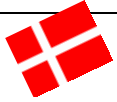

DAAL Hosts *The Danish Pioneer* Exhibit

On April 16th the DAAL proudly debuted *The Danish Pioneer - Connecting an Immigrant Community*, an exhibit that was funded by the Nebraska Humanities Council and the Nebraska Cultural Endowment. The DAAL partnered with the current owners of *The Danish Pioneer*, as well as with the Danish Immigrant Museum in Elk Horn, Iowa, for historical content and development of the exhibit.

The Danish Pioneer was founded in Omaha in 1872 by Danish immigrant Mark Hansen, with financial support from Edward Creighton, and is the oldest continuously published Danish-American newspaper in the United States. Five tall panels tell the story of *The Danish Pioneer* using photographs and text to trace the newspaper from its beginnings in Omaha in 1872 to the current publication based in Chicago. Viewers can see for themselves how the style and content of the newspaper evolved over time, and come face-to-face with the people who shaped its history. The DAAL holds the most complete collection of *The Danish Pioneer* in existence today.



The exhibit has provided an excellent opportunity for the Archive to reach out to a large segment of the Danish American community.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

Wandering: the Story of Ruth Rasmussen's Many Contributions to DAAL



Ruth Rasmussen describes her life as one of wandering. In her own view the goals have not always been clear. Yet, to those who know her the accomplishments have been exceptional, and her many talents continue to benefit the Danish American Archive and Library.

Ruth was born in Omaha and raised on a dairy farm on the city's northern fringe. Her dad was born in Denmark. She began school in rural District 20 at age 4, launching her into the world of books that has been a hallmark for nearly eight decades. This may be where the wandering started, but such an early encounter with learning carries a hint of destiny. Her wandering never took her far from the life of the mind. When she was a teenager her father sold the dairy and the family then moved to Laurens, a small community in northwest Iowa. After graduating from high school in Laurens she enrolled at the University of Northern Iowa. It took her six years to get her degree in education, since she had to work to support herself and to pay the costs of college. Wandering was complemented by persistence.

She moved to Omaha to teach. Unexpectedly widowed with two little boys to care for, she continued as an elementary school teacher. Her predilection for wandering led her in 1967 to Dana College, first as a library clerk but eventually as library director. In 1972 she moved with her sons (at that time in grades 4 and 7) to Iowa City to complete her Master's in Library Science at the University of Iowa. Even while wandering, perseverance, planning, and a talent for multi-tasking proved essential.

Ruth's arrival at Dana coincided with a decisive turning point in the history of the Archive. Although among Dana's faculty there had always been glimmers of an expanded view of an archive as a repository for the stories of all Danish Americans, the actual collections centered almost entirely on church and college. Yet by the late 1960's there were few students, staff, or faculty of Danish extraction and the Danish Lutheran synod that had founded Dana had virtually disappeared into a larger Lutheran body. Dawning awareness of the swift passing of the era of Danish immigration led to a quest for archival materials beyond the strict bounds of college and church. English professor Norman Bansen and then library director Ron Johnson led the way. Ruth was there to observe and to participate. When for the first time the Archive was given its own space in the Dana library, Ruth along with Lela Neve arranged with Nebraska Furniture Mart for a discounted price on the carpeting. Ron Johnson, Ruth says, taught her to negotiate—a skill that, as we shall see, continues to benefit the Archive.

As the Archive expanded, Ruth's contributions expanded as well. She wrote thank you notes for the material and financial donations. She arranged for Sharon Jensen, then the Dana library's Assistant Director, to devote part of her time to cataloging archival materials. She encouraged Tom Nielsen to join the library staff, and Tom then did much of the work in preparing Lur books for publication. Through her continuous involvement in the Archive she now is the bearer of much of its institutional memory.

Her participation in the work of the Archive continues. She is in charge of three discrete parts of DAAL's work, all reflecting her ability to wander confidently into unfamiliar territory. She is in charge of the "family files." When people think of the Archive's collections, they usually visualize the gray acid-free boxes that cover the shelves on the Archive's east side. However, there are thousands of instances in which a particular collection is not large enough to warrant even a single box. So, information by and about this family (or

individual or organization) is placed in a manila folder in the family file. Much of the Archive's growth is actually occurring in the family file section, as DAAL supporters continue to send in newspaper articles, photographs, and writings of Danish Americans. For many years the family files were themselves stored in boxes, a cumbersome, expensive, and time consuming procedure. Ruth suggested that it would be far simpler to store these folders in three four-drawer filing cabinets. Then, using her now well honed negotiating skills, she arranged for the Archive to purchase the necessary filing cabinets from All Makes at a remarkably low price.

