Konventionen 1889 og 1939

Naar Delegerede fra Det danske Brodersamfunds mange Loger spredt rundt omkring i Amerika denne Maaned samles til Konvention i Chicago, bliver det vel vanskeligt at finde ret mange, som var med helt tilbage i 1889, da de stedlige Loger sidst var Værtsfolk til det store Stævne, men det kunde jo hænde at En eller anden af de gamle Kæmper endnu er saa aandefrisk og rørig, at han følger med, og saa kunde det være interessant at høre ham berette, thi det der venter de gæstende Brødre idag er noget af et Eventyr; Det danske Brodersamfund har i de mellem-liggende halvtreds Aar gaaet sin store Sejrtsgang, men Chicago er heller ikke staaet stille.

Vi har endnu Billeder fra Konventionen i 1889, og alene ved at sammenligne disse med Nutidens Billeder, da faar Fantasien og Tanken Flugt. De beskæggede danske Emigrant-Ansigter tager sig iøvrigt godt ud i de lange Skødefrakker og det mægtige Kravat, og læser man Beskrivelserne fra Møder og Sammenkomster, da fatter man snart, at paa dette Tidspunkt stod D. B. S. i Blom-

stringens kraftigste Tegn. Damerne fulgte ikke med dengang, som de gør det nu til saa godt som alle Konventioner, men der var ellers tilstrækkelig med Fornøjelser og Adspredelse for de trætte Delegater; det var jo netop i den Periode, hvor Chicago blev berømt over hele Nationen som en Legeplads, Indledningen til Chicagos „gay nineties“, hvorom der endnu synges i Sange og Viser.

Syd for Bydistriktet kan man endnu finde enkelte af de gamle Bygninger, der husede de berømte Etablissementer, men ellers er der ikke efterladt mange Spor af det 19de Aarhundredes Seværdigheder.

Forretningsdistriktet er blevet et andet New York med alt det der hører det tyvende Aarhundrede til, Chicago har været Vidne til to Verdensudstillinger siden vor D. B. S. Folk sidste Gang faldt ind med Døren; hvor der var Heste-Sporvogne eller Kabel-Vogne, rasler de elektriske Sporvogne og Tog afsted i en tilsyneladende uendelig Rundkørsel (og saa er vi endda ikke helt tilfredse med Befordringsmidlerne), og hvor Bro-

der Hansen fra Syd Dakota og Broder Nielsen fra Nevada i en ledig Time traskede rundt paa Prærien ude i Byens Udkanth, knejser nu gigantiske Forretnings-Karre'r, afløste af hyggelig Beboelseskvarterer med blomstrende Haver og Hegn.

I de forløbne halvtreds Aar er der ogsaa sket andre og meget betydelige indre Forandringer. Chicago har lært at skatte den stadig tiltagende Turiststrøm, og naar Landsmænd i Dagene 18 — 22 September stævner til Brodersamfundets 20de Konvention vil de finde, at den hele Storby er besjælet af denne Stemning.

Iøvrigt kan vi berette, at Konventionskomiteen har alt klappet og klart til den travle Uge, og dette gælder i lige saa høj Grad det udmærkede D. S. S. Udvalg, som vil sørge for at vore gæstende Damer bliver underholdt ikke alene hver Dag, men fra Morgen til Aften.

Konventionens Hovedkvarter er, som tidligere meddelt, Hotel Sherman, hvortil alle Meddelelser, Post, o. s. v. kan tilsendes under Adresse: D. B. S. Convention Committee, Hotel Sherman, Chicago, Ill. Denne

Adresse gælder ogsaa for Besøgende, som er indkvarterede andetsteds i Byen.

Den store Folkefest, Festbanketten Torsdag den 21. September, afholdes ligeledes paa Hotel Sherman. Benyt omstaaende Bestillingsblanket og indsend Reservering saa hurtigt som muligt.

Ellers er der kun at ønske for den største Tilslutning og at haabe, at den tyvende Konventions Arbejde maa blive af Betydning for Det danske Brodersamfund i Amerika.

