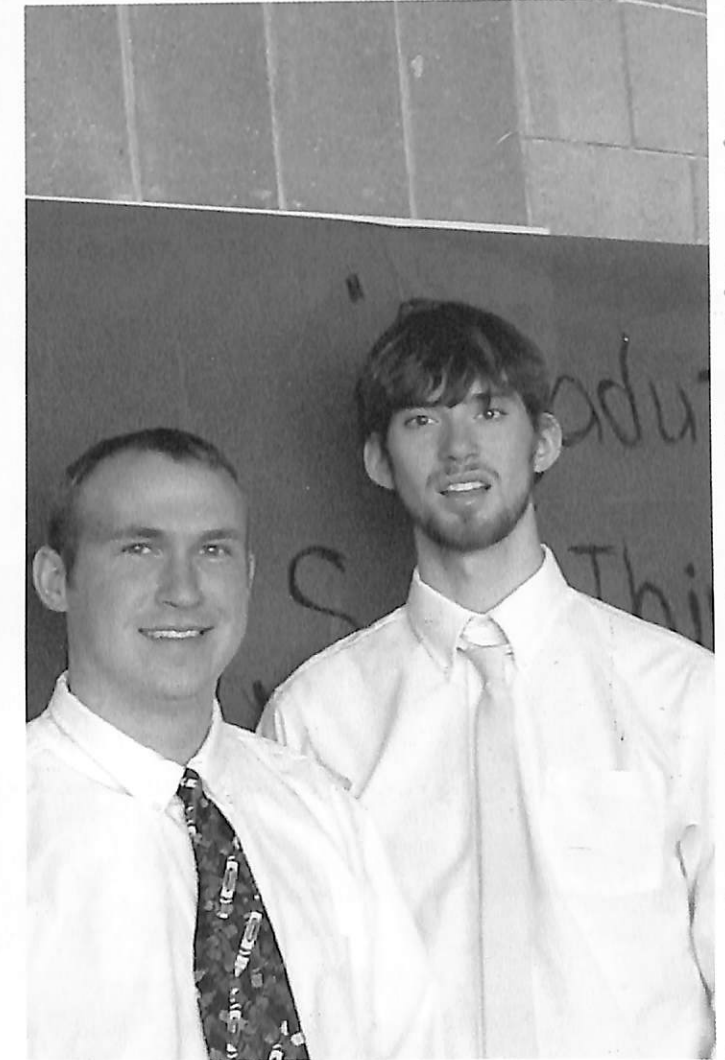
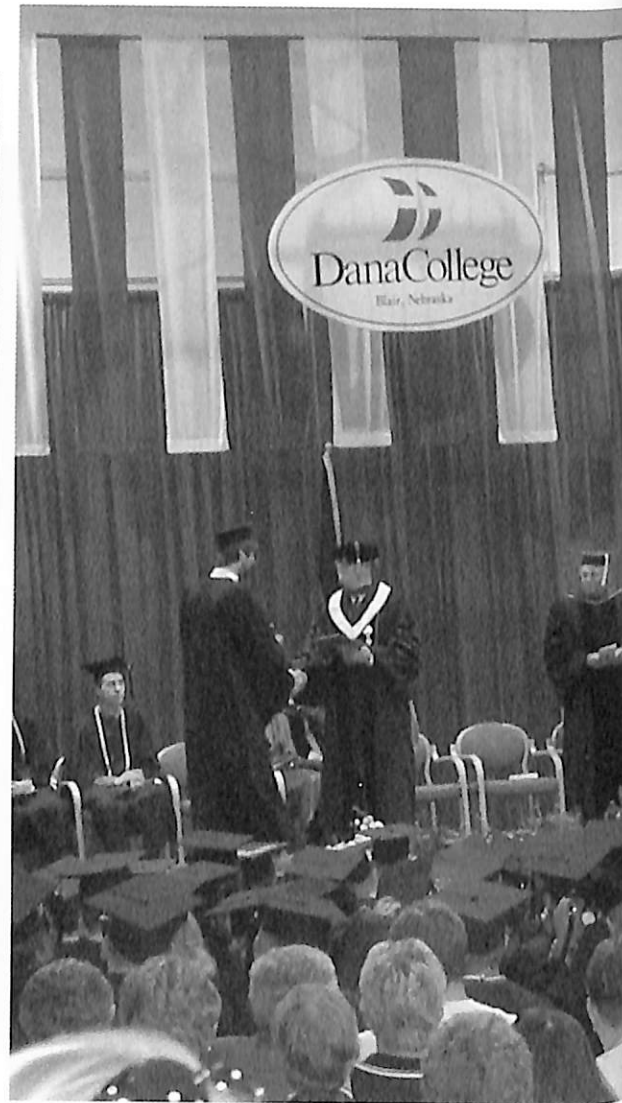

