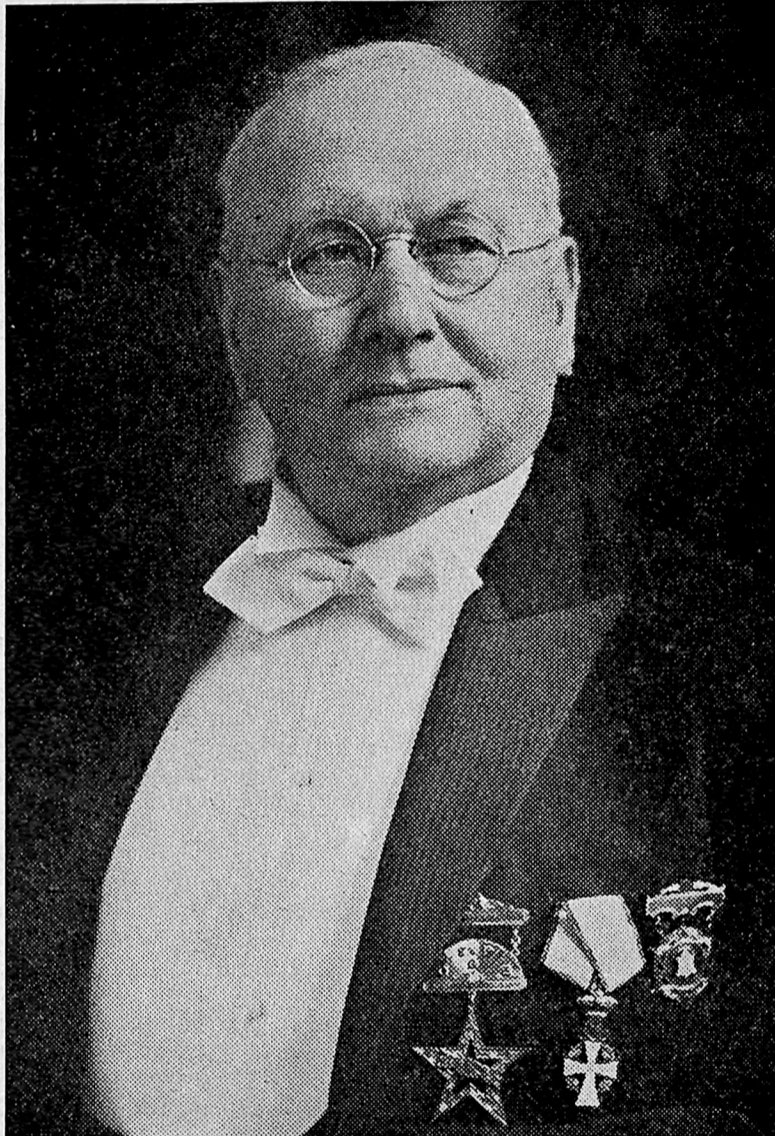

Happy Birthday Brother Vogt!

On July 2, 1859, an event took place in Denmark at Osterholm Als. At that time H. H. Vogt saw daylight for the first time, and it was an event that proved to be of great importance to the Danish Brotherhood.

Brother Vogt, as a good many other young people of his age, had a desire to see the world; consequently, he left Als in 1875 and came directly to Iowa.

In 1881 he became a charter member of Davenport Lodge No. 3. He took an active part in all the work concerning the Danish Brotherhood. In 1893 he was elected trustee at the convention in Omaha. At the convention in Minneapolis in 1896 he was elected Supreme President, re-elected in Des Moines in 1898, in Racine in 1902 and in Council Bluffs in 1906. He was Supreme President of the Danish Brotherhood for a period of 14 years and nine months. During his administration he laid the foundation for several of the functions within the Brotherhood that are still working fine today. He laid the foundation for our Relief Fund, and he also had changes made in our by-



laws by which very strict control is kept over our finances.

During the earlier part of his work as Supreme President, there was quite an unfriendly relation between the Danish press and the Brotherhood, and for that very reason, the membership in our organization was practically at a standstill. Through Mr. Vogt's efforts, cooperation was brought about, and the Danish Brotherhood experienced a gain in membership that has not been equalled since.

On July 2, 1939, the lodge in Davenport will celebrate Mr. Vogt's 80th birthday. There will be a party in the lodge building in honor of Mr. Vogt. All members of the Danish Brotherhood join Lodge No. 3 in wishing Brother Vogt a HAPPY BIRTHDAY!

