Pacific Northwest Lodges Conventions at Spokane, May 23-24-25

Danish Brotherhood Lodges and Danish Sisterhood Lodges will hold their third annual conventions beginning Friday, May 23rd, with a "Welcome Party" at which gathering Mayor Arthur R. Meehan will extend Spokane's welcome to visiting sisters and brothers. The business sessions of both organizations will occupy all of the following day and will terminate with a banquet and grand ball at Hotel Spokane. Sunday forenoon visitors will be tendered a farewell breakfast by the Spokane brothers.

It so happens that Spokane during these three days will be host to another convention with an expected attendance of several thousand delegates so for that reason it is important that reservations for hotel accommodations be sent in promptly. We have reserved, what we think, sufficient rooms for our need, but they must be spoken for not later than April 15th. Then rooms not reserved will have to be released back to the hotel. Our headquarters will be at the Hotel Spokane and reservations should be made direct with hotel, please. Rate schedule will be found on page 6 of the souvenir program sent you.

As you will recall there are six prizes, each consisting of a "Taylor" adjustable barometer, that will be awarded so that every other lodge in the district will win a barometer. 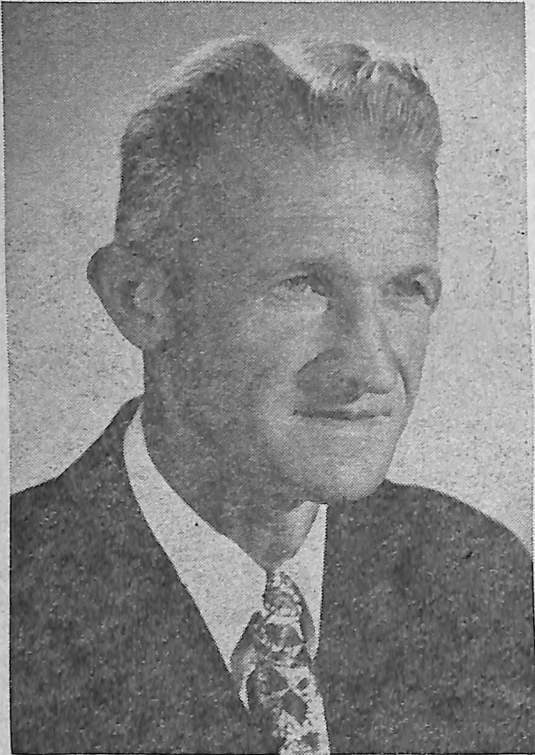
Brother Ferdinand Andersen was given a big hand, when it was learned that he this evening was celebrating his birthday making him of equal age with the lodge.

Here and There

There were a number of articles in last issue of our magazine of considerable interest. The new Supreme President called for help:—a song of welcome and a message of condolence. I have an idea that the song contest will outrun the latter. But I can see that both are necessary. A definite condolence for all would save some type setting and as a message from the whole Brotherhood the same words could well be used. If an individual lodge wanted a special message that would likely go to the local paper anyway, it could do so.

In another column I see that Jubilee meetings are being announced, our nearest being Askov, Minn., June 14th, etc. Well, let us be thankful that some lodges can celebrate. But how sad are the messages of loss of membership last year and the last few years. 800 in the last four years. However, the loss of 329 by death in one year 1951, makes up for a great share of the 800 above. The loss, of course can be made up only by new members. Naturally this loss will increase and can be balanced only by growth in new members. That must be clear to all.

I like the article on "Love" by Julius Andersen, and the last paragraph, especially, should be impressed upon the hearts of all members. Maybe it should be read at all the meetings, as some members may fail to see it. However, I do not agree in full with Jul. Andersen, in his other message, "Aftermath." He did not like the meeting in Detroit. Well, others have remarked as to this too. These National meetings are very likely too much concerned with entertainment! Generally people report on "the good times" they had, but not so much on what was accomplished. But my main disagreement with Jul. Andersen is on his objection to the election of members to the supreme board to positions higher than the lowest office. He thinks that all members should start on the first rung of the ladder and gradually be moved up; but no skipping of a rung. It can happen that some one has been elected who did not have the energy and capacity to advance up the ladder. Then a new member appears on the scene and gives evidence of greater ability and the members feel that he should be advanced more than one rung, and lo and behold, he skips one step. Well, after all, we do want the most capable men to steer the boat thru storms that may come up, and I think that the voters should have the right to vote for the best men, whether on the ladder or standing near by! The leaders should consist of men with ability, push and ideals that fills them with energy to work for the best progress. I would not like to have the law specify that when a man once gets his foot on the

