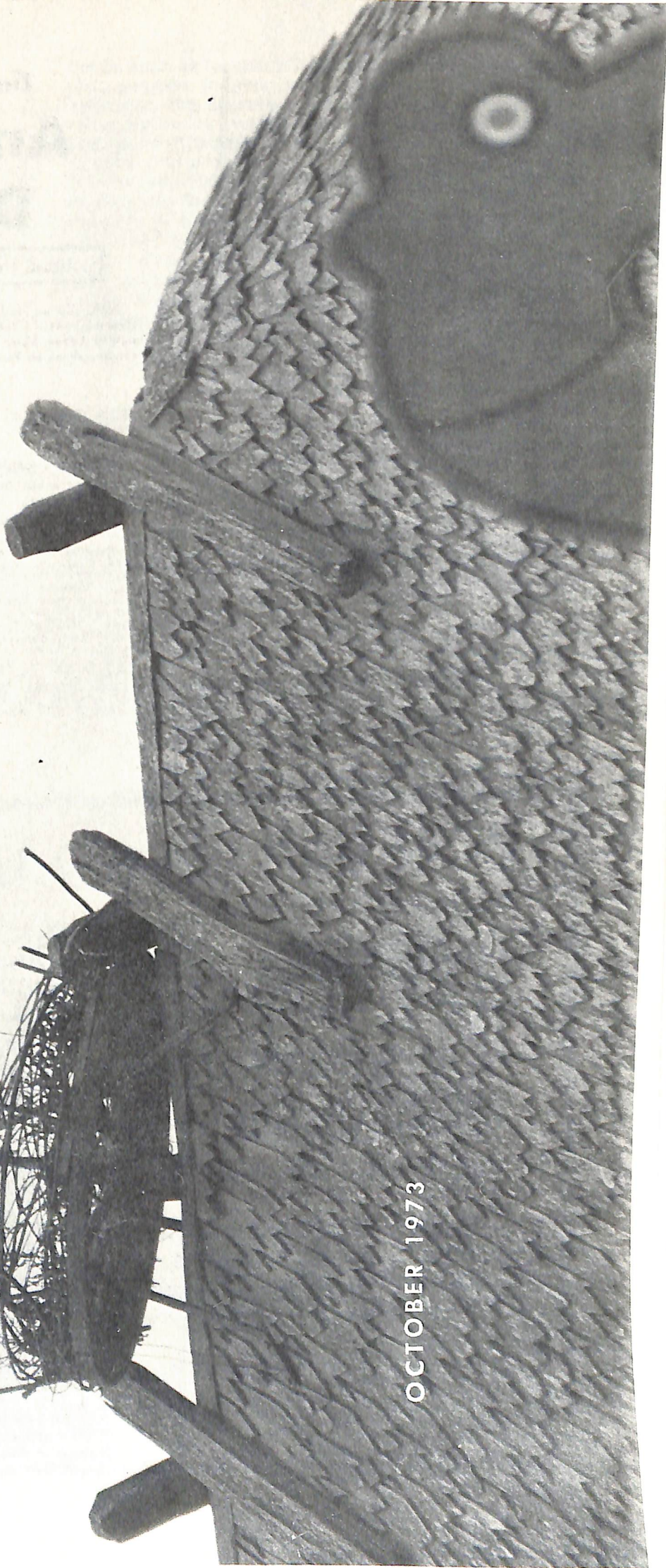
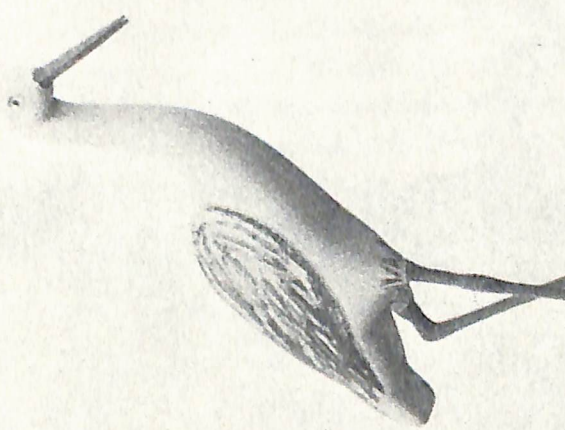

# Competition Opens For Scandinavian Grants

The American-Scandinavian Foundation has announced opening of competition for their 1974-75 fellowships for study in the Scandinavian countries of Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden. The fellowships and grants are restricted to Americans, and the deadline for receipt of fully documented applications is December 1, 1973, with exception of the George C. Marshall Fellowships for study in Denmark, which are due by November 1, 1973. Application blanks may be obtained by writing the Exchange Division, The American-Scandinavian Foundation, 127 E. 73rd St., New York, Ny 10021.