Konventionens Drill Team

Dansk Brodersamfunds Konventionens Drill Team nærmer sig nu sin Afslutning paa Prøverne vi har gennemgaaet i disse varme Sommermaaneder her i Chicago. Vi har haft en Del Vanskeligheder at kæmpe med, dels Varmen ved Prøverne hver Fredag Aften og tillige de forskellige Brødres Ferier, hvor vi hver Gang har maattet indsætte Stedfortrædere for disse Brødre paa forskellige Pladser, og det har selvfølgelig ikke fremmet Øvelserne. Vi er imidlertid nu snart ved den sidste Akt, baade hvad Ferierne og Øvelserne angaar. Man skulde tro, at i en Storby som Chicago, der tæller saa mange Brødre, vilde det være let at samle et saadant Team, men det har vist sig vanskeligt, at samle de 16 regulære Mænd og de 2 Reserver, der var nødvendigt for at danne Teamet, og vi har ikke kunnet vrage mellem lange, korte, tykke eller tynde. Men hver Mand har givet sit Bedste, og det er alt der kan forlanges. Alle Brødrene paa Teamet er klar over at vi vil blive konfronteret af Brødre den Tirsdag Aften, der gennem andre Fraternity Loger, saasom Frimuerne, Elks, o. s. v. maa-ske har set bedre Drill end det vi her i Brodersamfundet, efter kun nogle faa Maaneders Øvelser er i Stand til at præstere, men vi hengiver os nu til de ærede Brødres Kritik og Velvilie. Dette Drill Team er jo nærmest baseret paa en Reklame for at skaffe nye Medlemmer til Samfundet.

Nu lidt om Optagelsen: Efter endt Konventionsmøde om Tirsdagen, og Aftensmaaltidet er indtaget, samles Brødrene igen paa Hotel Sherman i et andet Lokale paa 6te Sal, det saakaldte Tamarin Ball Room. Her vil Over-Præsidenten præcis Kl. 7 (Chicago Tid) aabne et kort Møde, hvorefter Drill Teamet vil marchere ind og give den første Afdeling af Øvelserne, der vil ende med Optagelsen af alle Kandidaterne. Efter en Pause paa 3 eller 4 Minutter, hvor Brødrene bedes om at forblive paa deres Pladser, vil Teamet stille op til anden Afdeling af deres Drill og til Afslutning. Efter at Over-Præsidenten har sluttet Mødet, gaar Turen til Dania Hall, som er Hovedkvarteret, hvor en Smoker vil blive afholdt med Torskegilde og 1ste Klases Entertainment.

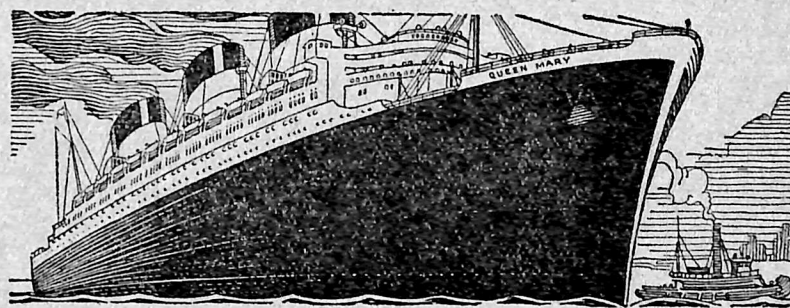

Timely Tips To Delegates

To the delegates and visitors arriving by train for the Danish Brotherhood Convention in Chicago, September 18 to 22 inclusive, my suggestion is to take a taxi from the railroad depot direct to the Hotel Sherman, corner Clark and Randolph Streets.

The fares from the following depots to the Hotel Sherman for one person are: Illinois Central 50c; Grand Central and Polk and Dearborn, 40c; Northwestern and Union Station, 30c. Additional passengers will be carried for a charge of 5c each. So by riding three and four in a cab the cost per person is very little.

Street car fare is 7 cents, while the elevated and bus fares are 10 cents per person. Transfers are issued only at the time the fare is paid. You can transfer from the street car to the elevated or vice versa by paying 10 cents and asking for a transfer to the service you desire.