Through his work for the Danish Brotherhood he has earned and enjoys the name of "our grand old man."

Mr. Vogt is in fine health and actively engaged in conducting the business with which he has been connected for a great number of years.

Annual Convention In St. Paul, Minn.

The Minnesota lodges held their annual convention in St. Paul on June 10. In spite of the drizzling rain, about 40 delegates and visitors were present when George Esterby, No. 91's president, called the meeting to order at 11 a. m. He then turned the gavel over to President Martin N. Hansen from Duluth, who bid everyone welcome and expressed as his wish that something good would come out of this meeting.

The minutes and various reports were read and found in order.

Ten lodges had sent delegates who reported how things were going for them locally. The general story seemed to be that we were all more or less standing still, or in some cases slipping, except St. Paul, where they have a string of 15 candidates to be initiated. The sentiment was very

much for making some kind of a reform whereby we can get new members.

The language question was, of course, discussed. A motion from Svend Andersen of Albert Lea, about working up interest for a Junior Department within the D. B. S. was really the thing that interested yours truly the most. The idea is rather new for us, but it wouldn't surprise me if something in that direction would be the solution for our problem.

Supreme Trustee Svend Petersen was called on and gave us an interesting oversight of the D. B. S. as a whole; investments of our resources, insurance policies, etc.

The national convention and various suggestions for improvements of our constitution were also discussed.

The following officers were elected for the next term: Ex-President, Martin N. Hansen, Duluth; president, Hans Marcussen, Austin; vice president, George Esterby, St. Paul; secretary, Chris Hansen, Minneapolis;

treasurer, Peter Rasmussen, Rochester; and trustees, Fred Paulsen, Hayward, Hans Jorgensen, Jackson, and J. Jacobsen, Alden.

In the evening we attended a banquet arranged by the Sisters who had their meeting on the same day. About 175 people were present. Dr. Rasmussen acted as toastmaster. Both the old and the new presidents of the Sisterhood and the Brotherhood had the floor for some remarks; Ex-Governor Hjalmar Petersen spoke, so did Svend Petersen; Supreme Treasurer of the Danish Sisterhood, Ellen Hojrup, also spoke; and den „Jydske Smed“, and several others. Then we danced to Helge Bjerg's music, and of course, got lost trying to find out of St. Paul going home.

Most of the delegates partook in the annual festival at Danebo the next day where an extensive program had been arranged. About 600 people attended this festival.

Supreme Board Decisions

The following letter was received by Brother John Hansen who submitted it for a board opinion in the usual manner.

Long Beach, Calif.,
November 2, 1938.

Mr. John Hansen, Supreme Vice President

Dear Brother Hansen:

Several months ago the Brothers of Lodge 126, Los Angeles, Calif., came to Long Beach and showed us a Danish film, pictures taken on a trip to Denmark. They had long time ahead advertised in the local newspapers about this film, and they also wrote invitations to every Danish name they could find in the telephone book, so when the evening came, the film was to be shown, there was about 350 Danish families getting together in the hall here in Long Beach. After the moving pictures were shown, we all were placed around the tables to some refreshments, and while we were eating, we listened to many speeches. It didn't take us long time to find out, that the ideas of getting these Danes together were, that a new lodge should be started here in Long Beach. The brothers of Los Angeles were waiting for the final word from one of the Danes here in Long Beach, and even so, I at that time only had been in Long Beach for one month, I felt, that it could be done, so I told them, that we will and we can start a lodge here in Long Beach. Since then I have worked hard to see it come through, and today I am glad, that we have the "Pacific" Lodge No. 329 in the Danish Brotherhood in America.

This morning I received a copy of "Det Danske Brodersamfunds Blad," and I read the article about the moving pictures taken this year on the excursion to Denmark. It also said, that all lodges interested in getting these pictures must communicate with you, so I am writing this letter to you, telling you about an idea, which came to my mind.

I am married and I have a wife and a little baby to support. I am sorry to say, that I have been out of work for the last two or three months, and the reserve fund we had, when we 15 months ago arrived from Denmark, has already been used up. Well, here is my idea. You just read about the 350 Danes, who got together here in Long Beach several months ago, and you can be sure, they came because they wanted to see pictures from Denmark. There is no doubt in my mind, that every place this new film will be shown, will get many Danes together, there will be members of the lodges and there will be Danes, who are not members. These non-members are the ones we wish to find, and it is the wish of the Danish Brotherhood to get more and

more members into the lodges. My idea is then, if the Danish Brotherhood had a man, who could travel with this film, advertise it and by showing this film getting all Danes together, then he can't fail in getting some more members for the lodges.

