This damaged guard rail was the tip-off that a car might be in the creek below.

The car, traveling east, veered off the bridge railing and flew through the air for a distance of 75 feet before landing on the bank of a small creek. The car landed on its top, crushing it to the doors.

Time of the accident was established at about 3:00 a.m., the Larsens having left shortly before 2:30, according to available information. The car was not found until almost noon and at that time the engine was cold, indicating that the family had been pinned in the car for six to eight hours. The accident had been discovered by a passing motorist

who noted the place on the bridge which had apparently been struck. Mr. Larsen was the owner and operator of the New Deal Bar in Kennard, having purchased it last

the victims began. Randy, age nine, was rushed to the Blair hospital and given preliminary treatment and then rushed to Immanuel Hospital in Omaha. Richard 3, was treated for facial cuts at Memorial Community Hospital in Blair.

Mr. and Mrs. Larsen were dead when reached by the Rescue Squad. Russell died of his wounds before help could be given.

The three bodies were taken to the Bendorf Funeral Home in Blair.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Larsen were natives of the Kennard area. Mr. Larsen was the son of the late Earl Larsen and Mrs. Larsen was the daughter of Lambert Coufal, a Kennard resident now deceased. Mothers of both of the victims are among the survivors. Norman D. Larsen was 26 years