Abby Jones summed it up best, "I'm happy to have finished, and am ready to move on, but I am also sad that I have to say goodbye to some great people."

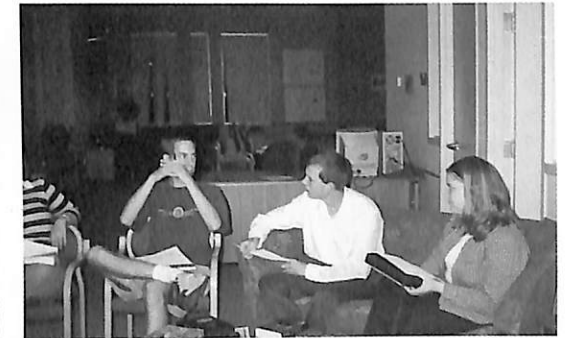
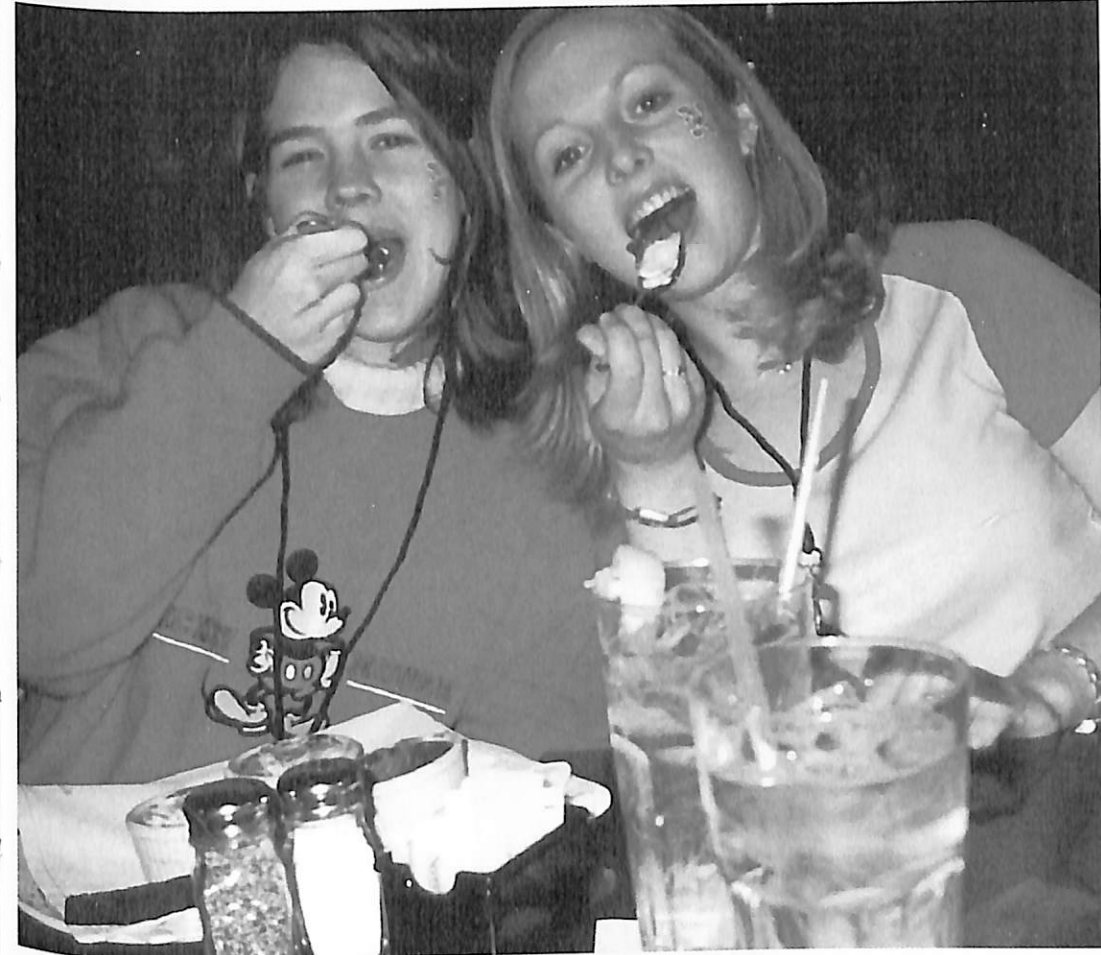

