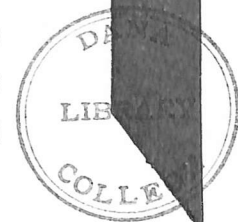

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DB EXCURSION TO DENMARK

We are now getting so close to the departure times for the ship and air excursions to Denmark that a payment notice has been sent to all members of the ship excursion and the charter flight. It is within the next couple of weeks that some cancellations can be expected, thus enabling us to accommodate some of the members now on the waiting lists. These waiting lists are not very long and all interested parties, who have not made reservations for the trip, are encouraged to contact the tour manager, as the chances are excellent to secure reservations on the ship, the charter as well as on the group flights from Chicago and New York.

Regarding the proposed visit to Washington, D. C., for the ship passengers, we wish to mention that the Danish Embassy will entertain the Brotherhood members provided that a sufficient number will show interest in such a visit. A circular has just been sent to all tour participants in order to get an idea about how many would be interested in this side trip.

If this visit will materialize, the program will be more or less the same as in 1962. The party will assemble in Chicago on Saturday, June 4, and travel by rail to Washington, D. C., with arrival there Sunday morning. There will, of course, be optional sightseeing tours arranged for those interested. The evening would be spent at the Danish Embassy before the party will leave after midnight by train for New York with arrival there in the early morning. The new M/S KUNGSHOLM is scheduled to sail at 11:30 a. m., on Monday, June 6.

Further details about the Washington visit will be sent to all interested parties as soon as it is known just how many persons would be going. This trip is not definite as yet.

Members who are interested in Washington and who will not be staying overnight in New York, will be leaving by rail from Chicago on Sunday morning, June 5, and arrive in New York in the morning of June 6; a few hours before sailing time.

Many members wish to take advantage of the special rail fare in connection with the EURAIL-Pass — unlimited first class rail transportation in 13 countries at a cost of \$99 for 21 days. Passes for one, two and three months duration are also available.

The popular Fairy Tale Tour of Denmark and other short tours in the Scandinavian countries are outlined in an attractive brochure, which is available on request.

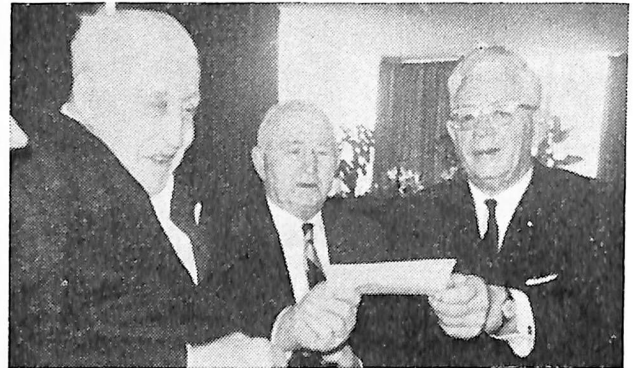

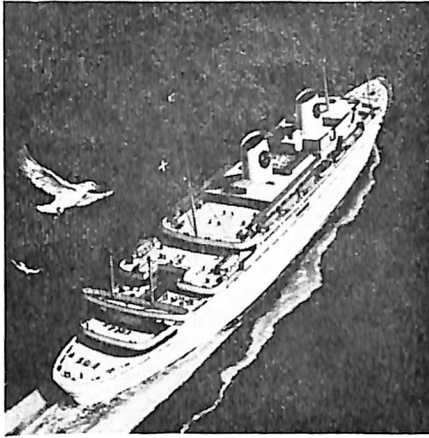
Brother Tapager was born in Jutland, Denmark in 1870 and immigrated to this country with his parents when he was 18 years old. He worked as a carpenter and later went into business with John Hanson. This partnership dissolved in 1913, when he formed the Tapager Construction Company.

Many buildings are credited to his company and are still standing in the city and many more in other cities. Creameries, post offices and municipal buildings were his main objectives.

Chris is a member of the Danish Brotherhood, the Elks and Odd Fellows, YMCA and several others, and a member of the Trinity Lutheran church.

He is now a guest of the St. John's Lutheran home, but is still interested in the progress of Albert Lea.

Brother Tapager lost his wife in 1942. His two daughters and a son have also passed away. One daughter, Mrs. D. W. Gove (Eleanor) lives in Seattle, Wash.

