CALIFORNIA NEWS

Should anyone tell you that the Danish Brotherhood is dying in California just let them know they don't know what they are talking about. Last month (March) a new lodge was instituted in southern California, on April 10 another new lodge was instituted in Fremont, Calif., and today, as I am writing this, another new lodge will be instituted in San Bernadino, also in southern California. So the last couple of months have been very busy indeed for our Supreme Trustee and secretary-treasurer for our General Committee, Al Tunsen and our president, Melvin Oredsen and their many co-workers. A very fine work for DB has been done. One hears rumors that other new lodges are in the process of getting started.

Unfortunately, I was unable to be present at the institution of Anker Lodge No. 337 in Fremont, but our Past President A. B. Christensen of the General Committee was and he has been good enough to write a report and I think I can do no better than to quote him:

"After a good dinner in the Elks club in Fremont April 10 about 100 people gathered in the meeting room of this establishment. Supreme Trustee Brother Al Tunsen announced that he had chosen Brother Vernon Olsen, past president of the General Committee and secretary of Valley Lodge 332 to act as conductor in the institution of Anker Lodge No. 337. After having honored Past Supreme President Hans M. Andersen by having him seated at his right side, Brother Tunsen proceeded with the institution and initiated 19 charter members plus seven dual members.

"As usual when Brother Tunsen performs a ritual he comes up with the unusual. He has a way of making a simple ritual into a very solemn and beautiful affair that leaves a favorable impression of our order on the spectators.

"This was followed by installation of the lodge officers by Brother Melvin Oredsen the president of the General Committee, assisted by Brother Willy Christensen, outer guard and the colorful drill team of Olga Marie lodge 166, Hayward, who were assisted by Blance Anderson at the piano.

"Brother Oredsen, a past master in lodge work, performed the ritual to perfection and Conductor Willy Christensen, after some trouble with our new badges and his first experience in presenting these to "female" brothers, also deserves credit for a good performance.

"At this point the presidents of Lodges 39 in Oakland and 49 in San Francisco, Sidney Nelson and Douglas Petersen, entered with flying colors, Brother Nelson carrying Old Glory and Brother Petersen old Dannebrog both gold-fringed.

"Brother Nelson in presenting the American flag expressed best wishes from his lodge, the oldest in California, stating his lodge was happy to present this flag to the newest with the hope that it would serve long and well.

"Brother Petersen in presenting 'Dannebrog' found it appropriate to do so in the tongue of the people it symbolized. He told the old story of how 'Dannebrog' fell from the heavens as an answer to a prayer to spur the Danes on to battle the heathens and with 'Dannebrog' before them, the Danes won.

"He hoped that this particular beautiful Dannebrog which his lodge presented to the new lodge would be a symbol to help them overcome obstacles as the original Dannebrog did for the Danish warriors in 1219.

"What good is a leader of the lodge without a gavel?

Apparently this was what Willy Christensen and Villy Jonsson, vice president of 49 thought, so they pooled their resources and procured a beautiful engraved gavel with the name of the new lodge and number. It was 'gift wrapped' by being tied to the neck of a bottle of champagne which had been placed in a bucket of ice. The champagne did not last the evening out, however the gavel is intact and will keep order in Anker Lodge No. 337 for a long time.

"Melvin Oredsen is the first General Committee President to install officers in two new lodges in our Brotherhood in California and when this is read there will be three. Brother Oredsen is naturally proud of this feat and wants it remembered and doesn't want his latest 'baby' lodge, at this writing, to forget it, so he immortalized the event by presenting a plaque reading 'Good luck, Anker Lodge No. 337, April 10, 1965, in appreciation of the privilege to install your first officers-elect. May you always prosper and grow.'

"We are sure that No. 337 will always display this plaque with pride for Brother Mel is, for good reasons, well liked by the membership of the new lodge.

"The new 'baby' already before its institution started laying plans for the future. One of these, a float entry in local parades and possibly also in the proposed parade during the General Committee's convention in Solvang in August.

"The tri-city area, Fremont, Newark and Union City, is one of the fastest growing areas in California and the lodges here look forward to enlarge its membership rapidly as many people are moving into this area."

I am sure we are all happy for the above report from Brother A. B. Christensen, but what he did not say in his report is, that he is really the "father" of this lodge and hence its name "Anker." Brother Christensen has for many years been the moving factor in Lodge No. 184 in Hayward, and now that we can hold dual membership he is also a member of the new lodge. And I am sure the officers will often come to Brother ABC for fatherly advice.

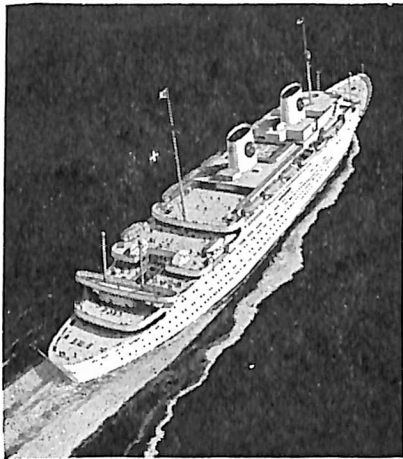

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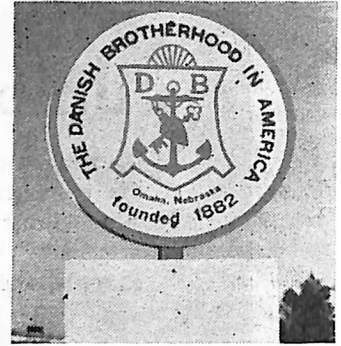
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For 40 Aar Siden

Ja, tiden gaar; For 40 aar siden var nogle af os unge mennesker —, jeg var med. Vi skrev 1925 og jeg var en ægte "Greenhorn" med bare et aar i Staterne.

