that Mary Kay died from multiple stab wounds in the area of the stomach, officers said.

Sullivan gave this reconstruction of the girl's movements before she disappeared:

Mary Kay was a candidate for the girls' track team and reported for training after school.

She was next seen at the Wigwam Cafe downtown at about 4:30 p.m. Tuesday where she had a hot chocolate. The next and last time she was seen was at 5 p.m. at the corner of a residential street about six blocks from her home. The street abuts Highway 30 A.

School Books Found

During the evening her parents became alarmed, telephoned the police and a search was begun.

About 12:30 a. m. a farmer on his way home noticed some school books which looked as though they had been dropped

not disclose at this time, said he was traveling west on a county road when he saw the books and stopped his car.

He brought the books to police headquarters in Wahoo and Officer Ernest Patzloff accompanied him back to the site.

Some distance from where the books were found they discovered the body of Mary Kay, fully clothed except for her shoes.

Visible From Road

The brown-haired girl, about 5 feet 2, was clad in cutoff blue jeans, a gray sweater shirt and a short brown coat.

The body was easily visible from the road.

Along the road, plaster of paris impressions of tire tracks and footprints were made as investigators from the Nebraska State Patrol joined the police and officers from the staff of Saunders County Sheriff Donald Jelinek.

Authorities were not sure whether the girl died at the scene.

Friends of the girl said she was an average student and pleasant to be around.

Mary Kay, a 17 year old junior in the Wahoo High School, was found stabbed to death along a rural road near Wahoo early last Wednesday morning.

Stabbed Girl Was 'Loner'

Wahoo, Neb.—Saunders Co. Atty. Robert E. Sullivan huddled with law enforcement officers Thursday searching for leads in the mysterious stabbing death of a Wahoo High School junior. No suspects have been arrested.

The body of Mary Kay Heese, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Julius Heese, was found early Wednesday, face up, in a ditch about four miles southeast of here. 3-27-69

Twenty officers from the Nebraska State Patrol, Saunders County sheriff's office and Wahoo Police Department have been working on the case around the clock.

A high school girlfriend of the slain student said Mary Kay had no boyfriends and was known, even among the girls, as a "loner."

The friend said she did not believe Mary Kay would enter the car of a stranger and that it was "highly doubtful" she
