The guests thoroughly enjoyed the outing. Dancing in the clubrooms concluded a very pleasant evening.

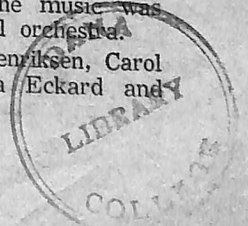

Inter-Mountain Tidbits

For some people the convention of the Utah and Idaho Lodges General Committee started two weeks early at the arranging committee meeting at Brother Ancker's place. Not maybe so much for the decisions as for the surprise table set by "Stine," Mrs. Ancker. Have you ever eaten an open-face sandwich about a foot long with all kinds of meat, fish, cheese, etc., on, one after the other? And regular "Aalborg Akvavit." For a starter of a convention it can not be surpassed and this culinary prologue was an inducement for the whole affair.

On September 1 delegates and their wives met at the lodge hall of Lodge 78, host this year, for a buffet style luncheon. The election results were: Ex-president, Edgar W. Hansen; president, Rasmus Christensen; vice president, Nick Jorgensen; secretary, Hilmar W. Hansen; treasurer, Soren Jespersen; correspondent, Borge Kragh; directors, Mart Jorgensen, No. 78; Einar Jensen, No. 264; Kjeld Jorgensen, No. 278. The installation of these Brothers was performed by Brother Henry Andersen with Brother John Olsen as conductor.

Although it is said that a well done job is a reward in itself, nobody felt offended in the reward they received in a cocktail hour at the new "Lowell's Restaurant" where the banquet took place.

A little intermezzo like that not alone brings the group together, it also sharpens the palate, something not entirely necessary at this special occasion as the food was extremely fine, plentiful, well served and every other adjective one can think of in connection with a dinner may be used here. A beautiful program, printed by Brother Henning Fano, was at every setting, and elaborate flower decorations on the tables were donated by Brother Mart Jorgensen, and at the finish distributed to three very grateful ladies.

Toastmaster Hilmar Hansen took charge of what looked like an endless program by reading greetings from Secretary of Lodge No. 49 in San Francisco, Calif., Brother Rudolf Olsen (thanks Rudolf) and then presented the newly elected officers, a group that more or less has held these jobs for many years. After getting the circulatory system back to normal by standing and singing a few songs to the accompaniment of Mrs. Ida Lubbers, Brother Ib Eckman was introduced to tell of his experiences in Greenland as a Danish military pilot among the Americans.

A rare experience was it thereupon, to hear a recitation by Mrs. Jonna Olsen, an 80-year-old lady reciting like a maiden in her bloom. Your correspondent's limited vocabulary prohibits the elaborate praises due. For an amateur to follow such grandeur is murder, so it is a good thing that the next number was somewhat of a professional nature. Brother Allan Kragh and Miss Diane LaFlame are, as earlier mentioned, two-thirds of Peter, Paul and Mary and they dispelled any doubts in their selections and presentation of American folk music, not alone expertly but, also, let us say sweetly performed to the well-earned applause from a captive audience.

Sister Ebba Jorgensen, Brother Einar Jensen and Brother Kjeld Jorgensen brought greetings from their respective lodges and Einar Jensen invited the Brothers to come to Pocatello for the convention next year.

Following another session of community singing Brother Borge Kragh was called upon to speak about the Brotherhood. After a little wandering history he praised the old Brothers who are the backbone of the DB and chided the younger set who have forgotten the pledge they took when they entered the Brotherhood, and finished by wishing the delegates luck at the national convention; the Brotherhood deserves it. His speech might suggest that he himself is getting old; quite deceiving though.

And again Allan and Diana entertained with their guitar and harmonies before the last speaker, the dean of our lodges, Soren Jespersen, spoke in his deepfelt words about Denmark, America and the Brotherhood. No one can, in lyrics and prose, speak like Soren, and no one, no matter how late it is, would miss a word of his talks. It being very late, the toastmaster then presented the committee (let it here be known that outside of one little meeting, Hilmar himself had arranged every bit of this convention to complete perfection) and thanked everybody for their presence, and finally proudly presented a new member application.

With the singing of the national anthems the program closed. The participants and audience were exhausted but happy for a very beneficial convention.