Let us see, how it could be worked. The man will have the list of all the secretaries of the lodges in America. He writes ahead of time to one of the secretaries, and let him know, when he will arrive in that town. The next two or three days he is busy writing invitations out to all Danes in the neighborhood and also getting it in local newspapers. The meeting is on, the film is to be shown. Every Dane, who goes through the door, will write his name and address in a visitor book. The tickets for the evening will be (maybe) fifty cents. There will be (maybe) 100 Danes that evening. The lodge has taken in \$50. The hall is their meeting place, so that is already paid for, so these \$50 are clear, if there is no refreshments to be paid for. Let us then say, that the man, who showed the pictures gets half of all the money, which will come in on such an evening, they will just the same be to the benefit of the lodge, as they will make the half of the money coming in, and also receiving a list of many prospects to be new members of the lodge. Then, if the man finds time to do so, he could use one or two days after the film is shown to visit these Danes, who wrote their names and addresses in the visitor book, and who are not members, and he may get many new members that way.

Now, I do not know, if I have made my ideas clear enough, but I do know, if I was offered a job like that, I shall guarantee that I will double the membership inside the Danish Brotherhood in America.

As I told you, I am out of work, and if this idea of mine could come through, I believe, I could make a living and beside doing something good for the lodges.

Hoping to hear from you in the near future.

Just a few words in regards to our lodge in Long Beach. We are getting along fine. We all are working hard and we have great interest in building up this lodge, so I am sure, we will for a long time to come only write good news about our lodge.

DECISIONS:

Nelson: The matter of increasing our membership by engaging a full time organizer has been urged for a number of years but on account of the great expense it has never been tried out.

It seems to me here is a splendid opportunity to give the proposition a tryout without having to spend much money and I am very much in favor thereof.

Hansen, John: It is now too late to carry out this idea. Serious consideration to this question of paid organizer should be given at our spring meeting.

Lawson: I believe it would be worth

while to accept Brother Seidler's offer to show the film on the terms as outlined in his letter to Brother John Hansen. Possibly Brother Seidler could work with Brother Svend Petersen in our membership campaign for the coming year and details could be arranged between them.

Rasmussen: The letter from Kaj Seidler explaining his idea to travel and show the films taken in Denmark; I think the idea wonderful and if John Hansen and Kaj Seidler can work out a plan, I am with them.

Christensen: Brother Seidler's idea is surely very good. It is in line with what we talked about at our last meeting. However, we should not charge 50-cents admission for our Denmark films.

I do not believe we should do anything in this matter at this time. I am quite sure the films are taken for the most of the winter and therefore, I'll recommend that we discuss this at our spring meeting.

Petersen: At our recent meeting in Omaha we adopted a definite plan for our Denmark pictures for the time being, and it is my belief that we should adhere to that plan until it has been given a trial and we learn something definite as to the response to the pictures and what comment we get upon them.

Brother Seidler's enthusiasm is appreciated, but his optimism indicates lack of experience.

Based upon the above, I am not in favor of accepting the offer.

Hansen, Viggo C.: I believe Brother Seidler's enthusiasm is causing him to overestimate the possibilities.

I am in favor of letting Brother John Hansen retain control of the pictures from our excursion as decided at our last meeting.

DECISION: The majority of the board being opposed, Brother Seidler's offer is declined.