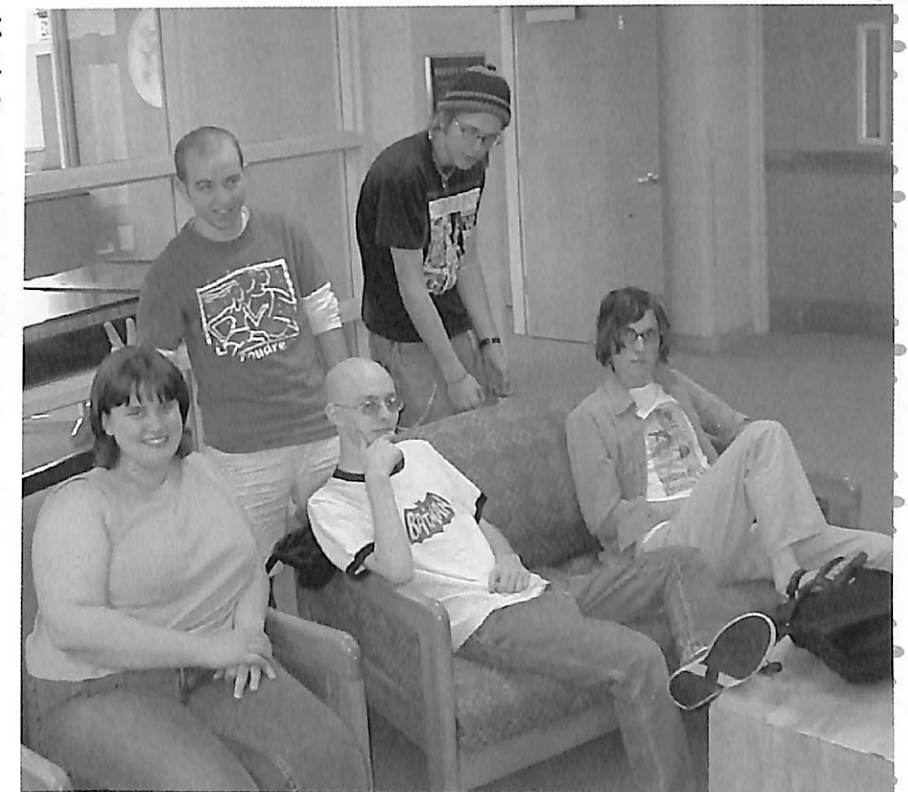

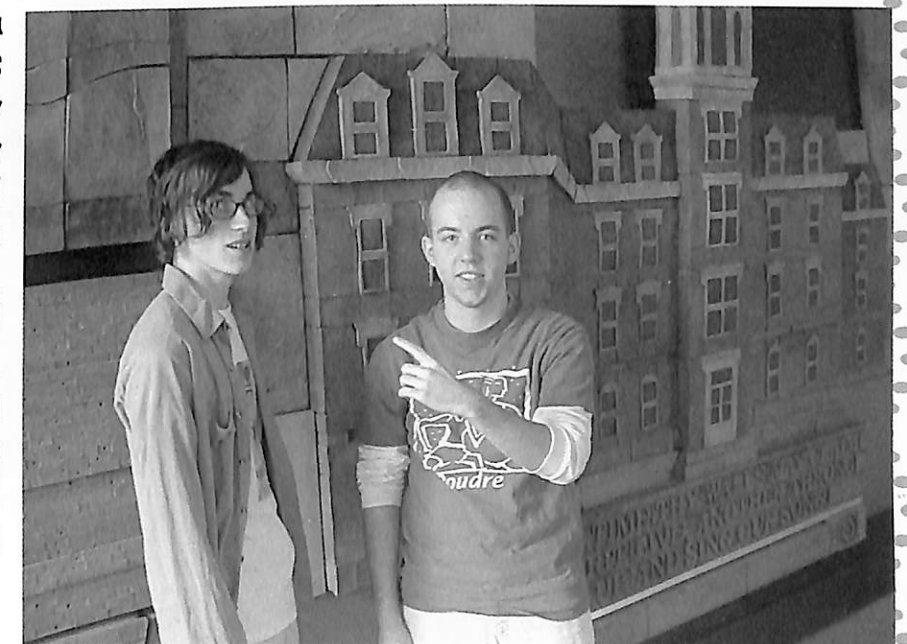
ISO

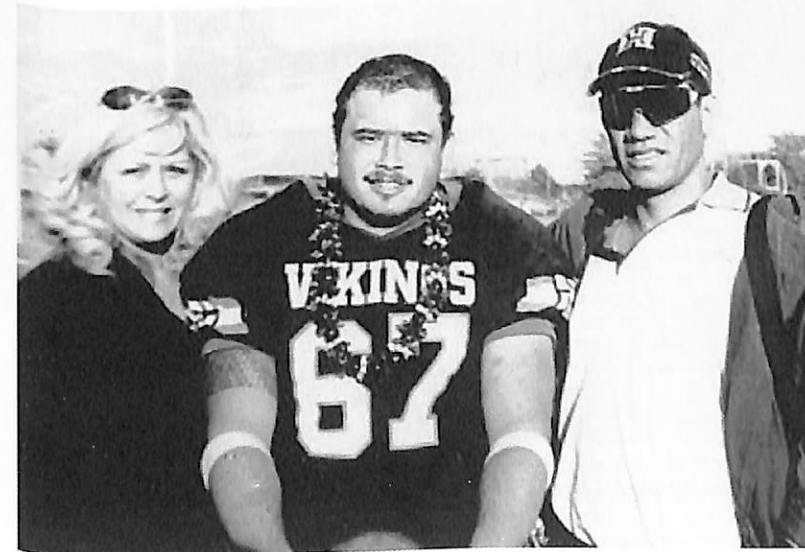
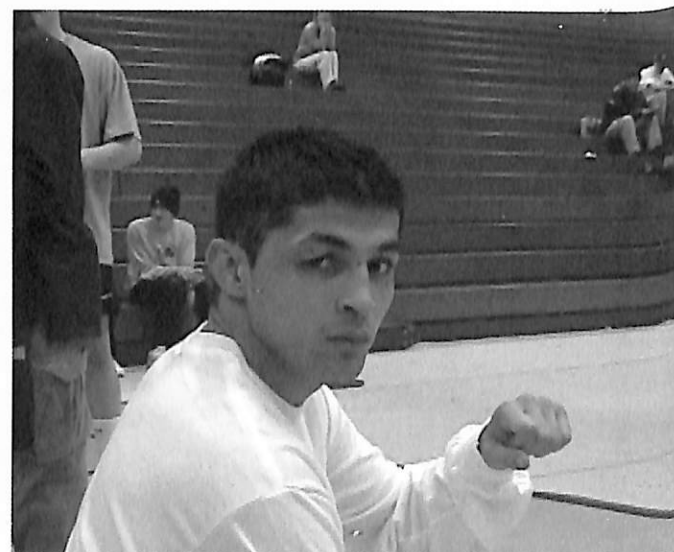
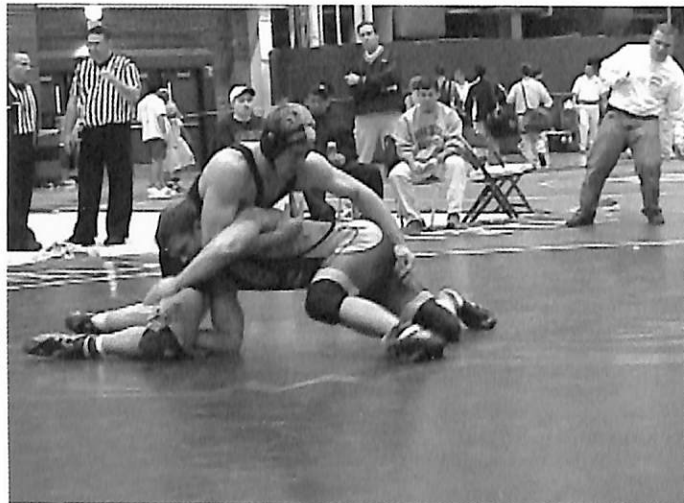
Business Club

In their hearts, everyone knew they had given all they could for the coaches, their team members, and all of the enthusiastic fans that cheered them on game after game.