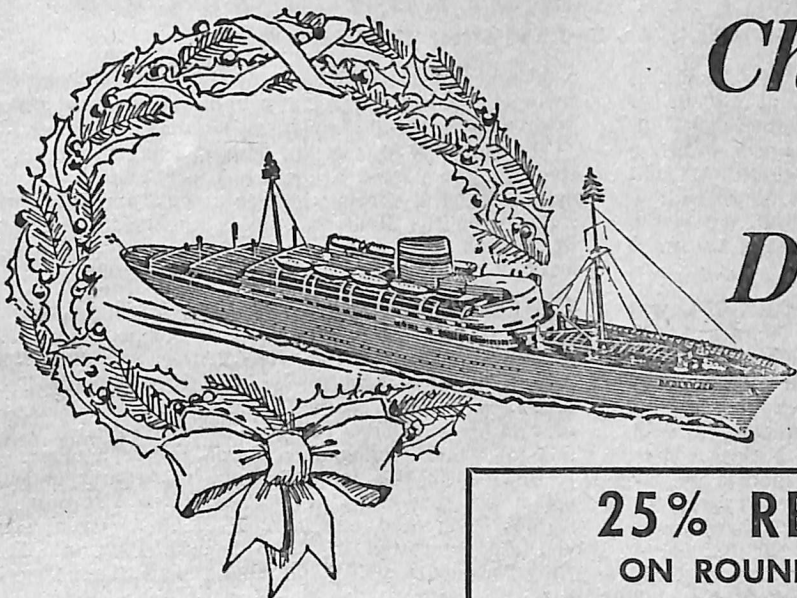

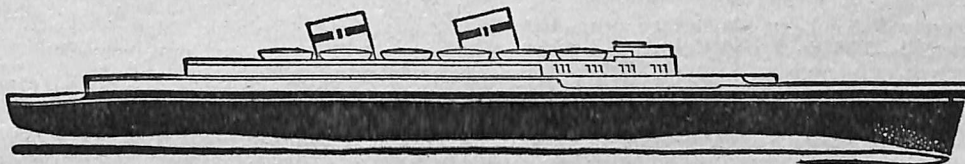
Our president, Carl Michelsen, bade us welcome and we did justice to the well prepared dishes.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST DB NEWS

This is the month when daylight saving areas return to standard time and daylighters will regain that hour they lost last spring. To many today, the time situation remains confusing, especially when a neighboring town is an hour ahead or behind.

But how much better now than before 1880 when a Scotch-Canadian tackled the time problem. In those days, each community kept its own time but caused only mild headaches as long as there was slow dealing with other communities. When the railroads came, the situation changed to migraine proportions as travelers were continually resetting their watches. There were 38 different time zones in Wisconsin and 27 each in Illinois and Michigan.

A civil engineer by the name of Sanford Fleming came from Scotland to Ontario and in due course proposed that the globe be divided into 24 zones with Greenwich, England, as the base or place of the prime meridian. Westward, time would be reckoned an hour earlier for each zone; eastward, an hour later.

Our nation now has seven zones, including the three covering Hawaii and Alaska. Today, thanks to Mr. Fleming, we have little trouble in ascertaining the correct time but the best way to spend that hour some get back in October remains a puzzle. Why not spend it calling on that DB prospect?

Plans for the Fifteenth Annual District Convention in 1964 at Junction City, home of Westen-Stjerne DB 268, are already being discussed. Last year, under the able leadership of President John Bech, Spokane, just back from Denmark, the Oregonian, Washingtonian and Canadian Danes set goals for a gigantic membership campaign. This year, directed by President Jack Jensen, Vancouver, B. C., we want to experience the results of that goal.

Looking ahead to next year, this could be one of the busiest in the district's 16 years of existence and with Promotional Chairman Magnus V. Esrom, Portland, in charge, prospects are good. We are very proud to have a part in Promotional Director Paul E. Strand's gigantic project.