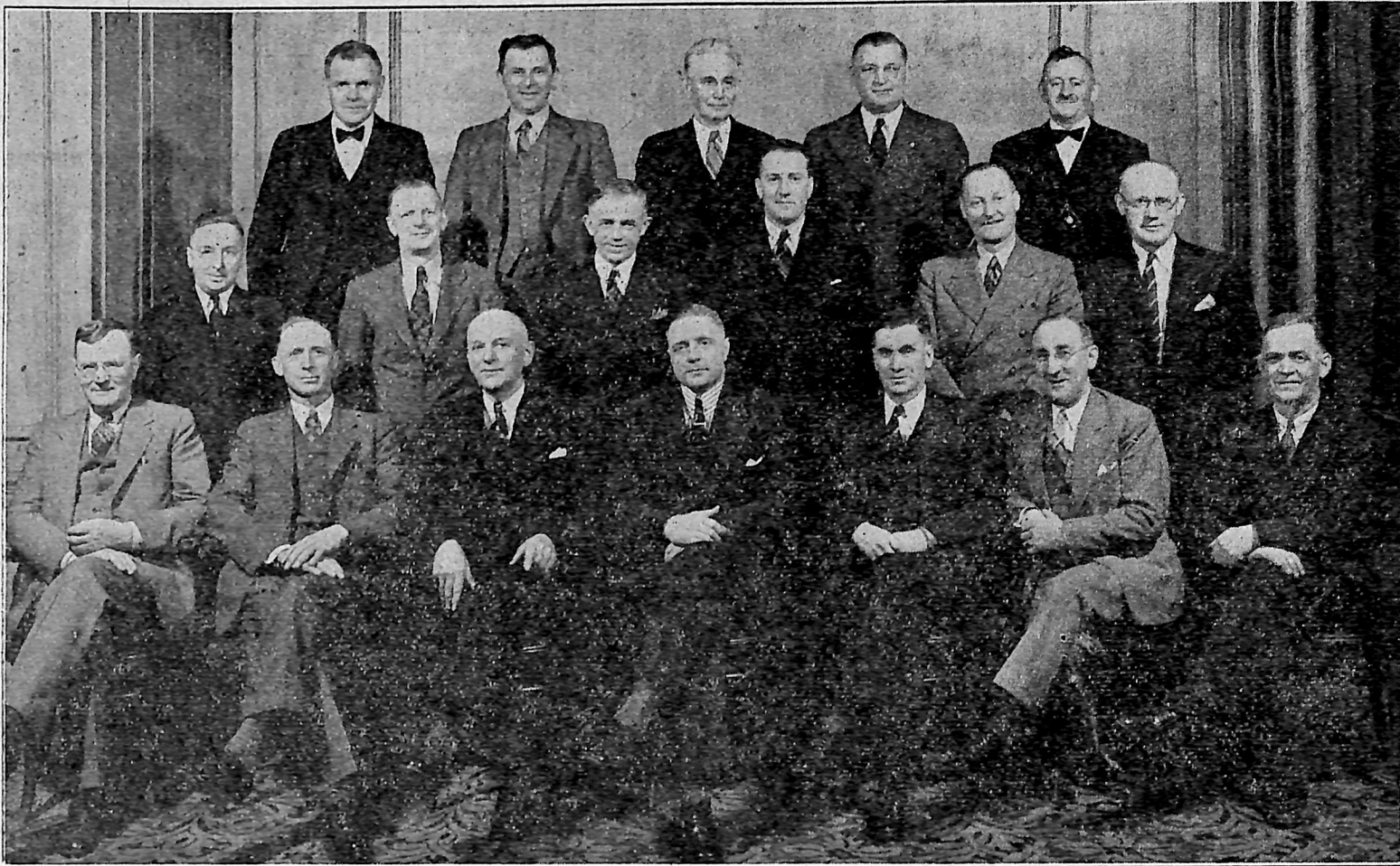

Tour No. 4: Merchandise Mart; see and hear an N. B. C. broadcast. This has to be seen and heard—it is hopeless to try to explain it.

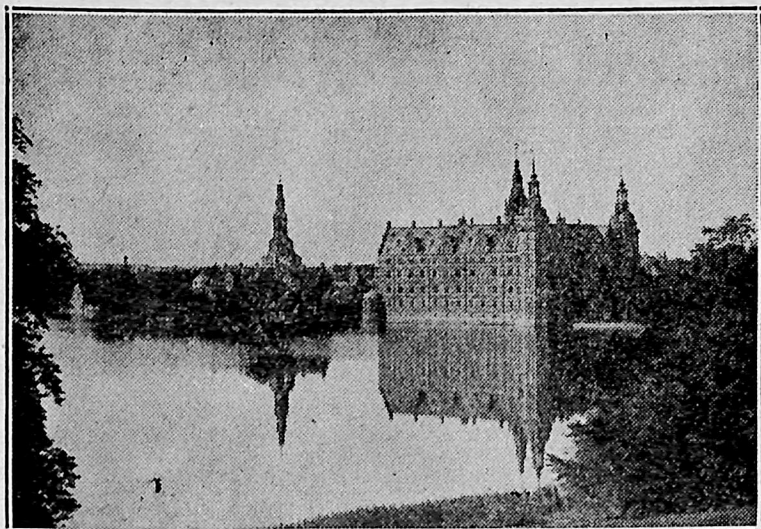
Tour No. 5: Field Museum; Planetarium; Aquarium. These places are world famous and nothing more need be said about them.

