Convention Program

The Danish Brotherhood 1935 convention will convene Monday, Sept. 16, and is scheduled to last until Friday, Sept. 20. Business sessions are held each day and the work day of the delegates is usually set by the convention as an eight hour session each day, exclusive of the lunch hour. In addition thereto committees often work overtime in preparing their reports.

The entertainment features are entirely complimentary on the part of the lodge in whose city the convention is held, in this instance Columbine Lodge No. 43, Denver, Colo., and do not represent any outlay for the treasury of The Danish Brotherhood. Only those who have attended a national convention of this kind will appreciate the immense volume of work this entails, the months of preparation necessary and the time and money that must be expended before the report can be made: All is ready for the reception of delegates and visitors.

THE TREMENDOUS TASK of arranging for a convention such as the Danish Brotherhood convention has finally reached the point of completion. The program has been outlined and promises to be a full week of interesting and worthwhile activities. No time will be wasted, yet the comfort and vacation spirit of the occasion has been considered in the schedule for the week of pleasure of all who attend.

While the Cosmopolitan hotel will be the official headquarters, we have arranged for a building a few blocks from the hotel and that will be our Danish home during convention week. It will be only a short walk from the hotel and here is where most of the entertainment will be held. Real "dansk Smørrebrød og Øl" will be served. This arrangement will avoid all confusion as to where social gatherings are to be held, etc., and will not be necessary to bother with cars to and fro.

LET US BE FAIR!

I believe in The Danish Brotherhood.

I feel it is an organization composed of men with as high a sense of fraternal fellowship and brotherly affection as will be found in any fraternal organization, barring none.

Our old age relief fund, established 12 years ago, is a fine example. Members of D. B. S. did not establish that fund and pay to it with any selfish motive. It was done to help the unfortunate, aged brothers. It was an expression of the true brotherhood spirit.

I know that during the late unhappy years many brothers have been unable to fulfill their financial obligations towards our Brotherhood and I also know that there is not a lodge that has not put itself out to do all they could to assist such brothers in their need. Thousands of dollars have been expended for that purpose, both through the lodges and through the supreme board. It was not done for a selfish purpose. It was an expression of the brotherhood spirit that exists within our ranks.

In sickness and in need, in time of sorrow and bereavement, brothers throughout the land have done all in their power to relieve distress and grief. They have stood by with a helping hand when sickness and death spread gloom in lives of their fellow members or their families. That was done, not for any selfish purpose but in a true brotherhood spirit.

And so I might go on. Many instances of how brothers have been assisted in a material way may be cited. Of how brothers away from home have been helped in every way possible; of how men have quit their own work to help a disabled brother save his crop; of how financial help has been extended in excess of that stipulated through our sick benefit; of the thousand and one opportunities that our members have embraced to prove themselves, towards their brethren in need, true friends.

Truly it is not right to say that the spirit of good will and fraternalism and brotherly love is dead in The Danish Brotherhood. To endeavor to instill that feeling among our members is wrong; to spread through the press, that impression among men who do not belong to our Brotherhood, seems to me still worse.

So without any ill-will towards anyone and without any desire to find fault, I sincerely ask:

Let us not do that! Let us be fair to our Brotherhood!

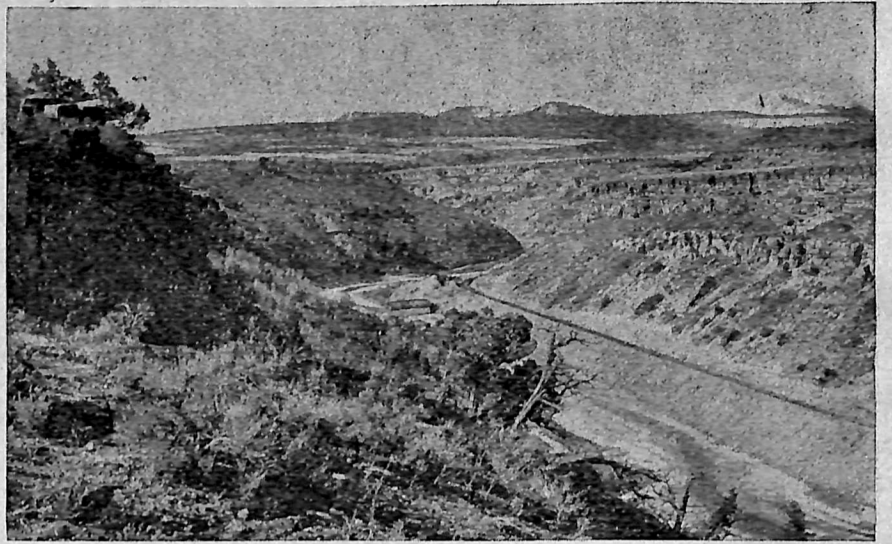
Why Make It Appear Worse Than It Is?