Secondly, Ruth takes care of purchasing archival supplies—everything from archival pens (replete with acid-free ink) to upright magazine boxes for the rapidly expanding Danish Brotherhood collection to special plastic bags used to store, but not damage, periodicals. She was in charge of purchasing as Dana's library director, and that polished skill remains an advantage in the Archive.

Third, Ruth is in charge of the sale of Lur Publications books. In the past two decades DAAL has published approximately fifteen books under the Lur banner. These books can be purchased either through Amazon or directly from the Archive. Even though no advertising is currently done, orders for these books continue to arrive. In 2011 sales amounted to nearly \$2000. *Boats in the Night* remains the Archive's best seller, but other volumes continue to find an audience. Last week five copies of *Under the Cloud* were purchased in a single day. Ruth's long-standing involvement with Lur means that she is familiar with copyright issues as well. Such knowledge is vital if the Archive is to avoid jeopardizing its tax exempt status.

Ruth's wanderings have led to her involvement with the work of the Archive for over forty years—from the days in the late '60's when the Archive began its rapid expansion to the recent relocation to downtown Blair. May her wanderings long continue, yet remain close to DAAL.

Approximately 860 people have seen the display in Blair, Chicago and Elk Horn, and many more are expected to visit the exhibit at Dannebrog, Nebraska, June 1-4, St. Paul, Nebraska, June 9-17, and Minden, Nebraska, June 18-30. Discussions are ongoing to make the exhibit available to additional venues in the near future.

Inga Larsen, who has been a volunteer since the first volunteer week in 1991, will turn 100 on July 24. Her contributions to the Archive include translations in the Lur book *Danes in America: Danish Lutheranism from 1860 to 1908*.

Family and friends attended a reception at the Archive in honor of longtime volunteer Ann George’s 80th birthday on April 7. Ann has been invaluable in sorting and documenting the Dana College collection, first in the basement of the Dana Library, and now in a dedicated room at our current location. The Dana collection may be the largest we have, containing thousands of photos, press releases, faculty and board of regents records and much, much more. Ann continues to serve as a resource not only for Dana College history, but for Archive history in general as well.

Executive Director Report

I have heard that some people who don't live close enough to the Archive to volunteer on a weekly basis don't feel like they are much help to the Archive. Not true! While our weekly volunteers are crucial to the operation, everyone can contribute in some way.

Having just completed our annual informational tax return for the IRS, I am struck by some of the statistics from 2011.

203 Lur Publications books were sold. If you would like a brochure showing the books we have for sale, please ask.

Our *Jottings* newsletter went to 997 households in 45 states, the District of Columbia, Canada and Denmark. We will add Utah in 2012. The other states we are missing are Delaware, Mississippi, Rhode Island and West Virginia. **If you have a temporary address change** for part of the year, please let us know since the *Jottings* does not get forwarded by the post office. **Would you prefer to get the newsletter by email?** Please let us know.

We had 484 visitors and researchers from 30 states, Denmark, Japan, Germany and Spain in 2011. Research requests have been varied. People often use the papers of Einer Vig to research genealogy. Two people also hope to use archive material to write books. Two of our big successes were the Kringle Mingle event during the Dana Alumni and Friends Homecoming and the Grand Opening events in October 2011. During that time, we showed the Danish Immigrant Museum's traveling exhibit *Church Basements and Children's Homes*.

To be a voting member of the Archive, you need to have donated material, time or money in the past two years. We received 157 groups of materials from 21 states, Canada, and Denmark.

73 volunteers from 9 states worked 6,122 hours! 24 of our volunteers were new in 2011. Their work ranged from baking cookies for the open houses to joining us for a volunteer week to becoming part of our weekly group. If you are in the area and wish to volunteer even though it is not a volunteer week, please let us know. We do have some people who work from home. Most of that work is translating, although some of it is on our obituary project. One thing you could do now is comb your local papers for obituaries. It takes some reading to look at maiden names, married names and parent's names. Even if a person isn't born of Danish of descent, once they marry a Dane, we claim them! Another thing to remember is that not all Danish names end in "sen"; Koefoed, Kahldahl and Svendgaard come to mind as examples. If you do work at home, please be sure to report your hours.

289 households and organizations from 32 states, Canada and Denmark donated money. **We have received our 501c3 status and can take charitable donations directly**, either by cash, check or credit card. We raised over \$100,000 in 2011 and had a net income of over \$18,000. Ninety-one percent of our support is from individuals giving less than 2% of our total revenue, so regardless of amount, each and every donation matters.

