Results of the 1935-36 Member- ship Contest

Midnight, May 31, 1936, was the official closing time for this contest. In a few instances lodges had "saved up" their candidates so as to have a big class, with the result that they did not get them initiated into the lodge before after June 1st. Officially they can not be counted in the contest. Fortunately these few instances would not have had any influence on the final results.

The official count shows that during this contest we secured

441

new members. Even though we did not reach the original goal the result is very gratifying.

In the contest for the lodges at large to see who could secure the greatest number of new members, regardless of location or present size of the lodge, the

FIRST PRIZE

goes to Seattle Lodge No. 29, Seattle, Wash., with a final grand total during the campaign of 48 new members

SECOND PRIZE

goes to Junction City Lodge No. 268, Junction City, Ore., with a final total of 39 new members.

THIRD PRIZE

goes to Long Island Lodge No. 325, Long Island, N. Y., whose final total was 31 new members.

The additional first prize offered later in the campaign for the greatest number of new members secured on a percentage basis goes to Astoria Lodge No. 307, Astoria, Ore., who had 22 members when the campaign started, and secured 16 new members, thus having a membership increase of 72.72 per cent. In this classification honorable mention surely goes to Wilbur Lodge No. 152, Wilbur, Wash., who had a membership of 24 at the start of the contest and secured 17 new members, thus having an increase of 70.83 per cent—but, of course, close doesn't count.

Four beautiful bronze plaques are now in the process of being manufactured specially for each of the winners mentioned above, and just as soon as they are completed they will be mailed to the lodge secretary.

In the contest for most members secured by individuals the result was exceedingly close, but the final result shows that

goes to Brother H. C. Christophersen of Lodge No. 268, Junction City, Ore., who secured 17 new members.

SECOND PRIZE—\$15 in CASH

Something to Think About It Will Not Hurt

Having been invited to write a few lines for the paper, makes me think—or at least I am trying to think: What to write?

I have often admired the writers of the well written articles published occasionally and wished for the gift to be able to fasten thoughts to paper—it is so much easier and convenient to speak to a group of men, than to write and in line with words used by Brother Svend Petersen in his article in the June issue: "Your supreme officers are not gifted with divine wisdom"—(I heartily approve). I wish to add that having been honored with election to a place on the supreme board, I am almost the same plain fellow as before the last convention, still wearing the same size hat and driving the same old car, so please don't expect that I should have become a writer in the short time since the election.

This is written shortly after the close of the convention held at Cleveland, Ohio. I was not there, but having listened to the proceedings by way of radio, I am sincerely grateful that we do not nominate our president of the Brotherhood the Republican way; the reason for not including "democratic" is that this must be in the hands of the printer before the 20th of June.

I hope the above will not be misunderstood as an attempt to meddle in politics. I am merely, by comparison, trying to express my admiration for the splendid conduct of our national convention. The able leadership of our officers and the sincere, eager willingness of the delegates to tackle the many propositions before them is gratifying. Many a fair fighter has won friends even among his opponents and no one can take part in a convention, as the one we held in Denver, without gaining a greater respect for his fellow man—right or wrong.

We are trying to do as well once a year in California by our general committee, and may look forward to our meeting in Petaluma in September

with much pleasure, some remembering, as well as I do, the fine meeting we held in Petaluma nine years ago. If you are thinking of a visit to California, include our meeting in Petaluma in your plans, you won't be sorry. The lodges of the Sisterhood meet at the same time.

I know the bowling season is closed, our tournament is over, the prizes have been distributed, and I hope they have reached their proper destinations in accordance with the list in our May issue. Having heard nothing from any of the winners, I take it for granted that no errors have been committed and that no complaints are due—but—as this was my first tournament, I surely expected suggestions for improved rules, as I have repeatedly invited, but so far no suggestions, no criticisms, no complaints. Is it possible that the rules were so perfect that improvement is impossible? I don't think it requires "divine wisdom" to formulate a set of bowling-rules, but before it becomes necessary for me to change the size of my hat, I wish that some of the fellows who really know something about bowling would knock the growing conceit to a place where it belongs, by accepting the invitation to submit improvements for next season's rules.

I believe that we are all looking for improvements in our personal as well as in fraternal and public affairs. Let us prove our alertness and intelligence by offering constructive suggestions and at times a word of praise. If we do not succeed in building up our membership to its former numbers, we can improve our Brotherhood in other ways.