Fellowships offered include: Lassen Fund — \$3200 for study in Denmark. New York Chapter — \$1000 for study in Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway or Sweden. Former Fellows Fund — \$500 for study in Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway or Sweden.

In addition, The American-Scandinavian Foundation recommends candidates for awards by the George C. Marshall Fund Board in Denmark, which makes final decisions: George C. Marshall Fund — Twenty to twenty-five awards of up to \$3600 each for study in Denmark. Awards may be used for short-term professional observation or academic year study or research, usually at the graduate level. The Marshall Fund Board is particularly interested in inviting applications from young businessmen and women who can construct valid proposals for short-term visits of up to three months for professional study. Value of observation in Denmark must be demonstrated. Many

fields, such as furniture retailing, farming, engineering, etc., suggest themselves. If merit of the proposal is sufficient, the Secretariat of the Marshall Fund Board can assist successful candidates with final arrangements and appointments. There is strong competition for awards, and proposals must carry persuasive evidence of the applicant's knowledge of opportunities and facilities in Denmark. Awards for short-term observation will cover basic living expenses in Denmark, as well as international travel.

The American-Scandinavian Foundation is a non-profit educational institution for exchange between the United States and Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden. It is supported through private donation and a membership organized into 22 chapters throughout the United States.

## Apply For Scholarship Now

The Scholarship Committee wishes to announce that scholarship applications for the school year beginning September 1974 will be considered beginning February 1, 1974. Those eligible members wishing to apply should write to The Danish Brotherhood in America, P. O. Box 31748, Omaha, Nebr. 68131, and request an application form not later than December 31, 1973. No applications received after February 1, 1974 will be considered by the Committee for 1974 awards. Scholarships are awarded in the amount of \$125.00 per semester and are renewable, pending qualification, to a total amount of \$1,000.00.

Eligible for scholarship awards are insured members in good standing with-in their local lodge who are attending, or planning to attend, an accredited college, technical school or vocational school in an undergraduate status. Under some circumstances eligible persons attending school in Denmark may receive an award. (See Sec. 61, Par. 9 of the bylaws.)

part of the reason for my majoring in Scandinavian Studies. Sociology will be my second major at the University of Minnesota.

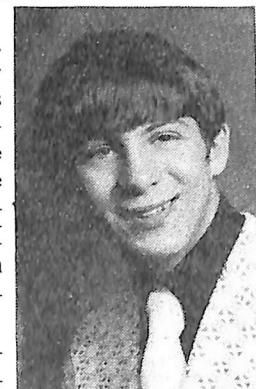

## Danish Wallhangings on Display in N.Y.C.

Fifteen new wallhangings by Arni Frederiksen were unveiled at an exhibition opening at The American-Scandinavian Foundation, 127 E. 73rd Street, New York City, on October 4th. The exhibition which is free of charge, will be open to the public (10-5 weekdays) during October. Although he uses sophisticated techniques and contemporary materials, Mr. Frederiksen's work conveys a feeling of antiquity and timelessness. The Danish-born artist often employs Scandinavian motifs which reflect his interest in northern mythology and Viking history.

The large wallhangings are made from a variety of materials — wools, paint, appliques, gold leaf and fabrics. Of prime importance to Mr. Frederiksen's work is that he dyes all his own wools; a time consuming task, but one that makes possible both a unique subtlety and a vibrancy of color, and gives each strand of wool a mottled and variegated character. By setting his materials at varying depths, the artist achieves a sculptured, three-dimensional effect in many of his hangings.

Art exhibitions are but one of the regular activities of The American-Scandinavian Foundation, among the objectives of which are "to advance the cultural relations between the United States and Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden."

# Praternal Protection

Family financial planning is a personal matter and is best discussed confidentially between you and your Danish Brotherhood

representative. These questions which appear below arise frequently, however, and are answered openly as a service to DB members:

Families usually think of life insurance in terms of protection for the wife and children in the event of the husband's death. But what would happen if the wife were to die first, leaving her husband to bring up the children by himself? Perhaps life insurance could play an important role in this situation, too. Let's see how.

Suppose that a young homemaker dies while her children are still young. Her husband will continue to go to work at the office or plant as before—no problem there. But who will take care of the children, keep house, and perform all of those other duties that she, as a good wife and mother, has been performing?

People are wonderful in times of tragedy and emergency, and we know that neighbors or relatives will doubtless pitch in and help take care of things during the weeks immediately following her death. But after that, what?

Here are the alternatives open to her husband:

1. **He could take care of the children by himself.** Obviously, this solution would be virtually unworkable.