We signed a Community Partnership agreement with the University of Nebraska at Omaha (UNO) in 2011. Currently, we are working towards providing internship opportunities for students from UNO and from Grandview University in Des Moines, Iowa.

The picture many people have of an archive is dark and secluded. The Danish American Archive and Library is an active and vibrant organization. Through your donations of time, materials and money, you are building your archive into a nationally and internationally known repository of Danish American history. Thank you for your support.

The Danish Lutheran Publishing House of Blair, Nebraska

The Danish Lutheran Publishing House has been gone for over half a century. Yet for sixty-seven years, the LPH, as it was informally known, was a prolific and pervasive presence in the world of Danish American Lutherans. It was founded in 1893 at the convention of the Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church Association in Racine, Wisconsin.

Financial difficulties loomed large in the early years. Since organized financial support was minimal, the LPH at the outset had no choice but to borrow the necessary capital. This resulted in an initial debt of \$2,500, which progressively grew to a daunting \$36,000. A subscription campaign by the United Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church in 1917 wiped out that debt and set the LPH on the road to financial stability.

The LPH initially occupied space on the first and third floors of Trinity Seminary. In the mid-1890's it rented quarters in downtown Blair. In 1898 the LPH had sufficient resources to purchase land and buildings near Front & 17th for \$3,600. Additions were made in 1927 and 1947, and fires in 1909 and 1953 forced further changes, but 17th & Front remained the LPH's permanent home.

During its first two decades the LPH focused exclusively on materials in the Danish language. Its first English language publication, *The Little Lutheran*, appeared in 1915. Hymnbooks, Sunday School materials, Luther's catechism, and church periodicals all appeared first as exclusively Danish publications, but gradually they



were all replaced, or at least paralleled, by English counterparts. One notable exception to the English-only trend was *Luthersk Ugeblad* ("Lutheran Weekly Paper") which, even though its readership steadily diminished, continued to be published alongside the *Ansgar Lutheran* right up to the close of the Lutheran Publishing House in 1960. The otherwise relentless preference for English led to the decision in 1943 to drop the word Danish from the name and become simply the Lutheran Publishing House.

This name, "Lutheran Publishing House," would seem a trifle grand. However, from the beginning it had a vision that extended well beyond that of a marginal sectarian press. Up until 1920 it published *Danskeren* ("The Dane"), a weekly newspaper that brought news of Denmark and the world into the homes of Danish immigrants. The LPH published a variety of hymnbooks for both of the Lutheran synods founded by Danish Americans. It was also the publisher of the *Rural Lutheran*, a monthly periodical that was the joint product of several Lutheran groups.

The variety of publications that the LPH produced is astonishing. Hymnbooks were

fashioned for both formal and informal settings, as with the Danish *Psalmebog for Kirke og Hjem* and its English successor *Hymnal for Church and Home*. Christmas, always a central Danish holiday, was marked with three publications, *Christmas Chimes*, *Child's Christmas Chimes*, and *Dansk Almanak* (later *Dansk Nytaar*). The *Ansgar Lutheran* was first published in 1927, and then carefully and persistently nurtured, despite considerable opposition to receiving church news in English. Conversely, the LPH supported periodicals in Danish even when interest in Danish was flagging. The *Dansk Ungdomsblad i Amerika* ("Danish Youth in America") periodical was begun in 1924 and lasted but three years.

The Danish American Archive and Library is fortunate to have an extensive collection of LPH publications—novels, memoirs, devotional materials, periodicals, hymnbooks, synodical yearbooks, Danish grammars, and much more. However, since all the LPH records were destroyed in the 1953 fire, it is impossible to know if the Archive's collection is complete.

Not only does the Archive house a large number of LPH publications, it also contains several collections that aid in understanding these materials and the publishing house that produced them. These include the 68 boxes of the collection of P.C. Jensen, (the long serving editor of the *Luthersk Ugeblad*), the collection of former synodical president N.C. Carlsen, and a collection dealing specifically with the Lutheran Publishing House itself.

Naturally, it was Dody who encouraged her friend Erna to use her talent to translate for the Archive. Dody's husband Oscar and Erna's husband Bob were also active participants during volunteer weeks where John W.'s wife Elizabeth was a gracious hostess. Elizabeth continues to volunteer.

The friendship roots run deep. While they can reminisce together about past family memories, their time together at the Archive has given them a chance to enrich their friendship at this later stage of their lives.

Now, all three friends have successfully encouraged some of their children and grandchildren to be interested in their Danish heritage and the Archive.

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