For those of you who are driving to the convention please bear in mind no street parking is permitted in downtown Chicago during business hours. However, the Hotel Sherman maintains a garage where cars can be parked four hours for 60 cents; 8 hours for 75 cents and 24 hours for \$1.25. The 24 hour rate includes an in and out privilege. There are also many open air parking lots downtown where the rates are somewhat as given above.

The convention headquarters are at the Hotel Sherman, and all are urged to seek lodging there. Write to the hotel for reservations. If necessary, you can have your mail forwarded to you at the hotel and it will receive careful attention.

CONGRESS COMPLETES ACTION ON 1921-24 AMENDMENT

The 1921-24 amendment to the Registry Act, permitting thousands of foreign born men and women to regularize their status and become citizens, was adopted by the U. S. Senate on August 1. It had already passed the House of Representatives on June 5.

The news that this amendment has finally passed both houses of Congress will be particularly welcomed by all aliens who came into the country illegally before July 1, 1924, or of whose admission for permanent residence there is no official record. As soon as the amendment becomes law, it will enable these men and women to obtain a certificate of registry and proceed with naturalization. In the past this privilege has been granted only to aliens who entered the United States before June 3, 1921. It is now being extended to those who came in between that date and July 1, 1924. Up to the present such aliens, while not subject to deportation, could not become citizens, because they could not show legal entry. The new amendment will not apply to aliens who entered illegally on or after July 1, 1924. Such aliens will continue to be deportable, whenever the government locates them.

To take advantage of the new law, a man or woman must be able to

prove (1) that he entered the United States prior to July 1, 1924; (2) that he has resided in the United States since such entry; (3) that he is a person of good moral character; and (4) that he is not subject to deportation. The alien must also be a person "not ineligible to citizenship," that is, he must belong to the white or Negro races.

As soon as the bill becomes law, those wishing to take advantage of it should write or apply to the nearest immigration and naturalization office or to the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Washington, D. C., for a copy of Form 659. The alien must fill in this form carefully and return it. When it is approved, a "record of registry" is made for him and he is given a "certificate of registry." On the basis of such a record of registry, a certificate of arrival may be issued and he can take steps to become an American citizen. He will also be in a position to obtain a return permit, in case he needs to leave the country to make a temporary visit abroad. The fee for making this record of registry is \$10. If anyone wishing to take advantage of the new amendment needs further information or assistance, we shall be glad to have him write, in English if possible, to the Foreign Language Information Service, 222 Fourth Avenue, New York City.

How many men and women are covered by the terms of the new amendment no one knows, but it is estimated that their number will run into tens of thousands. Congress and all those who have worked for the bill are to be congratulated on the success of a measure which is at once an act of justice and common sense.

Decisions Of The Supreme Board.

To the Members of the Supreme Board:

I am forwarding to Brother C. B. Christensen my correspondence concerning payment of the insurance of our deceased brother, Soren Peter Hansen, late a member of Lodge No. 48 in Rock Springs, Wyoming. I do not care to assume the responsibility of ordering this claim paid and therefore submit the matter to you for an opinion in the usual manner. The correspondence will be forwarded to each member of the board in the ordinary manner.

Please indicate in your opinion what disposal I shall make of the claim and to whom the insurance shall be ordered paid.

(Space will not permit printing the correspondence relative to this case; suffice to give the final board opinions and decision which follows:)

OPINIONS

Nelson: In the papers I can find no proof whatsoever that H. P. Hansen is a son of Soren Peter Hansen but if the heirs named in the final decree will assign their shares to him I think we could safely pay it to him. That is the only condition I would be in favor of paying him.

Hansen: As I read our laws (Sec. 50—Par. 2) children and adopted children come before brothers and sisters in paying the insurance. Hence my opinion is that the son should have the insurance paid. Our laws do not distinguish between children born in or out of wedlock. My recommendations would be to get a signed statement from the heirs mentioned in the court action to the effect that they have no claim on the Brotherhood.