Fraternal societies do not have as many members now as they did some years ago, before the depression. That is also true of The Danish Brotherhood. But compared to many other organizations, orders older in years than we, with greater prestige and the entire population of the United States to draw from for new material, The Danish Brotherhood has surely held its own among the best in the way of membership. We have lost some members, but surely not in proportion to that of other, even more fortunately situated, orders.

Judging from the records of later years, we suffer a loss from death of approximately 300 members each year. For the 16 years elapsed since 1919 that makes a loss of nearly 5000 members. So if our loss has been 6000, isn't it stretching a bit to say that of these 6000 "approximately all of them are living and doing business"?

In any society there is a turnover in membership. Some come in and others go out—for various reasons. That The Danish Brotherhood has been able to, what with depression and discontinued immigration, to keep down the net loss of membership to about 1000 over and above the loss suffered by death, certainly speaks well for our order and is a record that we believe not many societies have bettered.

So what good purpose does it serve to make it appear worse than it really is?

Fra Danmark kommer den for Dansk-Amerikanere nedtrykkende Meddelelse, at Skandinavien-Amerika Linien muligvis maa se sig nødsaget til at ophøre. Linien trænger til nyt Materiel, nye Skibe, som kan optage Konkurrencen med Udsigt til at gøre Foretagendet rentabelt. Der er ført Underhandlinger med den danske Regering om Understøttelse for Linien, og man maa haabe, at disse vil føre til et gunstigt Resultat.

Danmark kan ikke godt undvære Skandinavien-Amerika Linien. Dansk-Amerikanerne kan heller ikke godt undvære den.

Bestræbelserne for at henlede Amerikanernes Opmærksomhed paa Danmark som et Land værd at besøge, er ved at krones med Held. Store Fremskridt er gjort i de sidste Aar i den Retning, og vor direkte Dampskibslinie har spillet en betydelig Rolle i dette Arbejde og vil være af uvurderlig Værdi i Fremtiden, hvis den var lidt bedre ekviperet til at møde Konkurrencen.

Dansk-Amerikanere, som har rejst paa Besøg i Danmark med Liniens Skibe, er enstemmige i deres Ros af Linien, Skibenes elskværdige Besætning og den hyggelige, hjemlige Atmosfære, som slaar Een i Møde det Øjeblik, man sætter Foden paa Dækket. Man er „hjemme i Danmark“, saa snart man kommer om Bord. Fremmede Linier kan ikke tilbyde os noget Substitut for den Del af en Rejse til Danmark. Hjemvendende Dansk-Amerikanere benytter saa at sige udelukkende vor egen danske Linie.

Det vil derfor være i sin Orden, om vi Danskfødte tilkendegav overfor dem derhjemme, hvorledes vi føler i denne Sag. I denne Spalte er trykt en Henvendelse, som vi anmoder vore Brødre om at udklippe, undertegne med Navn og Adresse, og saa sende den til vor Over-Præsident, John Christensen, Cincinnati, som vil sørge for, at den bliver videresendt.

Danske Skibe har i Aarenes Løb ført Tusinder og atter Tusinder af danske Emigranter til De Forenede Stater. Paa dansk Skib vendte mange af dem tilbage til deres Fædreland for at besøge Slægt og Venner og gense de kendte Egne.

Under dansk Flag er der knyttet Baand mellem dem, der drog ud, og dem, der blev tilbage.

Saadan ønsker vi Dansk-Amerikanere, at det fremdeles maa være.