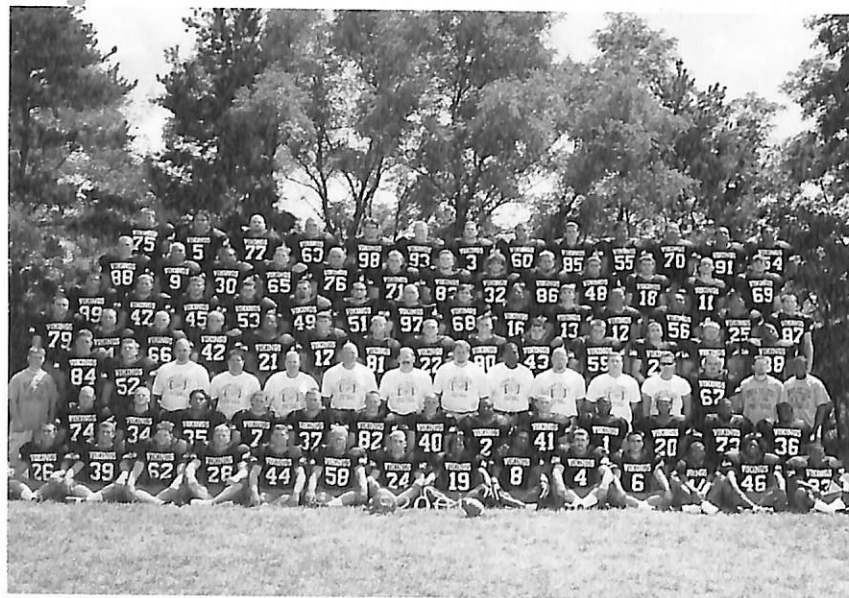

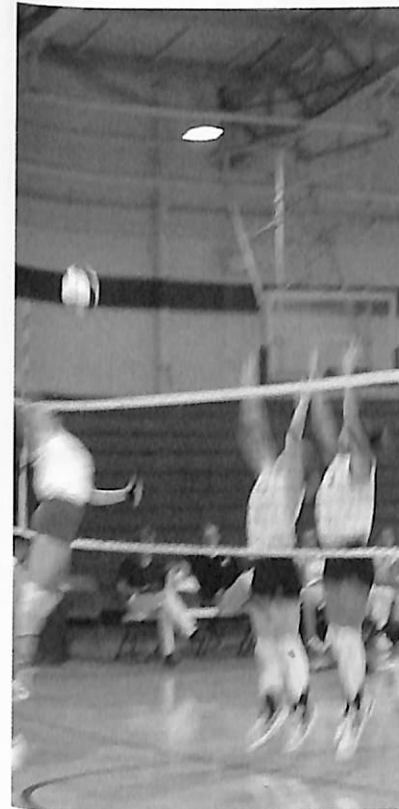

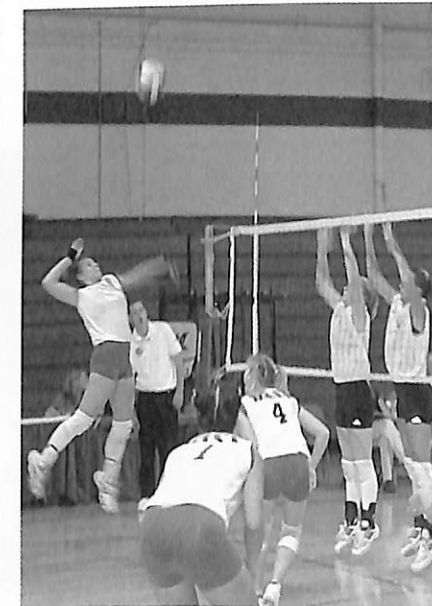
VOLLEYBALL