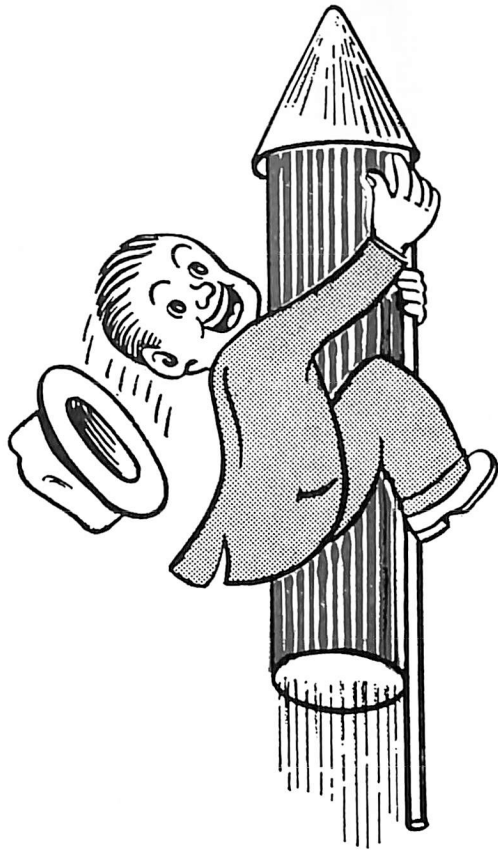

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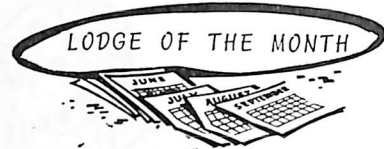

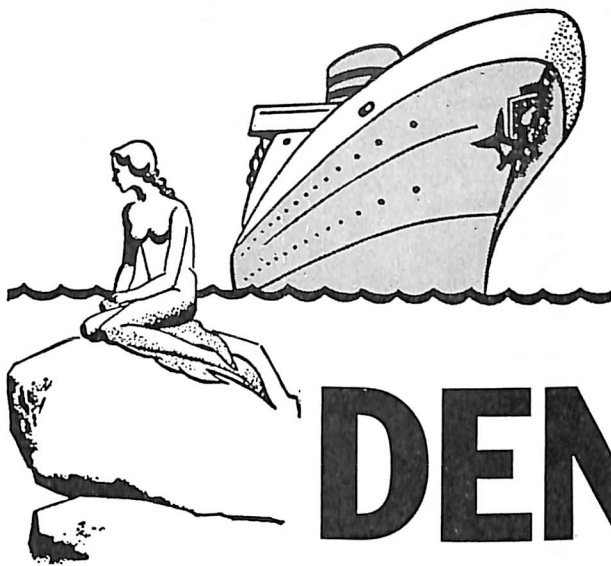

The amounts used are taken from our records subject to final audit when the lodge report is received. Secretaries who find an asterisk (*) after their lodge number are asked to submit their 1965 report (or return it) to the Home Office as soon as possible.

The above listing gives 173 lodges and as reported by the lodges, an adult membership of 10,026 consisting of 8,443 insured and 1,583 social; a total of one monthly assessment for all lodges of \$12,043.93 and a combined amount of insurance of \$6,388,750.

In addition to the above tabulation, as reported by the lodges, we have 735 juvenile members with an amount of \$926.90 for one monthly assessment and insurance of \$658,000.

This brings the adult and juvenile membership tabulation to a grand total membership of 10,761; one monthly assessment of \$12,970.83 and a total sum of insurance of \$7,046,750.

All lodges have in 1965 paid:

In sick benefit to members\$ 22,566.65
In extra help to members 7,027.79
Cash and other assets reported 1,341,315.47

The total sum of insurance assessments paid to the local lodge treasurer, but not yet remitted to the Supreme Lodge is not included in the total asset as reported on the annual lodge report. All such assessments must be accounted for, and belong to the Supreme Lodge. However, all other assets belong to the local lodges and the Supreme Lodge has no claim on these where the lodge is in good standing.

With few exceptions lodge treasurers had remitted promptly

when due. In states where it is required to report delinquent lodges at year-end, such requirements were complied with.

The average insured age attained as of December 31, 1965 is 53.27.