Da der for Tiden er Forhandlinger mellem Det Forenede Dampskibs-Selskab og den danske Regering om en mulig Understøttelse til Fortsættelse af Skandinavien-Amerika Liniens Drift og til Nybygninger, udtaler vi undertegnede Dansk-Amerikanere her ved vort Ønske om, at dette maa ske, ikke alene for vor Skyld, men ogsaa for at imødekomme den i De Forenede Stater stadig voksende Lyst til at besøge Danmark, der i de senere Aar er blevet mere og mere kendt som et Land vel værd at gæste.

Andre Lande har, besjælet af den Tanke, at en direkte Dampskibsforbindelse mellem De Forenede Stater og dem er nødvendig, selv om den for

en Tid kan være urentabel, ydet financel Støtte, dels til Nybygning af Skibe, dels til Opretholdelse af en Liniens Drift.

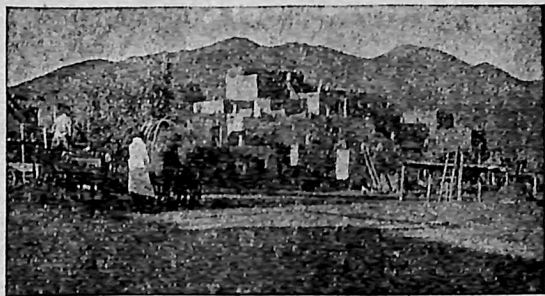

Quitting Time!

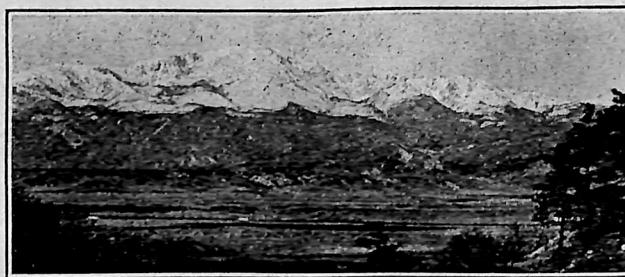

Herr Statsminister Th. Stauning, Christiansborg Slot, København.

Kære Hr. Stauning:—

Da jeg igennem den danske saavel som den dansk-amerikanske Presse har erfaret, at Skandinavien Amerika Linien muligvis vil ophøre, medmindre der ydes den Hjælp fra Staten, tillader jeg mig at tilskrive Statsministeren angaaende den for os Dansk-Amerikanere saa vigtige Sag.

I mangfoldige Aar har denne Linie været et Bindeled mellem de udvandrede og Moderlandet, og — indtil de sidste faa Aar — vel nok den eneste Turistreklame i U. S. A. for Danmark; og det vilde være højst beklageligt, om dette Bindeled skulde ophøre netop nu, hvor det tiltrænges mere end nogen Sinde at vedligeholde Forbindelsen mellem Dansk-Amerikanerne og Danmark, og hvor amerikanske Turister er begyndt at værdsætte Danmark som Turistland. Gennem Artikler i de amerikanske Magasiner, skrevet af Amerikanere som har besøgt Danmark, og ikke mindst gennem Mrs. Bryan Owens særdeles udmærkede Arbejde, er Danmark mere omtalt end det har været før, og grundet paa Forholdene i det øvrige Europa har Skandinavien, en Tiltrækning for amerikanske Turister, som det aldrig før har haft.

Da den danske Stat har tænkt paa at begynde større Turistpropaganda i Amerika, vilde det virke højst uheldigt, om saadanne Turister skulde være nødsaget til at rejse til Danmark med udenlandske Skibe. Med tidssvarende Baade og Skandinavien Amerika Linien's fortræffelige Renomme kan Danmark tage Konkurrencen op med en hvilken som helst fremmed Linie, og Turiststrømmen til Danmark vilde gavne ikke alene Landet selv men ogsaa dets Skibsfart.

Det er derfor mit oprigtige Haab, at den danske Stat vil træde hjælpende til for at vedligeholde den danske Linie til Amerika.

Hvem er den Mand, der kan bringe Broderskabsaanden tilbage til Det danske Brodersamfund?

Fra 1882 indtil Konventionen i Milwaukee i 1919 var Det danske Brodersamfund en Broderskabs Organisation. Den Dag vendte vi Bladet og blev et Assurance Selskab. Vi har i 16 Aar ikke tænkt paa andet eller hørt andet end Assurance, og vi har ganske glemt den broderlige Del af vort Samfund.