Desto rigere en Mand var i Omegnen af vor Hjemstavn, desto større var han i den almindelige Befolknings Betragtning. Hvad vi i Ungdommen fik indprentet i Naturen fulgte os tildels til Alderdommen, saa at vi ganske naturligt er rede til at bøje Knæ for den Mand der har erhvervet sig mere Jordisk Gods end vi selv ejer. Lars Peter Jensen, der vil ihukommens af flere af Delegerterne til D. B. S. Konventionen i St. Louis, Mo., i 1923, som den Mand der indbød dem til at beskue „Shaws Gardens“, den mest pragtfulde og fuldkomne Have i Amerika, det var kun et Uheld at vi fik en skyllende Regn lige som Forevisningen begyndte. Hr. Jensen var paa den Tid Bestyrer af Skolen og Haven, senere blev han forfremmet til at varetage den store Forsøgs Institution for Blomster og Planter, ved Grays Summit, Mo., hvor han lever nu og finder bedre Lejlighed til at frembringe nye, bedre og smukkere Eksemplarer af Plante-livet.

For hans kløgtige videnskabelige Arbejde i dette Fag er han blevet bekendt over hele Amerika som en af Landets ledende Arboriculturists, videre har han udrettet meget for at udlægge og pryde Plantager og Vejene omkring i Staten af Missouri, alt hans Arbejde har været udført fordi han elskede Blomster og Planter, og ikke for personlig Hæder eller Gunst.

Det blev derfor en stor Overraskelse til ham den 30. Maj da en ny Strækning af Scenisk Landevej og Udsigtsplads blev aabnet paa Rute 66 fra Kirkwood til Pacific, Missouri, og det smukkeste Punkt blev nævnt efter ham som en Paaskønnelse for hans Videnskabelige Arbejde i Botaniken. Uden hans vidende blev der en Kobber Plade afsløret paa dette Punkt der bærer følgende Indskrift:

“Jensen Point: Named in honor of Lars Peter Jensen, first President of the Henry Shaw Gardenway Association. Constructed by Company 1770, Civilian Conservation Corps, under the supervision of the National Park Service in cooperation with the Missouri State Highway Department. Site donated by V. R. Smith.”

Hr. Jensen, der var født nær Roskilde i 1869, er en bekendt Foretagsholder over hele Amerika, iblandt de forskellige Foreninger der dyrker baade naturlige og vilde Blomster, en mere Udførlig Beskrivelse om ham og hans Arbejde var indrykket i Detroit Logens smukke 50 Aars Souvenir Bog, udgivet ved D. B. S. Konventionen i 1931. Som Hr. Jensen altid er stolt af hans Hjemland og er et Æresmedlem af det Danske Brodersamfund, kan vi ikke andet end være stolte af ham som en Landsmand, der ved hans Flid og Dygtighed har vundet et stort Navn i hans adopterede Land og har modtaget saa meget Hæder fra Amerikas Borgere i hans Fag, at der vist ikke findes en anden Dansker her tillands der bærer saa stort et Navn og saa godt et Ry iblandt Botakkere som Lars Peter Jensen.

Viggo Eberlin afgaaet ved Døden

(Nordlyset, 8. Juni 1939)

Den i vide Kredse kendte og afholdte danskfødte Mand Viggo Conradt-Eberlin er afgaaet ved Døden paa et Hospital i Bronx den 2. Juni, efter længere Tids tiltagende Svagthed.

Begravelsen fandt Sted Mandag den 6. Juni i Boyertown Chapel, og Jordfæstelsen foregik paa Woodlawn Cemetery. Loge Cimbria holdt Aftenen før en Sørgehøjtidelighed for den afholdte afdøde Broder.

Han efterlader sin Hustru Jennie, f. Green, to Sønner, Walter og Viggo, samt en Datter, Fru Elizabeth May Wendt, som er gift med Lektor Frantz Wilhelm Wendt i Danmark.