BOY'S SOCCER

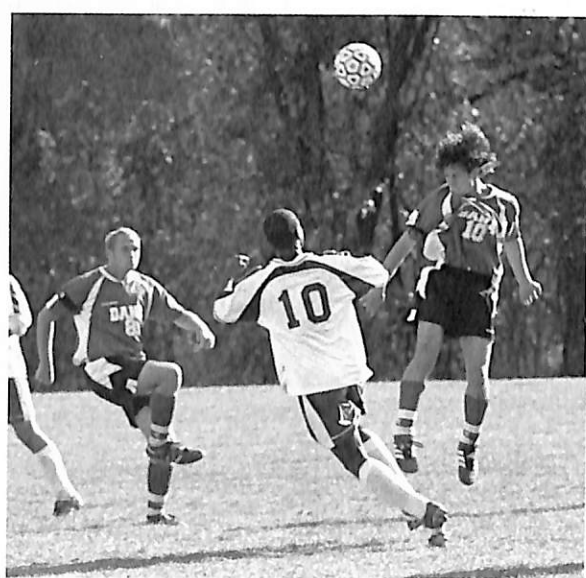

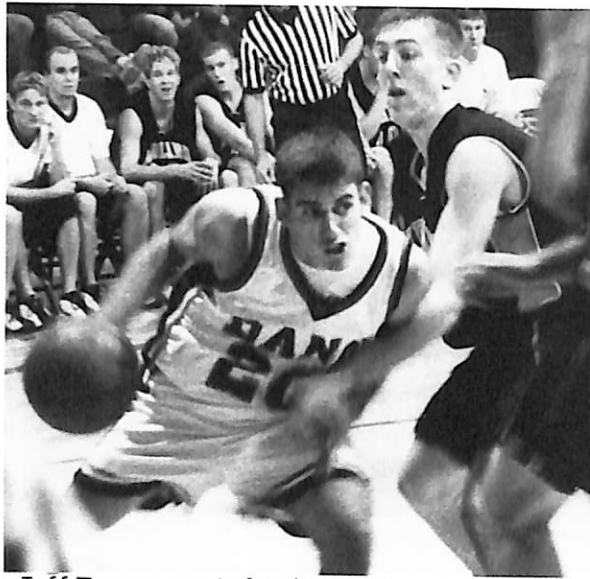

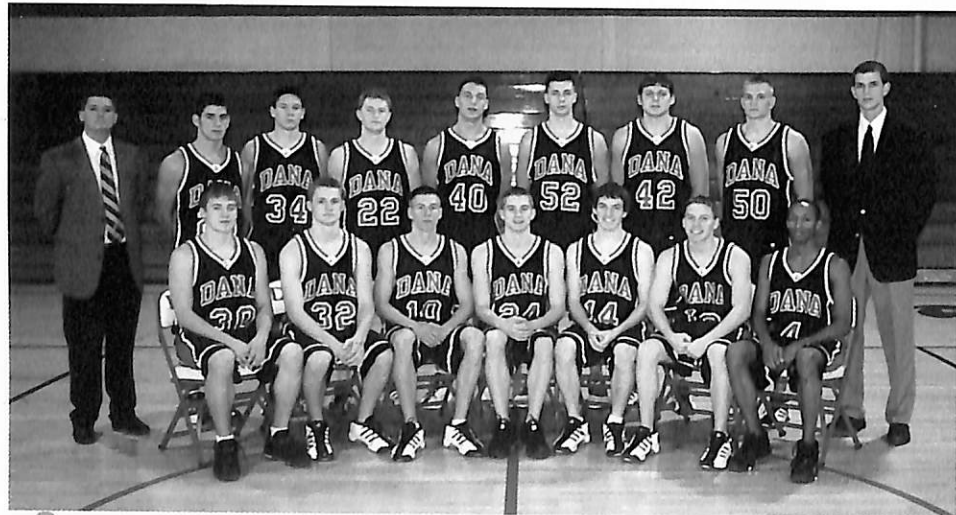