Man hører kun, „Har du betalt din Paaligning?“ Men der bliver ikke sagt et Ord om „Har du gjort noget for at opretholde Broderaanden og Arbejdet indenfor din Loge?“ hvilket burde og skulde knytte os alle, der er født i Danmark, sammen i een broderlig Organisation, eksisterende paa Minder om vort Moderland og vore Barndomsdage.

Maaske vi er kommen for dybt ind i vore Finansforhold og derved har tabt Sigte af vor broderlige Velfærd, og vore Landsmænds. Der er noget galt et eller andet Sted. Hvem er den Mand, der ligesom en Moses kan føre os ud af Ørkenen og bringe os tilbage til Broderskabs Aand og Følelse for den Virksomhed, med hvilken for Øje vi stiftede vort Brodersamfund og samlede et Medlemstal af 22,000, som nu er svundet ind til bare 15,000. Hvem, og hvor er Manden? Det er af yderste Vigtighed at udvælge en saadan Mand, som kan blive en Forretningsleder for vort Samfund og bringe den gamle Broderaand tilbage, som vistes af H. Vogt, Viggo Danielson, T. P. Nielsen, J. Michaelsen og mange andre, som var besjelede af samme Aand, og som kun tænkte paa den broderlige Side i vort Samfund.

Hvis det var dit eget personlige Foretagende, hvori du havde indskudt en Formue af 4 Millioner Dollars, vilde du saa sammenkalde alle og spørge dem, „Hvem ønsker I skal lede dette Foretagende?“ Nej! I vilde benytte Timer, Dage, ja Maaneder til at udvælge den allerbedste Mand, som I kunde faa fat paa, og som var i Stand til at lede en Forretning af denne Slags.

Lad Det danske Brodersamfund forsøge at faa fat paa en Mand, som er i Stand til at gøre Arbejdet i Stedet for den Mand, som ikke har den rigtige Følelse og Aand for Broderskabsvelfærd, som er saa nødvendigt for vort Samfund, hvis vi skal leve og fortsætte.

I har eders Chance i Denver til at udføre dette Arbejde, nu eller aldrig.

IMOD DISTRIKTSINDELING.

Efter at have læst Broder Markers Indlæg i sidste Maanedsbld er jeg nu mere overbevist om, at Distriktsinddeling er ikke ret meget, hvis i det hele taget nogen, Besparelse for D. B. S., naar vi regner med 11 Distrikter, som der engang blev foreslaaet, og saa skal betale Udgifterne ved 11 Distriktskonventioner, med en Hovedkonvention hvert fjerde Aar. Jeg skal ikke gaa igennem Broder Markers Regnstykke, for der er ingen Tvivl om, at han har været oprigtig i sin Maade at regne det ud paa, efter Forholdene i Østen. Det eneste jeg maaske kunde protestere imod er Delegeraternes 15 Dages Dagpenge. Konventionen varer kun 5 Dage, og det skulde ikke tage en Deleget 10 Dage til at gøre Turen frem og tilbage, undtagen han gik paa Rulle-skøjter. Men selv om der nu ogsaa var en lille Besparelse ved Distrikter, saa kan der blive et Spørgsmaal om,