Viggo Conradt-Eberlin var født i Randers den 23. December 1868 som det syvende af Birkedommer Adolph Emanuel C.-E.s 10 Børn. Som 22-aarig Boghandlermedhjælper kom han til New York, hvor han til at begynde med havde det meget haardt. Omsider fik han Plads paa en Farm udenfor Byen for \$10 om Maaned, hvor han maatte slide som et Bæst det meste af Døgnet. Da han efter et halvt eller helt Aar igen kom tilbage til New York, var det atter ved at gaa ham helt galt, og han sluttede sig til Frelsens Hær, i hvis Administration han fik Plads som Kontorist. Han avancerede i Stilling saa vel som i militær Rang og var til 1900 Overbogholder i Frelsens Hær. I de paafølgende 18 Aar var han Bibliotekar i det gamle Astor Library, Fifth Ave. Library og Century Club. Samtidig drev han Handel med importerede danske Bøger og vedblev i denne Virksomhed, indtil Sygdom ganske standsede ham.

Da han var Frelsermand var det en Del af hans Pligter at hjælpe dem, der var „down and out“, og dette blev efterhaanden hans Natur; han maatte altid hjælpe. Mest interesseret var han selvfølgelig i Landsmænd. Selv efter at Eberlin var kommet i anden Stilling blev fattige Danske ved med at opsøge ham og bede ham om Hjælp. Han blev Autoritet paa sit Omraade. Konsulatet, Kirkerne, Foreninger og Private konsulterede ham, og han havde en ualmindelig klar Forstaaelse af, hvem der burde hjælpes og hvem der var haabløse.

Omkring 1909 stiftede Eberlin sammen med nu afdøde Dr. Ejnar Hansen en dansk Hjælpeforening. I virkeligheden var der kun de to aktive Medlemmer i Foreningen. Dr. Hansen tog sig af de syge; sørgede for Lægehjælp, Hospitalsophold, Medicin, Brokbind, o. s. v. Eberlin tog sig af de andre Vanskeligheder. Han havde forbløffende Evne til at klare Folk ud af kedelige Komplikationer; Politio- og Øvrighedsvrøvl. I 1918 absorberedes denne Forening af Danske Kvinders Understøttelsesforening, efter at den havde virket en uendelig Mængde godt.

I 1918 overtog Eberlin Stillingen som Direktør i Danish Div. of Foreign Language Information Service. Han fik her Lejlighed til at hjælpe en Mængde Danske, der var taget til Soldat imod deres Vilje, Desertører, Slackers. Folk, der var politisk mistænkte o. s. v. Senere specialiserede han i at finde forsvundne Danske i Amerika, og han fandt sikkert en Mængde.

Eberlin var godt kendt i Forenningslivet og var bl. a. i mange Aar Sekræter for Brodersamfundsløgen Cimbria.

Efter at Svend Petersen havde overbragt en Hilsen til Nr. 45 fra Overbestyrelsens Medlemmer, blev den flotte Pokal, paa en meget Stilfuld Maade, overbragt til „Major“ Mammen, Sr., og derefter fik Keglespillerne Peter Pilegaard, (Kapt.); Bill Johnson, Walter Larsen og Vilhelm Hansen hver en Bronze Medalie og L. W. Mammen, Jr., fik Hovedlogens Guld Medalie, og det var med en vis Stolthed disse Brødre færdedes imellem os Resten af Aftenen.

From the beginning of civilization, friendships have been formed between mankind, sometimes because of necessity or convenience, and again because genuine affection has developed in the hearts of people toward one another.

Thus we read in the scripture about a great friendship between David and Jonathan, wherein they formed a covenant as a token of that friendship because they loved each other as they loved their own souls. The historic friendship between Damon and Pythias has been well described by many writers. In olden times it was customary for men to mingle their blood in their footprints as a pledge of eternal friendship, and history records that it was often the custom for friends to take an oath, as a symbol of the friendship existing between them, that they would avenge the other's death if killed, by killing the one who perpetrated the deed.

So we find that from these various methods of proving friendships has come in our present day the habit of pledging or vowing to one another friendship and brotherly love, which ritual has been used in our fraternal organizations with more or less sincerity. Many methods have been suggested in order to build up the Danish Brotherhood, some of which have been worthy of consideration. it not, therefore, be a good plan to have a sincere renewal of the pledge now and then in our innermost souls and in our meetings which we once solemnly promised, so that we may have it always in mind and memory and eliminate the loss of so many of our members who, by all that is right, fair and just, should be and remain true and steadfast friends and members.