A small nation can be as great or greater than a nation with a much larger population and, I believe, it is well to remember that if our opportunities for a large increase in our membership do not improve, it is better to make the best and the most of the present conditions, rather than to dwell in memories of what was.

Der er meget, der har gaaet for sig i Seattle Loge Nr. 29 de forløbne første fem Maaneder af Aaret. Aarets første Møde var en Sukces med Broder Overpræsident N. B. Nelson som Gæst

og Indsætter af den nye Bestyrelse. Til dette Møde var der henvend 200 Brødre mødt op, og 4 nye Medlemmer blev optaget. Denne gode Begyndelse aabnede Vejen for en Række gode og godt besøgte Møder.

Logen her har i Aar besøgt adskillige Begravelser for andre Loger, og i den Anledning vil jeg tillade at komme med en lille Bemærkning, som maaske vil være til Gavn for hele Samfundet, hvis der bliver gjort noget ved Sagen. Et Par af disse Brødre, som blev begravet, var Brødre tilhørende andre Loger, men som har været bosiddende i Seattle henholdsvis 14 og 31 Aar, men som aldrig har besøgt Logen, og som aldrig er kommen sammen med Landsmænd, hvilket har gjort det umuligt at faa deres Adresser eller Kendskab til dem. Naar en saadan Broder ligger for Døden, kommer maaske Certifikatet frem og som Regel skal dette forandres, hvilket skal gøres hurtigst muligt.

Saadanne Brødre er som Regel ikke kendt med Lovene, og det er ofte vanskeligt at gøre sig forstaaelig, og særlig naar Assurancen er nedsat. Almindelig lyder Historien, at vedkommende skulde have gaaet til Møde, men fordi ikke at være Medlem af denne Loge blev det udsat, og til sidst gaaet i Glemmebogen. Det er selvfølgelig vanskeligt at tvinge en Broder til at gaa til Møde i en fremmed Loge, men eet kan der gøres, nemlig at Sekretæren underretter Sekretærerne i andre Loger, hvilke Brødre som opholder sig paa fremmede Steder, for derigennem at faa Adresserne paa saadanne Brødre. Der kan maaske være mange Grunde, hvorfor en Broder ikke vil besøge en fremmed Loge, maaske var han paa Kant og ikke i Overensstemmelse med sin egen Loge, og der kan være mange Grunde, men hvis saadanne Brødre faar Invitationer fra Gang til Gang, er det mest sandsynligt, at de vil give Møde, og maaske vinder Logen derigennem gode Kræfter, og den fremmede Broder vil føle sig mere hjemme. Husk, Sekretærer, naar en Broder rejser for at tage fast Ophold i andre Byer, og har opgivet sin Adresse, da med det samme underrette Sekretæren derom i den By, hvor han opholder sig, saaledes at han kan blive indført i Adresselisten.

Her i Seattle, saa vel som i andre større Byer, findes der Massevis af Brødre, som tilhører andre Loger. Maaske vilde det være en god Maade, at Logen havde en særlig Aften sat til Side hvert Aar, hvor der blev gjort særlig Anstrengelse for at samle fremmede Brødre og arrangere et eller andet for dem. I Seattle Loge har vi 52 Medlemmer, som er bosiddende udenfor Staten. Om kort Tid vil Sekretærerne i de forskellige Loger faa Oplysning om Navn og Adresse, saa kan selvfølgelig den fremmede Loge gøre ved Sagen hvad den vil, men jeg tror, en lille Opmærksomhed som denne vil gavne Brodersamfundet og hjælpe den Broder, som er tilbageholdende, eller er bange fordi han ikke har det rigtige Pasord. Nu er det nok om den Sag, som kun var en Henstilling for Overvejelse, for muligt at samle alle Brødre fra nær og fjern for at faa dem sammen med os.

Der er Undtagelser til alting, og dette er Tilfældet med gamle Broder Anders Peter Larsen, som er Medlem af Kenosha Loge Nr. 14; han er en af de faa herboende fremmede Brødre, som har besøgt Logen. Han har altid fra det første Møde følt sig hjemme iblandt os, og det var en Fornøjelse,

da Loge Nr. 14 gav denne Loge Hvervet at dekorere Larsen med hans 50-aars Emblem. Dette blev ogsaa paa en værdig Maade udført af Logens Præsident, John Petersen, efter der var oplæst en Skrivelse med Lykønsning fra Loge Nr. 14. Det var en Fornøjelse at se gamle Broder Larsen bryste sig med det fikse Emblem, som han med Værdighed hæfter paa, naar han kommer til Møderne.