er det gavnligt for Samfundet, at vi splittes op paa den Maade, for at det vil blive en Adspaltelse kan jo umuligt nægtes. For Eksempel: Broder Marker regner med en Deleget for hver 400 Medlemmer i Distriktet. Vi har i Utah og Idaho 140 Medlemmer; hvis vi blev et Distrikt, vilde vi alt-saa slet ikke være repræsenteret til Hovedkonvention. Utah, Idaho, Wyoming og Colorado har lidt over 400 Medlemmer; om 4 Aar vilde vi ikke være istand til at sende en Deleget, da vi vilde være nede for Kvota. Med et Distrikt bestaaende af 4 Stater vilde vi da være nødt til at gaa enten længere øst eller vest paa, eller til Montana for at danne et Distrikt. Hvor mange Medlemmer tror Br. Marker, vilde bruge sine egne Penge til at rejse til en Distriktskonvention, hvor Distancen er 1500 Mil eller mere? Ulykken er, at Broder Marker ikke har nogen Ide om Forholdene her ude i Vesten, ja i Syden med for saa vidt, og altsaa ikke forstaar, hvad han skriver om. Jeg tvivler aldeles ikke om, at hans Udregninger passer godt nok for Østens Loger, ja maaske ude paa Vestkysten med, hvor der findes store Loger, og mange af dem. Jeg tror nærmest, at det er det store Assessment, som de skal betale til deres Assurance, som er Skyld i, at de maa gaa ud. Den fortvivlede Assurance. (Gid Fanden havde den) havde jeg nær sagt. Nu har vi betalt til den i saa mange Aar, og nu er vi bleven gamle, og kan ikke mere tjene Pengene til Assessments, og nu maa vi saa gaa ud og miste det hele. Hvorfor vilde vi ikke være bedre stillet, hvis mit Forslag om at helt glemme, at vi nogen Sinde har haft en Assurance, og omdanne Fore-ningen til en Syge- og Begravelses-kasse med et Dødsbidrag af 200 Dollars for en Broder og 50 Dollars for en Broders Hustrus Begravelse; alle Medlemmer, som har været Mem-lem i 25 Aar, fri Kontingent, som skulde kunne udredes af Garantifon-det. Paa den Maade kunde vi holde vore gamle Medlemmer, og der vilde være flere Maader, at Penge kunde spares, f. Eks. saa vilde vi ikke behøve en Oversekretær til en Gage paa 5800 Dollars. Men det bliver vi al-drig enige om. Hvorfor? Fordi for mange af os tænker som saa, nu har jeg betalt til det i saa mange Aar, og det gaar vel nok i min Tid og halv-anden Uge efter.

Naa, det kan maaske være rigtigt nok, men mig passer det nu ikke til. Mine Logebrødre har jeg kommet sam-men med i mange Aar til Møder og Festligheder; de har hjulpet mig i Sygdom og Nød, lige saa vel som jeg har hjulpet dem, naar de har trængt til det. Vi har alle hjulpet til at

bygge vort Mødehus, har arbejdet paa Komiteer til at skaffe Midler til at betale det med, har mødt og baaret vore afdøde Brødre til deres sidste Hvilested, og saa fremdeles. De er mine Venner, mine bedste Venner, og nødig vilde jeg se, at vi skulde være nødt til at slette dem, eller jeg selv skulde være nødsaget til at gaa ud af Logen. Jeg haaber, at Broder Mar-ker forstaar, at selv om jeg er imod Distriktsinddeling, saa er det min Hensigt at arbejde hen til Samfundets bedste, og jeg er aldeles overbevist om, at ved at have en Konvention, hvor ca. 400 dansk Mænd er tilstede fra alle de forskellige Stater, vil der blive pustet mere nyt Liv i D. B. S., end hvis vi f. Eks. havde et Distrikts-møde her i Utah, Idaho, Wyoming, og Colorado, hvor kun en Trediedel af Logerne var repræsenteret.

WHO IS THE MAN? NOW OR NEVER—

This is the sound warning of Brother Muller in the Danish Pioneer of August 15, 1935, by questioning our insurance and supreme officers since the Milwaukee convention of 1919.

With all due respects to the supreme officers that have passed away and not criticizing the supreme officers that are living and enforcing the delegates' orders that were adopted at the conventions since 1919 up to the present time, our Brotherhood order is not a one man organization (Mussolini), but our supreme officers are the governing board to carry out the constitution and by-laws of our orders made by the representatives of the lodges. The delegates are the representative body. Why pick on the supreme president or supreme secretary?

The fact is that the membership started to drop when the world's depression began in 1929. Our membership then was 20,143. In 1931 our membership was 19,645. In 1935 our membership is 15,542. In other words we lost approximately 25% of our membership in six years, and our financial statement has increased about as follows:

Total assets of the Brotherhood in 1929 \$2,328,487.46
In 1935 or as of Dec. 31,
1934, total assets 3,009,137.41

Now let us compare the membership loss of other fraternal orders. The statistics show that in the last six years the average loss of memberships has been 40%. Nearly all other fraternal orders have decreased their assets from 25% to 40%, while the Danish Brotherhood has increased its assets in the last six years 20%.