bottom rung, then he must be boosted from year to year to a higher rung, just because he succeeded in making the first step. I attended most of the meetings in Minneapolis, 1943, as a visitor, and I said to myself: two of the officers would be advanced because of their ability to express in good oratory and in good common sense, their ideas. They were Svend Petersen and Hilmar Hansen. I am wondering if they did not both skip a rung on the ladder! To me it seems as if the officers (especially the retiring ones) are honored plenty with gifts, etc. Having done a job well for four years is in itself an honor, that need not be covered with ribbons and gifts to any large extent. There is an old song: "Give me a Flower while I am living", etc. The supreme officers need sometimes to feel that appreciation WHILE IN OFFICE, more so than "flowers when they are out." Let us honor the best members by trusting them with office, even though they may jump over a rung now and then. The other method could be dangerous, after all it takes executive power and skill to be president and not just the ability to get on the first rung of the ladder.

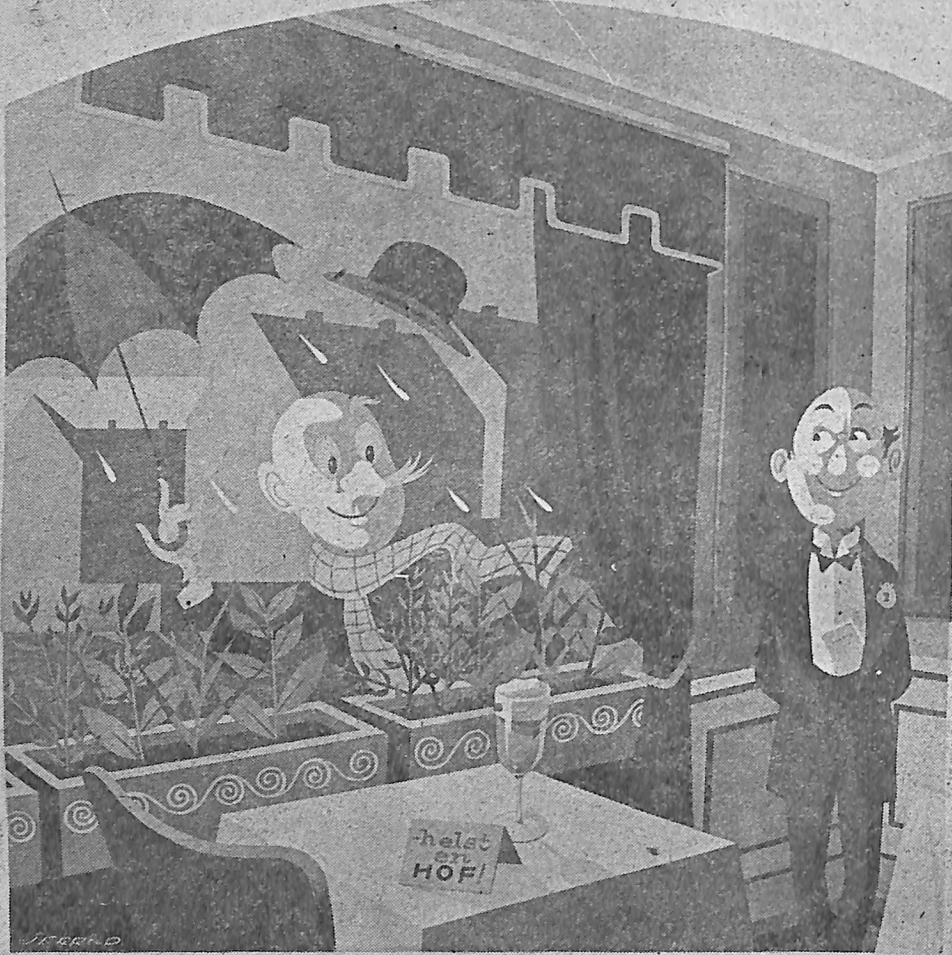

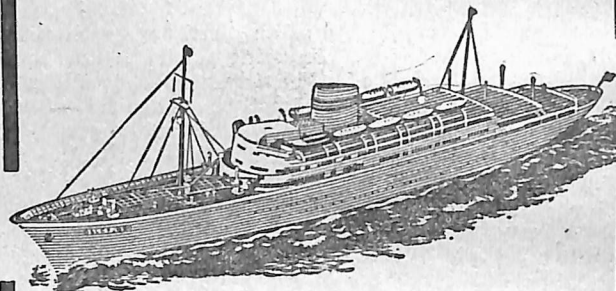