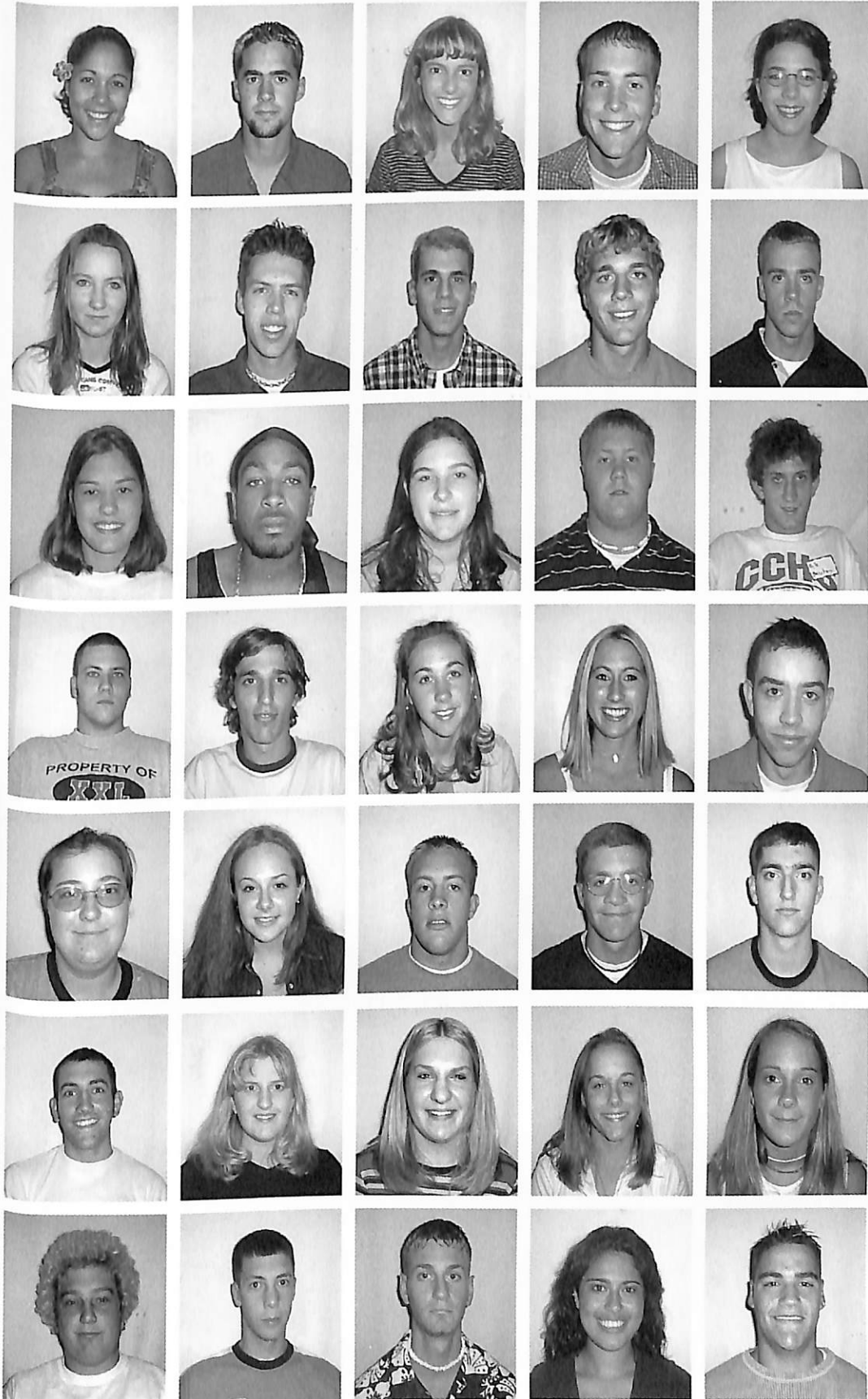

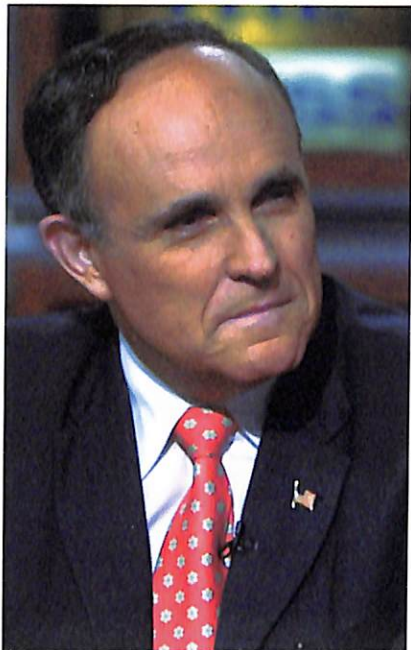
e n d u r i n g FREEDOM

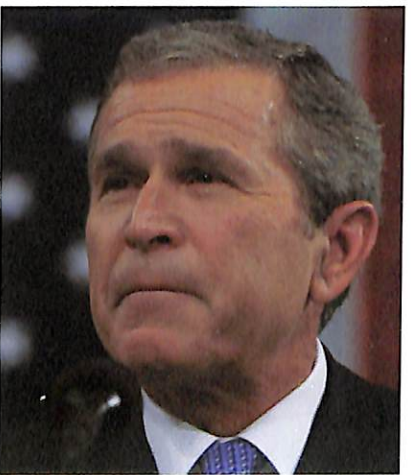