1925, alt var nyt, friskt og ungt og vi gik paa med humør, vort gode gamle DBS var det naturlige mødested for enhver dansker, og der var det, at retningslinierne for en stor del af vor tilværelse blev udstukket.

Ærlighed, trofasthed og kammeratskab var nogle af de idealer vi havde medbragt fra Danmark, men som nu først fik betydning da vi paa egne ben skulle skabe en fremtid, uden hjælp fra familie, uden støtte af sociale foranstaltninger tilrettelagt af Regering.

Jeg blev medlem af DBS for 40 aar siden den 17. Juni 1925. Det var her jeg fandt det mod og den moralske støtte der siden har været den kilde hvorfra jeg kunne øse naar ensomheden eller modgang forsøgte at stanse mig vejen.

Der skete imidlertid ting af langt støtte betydning for Samfundet end det at jeg blev medlem, det var der jo mange der blev. For 40 aar siden blev Lodge Nr. 318, København, indstiftet; det var jo en langt større begivenhed. Broder Arthur London var dengang rejst tilbage til Danmark med fuldmagt fra Hovedlogen til at danne den første danske loge af DBS udenfor De Forenede Stater.

Det var den 8. Maj 1925 at broder London grundlagde Loge Nr. 318. Den dag vil næppe glemmes. Vi har 40 aars stiftelsesfest i aar, og som enhver ved har Loge Nr. 318, der blev stiftet som et bindeled mellem logebrødre i amerika og deres gamle barndomsland, forsøgt at leve op til denne sin opgave efter bedste evne. Det er mange landsmænd og brødre der i de forløbne aar er budt velkommen herhjemme i "318" hvor man ofte har truffet gamle venner fra de aar man tilbragte derover.

En saadan opgave kan jo kun en Loge i selve moder-

landet opfylde, men ligesom vi i Loge Nr. 318 altid vil hjælpe og støtte enhver broder, vil vi i lige grad ære og agte de tusinder af brødre, kendte og ukendte, der engang drog ud, men aldrig kom tilbage.

Det er ikke alene de levende brødre vi i Loge Nr. 318 vil gøre noget for, det er ogsaa vore afdøde brødre og dermed er jeg midt i det allervigtigste af hvad der skete for 40 aar siden.

Dette er nemlig skabelsen af Mindehøjen ude i Søndermarken. Efter en indvielse af helt fantastiske dimensioner med en deltagelse af ca. 50.000 mennekser og med Kong Christian d. 10 i spidsen, — forglemtes Mindehøjen lidt efter lidt.

I 1950 holdt Loge Nr. 318 en 25 aars mindefest der desværre ikke gentages og derefter glemte man Mindehøjen igen og tiden skjulte den efterhaanden nænsomt med sin barmhjertige vegetation der snart blev et vildnes.

En frisk ung og initiativrig Park-administration fik omsider ryddet op i tingene og for to aar siden tog Loge Nr. 318 opgaven op og besluttede hvert aar at holde et stævne derude.

Loge Nr. 318 er, ifølge section 160 af Samfundets bilove, moralsk forpligtiget til at virke som vort Samfunds Agent her i Danmark, og vi tager dette meget alvorligt, men vi udvider den moralske, til ogsaa at omfatte en kulturel pligt, nemlig at se til at vore gamle pionerere's minde holdes i agtelse og ære.

Derfor samles vi ved Mindehøjen en gang om aaret for i ærbødighed at nedlægge en lille krans til ære for dem der engang drog ud, men aldrig kom tilbage.

Ogsaa i aar vil vi samles derude i den lyse friske grønne Park, men derom senere.

Maa held og lykke følge alle vore venner og brødre derude. Hjertelig hilsen.

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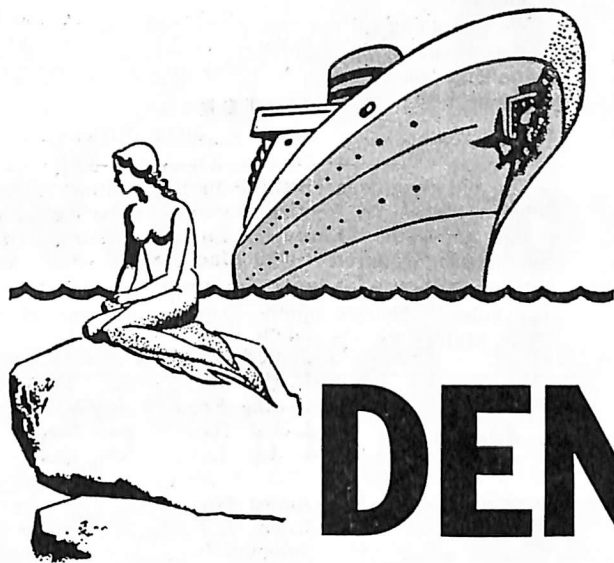