Det var en Overraskelse til Keglespillerne og Logen, da Resultatet fra Keglespillet blev oplæst, og de fem Keglespillere blev dekoreret hver med en Bronzemedaille; alt saadant hjælper til at skabe Interesse indenfor Logen og Samfundet.

Den største Glæde, som Logen har haft, er vel nok Masseoptagelsen i Marts og Besøget af Overpræsident N. B. Nelson, Ex Overpræsident John Christensen og Oversekretær Frank V. Lawson og mange fremmede Brødre, hvor der blev optaget 40 nye Medlemmer. Siden den Gang er der optaget flere, og den 27. Maj blev der optaget 3, hvilket ialt vil udgøre 49 nye Medlemmer for Loge Nr. 29's Vedkommende for de første fem Maaneder af Aaret.

Ved sidste Møde i Maj var der igen samlet en stor Forsamling, der taltes 125 Medlemmer. Dette var nu første virkelige Sejr, som var vunden af engelsktalende Medlemmer, og sandsynligvis vil Logen lidt efter lidt glemme, hvad der er dansk, og de Medlemmer, som for Aarevis har været over Sproget og danske Traditioner. Logens Præsident, John Petersen, som skal en Tur til Danmark, blev af Vicepræsident Einar Hansen paa Logens Vegne ønsket Held og Lykke paa Turen, med Opfordring om at hilse alle Loger, hvor han kom frem. John Petersen skal rejse sammen med Ex Overpræsident John Christensen, med M/S Batory, som afrejste fra New York den 2. Juni. Ved Rebild Festen den 4. Juli vil John Petersen overrække en Gave fra Staten Washington til Musæet paa

Rebild. Gaven bestaar af en Samling forstenede Træsorter, og en ualmindelig stor Østersskal paa over tolv Tommer, som John Petersen fik af Statssekretæren, Hr. Hutchingson, som en Gave til Musæet. En passende Gave, som ikke alene har historisk Værdi, men ogsaa Værdi som Avertering for Staten Washington og dens Tommer og berømte Østers. Gaven blev udtaget af Statsmusæet, og det kan oplyses, at Staten Washington af alle Stater har den rigeste Samling af forstenede Træsorter, og derigennem Forhistorien om Staten.

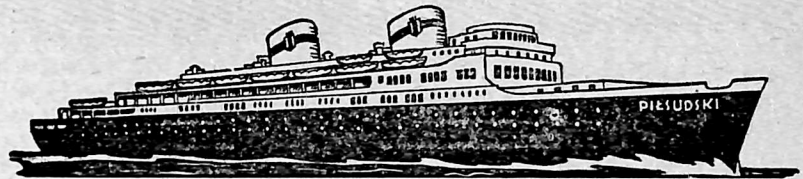

Supreme Board Decisions

A protest was received from lodge No. 195 against the action of the old board by which the old age relief of one of the members of No. 195 had been discontinued. The board had been informed that said brother went on a pleasure trip to Europe which was paid for by one of his children.

Nelson: So many brothers, whose families are not able to assist them at all, are depending on the help we can give them, that I can not agree to give a brother, whose family can afford to send him to Denmark on a pleasure trip.

Lawson: I am in favor of leaving this brother off the relief list. If the family can afford to send him to Denmark on a pleasure trip, they can afford to help him pay his dues and assessments.

Rasmussen: My opinion to question, same decision as before.

Christensen: I don't see any reason why we should change our decision in this matter. If they can send this brother to Europe then they certainly can get along without the \$4.50 per month.

Petersen: I feel confident that the original decision rendered by the Supreme Board in this matter was arrived at after due and just consideration of the case from all angles. Based upon this assumption, I sustain the original decision of the Supreme Board.

Hansen: It is extremely difficult to express a definite opinion in the case submitted, without all of the facts.

However, I have unlimited confidence in the former board's decision which should not be reversed unless proofs are furnished that the matter should be given further attention.

DECISION: That the board does not feel it can consistently give old age relief to a brother, whose family is in a position to send him on a pleasure trip to Denmark.

N. B. NELSON, Supreme Pres.

Upon the suggestion of the Supreme President the chairman of the supreme trustees, C. B. Christensen, was appointed leader of an attendance contest; Supreme Trustee Viggo C. Hansen, leader of the bowling tournament, Supreme Vice-president John Hansen, leader of the horseshoe pitching tournament, Supreme Trustee Svend Petersen having been appointed leader of the membership contest at the fall meeting of the board.

