Services were held on Friday, April 17th, for a long time Arlington businessman, Harold D. Weber. Mr. Weber passed away on Tuesday, April 14th, at the Arbor Manor in Fremont. Mr. Weber was 74 at the time of his death.

Mr. Weber was born on May 15, 1895 at Arlington. He is survived by his wife Dottie and one son, Donald, of Omaha. He has one sister, Mr. W. H. Hillegass of Denver, Colorado.

CAPTAIN HARVEY KELLY HONORED POSTHUMOUSLY

Mrs. Yvonne Kelley, widow of Captain Harvey Kelley who was killed in Vietnam, November 20, 1969 was presented the Silver Star for gallantry at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Hansen in Omaha, Wednesday evening. Although Capt. Kelley's Army career in the Regular Army was only 6 years he distinguished himself in his Duty to his Country. As an Advisor to the Vietnamese in 1966-67, he was given awards from their Government for the work he did there. A gift was sent home to his parents Mr. and Mrs. Herman Kuhl of Blair, for his concern and dedication for the people over there of the Village he was assigned to.

Among the 10 citations he received were Silver Star, Purple Heart, Bronze Star with 1st Oak leaf Cluster, Bronze Star with 2nd Oak leaf Cluster, Air Medal for having 25 air missions, Army Commendation Medal, Oak leaf and 4 Vietnamese Citations.