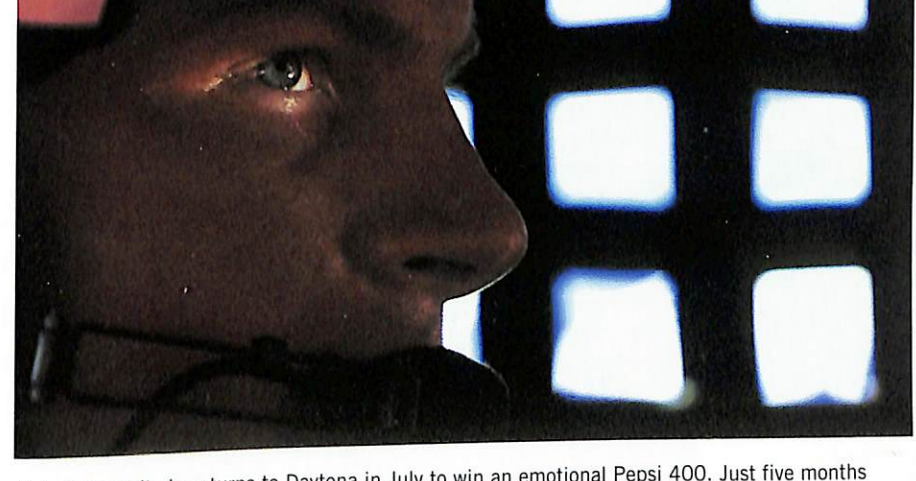

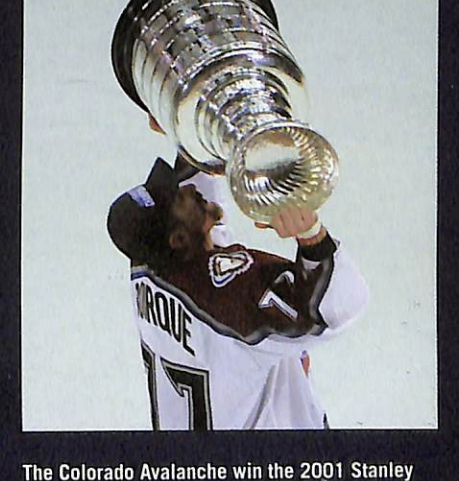

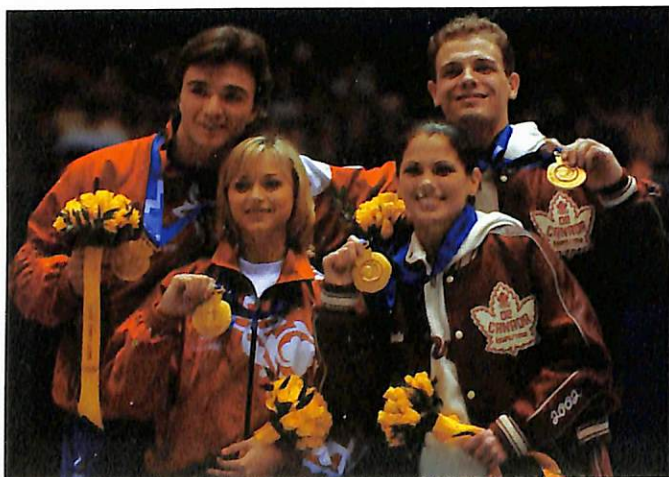