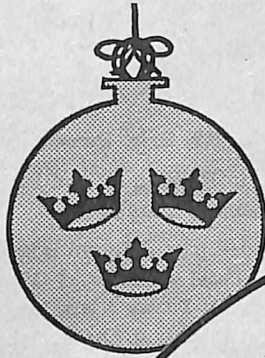

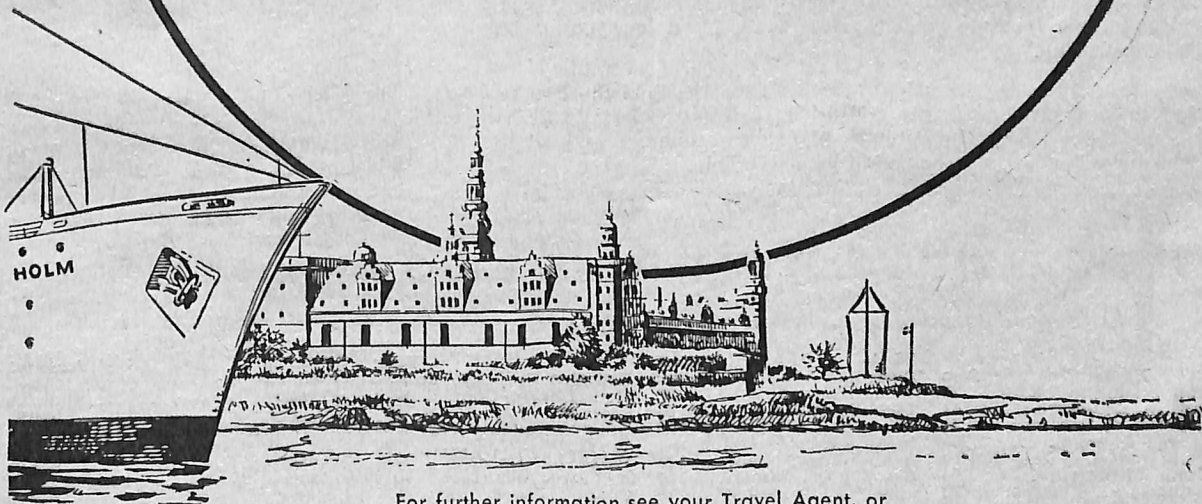

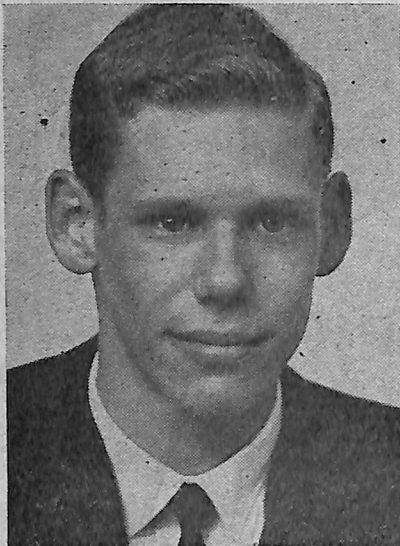

I would like to thank the Danish Brotherhood in America for the scholarship and the honor of receiving it. I will do my best to live up to it.

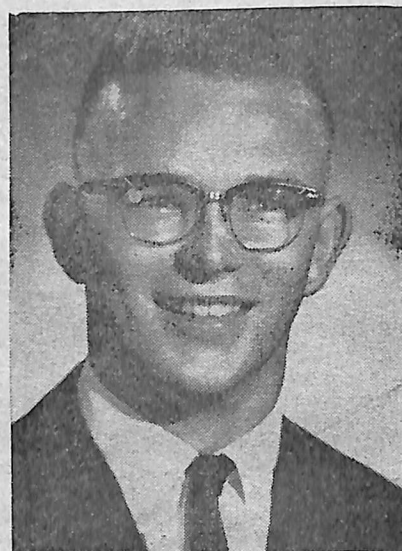
CARL H. HANSEN — Lodge No. 190, Schenectady, New York

Charter Member 96 Years Old

DB LODGE NO. 283, DAGMAR, MONTANA

John William Reimers, a charter member of "Polarstjernen" Lodge No. 283, was 96 years old on June 4, 1963, and thus became the first member of the lodge to attain this age. Only two other charter members are still living who helped establish the lodge on March 15, 1910.

The lodge honored Brother Reimers on his birthday by sending him a bouquet of flowers at the Rosebud Community Nursing home in Forsyth, Mont., where he has lived in recent years. On June 25 Brother Martin Sorensen delivered his insurance check which Brother Reimers was happy to receive and he was very proud of having been a charter member. The head lodge gave a bouquet of flowers for the event.

Forsyth is some 300 miles from Dagmar so Brother Reimers could not be expected to attend a meeting honoring him on the occasion. If he could have done so, he

undoubtedly could have told how he left Chicago, Ill., on May 25, 1908, shipping by rail a car of household furniture, three horses, a wagon, and also some lumber with which to build a claim shack.

He arrived in Culbertson June 4 and the next day started the 40-mile trip to his homestead about five miles southwest of Dagmar. On July 7 the house was built and that evening the community gathered for a dance. On July 10 Mrs. Reimers and daughters, Marie, Elsie and Mildred arrived from Chicago.