A letter was received from the Eastern Lodges requesting the sending out of their referendum proposal for district convention system. To make it possible to get this proposal in the November issue the supreme secretary stated that he had sent a copy direct to our paper so it could be printed immediately when ordered by the board.

Nelson: That we try to get it in the November paper.

Hansen, John: Under our present laws there is no way that we can refuse to send out this proposition for referendum. Some of the lodges might actually complete the voting within this year, others may not. It is my opinion that we should send this proposition out in the usual way, and if the actual voting in some lodges takes place after the first of the year, the board will then be compelled to rule out the entire proposition because the referendum was not finished within the period during which referendum was permissible according to our laws.

Lawson: I believe the proposed refer-

endum is too late to be acted upon and may prevent some lodges from voting thereon legally before December 31, 1935. I do not believe a lodge could legally vote on this question after December 31, 1935, as the present by-law stands cancelled as of that date.

Rasmussen: If the referendum is printed in the November issue; and the Lodges have the necessary time, for debate and vote, on the question, before Jan. 1, 1936; I suppose the result from same would be legal.

Christensen: As the Denver Convention abolished referendum to take effect January 1, 1936, and it is impossible to get the vote and complete report from the Lodges before that time, it would seem to me that to send it out for referendum at this time would not be right. We have a lot of lodges that only have one meeting per month and it would be impossible for them to vote on this before their January 1936 meeting, therefore, I am not in favor of sending this out for referendum.

Petersen: It is mandatory on the part of the Supreme Board to submit for a referendum vote of the lodges the proposal submitted by 10 or more lodges. In as much as said referendum has not already been submitted by first class mail, I believe it should be inserted in the Nov. 1st issue of our paper in the usual manner. If the matter is officially submitted under the present laws, I believe the results will be binding even if not known until after the new laws become effective.

Hansen, Viggo: I am in favor of extending the time for voting until January 10, 1936, if it can be done legally. I believe it would win the approval of the entire membership, if the Supreme Board would grant this extension to give all lodges an opportunity to vote.

DECISION: That Referendum be published in our November paper.

N. B. NELSON, Supreme Pres.

The supreme secretary informed the board, that the Nebraska Insurance Department had approved the paragraph in our laws passed in Denver permitting members past 60 years of age to obtain a paid-up certificate but that the New York Department refused to approve the paragraph. Our supreme secretary had taken the matter up with our actuary, who recommended that under the circumstances the matter be dropped, as it would be impossible to satisfy the New York Department.

Nelson: While I would have liked to see this paragraph in our laws, it appears that it is necessary to strike it out and so vote.

Hansen: It is impossible for me to form an opinion on the basis of the letter submitted from New York Insurance Department.

From past correspondence I have had with the Department I am sure that our plan can get their O. K. by reducing face value of new policies to take care of all conditions outlined in their letter.

Will recommend that we write again stressing the fact that new policies given in exchange must carry the entire financial burden.

Lawson: That we eliminate from our laws the paragraphs pertaining to permit members past 60 years to have a paid up certificate issued to them.

Rasmussen: I recommend that we cancel paragraph, permitting members over 60 years to receive a paid up certificate; as New York Insur-

ance Department and perhaps other Insurance Departments will not permit it.

Christensen: I recommend that we drop this matter as our actuary suggests.

Petersen: Under the existing circumstances there seems to be no choice in the matter; hence the elimination of the paragraph in question is hereby sanctioned by me.

Hansen, Viggo C. While it seems odd, that an interstate organization like ours must comply with a number of different and contrary state regulations without a chance to appeal to some authority (outside of the courts), I presume, that further attempts to gain a favorable decision by the New York Ins. Dept. may prove very costly and am therefore in favor of elimination of the paragraph from our laws.

DECISION: That the paragraph relating to paid up policies after age of sixty be stricken.

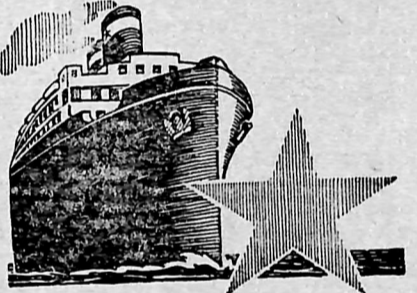