Is it not also a fact that the wealth of the country has decreased about 40% in the last six years, no matter whether it is real estate, stock, or any other security, and is it not a fact that the income of the wage earners has decreased from 35% to 40%? In other words, the depression, business conditions, low wages, and lack of work are to blame for the loss of our members as well as any other fraternal organization. As far as our insurance is concerned or financial statement of our Brotherhood, there is no apology necessary nor fear of NOW OR NEVER. With many new ideas and suggestions from the different lodges to our constitution at the coming convention, it is hoped that business conditions will increase and that new members will be secured in the future.

From late statistics issued by the Danish government, there are 180,000 Danes living in the United States, born in Denmark, and in Canada there are 7,200. There is no reason why we cannot build up our membership in the future as we have in the past. We hope that the delegates at the Denver convention will make some amendments to our constitution that other Danish organizations can merge with the Danish Brotherhood, for we are the largest Danish society and will continue to be so.

DEN DANSK-AMERIKANSKE UNGDOM

Som bekendt udvalgte Østens danske Brodersamfundsloger ved Konventionen i Schenectady, N. Y. sidste Aar en Komite til at udarbejde en Plan til Oprettelsen af en Forening, som skulde være beregnet paa at samle den dansk-amerikanske Ungdom, særlig de unge Mennesker, som er født her i Landet, og som ikke har sluttet sig til de danske Foreninger eller Kirker.

Siden Sagen kom frem i Schenectady, har det vist sig, at der er større Interesse for en saadan Forening, end man havde ventet.

Saaledes blev der allerede sidste Vinter dannet en Ungdoms Afdeling af Østens Stjerne Loge Nr. 112 i Portland, Maine. Den kaldes „Eastern Star Junior League“.

Som Tiden gik, afholdte ovennævnte Komite flere Møder, agiterede i det stille og samlede Ideer fra forskellige dansk-amerikanske Kilder.

Da saa Konsul Helmouth Møller i sin udmærkede Tale i Providence slog til Lyd for Sagen, og Casper Hasselriis' øvede Pen gav os to Kapitler om Spørgsmaalet, indbød Redaktør Van Sand til Diskussion i Nordlyset, som har givet det Resultat, at man atter er vaagnet op til, at der maa gøres noget for at samle Amerikanerne af dansk Afstamning, disse unge Mennesker som i Tidens Løb ikke blev indlemmet i det danske Samfundsliv i Amerika. De gik tabt for os, ikke fordi vi glemte at lære dem det danske Sprog, men nærmest fordi vi ikke forstod at holde paa dem. Vi var for snæversynet og for optaget i at opretholde det danske Sprog, til rigtig at forstaa, at disse unge Mennesker, som er født her i Landet, i Virkeligheden ikke er danske, men Amerikanere. Hvem er der, som er født i Danmark af udenlandske Forældre, som vil taale, at man kalder dem andet end dansk? Børn, fødte af danske Forældre her i Amerika, taaler det heller

ikke, i deres inderste Hjerter, at vi kalder dem andet end Amerikanere. Deres Sprog og deres Kultur er amerikansk, med den Tilsætning af dansk Kultur, som vi igennem deres Udvikling har opnaaet at indpode i deres Tankegang. Men, som sagt, de er og bliver Amerikanere, saa er det lige meget, hvor godt vi har lært dem at tale det danske Sprog, eller hvor meget godt vi har fortalt dem om Danmark. For at faa dem med os, maa vi følge med dem, i deres Tankegang og forstaa, at de elsker deres Sprog og deres Fædreland. Det er nærmest paa dette Grundlag, at Konventionen i Schenectady mente, at der kunde være Mulighed for, at en Bro kunde bygges over den store Kløft, som nu adskiller os i Forenings- og Kirkelivet fra vore Børn.

Der er selvfølgelig Undtagelser, og der er danske Kolonier, hvor Børnene staa i Samkvem med Forældrene i deres danske Foreninger og Kirker, begrundet paa at Forholdene er mere gunstige. Men paa de fleste Egne, hvor der bor Danske, er Forholdet dog saaledes, at den store Procentdel af Børnene ikke staa i nær Forbindelse med danske Foreninger eller Kirker.

Om disse hundrede Tusinder Børn her i Landet af dansk Herkomst kan samles, skal Tiden vise. Østens D. B. S. Loger mener, at det kan udføres ved at stifte en Forening for den dansk-amerikanske Ungdom, en Forening som skal være den dansk-amerikanske Ungdoms egen Forening, hvorigennem vi kan bibeholde saa meget som muligt af danske kulturelle Værdier i de næste Generationer.

