

## Don Stewart, 75 Died At Hospital Wednesday

Donald D. Stewart, lifetime resident of Blair, died at Memorial Community Hospital Wednesday following an extended period of declining health. He was the son of Dr. and Mrs. E. R. Stewart, early-day physician of the community. He lived with his sister, Ethel, at Sutton Place at 17th and Lincoln Streets, Blair.

Donald D. Stewart was born at Blair May 30, 1896 and he was 75 years of age at the time of his death. He grew to manhood in Blair, was a graduate of Blair High school and had entered the postal service in Blair. He retired from this several years ago. In spare time he was an assistant to several Blair painting contractors.

Andrew Nielsen, lifetime resident of Blair and Washington County, died at the Veterans' Hospital in Omaha last Saturday, September 11th. He was 75 years of age. He was born December 12, 1895 at Blair and he spent his entire life in this area.

He grew to manhood here and for a time farmed west of Blair. His farming operations turned to dairying which he carried on, along with a retail milk route here. Some years ago he moved to Blair and he has lived at 1645 Lincoln Street just east of the Blair Library. Since coming to Blair he has filled a number of jobs. He was a substitute rural mail carrier at the Blair Post Office and he did custodial work for a number of Blair business houses. He also had several regular customers for lawn and garden services.

He was a veteran of World War I and was a member of the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

His wife, the former Edith Amelia Richter, survives. Also surviving are two sons and two daughters.

The sons are Andrew Nielsen, Jr., of Omaha and William Nielsen

of Blair. The daughters are Mrs. Edytha Burke, of Overland Park, Kansas and Mrs. Pryllis Maxwell, of Omaha. A sister, Mrs. Bertha Hall lives in Blair and another sister, Mrs. Marie Densmore lives at Tekamah. There are 8 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren.