Brother Reimers continued his improvements with a small barn. The next spring he broke 17 acres with the three horses and seeded the field to flax. In 1912 he bought an Aultman-Taylor tractor to farm with and also to break land for other farmers. He was road boss from 1911 to 1914. In those days each land owner worked off his road tax. He continued to rent additional land and in 1917 bought three quarters next to the homestead which he farmed until 1940 when he retired and moved to Billings, Mont. CALIFORNIA NEWS

The California Lodges' annual conventions are over and from all reports, both from the Sisterhood and Brotherhood Lodges, these two conventions were a great success. A. B. Christensen, our new President, tells me that it was the best convention since the one we had in San Francisco in 1930. For some of the young people who attend the conventions these days, that seems a long time ago, but as I was installed President that year by the late Supreme President John Christensen, the San Mateo convention is vivid in my memory and I am inclined to agree with ABC.

Of course, after 42 years of existence there is not much that needs to be changed in our by-laws, but as we, as far as the Brotherhood was concerned, were meeting just before the National Convention in Erie, Pa., there were of course, proposals to talk over, and decisions on what to support. In this respect I was somewhat disappointed; too few of the delegates to the National Convention had really studied the many proposals.

As in so many instances like this, the delegates seemed to be bent upon election. Who to put into the line of officers and what city to be selected for the next convention. In the latter instance, we had two invitations, one from Ferndale and one from Solvang. I am afraid the delegates from Solvang were not on their toes, because they let Ferndale get it away from them, and that city was selected as the next convention city. The Ferndale lodge had an excellent spokesman in Brother Paul Chance who with the cooperation of Ferndale and Humboldt county's convention bureau was able to swing the delegates.

Ferndale used to be known as little Denmark in that it was really settled by Danes. Ferndale has some of the finest dairy farms in California, but today they are not owned by Danes but by Portuguese. However, there are still a good many Danes in Humboldt county. Peculiarly enough, Solvang was to a large extent settled by Danes from Ferndale.

Going back to the convention I would like to compliment the excellent Convention committee under the joint leadership of Brother Al Tunsen and Sister Bessie Olsen and they must have understood how to make a committee work by team work. The social affairs were excellent and as far as the business meetings of the Brotherhood were concerned they were conducted expertly by Brother Alvin N. Olsen.

At the request of the Los Angeles Lodge, the General Committee decided to sponsor a charter flight to Denmark next May, with return in July. The chairman of the charter flight will be Brother Fred Holm of Los Angeles, and while I understand the flight is pretty well sold out, there is always a chance for cancellations; so if you are interested you should contact Brother Fred Holm, 5019 - 7th Avenue, Los Angeles. The rate will be \$410 round trip from Los Angeles to Copenhagen and return. The charter will be via SAS DC-8 jet.

Besides deciding upon the usual prizes for membership, Brother Fred Holm donated \$30 to go for membership prizes: One first prize of \$15, second prize of \$10 and third prize of \$5.

As he has done for several years, our Supreme President Hans M. Andersen donated \$50 for bowling prizes. The convention itself donated \$75 for bowling prizes for the current year, and during the tournament held on Sunday the Norman Dan Andker trophy was won by

Solvang team No. 1. The Willy Christensen and George Hansen trophy for the best player was won by Brother Fred Jensen of Oakland. The new president, A. B. Christensen, appointed Brother Jim Jørgensen of Stockton as bowling chairman for the coming year. The new officers of the General Committee are as follows:

Past President, Alvin N. Olsen, Ripon; President, A. B. Christensen, Hayward; Vice President, Melvin Oredsen, Oakland; Secretary-Treasurer, Rudolph Olsen, San Francisco, elected an officer for the 36th time; trustees Frederik Andersen, Fresno; Mrs. Esther Hansen, Long Beach; Levi Persson, Solvang; conductor, Arne Johansen, Santa Barbara; inner guard, Harald Mathiasen, Los Angeles; and outer guard, Peter Nørby, San Diego. In the line of officers we find no less than three writers for "Bien." A. B. Christensen, the president; Levi Persson, trustee, and Peter Nørby, outer guard, so if the Danish Brotherhood does not get enough publicity during the coming year we can safely blame the above three officers. So please do your stuff.

When this is read the National Convention of the Danish Brotherhood in Erie, Pa., has already taken place. In my next column I hope to be able to give you some of my impressions of the convention.