2. **He could get a relative to live with him.** This might have been true in the old days but it is an impractical solution today. Families are widely scattered and each person is intent on living his own life.

3. **He could send the children to live with relatives.** If this were possible it would probably mean dividing the children up among relatives. It seems unlikely, though, that any conscientious father would freely consent to this arrangement.

4. **He could place the children in a foster home.** This would probably be the least desirable alternative of all.

5. **He could remarry immediately.** This is possible, however he should

not be pushed by economic necessity into remarrying hastily.

6. **He could hire a governess-housekeeper.** Everything considered, this would seem to be the best solution until after the children are grown or the father remarries. But it takes a lot of money to hire these people and they are not always easy to find.

The plain fact is that the death of a mother with young children costs her husband a great deal of money. Let's see what the actual costs might be.

### THE COST OF A MOTHER'S DEATH

In the typical situation, a widower with young children is likely to find himself confronted by the following expenses:

\*Final expenses — This is likely to total at least \$3,000 to \$5,000.

\*Cost of Governess or Housekeeper — a widower would be fortunate to find a good woman to

do this for \$3,000 a year plus room and board.

\*Readjustment expense — This would probably take about \$2,000 for the typical family situation.

\*Losses from Income Taxes — If your wife dies your income is taxed at a higher rate. If your taxable income is \$8,000 and you have no children you will lose \$3,250 over 15 years in lost taxes.

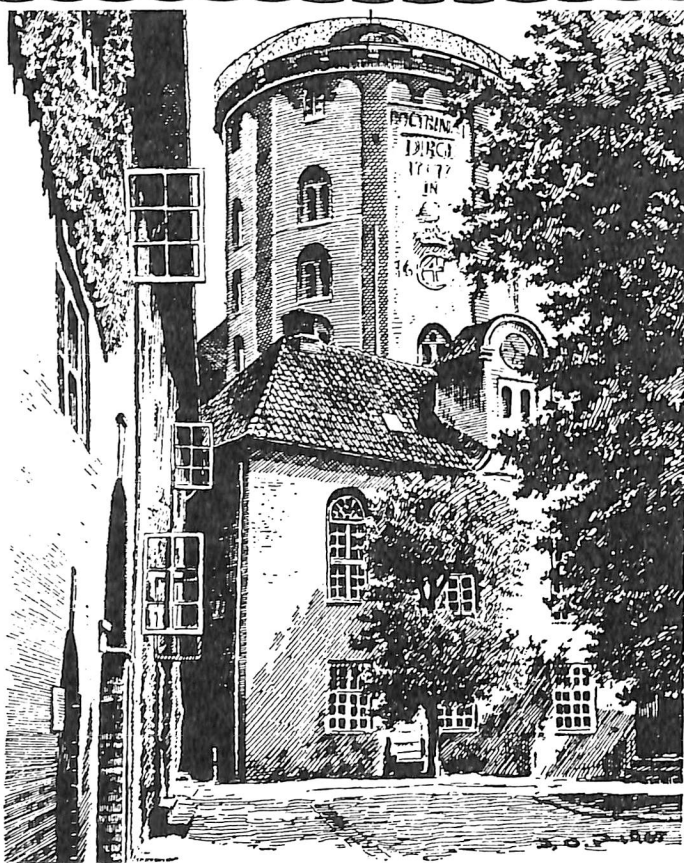
A sensible procedure to follow in buying wife insurance is first to estimate the total costs incurred in case the wife and mother should die today. Then a reasonable approximation should be made of the amount available for premiums. Finally, with the help of your life underwriter, the kind of policy to buy can be determined by relating the amount of protection needed to the premium the family can afford to pay.

## Danish Kitchen

What on earth can you have for dinner when you are asked to make a typical Danish dinner? In the coming months, we are going to offer an authentic Danish recipe for the culinary enjoyment of our readers. Can't you just smell those wonderful aromas wafting from the kitchen right now?

### DANISH PUFFS

- 1 cup margarine
- 2 cups flour
- 2 tbsp. cold water
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 tsp. almond extract
- 3 eggs

Cut 1/2 cup margarine into 1 cup flour. Add cold water, stir until well blended. Press into muffin tins about 1/4 inch

thickness on bottom of each muffin tin. Place boiling water and remaining 1/2 cup of margarine into a saucepan. Bring to a boil, add almond extract, remove from heat. Stir in remaining 1 cup of flour. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Divide this mixture, putting equal amounts in each muffin cup. Bake in hot oven 425 degrees about 50 minutes.

Ice with powdered sugar icing and sprinkle with finely chopped nuts. Icing made with half powdered sugar and half brown sugar is real good too.