Lawson: Our deceased brother, Soren Peter Hansen, evidently did not have a brother by the name of Hans P. Hansen whom he could name as a beneficiary in his certificate and the designation having failed, it would appear that the legal heirs of Brother Hansen are the proper persons to whom the insurance should be paid.

I do not believe it is safe to pay the insurance to the alleged son, who is making claim to same, unless the legal heirs of Brother Soren Peter Hansen named in the probate decree will assign their interest to him.

Rasmussen: My opinion to deceased Brother Soren Peter Hansen's, of Lodge No. 48, Rock Spring, Wyo.; that it should be paid to Hans P. Hansen his son, as he had no brother by that name.

Christensen: As I am quite satisfied Hans Peter Hansen is the son of our deceased brother, Soren Peter Hansen, I will recommend that the insurance be paid to him.

In the correspondence between the sisters and secretary Dalgas, Lodge No. 48, the sisters admit that he is a son of our deceased brother. If the estate had not been settled as it is, I would like to have an affidavit from the sisters of our deceased brother, but as things stand now I do not believe they will be willing to do anything that

might harm them in keeping the money they already have.

Petersen: We must be governed by Par. 3 Sec. 50 in our by-laws, which would make the son the beneficiary.

However, before payment can be made to him he must furnish absolute evidence that he is the son of the deceased.

In the event that Hans Peter Hansen who claims to be a son of the deceased can not furnish evidence to prove that, then the insurance would revert to the heirs set forth in the final decree by the District Court, 2nd Judicial Dist. State of Wyoming, County of Sweetwater.

Hansen: Complicated as the case is by the appearance of a person introduced as a son (not brother) of the deceased after four sisters and others, have been declared the only surviving lawful heirs by the District Court, I am in favor of inviting the alleged son to prove his identity and also his right to the insurance.

DECISION: That the insurance money be paid to H. P. Hansen when assignments from all the heirs named in the final decree, transferring to him all their claims on the insurance, shall have been received by us.

Supreme Vice President John Hansen offered the suggestion that the Danish Brotherhood sponsor a banquet for the Danish Royalty at their recent visit to Omaha.

(Although it was decided to do so, the plan was later abandoned on account of Omaha societies already having made definite arrangements for the entertainment). Following are the opinions and decisions rendered in the matter:

Nelson: I feel the Danish Brotherhood in America should sponsor a banquet in honor of the Danish Crown Prince and the Danish Crown Princess, to be held in the city where we have our headquarters.

Lawson: No plans have been formulated here as we do not know if the itinerary includes Omaha nor what arrangements to prepare for. If a stop-over is planned here, arrangements no doubt will be handled by a committee of Danes and Swedes and not by any particular group or lodges. I believe the matter should be left entirely in the hands of local committees and if Omaha is on the itinerary it would be fitting to postpone our spring meeting to agree with that date and take part in the festivities.

I propose that a committee consisting of our supreme president and our supreme vice president be appointed with full authority to act on behalf of the board on any matter coming up covering this subject.

Rasmussen: I think there is to be a reception for the Danish Crown Prince in Chicago; if so, I suppose it would be before his trip to California, then the best time to arrange for a banquet in Omaha would be when he leaves Chicago for California. I think it is proper to invite him from the Brotherhood, and if he accepts, we should go together with the lodges in Omaha.

Christensen: I heartily approve of the suggestion by our vice president as of January 19.

Petersen: The suggestions made by Brother Hansen have my whole-hearted endorsement. Details can be arranged later. I would suggest that the supreme president dispatch the official invitation at once.

Hansen, Viggo C.: I am in favor of having the Danish Brotherhood recognize the visit in a manner most befitting to the occasion.

The proposals contained in Brother John Hansen's letter have my approval.

I have attempted to get the latest information about landing and itinerary of the visitors, through the Danish Vice Consul in Los Angeles, where the party will land. Nothing very definite is known here at this time as arrangements are being made in Washington, D. C.

DECISION: The majority of the board being in favor of Brother John Hansen's proposal it is so ordered.

Inasmuch as our Supreme Vice President is near to Omaha and presumably will be in Omaha for a finance committee meeting shortly, I will appoint him and our Supreme Secretary as a committee to work out the details.