Ovennævnte Komites Rapport vil blive fremlagt ved Konventionen i Newark, N. J., og antagelig vil Spørgsmaalet blive ført videre til Konventionen i Denver.

We Get What We Pay For No More and No Less

As treasurer of the Askov lodge I have often, when collecting dues from the members, been confronted with a statement something like this: "Now I have belonged to the D. B. S. for nearly 25 years and have paid in more than my policy is worth because of its reduced value!"

I never let a Brother get away from me with that erroneous idea in his head, for there are extremely few Brothers who can claim and prove that they have paid in more than their policy is worth. To kill such an argument I figure out right then and there exactly how many assessments the Brother has paid, and multiplied by the amount of each assessment you have the actual figure right before you.

Every secretary and treasurer should have on hand the 1924 adjustment Valuation Book wherein the exact value of the reduced policies are given.

A part of the per capita tax should of course also be figured as part of the insurance cost, say for instance \$1.00 per year; the balance of the per capita tax can justly be charged to the other functions of the society.

If a Brother lives a long life, he will naturally pay in as much as his policy is worth and in a very few instances even more, but on a straight life policy we can not all take out more than we put in. But you will find it surprising how few have paid in as much as their policy is worth. In order that each Brother can figure the thing out for himself, I have compiled the following table which is taken from the records at Omaha. Just pick out the number of the assessment for the year in which you joined, subtract that from the present assessment which is No. 434 and you have the exact number of assessments you have paid; multiply that by the amount of each assessment, and add \$1.00 per capita tax for each year.

I would recommend that every lodge clip this out and save it as a permanent record; every secretary and treasurer should also preserve a copy.

If your lodge hasn't a copy of the 1924 adjustment Valuation Book, then just write to Frank Lawson in Omaha and ask for one.

Don't let anybody tell you that our insurance policy is a poor one; there are other kinds of policies that are better, but they cost accordingly. We have exactly the same kind of straight life policies that Old Line companies sold in olden days; we are getting exactly what we are paying for—and we can't expect to get more. IF we want better and more modern policies, then we will have to pay for them.

If we want the extended insurance feature; if we want paid-up value features; if we want cash surrender value policies; if we want cash loan value features, then we must pay a rate of assessments that will create the necessary funds to make these features possible. Let us not make any laws or promises that we later on will regret and realize are impossible. To put the whole story in a nut shell: IF we want cream on our oat meal, we must pay for cream.

The society shall have full power to govern and conduct the administration of its funds in aid of the sick and disabled, or for any benevolent purpose described by its constitution and laws, and no money or other benefit, charity relief or aid to be paid, provided or rendered by this society shall be liable to attachment, garnishment or other process, or to be seized, taken, appropriated or applied by any legal or equitable process or operation of law to pay any debt or liability of member or beneficiary, or any other person who may have a right thereunder either before or after payment, provided however that any lodge may become a part beneficiary to any member, who may agree to make the lodge to which he belongs, a part of the beneficiary to the amount such lodge has loaned him by paying his assessment. In States where it does not conflict with Insurance Laws.

Amendment to Section V of the Constitution to read as follows:

the Brotherhood, according to the Constitution and By-Laws, shall provide for the payment to his surviving relatives of such a sum which, according to the Constitution and By-Laws, is due the member, not to exceed \$3,000.00 according to the scale after which he has paid, while the assessment, which every member must pay to this object, must not exceed the provisions described in the By-Laws, provided that any member of a lodge may make the lodge of which he is a member, part of his beneficiary or dependent to the amount paid by such lodge for assessment to the Supreme Lodge for keeping his insurance in good standing, during such time he is unable to pay his assessment, any member who wishes to take advantage of this provision, should send in his certificate to the Supreme Secretary together with a sworn affidavit before a Notary with seal, stating said member applies for such loan, and said affidavit should be noted on his certificate and become part thereof and the treasurer of the local lodge to which such member belongs, should note the name and amount of the assessment on each monthly report to the Supreme Secretary, who should have blanks with space for such notation.

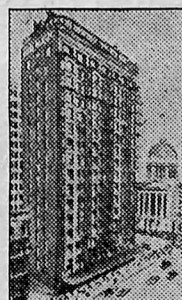
